## **DC UPDATE**

**Shutdown edition:** We need to let our members of Congress know the consequences of not fully funding TB programs across the USA, especially considering the millions who are about to lose their healthcare, and TB medication prices are increasing yet again!

**Keep/emailing your 3 members of Congress!** The Capitol Switchboard is **1-202-224-3121**, and our top action is to continue to ask your Rep. and 2 Senators to ask Leadership for \$225 million for CDC's TB programs in FY26, or at least an increase for inflation in any long-term continuing resolution (CR):

**Sample script 1:** As your constituent and a public health advocate, I urge you to speak out in favor of strong funding for the CDC's TB programmatic and research funding. Since TB anywhere is TB everywhere, we cannot afford the risk of further increased rates of transmission or drug resistance. TB drug prices alone demand an increase in funding, let alone the three years of increased cases. [*Add a sentence about why you care.*] Will your boss speak to the Chair and Ranking Member of the Appropriations Committee in support of \$225 million for CDC's TB programs? I look forward to hearing a response. [*Leave phone number or email if you wish to receive a response.*]



# TB BOOKSHELF

The Underdream by Aiyana Masla

Tuberculosis (TB) is now treatable. And the resulting loss of its punch as a literary device is worth it: there are plenty of illnesses out there for a contemporary Keats or Bronte. Disease does not define the deathbed, after all, be it squalid (e.g., Tolstoy's *Anna Karenina*), luxurious (Thomas Mann's *Magic Mountain*—featured TB Wire, December 2024) or a curious mix (Baz Luhrmann's *Moulin Rouge*). Deadly, if not a guaranteed death sentence, TB still has a place in contemporary settings—especially when it's the author's own journey—as Aiyanna Masla demonstrates in her second collection of poems, *The Underdream*.

While current TB treatment may not inspire the meditations on time with which Mann peppered *The Magic Mountain*, it is long by any standards–certainly to those who hear "antibiotics" and expect a 3-14 day course of treatment. Accordingly, *The Underdream* continually provides the *when* – time of day, month, season – and the *how long*.

As Masla writes:

[...]
Thumps repeated, long hours
on the windowless clinic,
pushes side effects, night terrors,
harsh daily swallows of chemical pills.
[...]
drags pain through this year, & the next.

("Greywater")

One recalls Stephen Linton's description of TB sufferers in *Out of Breath* (TB Wire, September 2024) as people who "[...] eat, take bitter pills and then sit around and lament [their] situation." Masla certainly has more freedom—of any type—than the North Korean patients in that documentary, but the imposed lack of agency sours any 'At least I'll have time

to' thoughts:

I do not want the excuse of of sickness

to need the reason of illness

[...]
to have twenty-eight hours
listening & quiet.

("Spell for a Slower Life")

Masla wants to "Walk, walk & walk until we're blistered" and engage in "[s]pontaneous dancing" in the rain "or a crowded pulsing room/where I have to shout to be heard over sweaty thumping music." ("I'm Not Ready Yet"). Instead:

The sick woman, out for her walk, early down the driveway gravel & mud Then back up it again

half an hour's time, enough.

The Underdream is filled with color, but that is not necessarily a counter to the risk of ethambutol-induced color-blindness, nor is every mention of "red" related to bloody sputum. Rather, as a visual artist, Masla is simply shifting from watercolors to language, giving the reader "Kidney yellow & chalk white,/plastic red", "loyal blue", and "devoted gold"

Those coming to *The Underdream* from this newsletter should be wary not to try to read everything as relating to TB. Similarly, the often jarring spacing within and between lines, be it extensive or absent, need not reflect shortness of breath, a coughing fit, or a midsentence cognitive short-circuit that comes with the antibiotic cocktail; as a visual artist, the composition of words, how they appear on the page, matter. That said, as of this writing, no audio exists online of her reading her poems: I hope one day to hear her perform them and what she does with the pauses and the emphasis of the volume's sole use of all-caps:

[...] lusting after tight seams

the crease & the wrinkle-less

always

dreaming of DONE.
