This Tool Kit was designed with you in mind. Inside, you'll find resources to help you:


- Clarify your family's values,

Library & Curriculum Review Guide

A Parent Tool Kit Resource

Purpose

This guide helps parents review the materials their children are exposed to at school—including library books, classroom curriculum, and supplemental resources—and equips them with steps to raise concerns in a constructive, effective way.



Step 1: Check What's Available

Library Materials

- Visit your school's website to access the online library catalog. Many districts provide searchable databases.
- Search for books flagged nationally for sexually explicit or violent content (lists are often available from parental rights organizations).
- Ask the school librarian for a full inventory of your child's grade-level library. Parents have a right to this information.

Classroom Curriculum

- Request a copy of your child's syllabus, textbooks, and supplemental reading lists.
- Ask teachers about any digital tools, videos, or outside resources being used.
- Be aware that controversial material may come through supplemental programs (SEL modules, DEI "toolkits," or online platforms).



Step 2: Evaluate for Age Appropriateness

When reviewing materials, ask yourself:

- Does this content contain graphic sexual descriptions or violent imagery?
- Would this material be rated "R" if it were a movie?
- Does this content align with my family's expectations for age-appropriate learning?
- Would I be comfortable reading this book aloud in front of a room of children or parents?



Step 3: Document Concerns

- Write down the title, author, and page numbers of concerning content.
- Save screenshots or photos where appropriate.
- Note how the material was accessed (library, required reading, supplemental assignment).

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Step 4: Address Concerns with the School

- 1. Start with the Teacher or Librarian
 - o Share your concern respectfully and request an alternative for your child.
- 2. Escalate to the Principal or Curriculum Director
 - Submit a written request (email or letter) explaining why you believe the content is inappropriate.
- 3. Formal Review Process
 - Most districts have a "challenged materials policy." Ask about it and follow the steps to submit a review.
- 4. School Board
 - If your concerns are dismissed, bring the issue to a public school board meeting.
 Use documented examples and keep your comments concise.



Step 5: Work with Other Parents

- Join or form a parent review committee to share findings.
- Organize respectfully—schools respond more quickly to unified parental voices.
- Share resources with your community so more parents know how to check what their children are being exposed to.



Sample Language for Parents

"I've reviewed [book/material] and found content that I believe is inappropriate for children at this grade level. I respectfully request that my child be given an alternative and that the school review this material for suitability."



Bottom Line

Parents are the best advocates for protecting their child's innocence and ensuring learning materials are age-appropriate. Review, document, and raise concerns confidently—because when it comes to what our kids see and read, My Kid. My Choice.



Know Your Rights

Parents, You Are Not Powerless.

The law recognizes that parents—not government agencies, schools, or outside activists—hold the primary responsibility and authority to raise their children. But many parents don't know the full extent of their rights, and some schools or institutions won't tell you unless you ask.

That's why My Kid, My Choice created a series of Know Your Rights resources: practical guides that explain what you're entitled to, how to access it, and what steps you can take if your rights are ignored.

Use these pages to get informed, take action, and protect your role as the decision-maker for your child's future.

Why It Matters

School boards make decisions that directly affect your child's education, the curriculum taught, the books in the library, and the policies that shape your child's daily environment. Attending—and speaking at—school board meetings is one of the most powerful ways for parents to influence local education.



Step 1: Find Your School Board Meetings

- <u>Check Online:</u> Visit your school district's website. Look for a tab called "School Board," "Board of Education," or "Governance." Meeting schedules, agendas, and minutes are usually posted there.
- Ask Directly: Call your school's front office and ask for the board meeting schedule.
- <u>Sign Up for Alerts:</u> Many districts allow you to sign up for email alerts when agendas are posted.
- Note: In New Mexico, boards are legally required to post their meeting agendas at least 72 hours in advance.



Step 2: What to Expect at a Meeting

- <u>Structure:</u> Meetings usually begin with formalities (pledge, roll call), then move into reports, agenda items, and public comment.
- <u>Public Comment:</u> This is when parents can speak—usually limited to 2–3 minutes each. You may need to sign up in advance, either online or at the meeting.
- <u>Professional Atmosphere:</u> Board members sit at a front table; the audience includes parents, teachers, and administrators. Comments are recorded as part of the public record.
- Respectful Conduct: Even when tensions run high, remaining calm and professional strengthens your impact.



Step 3: Preparing Your Comments

- Keep It Short: Most boards enforce a 2-minute limit. Aim for about 250-300 words.
- <u>Stay Focused:</u> Address one clear issue (curriculum, library content, parental rights, etc.) rather than trying to cover everything.
- <u>Be Personal:</u> Share why this matters to your family, not just statistics. Stories resonate.
- <u>Bring Facts:</u> Use evidence—like parental consent laws, NM curriculum rights, or Supreme Court cases—to back up your point.

Step 4: Talking Points for Parents

Use these as starting points, depending on the issue:

On Gender Transitions / Medical Decisions

 "If a student needs parental consent for Tylenol at school, parents should also be involved in life-altering medical decisions like abortion or hormone treatments."

On Education Curriculum

 "Parents are the primary educators of their children. We deserve transparency in what is being taught and the right to opt out of curriculum that conflicts with our values."

On Age-Inappropriate Content in Libraries

 "If a book is too explicit to read aloud at this board meeting, it shouldn't be available to middle school students in the library."

On Education Freedom

 "Every child learns differently. Families—not zip codes—should decide where their kids go to school."



Step 5: Sample Scripts

Script 1 - Curriculum Transparency

"Good evening, my name is [Name], and I am a parent of [X] children in this district. I'm here because I believe parents deserve full transparency in what our children are being taught. Too often, supplemental materials and digital programs are used without clear explanation to families. As parents, we have both the right and responsibility to direct our children's education. I urge this board to ensure curriculum is accessible for parental review and to uphold opt-out rights when materials conflict with family values. Thank you."

Script 2 - Library Content

"My name is [Name], and I'm speaking as a concerned parent. Recently, I reviewed titles available in the school library and found books containing graphic sexual content that is inappropriate for children. If a book cannot be read aloud in this room, it has no place in a school library. I respectfully request that this board establish clear review standards and provide parents with a process to challenge inappropriate materials. Our children deserve safe and age-appropriate learning environments."

Step 5: Sample Scripts (Cont.)

Script 3 - Parental Rights in Healthcare

"Good evening. As a parent, I was shocked to learn that in New Mexico, minors can access abortion and gender-related medical treatments without parental consent. This undermines the most basic responsibility of parents: to protect our children's health and wellbeing. Schools should never encourage or hide medical decisions from families. I ask this board to adopt policies requiring parental notification and involvement whenever sensitive medical issues are raised with students. Parents must not be cut out."



Step 6: Strategies for Speaking with Confidence

- <u>Practice Aloud:</u> Read your comments out loud several times. Time yourself to stay within the limit.
- <u>Bring Notes:</u> Use an index card or printout—you don't have to memorize.
- <u>Speak Clearly & Calmly:</u> Slow down and make eye contact. Passion is good, but shouting weakens your impact.
- <u>Stand with Others:</u> Attend with a group of parents. Multiple voices on the same issue make a stronger statement.
- Follow Up: Send a copy of your comments by email to the board afterward for the record.



Bottom Line

School boards exist to serve families—not the other way around. When parents show up, speak up, and stay engaged, real change happens.

Why Education Freedom Matters

Every child is unique. Some thrive in traditional public schools, while others do better in charter schools, private schools, or at home. Education freedom gives parents the ability to choose the setting that best matches their child's needs and their family's values—without being restricted by zip code or income.



School Choice Options in New Mexico Public School Transfers (Open Enrollment)

- New Mexico allows students to transfer between public schools, even across district lines, if space is available.
- Parents can apply directly to the receiving district.

Charter Schools

- Publicly funded but independently operated, offering innovative approaches to learning.
- Open to all students, regardless of home district.
- Popular options in New Mexico include STEM-focused, arts-integrated, and online charter schools.

Magnet & Specialty Programs

- Certain public schools offer magnet programs with emphasis on science, technology, the arts, or bilingual education.
- Often open through application or lottery.

Online Schools

- New Mexico offers full-time online public schools like New Mexico Connections Academy and Pecos Cyber Academy.
- Families seeking flexible schedules or specialized programs may benefit.

Manage Homeschooling

- Fully legal in New Mexico with notification to the Public Education Department.
- Parents must teach core subjects but have wide flexibility in choosing curriculum.
- Standardized testing is not required.

Funding & Scholarships

- <u> 529 Education Savings Plans (The Education Plan)</u>
- Tax-advantaged savings that can be used for K-12 tuition, apprenticeships, and college
 costs.
- Parents control how and when the funds are spent.
- <u>Proposed Education Freedom Accounts (EFAs)</u>
- EFAs would allow parents to use state-allocated education dollars for private school tuition, tutoring, or homeschool expenses.
- Currently not available in New Mexico but continually introduced in legislation.
- Private Scholarships
 - Many private and faith-based schools in New Mexico offer tuition assistance.
 - National organizations like ACE Scholarships also provide help for qualifying families.



How to Start Exploring Options

- 1. Identify Priorities What matters most to your family: safety, academics, values, flexibility, or special programs?
- 2. Research Local Options Visit district websites, charter school listings, and private school directories.
- 3. Ask Questions What curriculum is used? How are parents involved? What support systems exist?
- 4. Visit Schools Request tours, meet teachers, and talk to other parents.
- 5. Compare Costs & Funding Consider scholarships, tuition assistance, and 529 savings.

What is a Parent Gathering?

The purpose is the same no matter the size: to connect parents, share resources, and empower families to protect their rights and guide their children's future. Parent gatherings create space for conversation, encouragement, and action—because parents are stronger when they stand together.

The goal is to inform parents about their rights, the challenges facing families in New Mexico, and practical steps they can take to protect and guide their children.

Welcome!

Thank you for stepping up to host a My Kid, My Choice Parent Gathering. Whether you're meeting in your living room, at a community center, or in a church fellowship hall, you are creating a powerful space for parents to connect, learn, and take action together.

Remember: you don't have to be an expert to lead this. You just need to care about kids, believe in the power of parents, and be willing to bring people together. We'll give you the tools—you just bring the people.



Tips for Organizing Your Event

- Choose the Setting:
 - Small Group (5-10 people): A living room, coffee shop, or library meeting room.
 Perfect for casual conversation and deep connection.
 - Workshop (10-30 people): A church classroom, community center, or school multipurpose room. Good for structured teaching and group discussion.
 - Town-Hall Style (30+ people): A fellowship hall, civic center, or public meeting space. Best for guest speakers, Q&A, and momentum-building.
- Promote the Gathering:
 - Invite friends, neighbors, and fellow parents personally—word of mouth is powerful.
 - Share a flyer, social media post, or group text to spread the word.
 - Frame it as a safe, welcoming space to talk about parenting challenges and rights.
- Prepare the Space:
 - Arrange seating so parents can see each other—conversation matters.
 - Have a sign-in sheet (so you can share follow-up resources).
 - Provide copies of any MKMC handouts or Tool Kit resources.
 - Keep it light—snacks, coffee, and water always help!

Suggested Agenda (30-60 minutes)

Welcome & Introductions (5 min)

- Greet attendees, thank them for coming, and explain the purpose of MKMC.
- A welcome script is provided for you in this packet.

Overview of My Kid, My Choice (10 min)

Share a brief description of the movement and why parental rights matter.

Key Issues Presentation (10-15 min)

• Highlight 1–2 issues most relevant to your group (e.g., curriculum, parental consent laws, or age-inappropriate materials).

Group Discussion (10-15 min)

• Use discussion questions (provided later in this packet) to spark conversation.

Call to Action & Next Steps (5-10 min)

 Share ways to get involved: email sign-up, school board engagement, volunteering, or hosting the next gathering.

Closing (2-5 min)

• Thank attendees, remind them they are not alone, and end with encouragement.



Conversation Icebreakers

Choose one to start your gathering:

- One Word: Ask everyone to share one word that describes how they feel about parenting today.
- School Snapshot: Ask: "What's one thing you appreciate about your child's school and one thing you'd like to see change?"
- Looking Ahead: Ask: "What's the biggest hope you have for your child's future?"
- Quick Poll: By a show of hands, "Who here feels fully informed about what's happening in your child's school curriculum?"



Host Tip

Your goal is not to lecture but to start a conversation. Encourage openness, validate concerns, and remind parents that they are not alone in this journey.

Opening

"Hi everyone! Thank you so much for being here today. My name is [Your Name], and I'm really glad you decided to join this My Kid, My Choice Parent Gathering.

We all know parenting isn't easy. On top of the daily challenges, there are bigger issues—like what's being taught in our kids' schools, what materials they're being exposed to, and what medical decisions are being made without parents even knowing. That's why My Kid, My Choice exists: to protect the rights of parents to direct their children's upbringing, education, and healthcare.

This gathering isn't about politics or labels—it's about something every parent can agree on: no one knows or loves a child more than their family.

Purpose of the Gathering

"Today, we're here to connect with each other, learn more about the challenges facing families in New Mexico, and talk about practical steps we can take to protect our kids and support one another. You don't need to be an expert—just a parent who cares."

What to Expect

"Here's how our time will go:

- We'll start with a short overview of My Kid, My Choice.
- Then we'll highlight a couple of key issues parents are facing right now.
- After that, we'll have some time for discussion—so everyone can share experiences and ideas.
- And finally, we'll talk about ways to stay connected and take action together."

Icebreaker

"To start us off, let's go around and share [choose one]:

- One word that describes how you feel about parenting today,
- Or, one thing you appreciate about your child's school and one thing you'd like to see change."

Transition

"Thank you for sharing! Let's jump in with a quick overview of what My Kid, My Choice is all about..." (see the Introductory Message below to help explain what MKMC is all about.)

Introductory Message

Here's a short, ready-to-read Introductory Message for you to use at the beginning of a My Kid, My Choice Parent Gathering.

"My Kid, My Choice is a movement built on a simple truth: no one knows, loves, or is responsible for a child more than their parents. Yet today, parental rights are being challenged in ways we've never seen before.

In New Mexico, minors can make life-altering medical decisions without their parents ever being notified. Schools often introduce controversial curriculum without transparency. Libraries hold books with content we'd never want our kids to see at home. And for too many families, the ability to choose a safe and values-aligned education is out of reach.

These are not small issues—they impact our children's health, their minds, and their future. My Kid, My Choice exists to protect the rights of parents to direct their children's upbringing, education, and medical care—ensuring families, not government, shape the values and future of the next generation.

This isn't about politics or labels. It's about common sense, protecting kids, and empowering parents to do what they do best: raise their children with love, wisdom, and care.

And that's why we're here today: to learn, to connect, and to take steps together to make sure our children grow up safe, supported, and prepared for the future."

1. Medical Decisions for Minors

The Issue: In New Mexico, minors can access abortion and gender-related medical treatments (including hormones and surgeries) without parental consent or notification.

Talking Points:

- Parents must sign for field trips and Tylenol—yet are cut out of life-altering medical decisions.
- Puberty blockers, cross-sex hormones, and abortion procedures carry serious risks that children cannot fully understand.
- Parents are a child's best safeguard against exploitation, abuse, or pressure from outside influences.



2. Education Curriculum & Transparency

The Issue: Parents are often kept in the dark about what their children are being taught in the classroom. Supplemental materials, activist-driven lessons, and hidden curriculum can conflict with family values.

Talking Points:

- Parents are the primary educators of their children, and schools should partner with families—not hide from them.
- Transparency builds trust; secrecy erodes it.
- Parents deserve access to curriculum and the right to opt their children out of lessons that don't align with their family's values.



3. School Choice & Education Freedom

The Issue: A child's future shouldn't be determined by their zip code, yet many families are trapped in schools that don't fit their needs.

Talking Points:

- Every child is unique—no one school model works for everyone.
- Families should be able to choose from public, charter, private, online, or homeschool options.
- Education freedom gives parents—not bureaucrats—the power to decide where kids learn and thrive.

4. Age-Appropriate Content in Schools & Libraries

The Issue: Graphic, sexually explicit, or violently graphic books and resources are showing up in school libraries and classrooms, often without parental knowledge.

Talking Points:

- If a book is too graphic to read aloud at a school board meeting, it doesn't belong in a child's library.
- Early exposure to explicit content harms children's mental and emotional health.
- Parents should guide when and how their children are introduced to sensitive topics not schools.



Bottom Line

These issues are different, but they all point to the same truth: parents must remain the primary decision-makers in their children's lives. When families lead, kids thrive. Because when it comes to raising the next generation—My Kid. My Choice.

Healthcare & Consent

- Did you know NM law allows minors to access certain medical treatments without parental involvement? How does that make you feel?
- What safeguards should be in place to keep parents part of major medical decisions?

Education Freedom

- If cost or location weren't an issue, what kind of education would you choose for your child?
- How could more school choice options help your family or community?

Age-Appropriate Content

- Have you or your child ever found inappropriate materials in school? What did you do?
- What standards should guide what's available in school libraries?

Action Steps

- What resources would help you feel more confident as a parent?
- What's one small step you can take this month to be more engaged?
- How can we support each other as parents in this community?
