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SUNCOAST WOODCRAFTERS GUILD GENERAL MEETING MINUTES February 21, 2023 at 7:00 PM Chatelech Secondary School Library 5904 Cowrie Street, Sechelt, BC.

**CALL TO ORDER:** George McKee, President, called the meeting to order at 7:02 pm.

### **GUEST INTRODUCTIONS:**

- **Bryan Cuming:** Primarily a woodturner but will do anything. Started woodworking again around 50 years of age
- Ken Kolterman: Owns a mobile saw mill and also does veneer projects

MEETING PROGRAM: Presentation by Dave Beauchesne titled "Axes: One of mankind's oldest tools. Basic terminology, care, use, handle design, and replacement"

Rick Budd introduced Dave Beauchesne as a hand tool collector and someone who knows way too much about axes.

Dave started his presentation saying that his obsession with hand tools started with his grandfather who made, repaired, and maintained all his own hand tools. Dave received his first real axe from him.




Dave stated that, outside of the wheel, humankind's most important invention is the wedge which is the basis of many tools including the axe and that virtually every civilization has made or used axes.

Evidence of the this was the stone axe which he passed around.

Axes are a staple of the outdoors.

Invention of the chainsaw resulted in the loss of man axe manufacturers, but there has been a resurgence of axe manufacturing in the past 10 or 15 years. Some of these axes are very expensive.

He gave everyone a handout outlining some of the terminology and parts of an axe, how to attach the handle or 'hang' an axe, and axe handle anatomy.



Hammers, axes, and mauls all have the same handle requirements and aren't hard to make.

Handle shapes can be unique.

Quarter sawn wood with the grain running parallel to the axe head is best. You don't want the grain to run out.

The best woods for handles should have some springiness to make using the axe more forgiving on your body. Fiberglass handles usually don't have enough spring.

Axe head designs include the Puget Sound, Rhineland or Montreal, cruiser-style, or hatchets.

Axe heads should ring like a bell when struck with a mallet. If not, they are likely cracked.

Dave hates it when axes are used as a hammer because it can seriously damage the axe.

Axes can be easily maintained by keeping them dry, oiling the head and wood, and keeping them sheathed when not being used. Sheathes are both for safety and protecting the edge.

Sharper axes are not necessarily better. More obtuse angles are better for splitting wood, whereas finer angles are best for chopping down trees.

Nicks in the axe edge can be removed with draw file, then use a sharpening stone to finish the edge. 300 to 1000 grit stones are usually the finest you need to use.

Rick thanked Dave for his terrific presentation and present him with one of Patrick's handmade pens.
