


# Who Eats Who?

#### What To Do:

- 1. Observe the image below.
- 2. First write down everything you know and can remember about the image

# **Explore**

#### What To Do:

- 1. Your teacher will give you a playing card with an animal and what it eats on it.
- 2. When the music starts and your teacher says "Hakuna Matata", get up from your seat and wander around the room until you find someone who has a card of an animal your animal likes to eat or an animal that likes to eat your animal.
- 3. The person with the animal that is eaten should sit down and the person with the animal that has had a meal should take the card and continue looking for more food.
- 4. When no one can find anything more to eat, the students still standing should read what animal they are and what they ate.
- 5. Make a list of what you heard in the space below.


