

Empowering educators to teach students about online safety and human trafficking has proven to be a lifesaving initiative. In FSD1, over 10,000 students have been reached through these efforts, and many have bravely come forward to break their silence, thanks to ONE's education lesson plans and your steadfast support.

This impactful program is taught quarterly, ensuring the message of awareness and empowerment continues to resonate. Our reach is expanding across the Pee Dee region, now extending into middle and high schools. In the 2024-2025 academic year, we are proud to serve students in Darlington and Lake City schools as well. Together, we are building safer communities, one classroom at a time.











Human Trafficking and Online Safety Education Overview

The One Child At A Time Human Trafficking and Online Safety lesson is taught quarterly, with a 1-day 30-minute session provided to every student. This program aims to educate and empower students with critical knowledge about human trafficking and online safety, tailored to their needs and realities.

Incentives for Engagement

To encourage active participation, students have five opportunities to win incentives such as a t-shirt, stress ball, pop socket, pen, or bracelet. Each item is printed with the National Human Trafficking Hotline number, ensuring accessibility to support resources. Additionally, every student receives a card featuring a monitored email for asking questions. On the reverse side, the card displays the National Human Trafficking Hotline and text number for immediate help.

Core Lesson Content

Students gain an understanding of:

- Human Trafficking: Definition and its impact on their community.
- Signs and Grooming Tactics: How to identify red flags and online predator grooming techniques.
- Laws and Online Decisions: How poor choices online can influence their future.
- Safety and Reporting: Practical strategies for staying safe and how to report concerns to a parent, teacher and local law enforcement.

Exit Ticket Survey

At the end of the lesson, students complete an Exit Ticket Survey with the following questions:

- 1. Did you know what human trafficking was before this class?
- 2. List at least five apps that were not discussed in the lesson.
- 3. Is your social media set to private?
- 4. Would you meet someone in real life whom you met online?
- 5. Are you currently being threatened by a stranger online?


These surveys are reviewed by the Health and Science Coordinator or school counselors, providing students with a safe and discreet way to seek help or voice concerns.




The Impact


Data from Fsd1 Exit Ticket for Middle and High School Student's First Semester

Are you currently being threatened by a stranger online? 409 responses





YEAR IN REVIEW

Growing Concerns Of Generated AI and Child Sexual Exploitation.

According to The National Center For Missing and Exploited Children (2024), Generative Artificial Intelligence (GAI) has transformed how we engage with technology, offering groundbreaking tools and solutions. However, this same technology also presents serious risks, especially for children. The National Center for Missing & Exploited Children (NCMEC) is profoundly concerned about the potential misuse of GAI to exploit and harm children sexually.

Over the past two years, NCMEC's CyberTipline has received more than 7,000 reports of GAI-generated child exploitation. These cases are likely just the tip of the iceberg, as many instances remain unreported or undetected. These numbers will grow as GAI technology becomes more widespread and public awareness increases.

The National Missing & Exploited Children (2024) states that GAI enables the creation of fake content, including synthetic media, digital forgeries, and explicit images of children, often through tools like "nudity" apps. These fabricated materials can cause devastating harm, such as harassment, ongoing exploitation, fear, shame, and emotional trauma. Even when the images are entirely artificial, the damage to children and their families is very real.

The risks extend beyond images. GAI is increasingly used to manipulate children in other ways, including generating realistic text prompts for grooming and exploitation. Predators have even utilized GAI in sextortion cases, producing explicit, AI-generated images to coerce children into providing additional material or money. Financial sextortion is a rapidly growing threat, made more accessible by these technological tools.

This represents a new and alarming frontier in child exploitation, demanding immediate and collaborative solutions.
