A Giants trip has been planned for Wednesday, April 11th (see enclosed flyer), and some out-of-the-ordinary excursions are under consideration. We will continue to watch the Post 82 developments, and are still hopeful for a successful resolution. Very little Board turnover is anticipated, and I look forward to continuing to work with this

fter serving for at least a dozen years, including a period as President and as Chair of the Benefits Committee, Dick Callistro has stepped down from the RPESJC Board of Directors.

Over the years, Dick was directly involved in a number of organization accomplishments, including the following:

- Provided leadership on all matters related to the Ventura Settlement, especially the Post 82 beneficiaries' issues;
- Developed and implemented the Alternate Retiree Board member to the Board of Retirement, and also served in that capacity;
- Obtained approval from the Board of Retirement and County of San Joaquin for the allowable use of the Sick Leave Bank to pay for Medicare Part B premiums;
- Cultivated effective working relationships with the County Benefits Administrator and health plan representatives to address issues affecting retirees such as premium costs, coverage, and alternatives such as high and low option plans that provide retirees with more choices;
- Implemented additional benefit options from the Pacific Group Agencies Inc., which also increased membership in RPESJC;
- Took part in open enrollment meetings each March to give and receive information on various health plan options for retirees in attendance;
- Initiated presentations to County employees, who were about to retire, to advise them of RPESJC membership benefits, thus increasing the numbers of RPESJC members.

Dick was an engaging, active Board member. He participated in all the summer picnics and holiday luncheons, working with fellow volunteers to set up the venues and clean up afterwards. He also attended most of the RPESJC social activities from casino bus trips to ocean cruises. Dick developed a number of membership recruitment efforts, including refrigerator magnets that were provided to all retirees, not just RPESJC members. The "marble game" played at each of the monthly RPESJC luncheons was a Dick Callistro creation!

Perhaps most importantly, Dick was an active participant

in RPESJC Board meetings, offering his comments and opinions on all topics discussed. The growth and success of RPESJC is directly attributable to Dick's dedication and service.

Question: What is the best way to talk about my estate plan with my children? I'd like to make things easy for them after my passing but don't want them to know too much about my finances just yet. I still want to keep my financial independence. Thanks!

Answer: Talking about "the end" is not the easiest thing to do. Many people may create some type of estate plans with help of financial and legal professionals, but oftentimes leave their heirs out of the conversation.

How much should you tell your heirs about your estate plan? This is decidedly a matter of personal preference. You may want to share a great deal of information with them, or you may want to keep most of the details to yourself. Either way, they should know some basics.

You don't need to tell your heirs how much they will inherit. You can let them know about the planning steps you have taken to make a difficult time a bit easier. For example, you can tell your loved ones that you have a will and/or a revocable living trust, and whom you have designated as the executor or successor trustee. You can also tell them that you have an advance health care directive in place and inform them who you have named as an agent to make health care decisions on your behalf if you cannot do so.

Obviously, you must keep certain details close to the vest. However, you should at least let your heirs know the location of your important documents, such as wills, trusts and financial accounts. You also need to tell them the contact information for your financial adviser, your CPA, and any other professionals you consult. Tell your heirs the role these professionals have played for you and why their judgment should be trusted. You may even want to bring your heirs to meet them.

So, if you have planned for the transfer of your wealth, you are ahead of many of your peers. Just see that your intentions, and some specific details, are effectively communicated.

BUYING A CAR? CONSIDER THESE THREE QUESTIONS TO HELP SAVE MONEY

When it comes time to buy a car, you can be certain of one thing—it's going to cost you quite a bit of money! With heated (and air

conditioned!) seats, navigation systems, back up cameras, and even self-parking capabilities, today's cars come packed full of helpful features. Here are three choices to consider, as shared by Financial Center Credit Union:

1. New or Used?

As you probably already know, cars depreciate greatly within the first couple of years of purchase. The idea of buying a used car isn't always appealing, especially when you think back on cars that you held onto for 7, 8, or 9+ years. However, buying used doesn't necessarily mean you're taking on a car with a large number of miles or that is missing some of the newest technologies.
