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## FIRE DISTRICT IMPACT FEES

In the State of Idaho, a fire district impact fee is a one-time payment charged to developers or builders who create new residential or commercial buildings in designated fire districts. The fee is intended to cover the cost of providing fire protection services to the new development.

Fire district impact fees are calculated based on the size and type of the new building, and the estimated cost of providing fire protection services to the building over a set period of time. These fees are collected at the time of building permit issuance by the city or county building department and are used to fund purchase of firefighting equipment and construction of new fire stations.

The collection and use of impact fees are regulated by state law and must be used exclusively for the provision of fire protection services. These fees are an important source of funding for the fire district, allowing the necessary resources to provide high-quality fire protection and emergency service to the community.

Retail: Establishments primarily selling merchandise, eating/drinking places, and entertainment uses. By way of example, Retail includes shopping centers, supermarkets, pharmacies, restaurants, bars, nightclubs, automobile dealerships, movie theaters, and lodging (hotel/motel).

Office: Establishments providing management, administrative, professional, or business services. By way of example, Office includes banks, business offices.

Industrial: Establishments primarily engaged in the production and transportation of goods. By way of example, Industrial includes manufacturing plants, trucking companies, warehousing facilities, utility substations, power generation facilities, and telecommunications buildings.

Institutional: Public and quasi-public buildings providing educational, social assistance, or religious services. By way of example, Institutional includes schools, universities, churches, daycare facilities, hospitals, health care facilities, and government buildings.
