Adele Furby: Central Region Director Candidate

I founded NASS in 1986 following my discovery Hungarian Bravo in 1984 and my subsequent invitation from ISG to have Hungarian Bravo become the founding stallion for the North American Shagya-Arabian breed. The ISG accepted NASS and the NASS studbook at that time, and I was the first NASS President until 1993, when I stepped down from that position. I established my Shagya-Arabian Breeding program in 1984 and over the years I concentrated on developing outstanding Purebred Shagya-Arabians as well as Shagya-Arabian/Warmblood crosses. I had over 150 foals born during the years I was actively breeding and I shipped semen all over the country from my stallions *Oman, *Shandor, Starwalker, Janos, Onyx AF, Shagya Royal AF, Nicolette's Revelation, Shagya Raja AF, and *Hadban USA. I haven't produced any foals for a few years, but I have two Purebred mares and one gelding on my little farm, and I offer semen from 5 of my stallions. In 1989 after an apprenticeship with Dr. Ekkehard Frielinghaus, I was named an ISG judge and since that time I have been honored to judge Shagya-Arabian shows in Germany, Switzerland, Hungary, Austria, Norway, Sweden and Venezuela, as well as judging the International Championship Show 6 times. I've served as a NASS BOD member as well as chairman of the Breeding Committee and NASS Inspection Tour judge for the majority of the history of NASS, and I currently am serving as Central Region Director on the BOD, as well as Vice President and BC Chair. I really enjoy serving in those capacities and thus I would appreciate your vote!

Hi, my name is Cameron Gaytko and I live in Texas. I am an avid equestrian and have been competing with Shagya-Arabian bred horses for over 13 years in the sport of Endurance. You may recognize one of them: Lily Creek Kong. I took him to his first limited distance ride in 2013, where he placed third, won High Vet Score, and BC. After that, I knew he would do big things in endurance. He now has 16 100-mile completions, 29 BCs and 27 wins, making a total of 3,000 AERC completion miles to date. Kong is all heart. His mom is a registered Trakehner, and his sire is the Shagya-Arabian stallion, *Dante LCR (Nasrallah x Daphne). Kong has made me to fall in love with the Shagya-Arabian breed. So much so, that I bred an Arabian mare to *KS Tradition and produced the mare I placed 5th on at the 2022 Tevis! So far, I have also bred a filly from Onyx AF, a 2nd filly from *KS Tradition, and I have two *Dante LCR foals due later this year. I am breeding my Tribute daughter to Dante today! Hopefully she takes. Although I compete in endurance, I understand the versatility of the breed across many sports and as a family horse. I am interested in collaborating with other owners to promote the Shagya-Arabian breed here in North America. I would love to have the opportunity to support both the registry and my fellow NASS Members as Central Regional Director.
