NASS 2009 Inspection Tour Report

As this year 2015 draws to a close, NASS is getting ready to celebrate our thirtieth birthday in 2016!! So on this, our tenth NASS Inspection Tour, we are taking a tour and a review of the results of thirty years of Shagya-Arabian breeding with NASS in North America!

As chairman of the NASS Breeding Committee for the majority of those thirty years of NASS history, and as a judge on nine out of ten of the NASS tours, I felt lucky to have the opportunity to not only participate in the tour, but also to put together this newsletter, and in so doing, to review what we have seen on this tour as products of the thirty year's worth of the North American Shagya-Arabian Society's efforts.

Winter Creek Farm, Yacolt, WA.

Our first site, Winter Creek Farm in Yacolt, WA, near Portland, proved to have the largest group of horses to inspect—eleven. Hosted graciously by Carla Christian with major help from Melissa Rodewald, it was a great facility for such an event! Hallie Goetz and I served as judges, and NASS apprentice judge Dr. Keiko Young came down from Seattle to help us judge and photograph the horses also. Last summer Keiko was nominated by the NASS Board of Directors as a judge candidate and Keiko attended the ISG judging seminar in Babolna Hungary. Keiko clearly learned her "lessons" well, as she did an impressive job of helping us judge in Yacolt.

We inspected and evaluated six Shagya-bred mares in Yacolt, and it proved to be quite interesting since all six of the mares had been bred by the same Washington-based farm and had many of their bloodlines in common. All six mares had also experienced less than ideal conditions during their gestation or while they were very

young, many lacking proper nutrition and vet care. A number of these horses were placed in foster homes through an animal rescue organization, Sound Equine Options, and NASS has worked cooperatively with SEO to properly identify and register the horses. All of the horses were shown in good condition, which is a tribute to the tremendous job that their foster caregivers have done, but some are still showing effects of their earlier traumatic circumstances. It was most impressive to us, however, that "blood will tell", and the horses all exhibited sound minds and remarkable recuperative powers. And their caregivers and handlers were an extremely helpful and cooperative group!

The first mare shown, Cantata, was the high scoring mare of the day. Shown by our hostess Carla Christian, Cantata is clearly a dressage and breeding prospect. Although we did not have Cantata's DNA results to verify her pedigree on the day of the inspection, we have subsequently confirmed that Cantata's sire is the Almos son Atman PFF. This is the first Atman offspring we have inspected, and we were to inspect Atman himself later that day. Cantata impressed us with her type, and personality as well as her especially good body. It will be very interesting to see how this mare develops in her partnership with Carla, as Carla's main interest is in dressage.

The third mare we looked at was Amazing Grace, so named, I assume, because it was amazing that she survived her circumstances. "Gracie", as she is known, was in utero when her dam was rescued. Her dam, who was 22 years old at the time, had a old injury which was badly infected and she was severely underweight, so it was uncertain whether or not the filly inside of her would survive her gestation.

Cantata's dam Capri PFF was our next mare, and you can see from their photos how similar in type these two mares are to each other. Capri has not had much chance to develop gymnastically since she was previously used only for breeding, but SEO now has a volunteer rider who is riding her successfully and it's a tribute to her great disposition that she is doing so well under saddle. Like her daughter, Cantata, Capri's type is very good and her trot was the most impressive we saw all day. Capri's dam is by *Oman and her grand-dam was the Hungarian Bravo daughter Csilla AA out of NASS foundation Purebred Arabian mare Ravenwood Cresant ox. Capri has two lines to Hungarian Bravo daughter out of another of the NASS foundation Purebred Arabian mares, Magic Shadow ox.

received, she is developing into a very nice filly although she
still has a lot of growing to do. At this time NASS is utilizing
DNA testing to determine whether or not her sire is Bold
Bravo AF (Hungarian Bravo x *Aminah by Koheilan I DK)
or Atman. Gracie's owner, Judy Auble, expressed surprise at
how well Gracie handled the hustle and bustle of inspection
day given her lack of experience and maturity. Once again,
the Shagya-Arabian disposition came through and another
horse owner has become a Shagya-Arabian convert!

Next up was Jeri Randall's grey mare Musica PFF. Musica, like a number of horses we would see later in the day, is by Bold Bravo AF. Musica's dam is the *Budapest AF daughter Shomani's Moonlight Serenade, whose granddam Shomani was by *Oman and out of the abovementioned NASS foundation Arabian mare Magic Shadow ox. Musica impresses as a larger mare than her stick height of 14.3 hands, giving the appearance of substance and power, and she certainly exhibited very good Shagya-Arabian type. This was in contrast to her chestnut full sister Minuet PFF which Jeri also presented. Minuet, while an inch taller than her sister, was not nearly as substantial overall and did not show particular Shagya-Arabian type. Minuet also suffered a wrenched neck as a youngster which was clearly evidenced by a bulge behind her poll on one side of her neck and a depression on the opposite side. Interestingly, Jeri said that when riding Minuet she travels straight and she appeared to travel straight to those of us on the ground. On previous inspection tours we also inspected a bay Bold Bravo son of grand-dam Shomani and he exhibited a different type from his closely-related paternal half sisters (who also share his mother line.) This is an interesting example of similarly-bred "siblings" who do not

appear to be siblings based upon their color, their conformation, or their type.



ChaCha!!

The other chestnut that we saw on this tour was the charming Appendix Part-Shagya-Arabian filly ChaCha, also by Bold Bravo AF. ChaCha is a very young (October-born) coming three year old who, at under 14 hands, still has a lot of growing to do. However, she exhibited a lot of nice features and in a few years she would probably score considerably higher. Her Purebred Arabian dam, Forever Cashmere EVA ox, has a pedigree which is a mixture of Spanish, Egyptian, American and in particular, Polish Arabian blood.

After a wonderful barbeque lunch orchestrated by Carla and Melissa and cooked by Melissa's husband, it was on to inspect the boys. We started with Hannah Summer's eight year old gelding Balakrishna PFF. Balakrishna is by the Oman son Odin and his dam is the Bold Bravo daughter Breeze PFF whose dam, named *Bashira, was by O'Bedu. O'Bedu was by Obelisk, a full brother of *Oman. The dam line of *Bashira goes back to the black Egyptian stallion *Gharib who is prominent in the pedigree of Starwalker also. (This *Bashira is one of two German-bred "*Bashiras" who were imported from Germany to the US. A bit confusing! The "other *Bashira" was dam of Janos and the grand-dam of NASS approved stallion Onyx AF.)

Hannah is an endurance rider who has been quite successful in long-distance endurance rides on her mare which she presented to NASS three years ago--the Almos (*Shandor x *Arriva) daughter Salome. Hannah considers Balakrishna her next endurance prospect and this gelding should do well once he is better developed. Although already eight years old, he gave us the impression that he still has a long ways to go before he is fully mature. We speculate that this is probably due to his lack of proper nutrition when young. We are looking forward to seeing him in a few years when he comes into his own.

Keiko Young, NASS Apprentice Judge, comments on her experience at Yacolt:

I enjoyed being able to participate again as a learner judge at the 2015 Washington inspection site. The inspection took place at Carla Christian's barn in Yacolt and included a large number of Shagya enthusiasts. It was my first opportunity since the previous year in Hungary to see a large group of Shagyas and Shagya bred horses together in one location. Even though I had a newborn daughter and recently returned to work, I was determined not to miss it.

There were ten evaluated and inspected horses which included a variety of ages, as well as purebreds and partbreds.. There was a pair of full sibling sisters, and a mother/daughter duo. The breeding of some of the participants was still to be determined by DNA testing, so hopefully that information will make it into the final inspection report. It was notable that many geldings were presented, adding valuable information for breeders.

The process started with the objective portion, measurements and picture taking, and proceeded to the evaluation of conformation and movement. Each judge records their own marks and the final result is a collaborative effort that results in an unanimous decision for each mark. Overall, there was very good agreement between the judges. As a learner judge, being included in the discussion of the marks was very informative. The creation of the descriptive paragraph summarizes important points about each horse and often provides some historical information that can help explain the marks. At the end of the day, the marks were presented and the high scoring mare and gelding were announced.

I had to leave before the branding took place, and unfortunately had little time to socialize, but I left with a big smile on my face. I said hello to Hera AF and Scheherezade AF before leaving, so that made twelve Shagyas in one day!

Next up was another Bold Bravo son, the four year old gelding Badger out of the above-mentioned *Oman daughter Caress. Badger is a nice big gelding with very good type and with what appears to be very good athletic potential. At the moment, however, Badger is experiencing some soundness issues likely caused by poor nutrition and/or injuries, and veterinary work is being done on his left front leg. Still, his walk was good enough for an "8" and his trot and canter for "7's". His owner Elizabeth is very excited about his potential!

Very similar to Badger was his closely-related paternal half brother Caress's Bold Mover (nicknamed "Carlos"), who not only has the same sire but his dam is Capri, Caress's daughter. Once again, this three year old gelding had very good size and type. Like his "brother" Badger, Carlos is currently experiencing some lameness issues and recently had surgery on a hind leg. He was only shown in hand and at walk and trot because he is limited to "hand walking only" by his veterinarians at the moment. His handlers were a bit worried that he was a little too "full of himself", but he behaved well and also handled being branded like a pro. It will be really interesting to see this nice gelding in a few years once he is sound and has grown up and developed some muscle.


The last gelding we inspected was the attractive three year old Part-Shagya/ Appaloosa cross Serrano. There was nothing about Serrano that would have hinted to us that he was "half Appy"...in that he had a good type and a luxuriant tail as well (Appaloosas are known to often have skimpy tails). Serrano's sire is Bonus PFF, a Bold Bravo son out of the Almos daughter Bridget. Bridget (who was inspected later on this tour) is from the Hungarian Bravo daughter Bravita, so Serrano has two lines to Hungarian Bravo. Once again, while young and undeveloped, this colt was very attractive and impressed us with his potential as a great and versatile riding horse.

After this very full day of judging 10 horses, we wrapped up the day with branding a few of the horses and with presenting the award to the high scoring horses of the day--the purebred Shagya-Arabian mare Cantata and her owner and our hostess Carla Christian. We also got nice snapshots of the lineup of a nice group of Shagya-bred mares and geldings. Our special thanks to Carla and Melissa for a full day of Shagya Arabian evaluations!

Our breed's brand is such a beautiful brand and it is a great way to help identify our horses as Shagya-Arabians. Yet the branding process itself had always seem too intimidating to me and therefore, better left to someone else. Over the past few inspections I had gotten braver, assisting with the heating the irons and handling the horses. Change is good, right?

A few months before the 2015 NASS Breeding Inspection Tour, Adele Furby, NASS' "Master Brander", having been responsible for the actual branding for the past 20-plus years, sent me an email asking would I consider taking on the actual branding itself. And if so, that I should invest in a really good pair of leather gloves. Of course, ever the optimist I responded with a "yes" and found myself a great pair of gloves at the local farm supply store. Somehow deciding this via email made the idea of branding less daunting.

After meeting Adele in Portland and checking into the hotel that commitment I'd made so easily via email was suddenly now a reality. Adele had me practice a quite a few times using the hotel sofa (with cold iron only) and talked me through the technique which had worked for her so well over the years. Eventually, I started to get a feel for the irons. There are two irons, one for the mature horses and one for foals, each having a slightly different weight due to the size of the respective brand.

The next day was the first inspection of the tour and included a large number of horses to inspect. After spending all day measuring, photographing and judging numerous horses, it was suddenly time to brand! Adele and I put the brands together while some very capable volunteers got the heating wand hooked up and started.

Adele's eye as I heated up the iron for the next horse. I did some deep breathing and said to myself, "I think I can, I think I can". Between that and Adele's positive reinforcement, I was focused and was ready to roll!

I remembered the steps Adele and I had practiced, yet foremost in my mind was safety and producing a correct brand! Many factors come into play when branding, including everything from the correct temperature and angle of the iron to proper timing and teamwork. No matter how many times one practices, the fact is that it was now my responsibility to correctly place and remove the iron! I took a big breathe and firm grasp on the iron and headed towards my first horse. The red of the iron glared back at me as strode toward it! I placed the iron on my 1st horse! 1,2,3 ... done! I backed up as the owner led the horse away. The brand looked awesome. The horse didn't event flinch! Pretty darn cool! Adele continued to coach me as needed. I branded the rest of that day's horses as well as those at the California site successfully. Thanks to Adele for being a great branding instructor!

Finally, I just wanted to say THANK YOU to all the organizers and volunteers who helped with this year's tour. It was inspiring to see the horses and meet all the participants. I look forward to participating on future breeding inspection tours ... just remind me to pack my gloves!

Jeri Randall comments on her experience:

I had such fun attending the 2015 Shagya Inspection with my two Bold Bravo daughters, Musica PFF and Minuet PFF! I wasn't sure that my girls would be approved for breeding, as they each came to me at nine months of age having been starved for most of their short lives. Minuet, the older sister, had broken her neck as a foal and had trouble grazing. She ate slowly, and it took me several years to get her to the point where she would hold a decent body condition. I was determined that they attain their heritage as approved potential Shagya broodmares, so off we went to Yacolt, WA.

At the inspection, I explained to the judges the girls' early hardships, and they were quite sympathetic. Many of the Shagyas and part-Shagyas present had been seized from their breeder and placed in rescue a few years ago. A couple of the horses present had even been born in

rescue. Most of the horses had found good homes, and were now being restored to their heritage.

I was most impressed by Cantata, a gorgeous 4 year old mare owned by our hostess, Carla. She is a nice-sized grey mare with wonderful gaits who was the high scoring mare. It was also nice to see Balakrishna, an 8 year gelding, who had been sent to my trainer by the breeder several years ago. He stayed with me for about 6 months, and was a scrawny, freshly gelded colt with a major bad attitude at that time. It was great to see him mellow and filled out, starting his endurance career with owner, Hannah Summers.

I greatly enjoyed visiting with the other Shagya owners present. We had time to visit over a nice barbecue lunch prepared by our hostess and her help. I was fascinated by the judging process, which involves first standing the horse up for the official picture and measurements. The next step was to show the horse on the triangle, then finally at liberty. Several horses also tackled the jumping chute.

After the judging was complete, the judges compared notes and prepared a verbal description of each horse. Starting with the mares, each horse was presented to the audience with the verbal description and scores, leading up to the high scoring mare. The process was then repeated with the geldings.

My advice to anyone interested in the Shagya breed is to attend an inspection, even if you don't have a horse to present. Experiencing the inspection process is a wonderful way to learn what the Shagya breed is all about, what conformation is desirable, what gaits should look like, what the judges consider important.

My biggest regret, not being a horse show person, is that I didn't know how to train for the triangle. I also didn't realize how herd-bound my younger mare had gotten because she has been a pasture pet for the last three years. She was very upset each time my other mare got out of sight. It made her inspection much more time-consuming, for which I owe the judges an apology. Jeri Randall, October 13, 2015

Then Hallie and I took a long drive in the twilight into the hills above Portland to pay a visit to a special gelded stallion--Atman PFF, by Almos and out of the Hungarian Bravo Sjonja AA. Atman was still a stallion at the time of the horse rescue, but he had been quite badly injured, having suffered severe lacerations on all four legs. We made a special effort to inspect Atman because prior to his rescue and subsequent gelding he had sired several foals, including Purebred Shagya-Arabians. Atman's bloodline is of special interest in particular because his sire Almos was the only son of the imported Bajar daughter *Arriva, whose dam was Arietta, a full sister of Amor, one of the century's leading Shagya-Arabian stallions in Europe. Atman is living in a secluded and peaceful area, and his caregiver graciously presented him by lights in her indoor arena. This horse in person was impressive in all his magnificence. While only thirteen years old, he appears old before his time, likely due to his traumatic earlier years. However, he had a majestic presence which was palpable. He got high marks in nearly all criteria, although we could not score his legs higher than a "7" due to their overall condition. The amazing thing about his movement is that it was as good as it was considering the degree of injuries he sustained. His walk was impressive enough to receive a "9"--a score rarely given. We are happy that Atman has such a peaceful home now.



Much of the special value in Atman PFF's pedigree is through his paternal grand-dam, *Arriva. Imported from Germany in 1986, *Arriva represented the finest in German Shagya-Arabian breeding, being by Bajar and out of Arietta, a full sister of Amor. Arriva's only son Almos by *Shandor kept this blood alive in American Shagya breeding through his only son Atman PFF.

All in all our inspection in Portland area was a big accomplishment for NASS. We were able to incorporate a significant number of well-bred Shagyas into NASS and into the NASS studbook, and we were able to connect with some new Shagya owners who have rapidly developed an appreciation for the fine qualities of this breed.

Kerrigan Bloodstock, Eureka, CA

Our next inspection stop was at Elaine Kerrigan's in Eureka, California. Elaine and Joan Clark were our hostesses, and they did a great job as usual! Hallie and I drove from Portland to Eureka on a lovely early fall day, where we witnessed horse riders along the beaches of northern California.



We were met in Eureka by Kathy Richkind who had flown up from Albuquerque, so we had a full team of judges to judge the two stallion prospects awaiting us, as well as one filly and one gelding. First up was Elaine's three year old Shagya-Arabian colt KB Thor Fahim and second up was his two year old full brother KB Tomega Fahim. Both colts are by Elaine's highly accomplished black purebred Arabian stallion KB Omega Fahim+++
+// ox and out of Elaine's black imported Bahadur daughter *Thassia.

Thor, who is black from head to toe, showed a very good type but impressed as still not being as mature as his two year old brother. He was very calm and cooperative and in fact it was a bit of a problem during the free jump down the jump chute, as he clearly did not find the jump chute a very exciting activity! He took a very casual attitude about the whole affair. Elaine said that she is quite fine with his "laid-back" disposition—a good quality to have in a riding horse stallion as one ages.

Tomega, owned by Chris Bailey, inherited his two white hinds from his sire "Meg". He has developed more quickly than his brother and also had a higher energy level. The problem with him in the jump chute was the opposite of his brother's—he was overly enthusiastic and it was a bit difficult to persuade him to slow down! He radiated confidence. It will be interesting to see both of these fine full

brothers as they progress with their growth and training.



*Thassia, dam of Thor and Tomega. Elaine imported *Thassia from Germany. A daughter of the well-known Bahadur and out of Thirza. Both Bahadur and Thirza were outstanding performers under saddle.

Next Elaine presented her grey two year old filly KB Saracina Fahim, also by "Meg" and out of Starwalker's full sister Samantha. Saracina had the misfortune to have suffered radial nerve paralysis to her right shoulder as a weanling. This is an injury which is difficult to overcome, as I well know, having had a filly of about the same age experience the same injury a few years ago. Elaine has done quite a bit of therapy to help Saracina overcome her injury and we were impressed that the filly is moving as well as she is at this point. She is quite a lovely filly with a very good type, but we also had to lower the score for her legs because the injury has caused certain changes in the front legs due to her having to carry her weight unevenly during her rehabilitation.

The final horse we evaluated in Eureka was the handsome Anglo-Shagya gelding My True Companion, bred and owned by Jacqueline Debets. At age five, Companion is a very well-developed big guy with a calm and willing demeanor. His sire is SW Daniel, a son of the imported stallion *Dante, and out of the *Oman daughter SW Selabration, and his dam is Jacqueline's own thoroughbred mare, My Drum. Jacqueline said that she wanted to breed a very good trail horse from her thoroughbred mare, and she is very happy with the result, as she has already had Companion out on the trail. She said that the mare had typical "thoroughbred feet", but that the Shagya infusion seems to have solved that problem very nicely. Overall a very nice example of an Anglo-Shagya-Arabian.

Sterling Shagya Sporthorses, Blue Jay, CA

After branding Saracina and Elaine's two new black Shagya-Arabian fillies, one from Samantha and one from *Thassia, it was time to head for the airport, from whence Hallie flew back to New York City and Kathy and I flew to Los Angeles. Shelley's wonderful mom Jan graciously picked us up at the airport in the middle of the night and overnighted us at her beautiful home. Shelley and her new husband Don Child, consulted with us the next morning, as an unexpected problem had developed. Shelley and Don had leased the mare Brise PFF (Sarvar PFF x Bridget) from Hallie Goetz and planned to have her inspected. However, the previous day Brise developed a serious colic and was at the vet clinic. We made a visit to the clinic to see how Brise was doing; unfortunately, she was too ill to be inspected and later that evening she underwent colic surgery. Fortunately we have since learned that the surgery was successful and Brise is now well on the road to recovery, and so far she is still in foal to Shelley's stallion Sterling Silver AF!



Brise, by the *Shandor son Sarvar and out of the Almos daughter Bridget, whom we would inspect later on this tour, was shown last spring at an ATA inspection near Phoenix. Brise is another rescued horse from Washington and is now recovering from her colic surgery.

After our visit with Brise we went on out to the boarding stable where Shelley keeps her horses, where I found Shelley's husband Don busy persuading her stallion Sterling to have his face washed! I wish I had had my camera with me at that moment!...

Then we inspected the purebred Arabian mare TR Amazing to Me ox, nicknamed "Tiara". Tiara's pedigree is full of well-known Polish Purebred Arabians, with a dash of Russian and Crabbet blood too. Owned by Victoria Kelley, she showed a very good type and gave an overall impression of strength and athleticism. It will be very interesting to see how she crosses with a Shagya stallion. She was approved for Book II Appendix, so her foals from Shagya stallions can be registered as Shagya Arabians Book II.

We also inspected Sterling Silver's black daughter Shalimar Kate, who is owned by Shelley's brother-in- law Randy Ward. Shalimar Kate's dam is a Quarter Horse mare that nobody thought would be able to get pregnant some years ago. But the then-young Sterling apparently had other ideas, and one day to everyone's surprise, Kate was born! Randy only recently acquired Kate and he is now busy with re-schooling her, as she had not been properly handled when a youngster. She is a powerful mare and Randy is doing a great job of convincing her about acceptable manners. Kate like a Quarter Horse in many ways, but she really showed her Arabian influence when she started moving free in the arena. She should be a lot of fun to ride and very handy when fully schooled.


Then we had the pleasure of inspecting Shelley's big gelding Sterling's Brigadier SH, who is out of the Bold Bravo daughter Brooke PFF. We had evaluated Brig as a weanling and it was great to see how he has grown up. He impresses one as being larger than his 15.2 and a half hands and he clearly still has some growing ahead of him! His type, walk, and trot were especially good and he looks like a great dressage prospect with the willing and confident attitude so essential for dressage.



TR Amazing to Me, Arabian mare approved for Shagya breeding




Shelley Housh Child comments:

I was privileged to again host a NASS inspection this year. I want to say it gets easier, but this year had its challenges. I only had 1 mare to be inspected but my friend had a lovely arab mare she wanted approved and there were 2 to be evaluated. It started with my mom heading to LAX to pick the judges up at midnight – it was a late night for all! My weekend was thrown for a loop when my leased mare Brise coliced on Sunday, the day before the inspection. Being Labor Day weekend, my regular vet as well as all vets within a hour were not available. I ended up driving to a teaching hospital 90 min away. Sand colic was the diagnosis and we proceeded to medically treat it. Brise is in foal to Sterling, so that was an added worry. I wanted to visit her on Monday, so I picked up Kathy and Adele and we detoured to the vet where Brise was stable, but still in pain. Off to the ranch where everyone was waiting. My amazing husband spent the morning washing Brigadier and Sterling and getting everything ready. We proceeded with the inspection. The Arabian mare TRAmazing to Me owned by Victoria Kelley is doing well in endurance and has completed a 50 miler. She was approved for Shagya breeding. Next up was Sterling Silver's first foal Shalimar Kate, owned by my brother-in-law Randy Ward. "Katie" was an "Oops" baby out of an old QH mare that Sterling was stabled with as a 2 year old. She is used as a riding horse and will be bred to a Shagya stallion next year. Last up was my 3 year old gelding Sterling's Brigadier SH. As we were finishing up I got the bad news that Brise was not any better and surgery was indicated as her gut had twisted. I was distressed as I was quite worried about her pregnancy, but as she is such a lovely mare I felt we had no choice. She was Trakehner approved earlier in the spring so I felt she was quite valuable to our breeding program. I was upset that she was unable to be presented to the judges for approval, but she ended up making it through surgery with flying colors and has retained the pregnancy. After the inspection we headed to my Lake Arrowhead home for dinner and drinks on our deck. We spent hours talking horses and just catching up. It's always nice to see old friends again! A huge thanks to my mom Jan Housh for providing cookies and just helping out. Also, I could not have done it without the love and support of my amazing husband Don Child!

The next morning it was time to say goodbye to Don and Shelley and head for the Dubuque, Iowa area to the Olson/Rapp establishment named "Nosloendurance" at Chapel Hill Farm in LaMotte Iowa. Our hosts were the twin sisters Erin Rapp and Ellen Olson and Ellen's husband Jeremy, as well as Erin and Ellen's mom Judy and long-time helper Jordan. They all did a great job of showing us their endurance horse breeding and training operation. Erin maintains the majority of the breeding program year round in LaMotte, while Ellen and Jeremy spend winters in Ocala where there is a lot of winter-time endurance activity. Ellen and Jeremy have been leasing my stallion *Hadban USA for the past three years and at this point *Hadban has the best endurance competition record of any Shagya-Arabian stallion in North America, thanks to Ellen and Jeremy. This year Ellen has ridden *Hadban in four fifty-mile AERC rides and he placed Top Ten in all four rides, as well as receiving Best Condition in his FEI (internationally-rated)

comfortable to ride. Jeremy commented also that in Ocala most of their neighbors are either endurance riders or combined drivers, and Jeremy would like to start using *Hadban as a driving horse too. Jeremy said that his dad did driving with Arabians when Jeremy was growing up and Jeremy has all the equipment and experience to be able to start driving *Hadban. I can't wait to visit them again and go on a carriage ride behind *Hadban!

The first mare presented was Erin's Mattingley Freedom, a ten year old Appendix registered Part-Shagya-Arabian by the inbred Lily Creek Stetson. Stetson's sire was Sarvar PFF and his dam was Sarvar's full sister Sonata PFF. Stetson is a gelding who competes in endurance. Freedom's dam is the *Oman daughter "Reality by Dr. Beecher" who was bred by Dr. Robert Beecher who lives nearby. Dr. Beecher was very active and accomplished in the endurance world and his wisdom and knowledge are greatly appreciated by the Iowa crew. Dr. Beecher came by to watch the inspection and it was an honor to meet him.

Reality's dam was the purebred Arabian mare ENM Dahnna ox, an Egyptian-bred mare with an outstanding pedigree featuring, among others, *Morafic and *Sanaaa (Sid Abouhom x Yashmak). Mattingley Freedom impressed us with her type and beauty as well as her good body, bone, and her strong trot which came under from behind exceptionally well. The footing that day was a little slick and hard and I suspect that with better footing this mare's movement would be even more impressive. Mattingly Freedom easily surpassed the "7" average score needed for Appendix mares to be eligible for Book I with a score of 7.5.

Erin also showed us Mattingley Freedom's two *Hadban foals, the welldeveloped and feminine grey two year old CHF Freestyle, and her growthy but quite impressive yearling bay sister CHF Holiday (so named because she was born on the 4th of July.) Erin happily announced that Mattingley Freedom is back in foal to *Hadban for a 2016 baby! We branded Freestyle and Holiday and both fillies were calm and quiet about the procedure, which bodes well for their futures as level-headed endurance mares.

Ellen then presented her seven year old Arabian endurance mare "Noslo'sReadytoRun ox", who was shown with her charming and impressive bay filly by *Hadban which Ellen named "Thatswhatshesaid". ReadytoRun is already an accomplished endurance mare, With an FEI "Two Star" rating. A quick glance at the AERC site indicates that this mare has already completed the equivalent of the NASS Stallion Performance requirement in endurance (i.e. successfully completed at least 5 AERC endurance rides, at least three of which must be 50 miles or more). Consequently,

this mare needed to receive an average

score of at least a "7" to be approved into Book I. She had no trouble accomplishing this, receiving an average score of 7.5, including scores of "8" for her type, her head, her legs and her trot. It was great to see a purebred Arabian mare with such good legs! Equally impressive about this mare was her way of moving--it appeared in all three gaits that she barely touched the ground--there were no pounding hooves here! This impressed me as being a very good quality for an endurance horse. Her little filly by *Hadban was said to be a little firecracker,

but when we branded her she was very brave and not bothered at all by the experience, showing that she has also inherited that valued self-confident quality we all love in a good performance horse.


day. Diego is the the gelding's name, and he is a big, stout colt that shows excellent promise for an endurance horse. At this time he also has a very interesting "golden" color that reminds one of an Akhal-Tekke. This is of especial interest because *Hadban's bloodline from Romania has influences through the Asian horses which emigrated west into Romania. *Hadban himself is a bright bay and we have always commented on the special shiny "copper-penny" look to his coat too. Perhaps he shares some special color genetics with Akhal-Tekke ancestors and he has passed this on to Diego?

Erin also showed Granny's Scarlet, who has a two year old daughter by *Hadban named CHF Locamotion.

Locamotion is registered as a Part-Shagya because Granny's Scarlet is registered as a Half-Arabian. She is by the very well-bred Polish Arabian stallion Baszadin (*Aladdinn x Bazsa by *Bask). Scarlet has an excellent endurance record, having successfully completed many 50 and 75 milers, and one 100 miler. Her record includes winning first place in an AERC 50 mile race last year at age 18! That speaks highly both of Scarlet herself and of the great horse management that the Noslo team is providing to their competition horses. Locamotion is a very strongly-built filly with a flying trot, and she was well-presented to us by Jordan.

It was wonderful to see *Hadban so healthy, happy, and well ridden, surrounded by his "wives" and his kids! (And check out that shiny coat!!) Kathy and I had to say good-bye the next morning and I pressed on to Kansas City, where my hostess NASS Vice-President Susan Kiel met me. There we were able to meet up with Lori McCutcheon, the new owner of Stardancer, an eleven-year old daughter of Starwalker and the imported mare *Szikra. *Szikra had one daughter by *Oman, Sapphire, who is the dam of two of our high-scoring horses in a previous NASS Inspection Tour--the stallion Sterling Silver AF by *Shandor in 2006, and the mare Sheherezade AF the same year, also by *Shandor. *Szikra also had two other offspring by *Shandor and her last foal was Stardancer. Petra Gorski, breeder of Stardancer has had health problems and so Stardancer had not been ridden much before Lori got her. But Lori is not wasting any time with Stardancer and has been riding her out on the hunt field, where she says that Stardancer is fearless and can keep up with the other galloping horses with her big trot! She said Stardancer clears all obstacles unhesitatingly. Stardancer impressed me as a very classic Shagya mare--thus her high score for type. Her frame and her legs were really good, and it reminded me of Anna Aaby's comment that Starwalker had "exceptionally good hocks". He seems to throw them also! I predict that after Stardancer has a chance to develop her muscling she will score even higher than her average score of 7.875, which made her the high scoring mare on this, the 10th NASS Inspection Tour.


