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Arizona Inspection Sites

The nine horses we saw during the Arizona inspection represent an interesting cross-section of our American Shagya-Arabian bloodlines along with the addition of several interesting purebred Arabian lines.

Julia Lynn presented her young stallion LC Desert Dancer along with their two mares, the purebred Arabian Khayzallah, and the Shagya-Arabian CHF Freestyle. These three horses have very different pedigrees and it's going to be very interesting to see how they combine.

LC Desert Dancer, a representative of the Lily Creek breeding program, was shown at age seven and he impressed as a sturdy, calm and confident stallion with good type. He should do well in his chosen discipline of endurance riding and in the breeding shed. He looks

like he can pass on good Shaqya type to his offspring.

He is a son of the imported *Dante LCR, who was purchased as a yearling from Countess Arco-Zinneberg in Bavaria. *Dante LCR has another approved stallion full brother who was a successful performance and breeding stallion in Germany. His pedigree has many of the classic post-WW II bloodlines from Babolna and Topolci- Freestyle's pedigree is nearly completely Shagyaanky, with a dash of purebred Arabian blood from Mar- Arabian in the first four generations, a combination of bach (state stud in Germany). His sire line is Gazal, but NASS foundation breeding on her dam's side, and Romahe is not particularly linebred to any of the classic Ba- nian and mostly Babolna-derived blood on her sire's side.

bolna lines--most all of them are contained in the first four generations in his pedigree, but none predominate.

Dancer's dam Lily Creek Brielle is the product of frozen semen from the Swiss-bred Bahadur, a black Gazal VII grandson, and out of the *Oman daughter SW Selabration whose dam was Sabiyana ox, a purebred Arabian mare with Russian, Egyptian and old American breeding.

Julia's young three year-old Shaqya-Arabian mare CHF Freestyle had just recently arrived from her breeder Erin Rapp's farm in Des Moines, and she was consequently a bit underweight. She impressed as charming and immature, but with a very good type and structure and

with an especially broad and strong-looking pelvis. Her long correct walk with good use of the back deserved an "8", and her flowing trot and canter gave the impression of being very "light on her feet". This should prove to be a positive attribute which will benefit both her and her rider as she goes down the endurance trail.



Her sire *Hadban USA is at this time the only Shaqya-Arabian stallion in this country with the soughtafter endurance bloodlines from the Romanian stud farm Radautz. He has a good endurance competition record as well. Hadban is named for the significant amount of HADBAN-line blood in his pedigree. His sire Harapnik was imported into Germany in utero from Radautz Romania and he was used very successfully in Germany, Czech Republic and Austria. *Hadban USA's dam *Irahna-453, imported to America by Hans Sitter with *Hadban USA in her belly, is a daughter of the German-bred Amor son Amos and out of a mare with Babolna and purebred Arabian blood. Freestyle's dam Mattingly Freedom has a pedigree filled with many of






Because of her impressive performance record, in order to be approved for Purebred Shagya-Arabian breeding Book I she was required to achieve a minimum average score of "7", as are Shaqya-Arabian mares, rather than the required "8" for Purebred Arabian mares without a performance record.

Kayzallah was shown in "endurance condition" and her neck and chest had been shaved, giving her a "two-tone" appearance. Khayzallah gave the impression of being simultaneously elegant and statuesque as well as possessing many good riding horse gualities. Her head and neck were typey and her long, strong-looking sloping shoulder rose to impressive withers and a well-placed saddle area which puts the rider over the center of her body.

At 15.1 and 1/2 hands, she is tall for a purebred Arabian and she has enough bone to go along with her height.





requirements for Shagya-Arabian stallions, i.e. three 30 She shows good promise as a potential producer of Shaqya-Arabian-bred horses. Kayzallah's pedigree has a lot of Polish influence. Her sire, Star Ghazal+ ox (Gazal Al Shaqab x C Starlite Bey) was both a US and a Canadian Top Ten champion at halter, and her damsire Khadraj Na+++/ ox was not only several times Canadian and US Top Ten in halter, he was also a champion in his homeland of Brazil, and he went on to achieve Canadian and US Top Tens in Western Pleasure.

It was very interesting to evaluate the three horses from Don and Shelley Child's breeding program, as they share many common pedigree elements. In particular, their dam lines all come from the mare Bridget (Almos x Bravita AF by Hungarian Bravo).

The nine year-old Bridget daughter Brise is the dam of one of horses in this group. Brise's pedigree consists of entirely "NASS foundation" horses. The motherline traces to a 7/8 Purebred Arabian, 1/8 Shaqya Arabian mare named Bint Ghasala, whose dam was imported to America by the Walters family a few years before I imported the other NASS foundation stock in 1986. Her granddam was the 1957 Babolna-bred Ghasala (Kuhaylan Zaid I ox x 62 Siglavy VI). Bint Ghasala's grandsire was the well known purebred Arabian *Bask++. I leased Bint Ghasala from the Walters and her Hungarian Bravo daughter Bravita AF was approved for Shagya breeding in 1991 and became a broodmare in Cindy Lewis' breeding program. Bred to Almos, the son of the two imported foundation Shaqya-Arabians *Shandor (Shagal x 41 Shagya XXXIX) and *Arriva (Bajar × Arietta), the resulting mare was Bridget, whom NASS inspected and approved for breeding on our previous Inspection Tour in 2015.

Brise's sire is the *Shandor son Sarvar PFF out of the Hungarian Bravo daughter Sjonja AA. Consequently, Brise picks up another line to *Shandor as well as another line to Hungarian Bravo. Brise is a substantial mare, standing a good 15.3 hands and with a frame and bone to match. You would never believe that her great grand-dam was only 14.3 with a 17 cm cannon! Brise did not have the best of nutrition growing up, had colic surgery in the fall of 2015 and a foal in March of 2016. When inspected she was not in optimum condition. Still, she was an impressive





Candice Colson presented her 12 year-old riding horse mare Nike PFF (Amara's O'Biwon x Nadeja ox), whose pedigree on the top side is full of NASS foundation Shaqya-Arabians, whereas her dam side is purebred Polish Arabian.

Nike is a very well-developed mare, although her nutrition as a young mare may not have been ideal. Nike gave the impression of being an Arabian-bred horse who showed some Shaqya-Arabian features as well as a good Nike's pure Polish dam Nadeja ox is a *Bask++ granddeal of Arabian influence. She has a very attractive daughter. Her pedigree reads like a "who's who" in Polish head with a charming expression and wonderful "liquid" riding horse.

*Oman and O'Biwon's dam Aerial AF is a Hungarian Bravo daughter out of the imported Bajar daughter *Arriva. Since Bajar himself was an incest-bred full brother-sister cross, this gives a lot of O'BAJAN-line influence in the pedigree. O'Biwon's other strong pedigree influence is Hungarian Bravo, whose sire was the pure Polish *Pilot ox, by Trypolis and out of an Ofir daughter.

He was beautifully turned out, and displayed a beautiful Arabian-influenced type. He had an elegant neck and he was well-muscled. Monique has an endurance career in mind for "Midas" and his very good, large feet should serve him very well in that capacity. He shows good potential to be a "refining" stallion for overly coarse Shagya-Arabian mares.

Monique Vincent's Appendix Shaqya-Arabian Stallion His sire, Santana HF ox, is a French-bred stallion popucessful career as an endurance horse for Monique, and in fact it was Monique's positive experience with Olivia that convinced Monique to begin breeding Shagya-Arabians. *Oman is well-known to NASS Shaqya-Arabian breeders as a producer of many top endurance horses The dam line is an American-bred purebred Arabian line which Melody Link used very successfully in her breeding program with several different Shagya-Arabian stallions.



Arizona Inspections 2017

In 2017 we started our new inspection format - instead of scheduling a whirlwind cross country inspection tour every three years, we decided we could best serve our membership by inspecting for breeding approval on an as-needed basis. Luckily, NASS has three members who are official ISG Judges and we no longer have to fly in Judges from Europe for inspections - a considerable savings in cost and flexibility which we hope to leverage to our members' benefit.

We began this new program in 2017 - our first inspection site of the year was in Arizona - Adele Furby now lives in the state, and I spend my winters here, so

we decided February would be a great time to hold an inspection here - beautiful sunny weather, Hallie would be happy to leave the cold northeast for a bit, and we had several horses lined up. Adele and I were boarding our horses at a training facility in north Scottsdale and the managers graciously agreed to let us use this facility for our inspection - nice arenas, a chute for free There was also hotel availability there. We arranged jumping, plenty of parking, another boarding facility to go to Prescott for Julia Lynn's horses, and then renearby for horses coming in, and the ropers agreed to cease and desist for two mornings while we inspected breeding stock. Scottsdale is a tourist mecca in the winter, with many hotels and boarding facilities, and we stall and hotel reservations already.) wanted to overlap with the big Scottsdale Arabian show, in hopes of sharing our inspection procedures with some purebred Arabian breeders. It sounded like a great idea to us, as we planned in the six months prior to the scheduled date.

The best laid plans, right? First issue - all hotels and boarding stables were filled on our dates -I knew the hotels would be busy, but apparently horses overwinter here too, and make their reservations a year in advance! Second issue - Arizona was having one of the rainiest winters in history, and the arenas and most turnouts at our facility were basically unusable for six weeks or so. Third issue - a respiratory virus was going through the barns of Scottsdale, and we decided that overnight boarding in a public facility anywhere in the area



was not a good idea for the horses. What to do? A scramble to rearrange the plans, and we decided that the judges would travel, instead of the horses. Adele and Charlie opened their farm in Camp Verde for the horses coming in from California and up from Tucson. turned to Scottsdale to inspect my mare where she was boarded and Monique Vincent's stallion, who was also attending the Scottsdale Arabian show (so she had a

With fingers crossed, we began the inspection. I headed to the airport to pick up Hallie and then drive to Camp Verde. I was also bringing dinner for the partici-

> pants, which I had prepared the day before. Hallie's flight was on time, despite the rain, and we left the airport, enthusiastically talking about Shagya-Arabians. Unfortunately I was so engrossed I missed the freeway turnoff to Camp Verde from the airport and headed west on I-10 for a while before I realized my error and turned around - we were late arriving at Adele's, but Hallie did get to sample In-and-Out Burger on the way, and dinner was just served a wee bit late, giving everyone there time to enjoy some adult beverages. Despite weather challenges, everyone else arrived safely too, so we could begin the

inspection the next day.

It was interesting to see the variety of bloodlines present. We started at Adele's on a gray drizzly morning; fortunately the footing in her small pasture was good so the triangle was set up there, and the horses could also be turned loose there for canter evaluation. We had two young horses for evaluation and two mares for breeding approval - three horses from the Sterling Silver California contingent Shelley and Don Child and Steven Thompson and Candice Colson, who had hauled up from Tuc-



(Shaqya Royal AF x Echo Daal). She is closely related to my homebred mare WS Emilagra (*Shandor x Echo Daal), as their sires are father and son, and she has been shown in training level dressage. She was presented by the trainer who had been working with her for a few months. As the rings had been unusable due to the rain, we had to use the parking area for the triangle. Her exercise in the previous month had consisted mainly of hand walking (an oxymoron) in the

son with her nice mare. Lots of hauling in poor weather involved here from these dedicated Shagya-Arabian owners!

The following day we proceeded to Prescott to inspect Julia Lynn's young Shagya-Arabian mare, Shagya-Arabian stallion and a purebred Arabian mare. The stallion LC Desert Dancer already has a performance record in endurance (as had the Arabian mare) and Julia had sent the stallion from her farm to a trainer Starwalker x Shagya's Sisu AF). parking area as often as I could get out there to do it. Stall confinement and cold weather led to a very frisky mare for the inspection.

There was fortunately one long usable turnout for her canter evaluation, which consisted of her mainly galloping madly up and down the run, frantically calling for her stablemates...the best laid plans, sigh. As I was her owner and Adele her breeder, it fell to Hallie to be the judge in this less than ideal environment, and I had a good taste of how other owners feel during this pro-

cess.

In the evening Hallie flew home on the red eye, and Adele and I returned the following morning to our facility to evaluate Monique Vincent's Appendix Shaqyastallion, Arabian MCV Ohrrmidas. who was immaculately groomed and fresh off a nice sport horse win in the half Arabian division at the Scottsdale show. He also was presented in our park-

to learn how to free jump and prepare for the inspection. This was a very friendly stallion, and he and the trainer had developed a good connection, which was nice to see. The stallion obviously liked his free jumping training. All in all, a very nice group for their endurance future.

We proceeded down to Scottsdale in the afternoon to evaluate my mare, Echo's Eroica AF

ing lot triangle, and proceeded to the long turnout for canter evaluation. Charlie and our trainer had set up the jumping chute there as well (jumping standards lovingly made by Charlie for our use), and the stallion handled the novel surroundings very well. Monique then set off back to Texas, Adele and Charlie went home to Camp Verde, and I drove to my daughter's house to admire and help with my new grandson, who had been born 4 days prior to the start of the inspection.

Adele has described the horses well in her commentary so I have nothing there to add, except that it was a pleasure to meet some new folks, and see those again whom I had met before. All the horses were very well behaved (except mine) despite long trips, new surroundings, and unseasonably cold and wet weather.

start to her Shagya-Arabian breeding program with all three of her horses being approved. Afterwards, we I was looking forward to joining Adele Furby and Dr. headed back to Scottsdale where I was set to inspect Kathy's mare.

Echo's Eroica AF is by Shaqya Royal AF, the *Shandor son out of Rachelle AA by Hungarian Bravo, and is out of Echo Daal, bred by Minetta King, a Hungarian Bravo daughter out of the Arabian mare Dollys Echo. Dollys Echo was one of the original 9 Arabian mares approved I still had my gloves from the 2015 NASS Inspection for Shagya-Arabian breeding with NASS and was sired was bred in Egypt and imported in 1970. He represents

Skowronek (Polish) bloodlines.

Eroica's royal lineage showed true as she is a large majestic mare of good Shaqya type, standing nearly 16 hands and having a large frame. She received a score of "9" for type and scores of "8" in a quite a few of the other judging criteria. She was covered in beautiful dapples and had white stockings , which mirrored her sire, Shaqya Royal AF. She was also very well handled by her trainer and took the whole inspection process in stride. Due to all the recent rain the facility's arena was too slippery for an at liberty presentation, but we made due in a narrow alleyway type paddock with slightly firmer ground, allowing for Eroica to show off her



good trot and she received an average score of 7.75.

I was able to see Eroica's brother from a different mother, Nicolette's Revelation AF (Shagya Royal AF x Nicolette) and Kathy's other mare WS Emilagra, who is also a daughter of Echo Daal, but by *Shandor. What an impressive group of foundation bred Shagya-Arabians! Unfortunately, I was unable to see MCV Orrhmidas, the 2nd stallion being presented in AZ, but enjoyed a brief visit with Monique Vincent.

While driving around AZ I must have asked Kathy at least 10 times a day, "What do you call those giant cactuses again?" 

NASS inspection Vermont By Kathy Richkind

NASS' second inspection of 2017 took place in early fall in Vermont. I flew from New Mexico to Albany, arriving midafternoon, and rented a car with GPS to find my way to Hallie Goetz' farm in Danby, Vermont. Adele Furby and I have traveled to Hallie's farm on several previous NASS inspections and on each trip had gotten lost either leaving or returning to the Albany airport. Unfortunately on this trip Adele was unable to attend the inspection

so I was (gulp) on my own to find my way to Danby. The 70 day Stallion Performance Test. GPS was programmed by the rental agent but nevertheless managed to direct me to south Albany, by which time I figured I was headed in the exact wrong way to get to the Vermont border. Very nice staff at a Best Western hotel helped me get redirected but then the GPS was always about 5 minutes behind my route on the trip. Nevertheless I remembered some of the route and managed to arrive at Hallie's somewhat later than planned but in time for a nice meal and congenial company. In the morning we headed north from Danby and drove up the beautiful central valley to Ferrisburgh, where Dawn Jones-Low was hosting the inspection at Constance Hill Farm where her purebred Arabian stallion FCF Oberon's Vanity was in dressage training and preparing for an upcoming USDF regional championship. In addition to this stallion, Dawn brought two purebred Arabian full sister mares (and half sisters to "Obie")

for NASS breeding approval. At that point we also connected with Jamie Bratt, who was attending as a learner judge.

There was a very nice contingent of people present when we arrived, and it was clear that Obie was a barn favorite. He has a performance record up to second level dressage and in 2015 impressively passed

the North American By virtue of his meeting the NASS performance requirements for stallions, he was required to meet a minimum score of 7 for approval for Book 1 status rather than the 8 required for purebred Arabian stallions who do not have a performance record. In addition to being nicely balanced, he impressed us with the use of his back in the walk and trot and with an uphill canter, characteristics that are not always observed in purebred Arabians. He appeared to enjoy the free jumping and showed good form over the fences.

The two Arabian mares, FCF Silver Stardust and FCF Titanias Vanity, were very similar in appearance, not surprising as they are full sisters. Both mares were very feminine with lovely eyes. Both under 15 hands they nevertheless had good depth of chest and suffi-They should cross well with Shaqyacient bone. Arabian stallions, which could add size and power in the







house, where we were served a lovely dinner of home grown beef and enjoyed the evening discussing, what else, Shagya -Arabians. The next morning, another beautiful fall day, Hallie had to get up early to get her imported mare Siglavy Bagdady Blanka (3795 Siglavy Bagdady XV-5 x Siglavy Bagdady Bibic) ready for her inspection. She was Hungarian bred but had spent some time in France where she successfully competed in 70-120 km (roughly 50 - 75 miles) endurance, and she had been previously approved in Europe, as well as having several approved offspring - a working mother!

We took Blanka's measurements at Hallie's farm, then trailered up to her neighbors to use their arena. This mare was powerful and charismatic, one of those horses that it is very hard to take your eyes off of and try to objectively evaluate the parts. As the sole evaluator on this morning (given our missing Adele and Hallie being the mare's owner) it fell to me alone to decide on her The judging panel individually assigns scores. marks, then discuss our marks and deliberate with each other to achieve a consensus before assigning them, so Jamie got to listen to me spend quite a bit of time muttering to myself as I weighed my impressions. The mare was a bit tense so I think her walk and canter scores could be higher on a different more relaxed day. She was quite impressive and I look forward to seeing her future foals with our American bred Shaqya-Arabian stallions.


This mare has Siglavy Bagdady lines from both the sire and the dam, with the sire line being mostly from the Mangalia Siglavy Bagdady bloodlines,

with several Romanian lines to Hadban and Mersuch as well as Dahoman and Koheilan. The dam is from the Babolna Siglavy Bagdady VI bloodlines. The dam line also had quite a bit of "new" Egyptian blood which was brought into Babolna during the '60's, linebred to the Morafic son Faraq, with excellent "old Babolna" motherlines. The tail female line carries some Shagya bloodline influence. Blanka's dam sire, Siglavy Bagdady 308, was also the sire of the 2006 WEG world champion endurance horse Hungares, so her successful endurance career is not a surprise.

In summary I think our new protocol, with two inspections in 2017, worked out well for the judges, for NASS and for the breeders and owners, who did not have to have to wait another year as they would have on our previous three year rotation. I wonder what 2018 will hold?

GREEN MOUNTAIN INSPECTION SITES

Dawn and Thom Jones-Low, the owners of Faerie Court Farm (FCF) presented their three homebred Arabians from their CMK and performance based Arabian breeding program. Their stallion FCF Oberons Vanity or Obie, impressed us as a very attractive compact stallion with a wonderful character. I had to measure his cannon a few times to make sure my reading of a 20 cm cannon was correct! He received good scores for head. type, body and trot. His very good uphill balanced canter received a rare canter score of "9". Because Obie had passed the 2015 North American 70-day Stallion Performance Test (SPT), placing 5th out of 14 stallions (and was the only non-Warmblood) he was approved for Book I—Appendix. The two mares, FCF Titanias Vanity and FCF Vanitys Stardust, are full sisters with a





strong familial resemblance. Titania had the more typey head and Stardust the straighter profile, but both had the same nice looking eye.

After announcing the inspection results, Obie was presented under saddle and my mares were presented at liberty. We closed the event with a great discussion with the many attendees who expressed their keen interest in the Shagya-Arabian breed. We loaded up the horses and Kathy and Jamie followed me back to my farm. I tried to get them to notice the lone Bactrian camel grazing in a meadow alongside Rte. #7, honking my horn hysterically, but they were too busy talking about Shagya-Arabians to notice.

Dawn and Kathy have gone into detail about the Arabian ancestry of Dawn's horses, but I wanted to mention their Arabian ancestors' connections to the Shagya-Arabian (ShA) breed. Their grandsire on top, the stallion Oran ox (Riffal x Astrella) is a grandson of the stallion Rasim ox (1906) (Crabbet Park). Sons of Rasim ox (1906) were bred to Shagya-Arabian mares and helped to establish the Rasim ShA line at Topolcianky. (i.e. Rasim I, 1946). This line can be found in the pedigrees of Neddora SHG's imported Shagya-Arabian dam, *Lutka-62, as well as in the pedigree of *KS Rubin.

Dawn's horses' bloodlines also include an Arabian mare named *Azja IV (AHR 1543) who was born in 1935, of the Saklawieh Jedranieh strain, and imported from Poland by Henry Babson in 1936. She was sired by a stallion named Landsknecht (PASB 211) who was a son of Koheilan IV ox. Koheilan IV ox was bred at Babolna and stood at stud there as a senior stallion. Landsknecht's

dam, Soldateska, goes back to the famous Amurath 1881, bred at Germany's Weil Stud, where he stood at stud and then at the Austro-Hungarian state stud of Radautz (Romania). He can be found in the bloodlines of Arabian, Shaqya-Arabian and Warmblood horses worldwide. *Azja IV's dam, Asra (PASB 24), was by Gazal-1 and goes back to Siglavy Bagdady-11, bred at Babolna.

The next day dawned guite muggy and it was going to be yet another hot day. It was time for me to present my mare *Siglavy Bagdady Blanka. She is sired by Siglavy Bagdady XV-5 (Radautz) out of Siglavy Bagdady Bibic (Babolna), by Siglavy Bagdady VIII (Bab) who was brought to Babolna to help reestablish the Siglavy Bagdady ShA line. Her pedigree includes horses that go back to the stallion Farag (Or.Ar. 1962) who stood at Babolna, as well as other Babolna classics, such as Gazal VII and Shaqya XXXVI.

The NASS Foreign Stallion Farid (ShA), has a similar mother-line to Blanka's, noting his dam, Farina XIII, by Shagal, is out of the mare Faraga by Farag I ox, who was a son of Farag (Or.Ar. 1962). This line was introduced to the USA back in the 1980's when

the Stockinger Family imported two Shagya-Arabian Radautz ShA) and *Aifa was out of the mare Aika. mares which were presented on the 1989 NASS Inspection Tour. Both mares were sired by the stallion Faron Ibn Farag (Farag-5), by Farag (Or.Ar. 1962) and out of the influential Shaqya-Arabian mare 58 O'Bajan XIII, but *Anja was out of the mare Amara (by

what to do that day, especially not by a total newbie such as myself! He charmed me, nonetheless, and earned excellent scores for conformation and movement. I made so many friends that day with whom I have stayed in touch over the years on horsey topics. It's truly remarkable what a bond is formed in a

short amount of time between folks who share a niche interest such as Shagya-Arabians.

As the years went by I always wanted to participate in another inspection but never was there such a convenient opportunity until this year. Now that I had returned to my home state of Connecticut, the Vermont location was just 4.5 hours away by car. I was very excited to meet Hallie Goetz in person, a friend with whom I have shared many emails and a few phone calls, but had never actually met until this weekend. Kathy Richkind and I had met briefly at the 2009 inspection and had also traded emails over the years, so I was looking forward to reconnecting and getting the latest scoop on her beautiful horses.

As the inspection date approached I thought that perhaps I could contribute to the cause and further my own Shagya-Arabian studies by participating as a learner judge. I have poured over old inspection issues for several years to study pedigrees, conformation scores and comments, and I had recently participated in a conformation and biomechanics clinic in Massachusetts, so I thought the timing for learner judge might be convenient. ISG judges Hallie Goetz and Kathy Richkind agreed, and my joyful anticipation of the day grew to new heights.

To make matters even more wonderful, I learned that my old riding buddy Skamp would be competing in a 25mile ride also in Vermont on the very same day with his

new owner Joanna Lasher. As fate would have it, the ride site was literally on my way to the inspection site, and there would be another part-Shagya competing, so my Shagya-based itinerary was shaping up nicely.

I started in misty conditions from Hartford at 3:30 am and had a good ride in the dark up to the competitive trail ride (CTR) start, where I watched the vet-in, listened to the ride meeting, and photographed the trail departures. Skamp was in beautiful condition, and I got to meet a new friend in Jeanette Weber and her Shagya/Trakehner cross gelding named Lily Creek Tariff (a Bahadur grandson). The ride vets were quite impressed by the svelte Tariff. Jeanette reports that mares for exhibition and discussion in the afternoon.

The "on-the-job" training at this inspection included verifying the measurements of the jumping combination required for stallion evaluations; watching and recording height and girth and cannon bone measurements, taking both candid photos and official "yearbook" shots of the horses presented (and their owners), and of course, conformation and movement judging. Horses are shown "on the triangle" at the walk and trot and then also at liberty for walk, trot, and canter. Each judge is tasked with independent scoring on the following marks: type, head, neck, body, legs, walk, trot, canter - and making short notes about distinguishing features. There are

she is hoping to complete a 50miler on this horse later in the fall, and he certainly appeared game for the adventure.

After the start I indulged a brief power nap and headed north again under glorious blue skies and early autumn colors towards North Ferrisburgh, my destination being a small but meticulously well-kept dressage training center. (Fitting of my quintessential Vermont road trip, I even had to drive through a covered bridge!) Hallie, Kathy and I received a very warm welcome and had the pleasure of meeting three beautiful purebred Arabian horses. Hallie also trailered in two of her previously inspected purebred Shagya-Arabian

strict guidelines for the guality associated with each score, but it's still a complex and somewhat subjective matter. After the evaluation is complete the judges discuss their independent scores to establish the official mark for each category, and they also develop the official judge's comments for the horse. This is perhaps the hardest task of all, to be brief but descriptive and focus on details that may be of most interest to breeders down the road.

I was fortunate to be in the midst of Hallie and Kathy for this process, because they had wonderful judging abilities and also took the time to discuss with me some of the finer points of what they were seeing (or not seeing) on a particular horse. They also allowed me to partake in the wordsmithing, which was extremely educational. At our first destination, all three subject horses were by the same sire, so it was guite interesting to compare similarities and differences.

By the end of the day, after many miles driven, and many hours on my feet, and much attention given to the horses presented, I do believe I fell asleep before my head hit the pillow! I woke up early the next day and enjoyed a wonderfully peaceful morning visiting with a the beautiful collection of Shagya-Arabian mares (and two adorable non-Shagya ponies) at Northeast Shagyas. There is a lot of pedigree diversity amongst these mares, so I really enjoyed looking for the different subset types in each horse (I noticed Gazal, O'Bajan, Shagya and Siglavy Bagdady type, and one horse showing purebred Arabian influence).

Later that morning we were able to visit three more Shagya-Arabians, including one of my favorites of all time, Sapphoro SHG (Starwalker/Shaqya Scarlette AF by *Shandor). I had admired "Riva" in photos for years but had never met him in person, and he was happy to show off by powering around in the outdoor ring for me. Riva's field companions included an aged bay mare named *N'Obaya (O'Bedu/Natali) who holds a wonderful reputation as an unflappable and rugged trail mount. Rounding out the triumvirate was Fleurette (Budapest AF/Flora AA by Hungarian Bravo). With her luxurious mane and forelock, large liquid eye and wonderful body condition, I must say that Fleurette was perhaps the most beautiful 23 year-old horse I have ever seen.

I think many NASS readers may be able to think of their own experiences with a 20+ year-old Shagya-Arabian who stays in great condition and may still even





be working. Just one of the many things I love about this breed. (Shameless plug: I am collecting stories about older Shagya-Arabians and about foundation broodmares for my blog called Shagya Power: if you have an anecdote or photo you'd like to share, I'd be delighted to hear from you!)

As I returned to the workaday world I reflected that perhaps my greatest joy of the whole weekend was to observe every single horse in wonderful condition - good weight, good coats, good conditioning for their job, good

pastures and good hoof care. Hats off to all the owners and trainers for being careful stewards of your horses, I know it isn't easy or cheap! The herd looks great!

I am energized to have seen so many gorgeous representatives of the NASS herd in one short weekend, and to have increased my knowledge of the breed and of the judging process. I truly enjoyed the learner judge experience, and hope to continue my apprenticeship! Kathy recommended a USDF breeder's seminar and a trip to Europe - sounds good to me! In fact, my Hallie and I have already circled our calendars for the ISG Championship in 5 years (2022). I'll be turning 40 that year and figure I'd much rather indulge a trip to Babolna than Las Vegas or Cancun! Does that make me Shaqya obsessed? Perhaps - but there are worse vices...

Ferrisburgh, VT by Dawn Low Jones


I was honored to present three Arabians to the judging panel at the NASS inspection on September 16th held in Ferrisburgh, VT. The three Arabians presented were the 2006 stallion, FCF Oberons Vanity (AF Vanitys Repeat x Brumarba Callisto by Opalo), and two full sisters, FCF Titanias Vanity (2005) and FCF Silver Stardust (2006) by AF Vanitys Repeat and out of AM Tawny Britania by the UK bred stallion,*Sa'Ika.

Their sire AF Vanitys Repeat (*Silver Vanity x Silver Moonbeam by *Silver Moonlight) was never able to be ridden due to a vertebral fracture in the lumbar area as a yearling, but he exhibited elastic gaits and a good use of his topline in spite of that injury. The quality of those gaits is readily apparent in his son, FCF Oberons Vanity. AF Vanity's Repeat was a paternal grandson of the 1940 stallion, Oran who is found as a prominent influence in a number of Arabian-bred horses with proven sport horse ability. The Oran son, Noran, sired the international show jumper, Rex the Robber, and the 1973 KWPN stallion, Olympus, who was the first horse to represent the Netherlands in international GP dressage. Oran is also a prominent influence in the 1957 Arabian stallion, The Count of Al-Marah, who was trained by Ward Wells to Haute Ecole.

The mares' dam, AM Tawny Britania, was my riding mare for several years before I bred her so I appreciate all the qualities both external and internal that she imparted to her two daughters. Through their dam, the mares have several lines to Rissalix, a source of athleticism and stamina that is often found in conjunction with Oran in a number of Arabians with proven sport horse ability as in the aforementioned Noran and The Count of Al-Marah. All three of the Arabians I presented are strongly influenced by Skowronek whose

sons Raseyn and Raffles are often found in Arabians with jumping talent.

I found the judging panel to be fair and insightful. The scores and comments accurately reflected the horses as presented. Since strong hindquarters with correct structure is one of the core goals of my breeding efforts, I was pleased by Kathy Richkind's comment that all three had very good hind end structure for sport which she pointed out was difficult to find in contemporary purebred Arabians. FCF Oberon Vanity's superb character never fails to make an impression. It was fun to demonstrate his rideability and performance ability to the judges with the young rider, Emma Burnham, who did a wonderful job exhibiting him in USDF shows in 2017.

Everyone in attendance appreciated seeing the Shagya-Arabian mares brought by Hallie Goetz, Neddora SHG and O'Bajan Sahara SHG. None of the spectators had previously seen a Shagya-Arabian so it was wonderful to be able to expose more people to the breed.

I encourage all owners to have their horses Inspected for Breeding Approval or Evaluation with NASS. It was a wonderful experience and I'm thrilled my Nike PFF passed!

Foreign Stallion Joins NASS

The Shagya-Arabian stallion Under Milkwood has been accepted as an Active Foreign Stallion with NASS.

"Woody" is a 2008 son of Tatjanus and is out of the Babolna bred mare Gazal XIX-1. Tatjanus was a breed show champion in Germany and passed a German 90-day stallion performance testing. His grandsire Jeremias (Silas x Judith) was for many years the principal stallion at the stud of Mrs. Ruth Pack in Reichshof, siring five licensed sons. Woodie's dam Gazal XIX-1 is by Paris (Elite) who was by Bartok (by Gazal VII) and out of Pamina (Elite).

Woody was graded by l'Association Francaise du Cheval Arabe-Shagya (AFCAS) in 2011 and as an immature 3 year-old

was accepted into their Stud Book A, scoring 8's for type, head, neck and canter; his average score: 7.10. His measurements at that time: Height: 158 cm or 15.2 hands, Girth: 172 cm or 76.5 inches, and Cannon of 20 cm.





Olivia was originally a dressage and Sport Horse prospect who I transitioned to endurance. She has a very competitive nature and sheer toughness. *Oman Several line Shagya-Arabians and partbreds have done

very well in endurance, most notably SMR Fayette de Cameo (*Oman × Cameo Corrine). Cam- National title in both the open and amateur to handle eo, who is Olivia's half-sister, won the Haggin Cup in classes. He is currently schooling at about 1st level




