nual Meeting November 19, 2005

Meeting notes taken & respectfully submitted by Denis Atam (pictured at left).

The annual ISG meeting 2005 was held in Stadl-Paura (Austria) on Saturday, November 19th. The delegates representing NASS were Denis Atam (BOD) and Irmi Atam (Treasurer). The event started at noon with a site-visit through the stud Stadl-Paura led by Mrs. Holzleithner. Many nice horses were shown and we were told a lot of the history of the stud, the buildings and so on. This took about 45 min. We went then into the meeting room for a short get together and were asked to come to the covered riding arena where they have prepared a

short Shagya show for the delegates. Mr. Hoppenberger led through the show. The versatility of the Shagyas was one of the key messages during that show - you can use them for dressage, jumping, endurance as well as a family horse. A few stallions were shown, some of them quite young, who were not yet familiar with shows and people watching and applauding - but the handlers did a great job. The more experienced stallions were: Shaman (owner Mr. Meindl), a grey Shagan son) and Raon, an experienced jumping and event horse - both very nice stallions! The Au family from Austria also showed their stallion they brought to the venue. After about another 45 min. we went back to the meeting room for a snack and then the meeting was officially opened by Gaby Conradty.

The meeting started with a 30-40 min. presentation from Dr. Zehner who is an expert in genetics research. He shared information about several analyses on the Shagya breed under (Continued page 2)

Message from the President:

Dear NASS members,

You may have heard lately that there has been talk of a "merger" with the other Shagya organization in North America, the American Shagya Verband. This organization, which split from NASS over disagreements in management, applied to the ISG for membership 2 years ago. The ISG ruled that there should be one organization per country and decided in favor of NASS after listening to both organizations' presentations at the International Meeting.

Although nothing official has occurred, it has come to my attention that there have been a number of people from the ASAV discussing NASS and a "merger" on internet message boards and in other venues, including at the ASAV board meeting. I can assure our membership that as President, I have to date never received any formal communication concerning ASAV's intentions in this regard.

We welcome back any ASAV members that might have left NASS, and have offered to register any horses currently registered with ASAV that are not on our registration books, if they satisfy NASS' requirements for purebred or partbred Shagyas. As a further gesture of good faith, any horse that was presented 2 years ago at the ASAV judging event with Egon Kamarasy and his judging team is welcome to come to our inspections this fall, and the inspection fees will be waived for this group of breeding stallions and mares.

I also want to assure our membership that we are solvent financially, and in good standing as a non-profit organization with the State of Montana. We are a non-profit 501c3 and are current with our filings to the IRS in this regard. We run our organization professionally and within the law as required, filing all the necessary documentation each year with the state of Montana and the federal government. We have our members' best interests in mind and work for you, our members, to make sure the Shagya breed is represented in North America and that our stud book is up to international standards.

We welcome diversity in our membership and are working to best serve the Shagya owners and admirers in North America. Above all, NASS is dedicated to preserving and promoting the Shagya breed in North America. I hope all our members feel the same pride that I do in this organization.

genetic aspects. What it means if a breed is closed or open, about the meaning and importance of selection and breeding – what the difference is between selection breeding and breeding just to increase the numbers etc.

Next was the official declaration that the meeting was correct setup & invitations being send out before, the registration which delegates are present and how many votes each country has. The annual report 2004 was signed-off and the BOD/treasurer report was acknowledged and approved.

Then Gaby Conradty gave a speech for about 30 minutes with a review of activities/achievements/high-lights and low-lights during her assignment since she became ISG president. Here a summary of the topics:

Started 1999, implemented the 9/16 rule.
 2000 Millennium with a show in Babolna, political changes in Babolna made it possible that the Shagya was acknowledged as cultural heritage and something to be preserved.

- 2001 ISG had 2 annual meetings – how much ISG do the member associations need? Several decisions made, more transparency needed. Plans to come up with a breeding program and collecting information/data from the member associations about number of foals & pedigrees. Members of the ISG BOD traveled to several different countries.

- 2002 Introduced the ISG-Cup, European Sport Championat, some coordination problems with dates of events, several Shagya shows, Gaby Conradty traveled to USA for an evaluating seminar at Donna Coss place, mediation in regards to the problems in USA with the second association.

 2004 application of second US association ASAV was not approved. Several positive changes within NASS (introduction of regional directors, etc.)

- 2005 Equitana fair in Germany where ISG had a booth.

Some of the key messages were:

There are too many national conflicts.

 National problems need to be solved at national level, ISG cannot help much in such matters. Missing global transparence, no information where which stallions/mares exist/stands, where are which bloodlines, etc.

Missing stud books.

 There needs to be more marketing of ISG, ISG is not enough known/visible to the public.

 Need to exchange information about breeding stock amongst member countries.

 Certification standards are not in sync across all member associations (some have "Koerung" = performance test for stallions & special evaluation for breeding and some don't).
 Countries need to work more closely to-

gether. - Issues with the reporting of the number of

 Issues with the reporting of the number of registered horses and therefore not being able to issue correct invoices.

 ISG and member association to educate our members and Shagya owners to be able to give a more consistent answer about the nature/ characteristics of the Shagya breed.

- Challenges with the European studbook legal requirements.

Everyone has to be willing to make compromises.

Gaby Conradty then stepped down (including Dr. Hecker and Mr. Hoppenberger) and they dissolved the BOD of ISG. Then Mr. Ahmed Al-Samarraie gave a short speech about what some of the people have discussed prior to the meeting and what they would like to propose.

A short intense discussion started about the election modus. Finally it was agreed to nominate two helpers who would act as the election committee and lead through the election. The first position to elect was the president's position. They had two candidates for this one (Al-Samarraie and Rombauer) and Al-Samarraie was elected with 1105 votes (all possible votes). For the second BOD position the candidates were Rombauer, Kleist, Hoppenberger and Rombauer was elected over Kleist with 792. For the third position the candidates were Frei, Kleist, Hoppenberger and Kleist was elected also with 792 votes.

The new BOD immediately proposed to extend the BOD with 3 additional positions – this was also agreed by all member countries. During the following election process the following 3 people were elected: Dr. Walter Huber, Mrs. Carin Weiss and Mr. Hoppenberger

Then the election of the treasurer Mr. Psota and an assistant treasurer took place.

There were 3 applications from new members associations – Spain (approx. 20 registered horses), Croatia (approx. 30 registered horses) and Bulgaria (approx. 36 registered horses) – all 3 were approved.

Dr. Hecker gave a short speech from his side in regards to the situation in Hungary and the cultural heritage of the Shagya breed. He said that in former times the Shagya-Arabian horse was called "Babolna Arabian horse" and outlined that the breeding principals should be preserved and applied as they were defined 200 years ago.

Then the new BOD gave a short outlook what they have in mind for the future (better marketing, establish a Shagya database, more transparency & collaboration between the members, judge certification program, etc.)

Then Denis Atam gave a presentation about the current situation of NASS and the progress NASS made over the last 2 years. The situation that a second association was founded is unfortunate, but with the changes NASS made and the approach the new BOD of NASS is taking – the doors are wide open to welcome back any ASAV members to NASS. The feedback given by the attendees of the meeting was very supportive and encouraging that NASS should continue the great work and hopefully also to resolve the issue with the second association.

The meeting was closed at 7:30 p.m. when the majority of attendees went to a hotel close by.

Right to Ride Bill

The Right-to-Ride Bill, which would guarantee equestrians access to Federal public lands where horseback riding and stock packing are historic uses, seems to be stalled in Congress.

The stated purpose of this bill (HR 586, the Right-to-Ride Livestock on Federal Lands Act of 2005) is to preserve the use and access of pack and saddle stock animals on public lands, including wilderness areas, national monuments, and

other specifically designated areas, administered by the National Park Service, the Bureau of Land Management, the United States Fish and Wildlife Service, or the Forest Service where there is a historical tradition of such use, and for other purposes.

If the Right-to-Ride bill is to become law in the 109th Congress, a wave of popular support must carry it through the House Resources, House Agriculture Committees, and US Senate! Off the Registrar's Desk

(This is the first in a Series of Articles)

Happy New Year! We hope that everyone will have a great time in 2006 with family, friends and horses.

It's been my privilege to serve as NASS Registrar since its beginnings nearly twenty years ago-a learning experience I would not have missed for anything. The "Registrar's Office" is, at present, by the bay window of my living room. If you should ever come through the Central New York area, we'd love to have you stop in- but you won't find any smart young things frisking around in business suits or machinery bussing. You will find one old lady in a chambray work shirt and blue jeans, with notebooks, file cards and lettering pen, piles of books, a piano, the coffee pot on and three "genuine Delphinian Throw-away cats (the "editorial 'we" refers to whichever kitty is curled up on my lap at the time).

We have some "new people" among our members who may need to know about the procedures for submitting registrations, recording the sale or transfer of horses and recording other essential information about our Shagya-Arabian horses. Even long-time members will sometimes want to check on the details.

Recently, we have observed some peculiar events in regard to timely USPS delivery of both personal and Shagya mail. We can't deal with lost mail effectively unless we know about it. A few days ago, word came that some owners had sent an application <u>more than fifteen months</u> ago which has yet to find its way to our post office box. I don't know whether to cry or scream. The NASS Mail comes to my post office box at the local Post Office 200 yards away around the corner and down the street. I've only had access for over thirty years. No one else is authorized to open that box. If I should be away from home for a day or two, the mail is inside, dry, and locked up.

If you do not hear from us within three weeks after you sent your material, PICK UP THE PHONE AND CALL! The number is Area Code 315-662-3662. I am almost always here until noon every week day (my "Shagya day" runs from +/- 5 a.m. until I'm done, or have to be somewhere else0. My answering machine picks up on the second ring. I let the machine "screen" most of my calls, but I want to talk with you.

Then report non-delivery of mail to your Post Office where you mailed it out. It's a good idea to keep notes of what you sent to us, and when, and to make photocopies of applications and other required documentation before you mail them. There is a "Form 1510, Mail Loss/Rifling

Report" which can be submitted especially if you have sent mail by Certified or Registered Mail. Considering the current exorbitant costs of postage and fees, the USPS has no excuse for not delivering correctly addresses mail, on time and undamaged. Having a record of what you sent, and when, puts some "teeth" into your statement when you report a loss. We keep a log book of all mail received, all pieces sent out and all postage used, to verify the amount spent on postage and certified or priority mail. Okay, now on to how to get the job done!

Stallion Report Form:

Stallion owners should submit a <u>Stallion</u> <u>Report</u> as soon as possible after breeding season is over, before December 31. The reports must be on file in order to process any registrations of foals from your stallion. If you are not sure of the information required, we will be glad to send you a copy of the NASS Stallion Report form. If you use your stallion via transported semen, a permit for those techniques must be on file, along with blood type or DNA identification. Copies of these results must be on file with the Registrar's office. The University of Kentucky has handled all our testing procedures and now performs the DNA testing procedures currently in place.

Registration Application Form:

When we receive your application(s), we examine them to be sure all information is provided, drawn and written in parts of the description match, and necessary documentation and correct fee(s) have been provided. If everything is in order, we send you a letter of acknowledgement, confirming receipt of your application, documents and payment, stating the registration number assigned to each new entry, or horse. We report a receipt of payment and forward your payment to the Treasurer by Saturday of the week of receipt if all is in good form. If there is any question about information presented, fees or documentation, we contact you. If necessary we return the documentation to you, keep a photocopy, and retain your check until the records are corrected and all necessary items have been received. In either case we acknowledge receipt within one or two days.

Registration Eligibility Questions:

Owners should consult with the NASS handbook for detailed information. If the owner has any question about the eligibility of any foal, application and documentation should be submitted to the NASS Breeding Committee for approval.

The Registrar is not authorized to make approvals and is expected to contact the Breeding Committee regarding questionable applications. Nonetheless, you may contact me with your questions.

SHARONA:

For those of you who may not know, NASS' registry is officially named "The Shagya Registry

of North America" or "SHARONA".

Purebred Shagya Arabian Registration

All offspring of two ISG-Registered or NASSregistered purebred Shagyas which have been approved for purebred Shagya breeding by the NASS Breeding Committee ("BC"), or with one parent a Registered Arabian approved by NASS' BC as specified in the guidelines, are eligible for registration.

When importing a Shagya-Arabian, the importer/ owner of the horse to be registered should request the Registration Form for Imported Horses (the green form) and furnish copies of its valid registration certificate from the country of origin, official pedigree, recorded ownership, and record of importation. These documents, with the required fees, would be sent to the Breeding Committee for consideration and recommendation.

Part Shagya Arabian and Part-Shagya Registration:

For "Part Shagya-Arabians" and "Part-Shagyas", the owner should submit the Part-Shagya Registration Form (the yellow form), and must provide a copy of the valid registration certificate and official pedigree of any <u>registered non-</u> <u>Shagya parent</u>, which becomes part of the registration documentation.


"Part Shagya-Arabians" and "Part Shagyas" are described in the NASS Handbook in "Appendix Registry to the Pure Bred Shagya." Part Shagya-Arabians are the progeny of one NASSregistered Purebred Shagya and one purebred Arabian. Any offspring of one NASS-registered Shagya may be registered in the SHARONA Part-Shagya Registry and will be called Part-Shagya.

If the non-Shagya parent is not registered, the owner should state the name, color, and age of the parent, with information as to its type: e.g. hunter, stock horse, pony. Again, the documentation furnished is retained and with appear on the Part-Shagya registration form. (To be Continued...)

My name is Monique Vincent, I am the proud owner of MJL Olivia and a lifetime member of NASS. Olivia came to me about a year ago after having been started in a dressage barn by Patty Saddler in Lubbock, Texas. Olivia has finished out at 15.2 hands and about 1250 lbs and her look also has developed a lot more depth (the picture above is from about two years ago). When Olivia came to me she was introduced endurance riding. She took well to it from the start. After one short month she was taken to her first ride-a 35 mile ride in southern New Mexico. She completed the distance in 4 hours and 45 minutes. Olivia then went on to complete two other tough limited distance rides in the 2005 season. By the start of the 2006 season I felt like Olivia was ready for multi-day rides. So a year to the date of her first completion Olivia started her first back to back limited distance rides. On February the 11th 2006 Olivia started a 35 mile limited distance ride along with 7 other horses. All day long she did not miss a beat. We pulsed in to complete the ride in second place and were also awarded the Best Conditioned award. On the morning of the 12th of February Olivia looked good-no stiffness or soreness, good energy, so we went ahead and started her second day of riding. Again she looked really good all day. We placed first and were again awarded the Best Conditioned award. Olivia is now in the pasture enjoying a well earned rest. I hope to continue with Olivia in multi-day limited distance rides for the 2006 season before moving up to the 50 mile distance for 2007. ****

Ghazzlan: A Story of Linebreeding in Denmark by Eskil Vad, Denmark (Translated to English)



The year 2005 once more brought one single stallion for the Danish Shagya Breeding Approval, but we are talking about an unusual stallion: Ghazzlan (Ghazir x Radonna by Radautz), (above photo) who was bred and is owned by Gitte and Jørgen Hoberg, Denmark. He is not only quite a big stallion, even though he is a late born 3 year old stallion (4 years in 2006), he measures 162 cm and he looks more sporty than we have seen in many years. At the same time he has good movements and has a very good temperament. What makes him extra exciting is his pedigree: it gives him big promises for power of penetration, which I will try to show in the following sentences.

Ghazzlan is a very exciting and well thought out combination of the best bloodlines in the Shagya breeding. In his pedigree there is the best way made line breeding of Shagya XXXVI, which is known as one of the best breeders of type in Babolna, and by the way father to the well known Shagya I (DK), who among others were the father of Shagal (DK), even over Gazal VII who was named stallion of the century. With 19 licensed sons in Germany and incredible high licensed daughters which many of them again had the quality to become mothers of stallions. As such he has a lot of grandsons who have been able to continue the line after him.

Gazal VII was well known as producer of really good competition horses, and he had the ability to give very good movements to his offspring with very good type and size. His offspring did very well especially in jumping and military. Several of his offspring have been selected in Hanoverian and Trakehner breeding associations and made independent lines, a single line has continued in Australia and New Zealand and is quite popular.



Ghazir, Ghazzlan's sire, (above) was one of the few Danish Shagya stallions to get national as well as international gold medals. He was especially known in the Danish Shagya breeding Society (DSAH) as a stallion who was the best to produce type and movement. He made the most homogeneous offspring selection (5 representatives) which has been seen until now in Denmark with 23 points (24 points is top score).

Radautz, (below) Ghazzlan's grandsire, was an unique stallion, he had a very incredible exterior and he had an exceptional capacity. Radautz is probably the only breeding stallion who has been able to perform and win the Grand Prix classes in endurance, jumping as well as military His personal jumping record was 210 cm. He is one of the relatively few Shagya stallions who have been mentioned in the German Jahrbuch (Year book). In the year book the stallions are mentioned by the offspring prizes and even so



many years after his death there are still offspring, which can raise his name by winning prizes in Germany. He was well known as father to high licensed stallions in German and Dutch breeding, furthermore he was especially known as one of the best stallions in the Anglo Arabian breeding programme by in Germany. In Denmark he is among others the father to the super mare Soebo's Tandara, the mother of Mon Ami

AA, licensed in DSAH, Danish Warmblood and British Warmblood. Radautz is furthermore grandfather to stallions as Hector AA, Mango AA, Mariegaarden's Call AA, Sonny Ace AA and not at least Doncaster AA, which today is used in Holsteiner breeding besides an international jumping career. Radautz was by his 163 cm, 21 cm bones, a relatively big and strong Shagya stallion and was known to produce movement, type and size, as well as an incredible good temperament and extremely good riding ability in offspring.

Shagal, (sire of *Shandor and *Budapest) the sire of Ghazzlan's grandmother, became the first Shagya stallion in Denmark, who reached licensing in Danish Warmblood Society and he also got licensing in the Trakehner breeding society both in Denmark and Germany, and furthermore Shagal was an improver in Babolna where the horses were much to small and insignificant and he left behind several licensed sons and grand sons after him, in both Germany and Denmark (and U.S.A.). Shagal was by his 165 cm the first stallion in Danish Shagya breeding that had a size, which also competitors could accept. Shagal also reached national and international gold medals.

The mother line of Ghazzlan is also very special as he is linebred to one of the best Shagya mares in Denmark through the years, Anja, who among other things was the mother of Ghazir (DK), Ghazzlan's father, and at the same time grandmother's mother to Ghazzlan. Anja made a lot of top mares with different stallions, and a lot of these mares continued her success as Anja's family is the leading line in Denmark.

The most important of Anja's daughters has to be Aggie, who has been founder of first quality mares which some of them has reached recognition in the Trakehner breeding in Denmark, beside of their recognition of DSAH, and she is mother to the selected stallion Bravo Bajar (by Bonjour Bajar). Another daughter of Anja with a very big value for the breeding is Ghazzlan's grand mother Shanea, Radonna's mother, also have made two selected stallions, Bashan by Bouquet, in Norway and Sweden, and Arshan by Artaxerxes (DK), in Sweden, both especially large framed stallions, so maybe Shanea will become as important in Norway and Sweden as Anja has become to the Danish breeding. There are three stallion mothers in Ghazzlan's mother line.

This deliberate line breeding is expected to result in a very secure breeding, where one can expect offspring with type, size and top movement, combined with a good temperament. With the right combinations there could be a possibility of brown offspring, as Radautz was brown, and he had the power of producing colour. Anja's mother also was brown, so there should be good chances to produce colour!
