# JUNE 2024 NEWSLETTER FROM THE PASTOR: THE BLESSINGS OF SUMMER

On June 1, Meteorological Summer begins; on June 20, the summer solstice marks the beginning of Astronomical Summer; both events are generally most gladly welcomed by North Shore dwellers! Or perhaps our season of Summer is best defined by Memorial Day weekend through Labor Day weekend? Whatever the case, this is a favorite time of year for many, even if we do have to adjust to increased tourist traffic. Children are off from school. Work schedules may slow down in many cases—although not for those in the hospitality industry! The warmer weather has a way of inviting us to relax, play, and savor life a little more easily. Within the life of our congregation, summer is in some ways a less busy time. Some, though not all, of our musical ensembles will take time off; the Women's Group and the Quilters take a break, the Confirmation aged students and the younger students, will not be meeting over the summer as they do during the program year from September through May.

On the other hand, the Council, most committees, many musical ensembles, the Men's Group, and Lectio Divina/Dig Deeper, the pop-up dinners, will continue on, unabated. Children's Time for younger children will take the place of Children's Church/Kid's Connect during the summer, so there is still a fun activity for kids during part of the worship time. We will have a Vacation Bible School in June from the 10<sup>th</sup> through the 12<sup>th</sup> in the evening. Our All Church-Community picnics will happen monthly, providing opportunities for fellowship and welcome. Perhaps most significantly, our worship will move outdoors, hopefully in later June, and that always provides a very inviting space for all in the area to join us in worshiping in our beautiful Memorial Garden space. Families with children can sit on blankets if they like; dogs can accompany owners; newcomers can find a casual and welcoming community of worship, and all of us can be blest by communing with our Creator in the context of the Creation.

The last point is really one of the blessings that summer offers us in general: the opportunity to more easily connect with the Lord of Creation within the diverse and awesome Creation which surrounds us on the North Shore. Hopefully we can find the opportunity to watch for Northern Lights, or hike along the Shore, or kayak on Lake Superior, or go fishing, birding, biking, camping-- whatever gives us the chance to breathe deeply and recognize the goodness of God in Creation. This kind of spirituality not only binds us together with other Christians, but with people of other faith traditions as well, who also experience God in Creation. Our souls are nurtured by drawing close to God through nature. Our relationship to the earth and our fellow planet-dwellers can also be enhanced as we relax and savor the Created world around us.

So, whether we are taking advantage of outdoor summer worship or some other church activity, or we are sitting alone on a rocky beach overlooking Lake Superior, summer is a season that can truly be an opportunity for growth in faith and spirit. May God bless us this summer!

If the funds are needed, they can be used for anything in the church budget by Council approval. It was also decided to earn interest on the money in the Building and Property fund as well as the Memorial Fund. You should see this transaction show up on the next financial report. Mary and I were with my cousin, a farmer, when after visiting the cemetery where my mother's family is buried, he offered to show me the former cemetery, now closed. With my interest in history, I find I can learn a lot about the people and times of a community from the words on a headstone.

The words on this little girl's headstone saddened me and left me with many questions. Why wasn't she named? She apparently was not stillborn as she was referred to as "little girl." How did she die? Why no date of birth or death? Where was her family going? I can only conclude the grief-stricken family wanted their daughter to be buried in a Christian cemetery. It may have been the wagon train could/would not stop, so they lovingly gave their little girl to townspeople of Elmore for a Christian burial. Somehow her name was lost - but known only unto God.

How comforting the verses of the hymn we often sing after a baptism:

- Children of the heav'nly Father Safely in His bosom gather; Nestling bird nor star in heaven Such a refuge e'er was given.
- God His own doth tend and nourish; In His holy courts they flourish; From all evil things He spares them; In His mighty arms He bears them.

# Rubedors.....BILLBOARD MAGAZINE: JULY 18, 1942

NORRIS CITY, ILL., Despite much rain and cool weather, Zarlington Comedians has been experiencing exceptionally good business on its established Illinois-Iowa territory. Show goes into week stands next week for the remainder of the season in Illinois. In the roster this season are Ray Zarlington, Bernice Zarlington, Flossie Evans and Mitzi.....

Mitzi is our own Maureen Rubedor! In 1936, Mitzi Evans was the fourth generation born into a circle repertory performing family known as the ZARLINGTON COMMEDIANS! Home-based in Iowa with a winter home in Florida during WWII, Ray & Bernice and their daughters Flossie and Mitzi were part of a circle repertory group that made up early Chautauqua performers, traveling by rail, truck and auto to bring their talents to mostly rural audiences far and wide. They often performed on Chautauqua grounds in tents that could seat 1,000 people! Zarlington Comedians were one of roughly 2,000 "circle rep" performing troupes that made the circuit east and west until modern conveniences like drive-in movie theaters reduced demand for this kind of entertainment. Ray was a comedian, soft shoed and played any musical instrument he could lay his hands on. Bernice sang and acted. Flossie played trumpet and the baby of the family, Mitzi played trumpet and was a character actor.
