FROM THE PASTOR

Advent has long been my favorite season of the church year. So much about Advent speaks to me: the beauty of the sanctuary decorated for the season, the beauty of the worship services and the music, and the beauty of the Scripture texts come together in a way that is rich and meaningful. Many of us find Advent to be a particularly *soulful* season, one that combines longing with hopefulness in a way that heals our souls.

Longing is one of the spiritual experiences of Advent, which makes it a realistic reflection of our experiences year-round in a broken world---a world that is oh, so, good, and yet is also oh, so, wounded. We long for peace, but war continues to rage not only in the Holy Land, but all over the world. We long for unity, but our nation remains polarized after a divisive election. We long for joy, but many of us are grieving after a year of many significant deaths in our church and community. We long for health, but many of us are experiencing illness or one kind or another. Advent allows us to express all of this longing, to honestly acknowledge the brokenness we see and experience, and to lament all that is less whole and more broken than we wish it were. Longing is part of the human condition, and it is given expression in the sometimes minor-keyed music, the candle lighting, and deep blue altar paraments of Advent...all a reflection of the darkness in nature as we approach the winter solstice.

Yet, *hope* is another primary experience of Advent. If longing acknowledges all we wish could be so but is not yet so, then hope acknowledges that God is good, and that our longing is not futile. So many of the hymns of Advent speak of hope, including our most ancient Advent song: "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel, and ransom captive Israel, who mourns in lonely exile here, until the Son of God appear. Rejoice, rejoice! Emmanuel shall come to you, O Israel." Practicing hopefulness is a spiritual discipline, and it can be a challenge. The important thing to keep in mind, is that we can be hopeful, while we are still feeling longing and experiencing darkness. We don't need to force false gaiety during this season; being hopeful is more an experience of the soul that trusts that God does come among us in Christ, uniquely incarnate in a Holy Child, in order to keep our hopes alive.

With the coming of Christmas, all of our longings and hopes come together as God takes on flesh in Jesus. It's not that our longings disappear altogether or that our hopes are immediately fulfilled. But a light is given to us that shines in the darkness and that cannot be extinguished by all that is wrong or evil in the world. The Christ child brings gifts of peace and joy to us, even in a world that remains broken and blest, all at once.

This Advent, my prayer is that the beauty of this season---in worship, in nature, in our gathering with each other—will allow us to express our longings and hopes and to discover the love of God, made real in the birth of Christ. May this soulful season bring healing to our souls and our world.

WORSHIP IN DECEMBER

This is one of the most beautiful months of worship within the church year. Please make a point to take time out from holiday busy-ness to move through Advent into Christmas in worship. All services are at 9 AM, as usual, except for Christmas Day, which is at 9:30 AM.

- Sunday, December 1-The First Sunday of Advent. We will celebrate Holy Communion at the altar, as we experience rituals and music unique to this holy season. Seraphim will sing.
- Sunday, December 8-The Second Sunday of Advent. We will celebrate Holy Communion by intinction, and following worship, we will sponsor the Live Nativity at the Julebyen celebration.
- Sunday, December 15-The Third Sunday of Advent-We will celebrate Holy communion by intinction, and there will be an opportunity for healing prayer and anointing. Our bell choir will play.
- Sunday, December 22-The Fourth Sunday of Advent. We will celebrate Holy Communion by intinction, and our dulcimer group will provide music.
- Wednesday, December 25- Christmas Day-On this joyful day, our JOYFUL choir will be present to sing. Holy Communion will be celebrated by intinction. This service is at **9:30 AM**, the one time in the year we get a little extra sleep!
- Sunday, December 29-The First Sunday of Christmas. A service of Lessons and Carols will guide us in reflection upon the blessings of Christmas.
