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From the Pastor's View:

The Knowing, Caring Community of Christ"

President Lyndon B. Johnson was our nation's 36th President. Early in his life, he served as a public school teacher. LBJ was a man, a teacher, and a President with a heart. He was instrumental in passing landmark legislation that brought opportunities and Voting Rights to our nation's most disadvantaged citizens. I have often wondered - what was the genesis for such committed and abiding care for the disadvantaged? Doris Kearns

Goodwin, historian, and author of one of my favorite books, <u>Leadership in Turbulent Times</u>, provides some insight.

At one point, LBJ's father. Sam Johnson, was dying. The father asked his son, to return him to the family home & community in which he grew up. Sam told his son, "I want to be where people know when you are sick... and care when you die." So, LBJ took his Dad home. There, people KNEW and CARED. I have been reminded of Sam Johnson's dying wish as I've served among the people of Knife River. Of course, we are not on our deathbed. But, we know plenty of "knowing" and "caring." For example, through recent weeks, people of KRLC have extended compassionate hospitality to grieving family members as they have gathered for Memorial and Funeral services. On a couple of these occasions, the venue for the knowing and caring has been at church. On another occasion, the service and hospitality was at the Two Harbors Fire Station! For these gatherings, the faithful have rehearsed and offered inspiring music; they have prepared the space and food; and, they have known and cared through loving hospitality.

On several occasions, I've been reminded of the third verse of the familiar hymn, "Blest Be the Tie That Binds".

We share our mutual woes. our mutual burdens bear, and often for each other flows the sympathizing tear.

The word the Apostle Paul used for love was *agape*: that is, "a selfless, unconditional love, that seeks no reward or acknowledgement.". That Greek word is used 115 times in the New Testament. It has to do with love. It has to do with "knowing" and "caring."

That's the kind of love that has been breaking out these days, in this place. Thanks be to God!

CAN WE TALK?

Following worship, for several Sundays, we have scheduled "Table Talks" to address important issues. These Adult Education offerings will explore such topics as:

<u>November 2</u>: Brief presentation related to the recent Congregational Survey. What do KRLC members most value out our congregation? What are the pastoral leadership qualities we most desire as we look to the time of Calling a new pastor?

<u>November 23</u>: Living Wills – Who Needs Them? For What? This will be the first of two sessions to explore the preparation of personalized "Health Care Directives." Dr. Anne Skadberg, Tara Damyanovich,

and Pastor Holman will offer an orientation to how we might clarify and state our values, hopes, and expectations for the medical treatments we want to receive near the end of life. (And, importantly, what treatments we might not want to receive.). Session #2 is scheduled for December 14.

<u>November 30</u>: "The Year of Matthew". Beginning with the First Sunday of Advent (November 30) our Gospel readings will come from Matthew. (Through the past year, we have journeyed through Luke's Gospel.) Join us on this beginning day of Advent as we explore some of the unique perspectives, themes, and emphases of Matthew. This will be a good way to prepare for the worship year ahead.

December 14: Living Wills - Who Needs Them? session #2

Christmas Giving – This year, we will continue our tradition of providing special Christmas gifts for Senior residents living in the Two Harbors community. We have committed to providing 25 much-appreciated gifts this year; and, we do this in partnership with other congregations of the Two Harbors ecumenical community. WELCA OUTREACH

Each fall, WELCA meets to allocate "Sunshine" donations to worthy organizations. Suggestions were made in September over a potluck dinner. Allocations were voted on in October.

- *<u>Lutheran Social Services Youth & Family Services</u> received \$350 to purchase mattresses for Another Door Youth Shelter, Renaissance Transitional Living or Permanent Supportive Apartments.
- *Lutheran World Relief received \$425 for relief assistance where the need is greatest. Founded by Lutherans in the United States at the end of World War II, grounded in Lutheran theology and building on decades of experience, Lutheran World Relief tackles global poverty by helping people adapt to the challenges that threaten their livelihoods and well-being. LWRs work with people based on need, regardless of race, religion or nationality and they do not evangelize. They provide aid in emergencies and help families restore their lives. They partner with communities to build and grow rural economies. They break the cycle of poverty, so families and communities can thrive. Their goal is to help people build self-sufficiency and create new community-owned approaches to problem-solving that will last long after our projects end.
- *Justice North received \$425. Justice North is a nonprofit civil law firm serving all of NE Minnesota with the "Justice Bus" dedicated to the principle that equal access to justice is a basic human right, regardless of background or circumstances. They open the doors of the legal system to the most vulnerable in our communities by providing critical legal assistance to preserve clients' safety, security, and stability. They provide representation, limited services, advice, or information to individuals with issues that fall outside of the criminal justice system. For people facing civil legal challenges such as the threat of losing their home, safety, health care, income, or even their families, navigating the justice system without a lawyer can be nearly impossible.

Call Committee update:

The call committee has met twice as we begin the process of calling our next minister. On Oct. 8th the five members met with Deacon Susan Williams from the ELCA Northeastern Minnesota synod to review how our church will compile a Ministry Site Profile (MSP). It will take 7 meetings for us to properly develop this document for the needs of KRLC.

The MSP will then be used by the NE MN ELCA synod to help match us with potential candidates from all 65 synods across the country. We will then interview and consider selected candidates.

The process is very well thought out and we have excellent resources from our synod and therefore are not left to try to figure this out ourselves.

We are currently gathering information from the congregation from surveys and answers to posed questions to help us gain further understanding of what our congregation feels are the most important qualities of our next minister. We will endeavor to keep the congregation updated on where we are at in the process. We would very much ask for your prayers for wisdom and clarity as we go forward.

It All "Boils" Down to Feeling the "Heat" in the Holiday Season!!

At a special congregational meeting following the service on October 26th, the congregation unanimously voted to replace our aging heating/domestic water heating boiler at a cost not to exceed \$12,000. Our current boiler is approximately 20 years old, has had had several major breakdowns and the availability of replacement parts & service was a major concern with the heating season fast approaching. The new boiler will be a wall-mounted, combination unit which in addition to supply building heat, will also supply domestic hot water "on demand." This should result in a significant savings in propane costs as the current boiler system configuration heats approximately 55 gallons of domestic water 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. As well as improved efficiency, the installation of the wall-mounted combination unit eliminates the need for the large domestic hot water tank in the already crowded small boiler room. So as the cold holiday season approaches, we can all relax knowing we will not suddenly be awakened from our holiday naps to hop in our sleighs and head to the church to set up electric space heaters and hope that Santa Claus can deliver and install a new boiler for us quickly. A special thanks to David Grong, Ed Lee, Pete Stoddard and the rest of the Property Committee for all the hard work done to get this very important building improvement researched and approved.

Also, a shout of thanks to Pete Stoddard for replacing/adjusting the blower thermostats on our church heating registers. These blower thermostats have been non-functional over many years and their operation will help circulate more warm air throughout our church and improve our heating efficiency.

The History of Churches Feeding the Poor

The history of churches feeding the poor is deeply rooted in the teachings of Jesus and the early Christian movement. Early Christians were known for their charitable efforts, including the establishment of soup kitchens and the provision of meals to the needy. These efforts were driven by a commitment to charity and a desire to alleviate poverty.

The modern soup kitchen movement gained prominence during the 19th century, with religious organizations like the Salvation Army playing a significant role in opening and operating these kitchens. During economic crises, such as the Great Depression, secular groups and individuals also contributed to addressing widespread hunger.

Today, soup kitchens continue to be operated by a diverse array of entities, reflecting a collective effort to combat food insecurity.

In 1939 the Federal Government stepped in with the Food Stamp Program as an answer to the Great Depression. It became a permanent program in 1964 with the Food Stamp Act and in 2008 it became known as SNAP or Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program.

The reason for this history lesson is that SNAP's funding will run out in November, and it is being caused directly by the Government shutdown.

It's time for us to step up and remember our history of feeding the people who have less than we do. Going forward, we can play a big part in our local area by helping to fund CHUM and the Two Harbor's Food Shelf. Please send in your donations now so we can help with this urgent need.
