already high enough to finance the cost of rebuilding, along with the help of the HOA. It's time that the league should start using the money it collects for the improvement of the courts

I have played on courts with Turf and it is much better than oyster shell overall. I also suggest looking into the length of the court. I would suggest contacting Sun City Roseville to get their feedback back on surface and length. They have used Astro turf for years.

League fees make more sense as it applies to players, not everyone uses the courts.

I prefer playing on the oyster shells over turf. I enjoy the challenge of the imperfections in the oyster shell courts, as it is similar to reading a putting green in golf. That said, I would assume more people would prefer the turf, and if approved, I would prefer that HOA reserves NOT be used, and have the turf paid for with a combination of fundraising and slightly higher league fees.
