

# "Humanization: The Artistic Eye of Arthello Beck, Jr." Exhibition

On Thursday, March 24, 2022 the African American Museum held a reception for the opening of a new exhibition entitled "Humanization: The Artistic Eye of Arthello Beck, Jr." This exhibition shows the breadth and depth work of Oak Cliff Artist, Arthello Beck, Jr. He was born and raised in Dallas, Texas. The self-taught artist attended Lincoln High School where he received his only formal art training.

He was a quiet, gentle man who painted humanizing scenes of the African American family, culture, and life. Mr. Beck crafted numerous depictions of the Civil Rights Movement, as well as echoes of places he visited locally and international, including Africa and China. In 1960, Mr. Beck won the Grand Prize in the Crafts Fair held in the General Exhibition Building at the Fair Park; during the State Fair of Texas. It was an outstanding accomplishment at a time when, due to segregation, Black people could only attend the fair one day each year.

In 1970, Mr. Beck and fellow artist, Nathan Jones, opened the Fair Park Gallery of Fine Arts, first gallery in Deep Ellum/ Exposition Park area, across the street from the Music Hall. In 1971, Mr. Beck opened the Arthello's Art Gallery which is still located at 1922 South Beckley in Dallas. The gallery is managed by his wife, Mrs. Mae Beck.

Following his death in 2004, a 20ft mosaic tile medallion he designed for DFW Airport (Terminal D) entitled "Cypress Trees", was installed in 2005. In 2007, a gallery in the South Dallas Cultural Center was named after him. The City of Dallas Office of Arts and Culture has commissioned Mrs. Jennifer Cowley to design and fashion the public art sculpture to honor Mr. Beck. The sculpture will be unveiled in 2022 in Twins Falls Park, located in Oak Cliff.

Special thanks were given to MOI Jesse Hornbuckle, III, City of Dallas Office of Arts and Culture Commissioner; Mr. Hiawatha Williams, Owner of Williams Chicken; and others for helping to bring the "Humanization" exhibit to the museum. ### Iota Phi Lambda Sorority, Inc., Psi Chapter Congratulates Dr. Vicki (Claybon) Sellers 2022 Texas Black Sports Hall Of Fame Inductee

Dr. Vicki (Claybon) Sellers emerged from being a young high school tennis sensation and used her accomplishments to serve as a springboard toward an extraordinary career as a multi-sport coach, trailblazing administrator, and prolific educator. Starring on the tennis team at Lufkin Dunbar High School of Prairie View Interscholastic League (PVIL), Vicki, along with sister Cedric and doubles partner JoAnn McGruder, rocked the high school tennis world in East Texas, the state and various regions in the country in the early to mid-1960's. Then Vicki Claybon won two state high school tennis championships in singles and four state crowns in doubles. She and her associates racked up numerous tournament wins including victories over the defending national champion.


Sellers then took her winning ways to North Texas State University in Denton (now University of North Texas at Denton) where she excelled in coaching under the mentorship of 2017 Texas Black Sports Hall of Fame Inductee, C.H. Collins where she led and organized Denton's girl's athletic programs at both the high school and junior high school levels.

She later took her new skills to Dallas ISD, where she coached at Pinkston and Skyline High schools while earning her master's degree at Texas Woman's University and her Doctorate Degree from Nova Southeastern University in Ft. Lauderdale, Florida while earning Educational Life Certifications in four other states and was named "Dallas Teacher of the Year" in 1996.

In 2015, Dr. Sellers was inducted into the Lufkin Dunbar Hall of Honor. In 2019, she was inducted into the Hall of Honor for the Prairie View Interscholastic League and Coaching Association (PVIL-CA) and as a Life Member in 2021.

It's a fate many older women fear: loneliness and isolation as they age. Now, new research suggests those feelings may also predispose them to heart disease.

The findings may be especially relevant now because of social distancing required by the pandemic.

"We are social beings. In this time of COVID-19, many people are experiencing social isolation and loneliness, which may spiral into chronic states," said study first author Natalie Golaszewski, a postdoctoral scholar in the Herbert Wertheim School of Public Health and Human Longevity Science at the University of California, San Diego.

"It is important to further understand the acute and long-term effects these experiences have on cardiovascular health and overall well-being," she added in a university news release.

The study included nearly 58,000 postmenopausal women in the United States who responded to an initial questionnaire assessing social isolation in 2011-2012, followed by another questionnaire in 2014-2015 that assessed loneliness and social support.

The women were followed through 2019 or until they were diagnosed with heart disease. During that follow-up, nearly 1,600 were diagnosed with heart disease.

Social isolation and loneliness independently increased heart disease risk by 8% and 5% respectively. Women with high levels of both had a 13%-27% higher risk than those with low levels of social isolation and low levels of loneliness.

The researchers pointed out that socially isolated people are not always lonely, and that lonely people are not necessarily socially isolated.

"Social isolation is about physically being away from people, like not touching or seeing or talking to other people. Loneliness is a feeling, one that can be experienced even by people who are regularly in contact with others," explained senior author John Bellettiere, assistant professor of epidemiology at the Wertheim School of Public Health.

"We do not yet know whether the increased risk of cardiovascular disease is due to acute exposure to social isolation and loneliness, or whether prolonged exposure accumulated over a lifetime is the culprit. Further studies are needed to better understand that," Bellettiere said in the release.

One-fourth of adults 65 and older report social isolation, while one-third of adults 45 or older report being lonely. Previous research shows that social isolation is more common among women than men.

Heart disease is the leading cause of death for U.S. women, accounting for 1 in every 5 deaths, according to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

"Measures of social isolation and loneliness -- even with brief questions as was done in our study -- should be incorporated into standard care," Golaszewski said.

"We monitor our patients' blood pressure, weight and temperature, and it might also be beneficial to capture the social needs that individuals may be lacking to better understand cardiovascular risk and develop solutions," she added.



### **April Is Parliamentary Law Month**

### Did you know?

Parliamentary Law Month is celebrated in April to coincide with the birth month of Thomas Jefferson, who wrote the first American manual of parliamentary procedure in 1801. His Manual is unchallenged as the first to define and interpret parliamentary principles for our democratic republic and to offer a basic pattern of rules and a measure of uniformity for the legislative processes of the United States.

### Did you know?

Parliamentary Law originated in Athens nearly 3,000 years ago. Demeter's Manual (Demeter, George (1969). Demeter's Manual of Parliamentary Law and Procedure, Blue Book) traces the origins of parliamentary law, by which is meant orderly deliberation and action by an assembly of persons or a body of citizens, to c. 750 BC in Greece. It was during that era that the idea of self-government with the right to deliberate in assembly and to speak and vote on public questions, was conceived. Parliamentary Law was refined by the English during the last one thousand years and made a part of the United States Constitution in 1789.

### Did you know?

Henry Martyn Robert was the author of Robert's Rule of Order, which has become the most widely used manual of parliamentary procedure and remains today the most common parliamentary authority in the United States. Now in its 12th Edition, it is the Parliamentary Authority of lota Phi Lambda Sorority, Inc. General Roberts became a renown military engineer. He is buried at Arlington National Cemetery. Notably, his father, Reverend Joseph Thomas Robert was the first president of Morehouse College where there is a dormitory on the campus named after him.

After Holly and Rodney's eldest son, RJ, was diagnosed with autism, HollyRod's mission expanded to provide resources to families affected by an autism diagnosis. One in 68 children are diagnosed with autism every year.

50% of these children have extreme difficulty learning how to speak, while 25% of them never will. HollyRod launched the RJ's Place grant in 2014 to provide assistive technology to children's hospitals and autism centers. As these children grow, they require vocational training and specialized job placement assistance to transition to mainstream life and gainful employment.

Our RJ's Place grants now support toddlers to young adults in over two dozen locations the U.S. and Canada. The HollyRod foundation provides compassionate care to those living with autism and Parkinson's disease. We seek to fill an unmet need by providing compassionate care and services to underserved individuals and

families that are burdened financially and emotionally by a diagnosis.

We strive to help individuals live the best life possible.





# History made: Judge Ketanji Brown Jackson confirmed as first Black woman on Supreme Court

The Senate on Thursday, April 7, 2022, confirmed <u>Judge Ketanji Brown Jackson</u> to the 116th Associated Justice of the United States Supreme Court, <u>paving the way for her</u> to become the first Black woman to sit on the nation's highest court.

Just before the 53-47 bipartisan vote -- a rare occasion when senators announced their votes standing at their desks -- Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer called it "an even greater moment for America as we rise to a more perfect union." (According to Libby Cathey of abc NEWS)
