

Becoming Who God Jays I Am

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INTRODUCTION

The whole focus of this study is on identity – discovering God's perspective on who we really are (and are not) and learning to live authentically out of that identity. This study isn't about unhealthy, self-absorbed introspection. Rather it's about one critical piece of Jesus' greatest commandment to "love the Lord your God" and to "love your neighbor as yourself" (Mark 12:30-31). "As [you love] yourself." No matter how hard we try, we cannot grow in loving God or loving others unless we are also growing in loving ourselves. Of course the journey of knowing, accepting, and loving yourself as you truly are in Christ will take every day of your life for the rest of your life. But there are some important signs, experiences, and decision points along the way that you don't want to miss.

You've probably been on the "Who am I?" journey for quite a while. Your current sense of identity is most likely a mixture of some truths and some half-truths and a few lies, of dreams and disillusionments, of wonders and wounds. So how can you sort out who you really are, much less grow to really accept and love who you are? The Bible describes our identity as something imparted to us by our Creator — not something we patch together for ourselves. It combines our one-of-a-kind distinctiveness with characteristics of God's image embedded in all humans — because all humans are created in His image. There is a vital connection between God's true identity and our true identity as human persons. If we want to find out what's true and good about us, we begin by discovering what's true and good about us has to acknowledge what's also really bad about us, and all humanity. You'll find that embedded in every chapter, too. But ultimately we hope these studies will release you to love yourself and live out of who God says you are as you experience God's redemption — so that you can better experience loving God and others.

CHAPTER FLOW

Think of your time spent in each chapter as a mini journey – an exploratory trip into a significant topic on your way toward authentic spiritual transformation through Jesus.

Most chapters in each module have the following sections where you will "pause" your heart and mind along the way.

A JHORT JTORY

Each is based on real-life experiences.

PAUSE 1: EXPLORING WHAT GOD SAYS

This section encourages you to look at the Bible to see what God has said. We'll print out most of the verses for you, from a variety of Bible translations. But nothing beats reading your own Bible to make you comfortable in God's Word. You'll be reading the *New International Version* (NIV), unless we say otherwise. Sometimes we use The Message (MsG), The New *Living Translation* (NLT), *The Living Bible* (TLB), or the *Amplified Bible* (AMP). As you move from chapter to chapter, you will gradually try different approaches to studying, processing, and applying these passages.

PAUSE 2: EXPLORING YOUR REALITY

Our information-driven society makes it easy to walk away from profound truth without considering what it really says about us. This section helps you identify where you are in terms of the topic, and how you got there. You will also explore what it might take for you to become more like Jesus.

PAUSE 3: COMING ALIVE TO GOD AND OTHERS

Our "What's-in-it-for-me?" culture often promotes self-centeredness and shallowness in our relationships. This section will help you examine biblical principles for knowing and relating to God and others with authenticity, honesty, humility, and love.

PAUJE 4: JOURNEYING FORWARD

Being connected with Jesus as your default lifestyle means learning to trust Him with what's true about you — all the way, every day. This section invites you to process and write out what you are learning as you live in Him, as well as what you're doing about what you are learning. We strongly encourage you to memorize the key verse provided for each chapter as a way of building this vital spiritual discipline into your journey.

DIGGING DEEPER

Like the photo album you make after a trip, in this optional section you can pause to recap and process the highlights of your experience so far. We'll give you a few "extras" if you want to explore and experience the topic of the chapter more deeply.

IMAGEJ

In each chapter we've included pictures and artwork to help you reflect on the topics. They are there to stimulate your imagination and heart when words fall short. Take time to gaze

at the images and place yourself within these visual stories. If a photo disturbs you, that's okay; try to figure out why.

YOUR JOURNEY THROUGH EACH CHAPTER

For each chapter, expect to devote about an hour to personal preparation — more if you choose to do the optional "Digging Deeper" section. So pace yourself. You might try working a little at a time on a chapter — say, one section a day or twenty minutes a day or take a longer time of concentrated reflection. Find a rhythm that fits you best. Your group may want to consider discussing one chapter per session or dividing up the chapter and discussing it in two sessions.

GUIDELINES FOR SMALL GROUPS

- 1. Confidentiality: Do not repeat anything said or heard inside the group to anyone outside the group. Refraining from gossip builds trust.
- Safety: Respect each other's boundaries. Also accept each other's perceived realities without needing to comment or "fix" how someone feels or sees things at the moment. Nobody should feel forced to share anything that they prefer to keep private. Providing each other space and supportive care will promote safety.
- 3. "I" Statements: Be yourself; take off your masks. Share information only about yourself not "we, they, or us."
- 4. Interference: Avoid giving advice, talking while someone else is sharing, or subtly competing by saying, "I'm just like you" or by sharing a similar story. Instead, listen attentively, learn from each other's life experiences, and offer brief and affirming feedback.
- 5. Individuality: Accept and enjoy the diversity in your group, including being at very different places on your spiritual journeys. Allow everyone (but don't force anyone) to discover areas of need or brokenness. Avoid probing or intrusive questioning, as well as tampering with or elaborating on each other's personal sharing.
- 6. Emotional Sharing: Expect and allow each other to experience a full range of emotions, even if this makes you uncomfortable. This might include crying, raising their voice, or being silent. When this happens, avoid interrupting, communicating that another's feelings are unacceptable or "bad." And don't touch or hug without permission. Allow for times of quiet in your group because silence can be one of the most powerful healing environments.
- 7. Roadblocks and Obstacles: It is important to allow people to process their thoughts and feelings without needing to come to clear resolution. It is also normal to experience obstacles and setbacks. Remember that being stuck can be a catalyst for members to move forward. Trust the process!
- 8. Holy Spirit: Only God can perform the healing and growth needed in our hearts. The purpose of the group is to provide a place where the support, love, and acceptance of God can be modeled and felt and where the truth of God can be discovered and embraced.
- 9. Personal Responsibility: Recognize that true life change can occur only with God's help as we yield to His leading. The group can provide accountability through prayer and support.
- 10. Group Limits: Don't expect your group to provide therapy, counseling, or other indepth one-to-one support for members. Know when to refer each other to someone outside your group who is better equipped to help.

BENEFITS OF HEALTHY GROUP PROCESS

- 1. A safe place to share vulnerably and honestly.
- 2. New relationships.
- 3. An opportunity to be listened to in an accepting and grace-filled environment.
- 4. A forum for embracing truth, gaining perspective, and growing spiritually at your own pace.

CHAPTER 1 GOD'S ESSENCE: WHAT'S GOOD ABOUT HIM?



About the only time Jesse ever heard his mother mention God was before a meal: "God is great, God is good, and we thank Him for our food . . ." Actually, it was more of a chant than a prayer. So, if God was so good, why was He so conspicuously unmentioned and irrelevant the rest of the time?

For years, Jesse's infrequent reflections on God were mostly for the sake of argument or philosophical peace. But then his best friend in high school died in a tragic accident. Jesse began struggling with thoughts about God. For months stretching into years, he couldn't square the mealtime-blessing image of this "great and good God" with such senseless pain. Unable to resolve the question of whether God was good or not, he just blocked it from his mind. Not thinking about God at all was less painful than wrestling with the goodness of God in the face of his anger and loneliness.

Jesse was in his late twenties before he finally connected the numbness of his heart to that day he turned away from struggling with the goodness of God and just gave up. He was getting engaged and hoping to be a dad someday. That's what made him start wondering if, maybe, God really could be good after all. He wondered if God might even be good enough to restore his numb heart to life.

PAUJE 1_EXPLORING WHAT GOD JAYJ

Let's explore God's character and what it has to do with our identity.

GENESIS 1:26-27,31. God said, Let Us [Father, Son, and Holy Spirit] make mankind in Our image, after Our likeness, and let them have complete authority over the fish of the sea, the birds of the air, the [tame] beasts, and over all of the earth, and over everything that creeps upon the earth. So God created man in His own image, in the image and likeness of God He cre-



ated him; male and female He created them.... And God saw everything that He had made, and behold, it was very good (suitable, pleasant) and He approved it completely. (AMP)

God, the Creator of the entire universe, chose to make us human beings (and only us human beings) in His image. We reflect the very likeness of God. What do you think this means?

What do you think was "very good" (verse 31) about our original design?

The creation account in Genesis implies that if we want to find out what's true and good about us, we begin by discovering what's true and good about God. Why? Because God designed us to be like Him in some very important ways.


God the Creator is transcendent, mysterious, and inscrutable, beyond the range of any imagining or philosophical guesswork of which we are capable; and hence a summons to us to humble ourselves, to listen and learn of Him, and to let Him teach us what He is like and how we should think of Him.

Throughout this study we'll use the illustration of light passing through a prism to depict what is so dazzling about God. A prism is a piece of crystal that takes rays of invisible light, refracts them, and reveals a rainbow of different colors contained in that light. Similarly,

God is invisible to human beings. If God hadn't chosen to reveal Himself, we wouldn't have a clue what He's really like. He longs for us to know Him as He truly is. He revealed many things about Himself to us through the "prisms" of His created world, the Scriptures, His Son Jesus, our consciences, and history. These are just some of the ways God shows us His "true colors," so to speak.

PSALM 145:1-3 gives us a panoramic view of what's good about God. Study these verses from your Bible for words or phrases that describe God. Write those words or phrases on the prism illustration below.



NOTE: A prism doesn't "reveal" all of the rays contained in light, like ultraviolet or infrared rays. Similarly, there is much more about God revealed elsewhere in Scripture, through creation, and through the Person of Jesus – as well as things about God we'll never see on this earth (see Deuteronomy 29:29).

PAUSE 2_EXPLORING YOUR REALITY

We live in a very pluralistic world with too many options to count. Culture says you can have your choice of gods, too. Besides the God of the Bible, what other gods are out there that people believe in? How do they differ from God (Father, Son, and Holy Spirit)?



Sometimes people like God, but they also dislike Him. Ask several people you know if they like God, and why or why not. Summarize their responses here.

You can be sure that God knows if you find Him unlikable sometimes; He isn't surprised. Are there things about God that make you uncomfortable or confused or that you just don't like? Explain.

Do you think you'd feel any differently if you got to know Him better?

Where do you think your concept of God came from? List several possible influences.

What influence do you think your view of your earthly father (even if you never knew him) might have had on your view of your heavenly Father? Explain.

EXAMPLE: My dad worked all the time and hardly ever relaxed or played. So I viewed God as a no-nonsense God, always practical and taking care of basic needs and essentials. I didn't think He was interested in my wild, impractical dreams or would ever just splurge on me.

You are invited to step into the mystery of God. How does this invitation encourage you toward a life of adventure with Him?

PAUSE 3_COMING ALIVE TO GOD AND OTHERS

Behind the "Who am I?" question is the even bigger "Who is God?" question. In Pause 1 you took a panoramic view of God's character. Now you're going to zoom in on some of God's attributes. As you read:

- 1. <u>Mark up the key words and phrases about God</u> in these verses with underlining or highlighting.
- 2. In the margins, <u>summarize</u> what you have observed about who God is and what He's like.
- HEADS UP! This Pause is packed with Scripture verses

 some of the most awesome verses in the Bible,
 because they describe our God. Don't feel compelled to
 do all twelve attributes if your time is short. Do as many
 as it takes to understand that the one and only God has



revealed His character to us in these ways. Just enjoy getting to know Him more accurately and intimately.

Explain and Expand:

1. GOD IS ALL POWERFUL

God used His great power JEREMIAH 10:12-13. But God made the earth by his power; to create the whole universe he founded the world by his wisdom and stretched out and everything in it. the heavens by his understanding. When he thunders, the waters in the heavens roar; he makes clouds rise from the ends of the earth. He sends lightning with the rain and brings out the wind from his storehouses. Absolutely nothing is too JEREMIAH 32:17-19. Ah, Sovereign Lord, you have made hard for God to do. the heavens and the earth by your great power and outstretched arm. Nothing is too hard for you. . . . O great and powerful God, whose name is the LORD Almighty, great are your purposes and mighty are your deeds. Explain and Expand: 2. GOD IS ETERNAL AND IS PRESENT EVERYWHERE PSALM 90:1-2. Lord, through all the generations you have been our home! Before the mountains were born, before you gave birth to the earth and the world, from beginning to end, you are God. (NLT)

PSALM 139:7-10.
Where can I go from your Spirit? Where can I flee from your presence?
If I go up to the heavens, you are there; if I make my bed in the depths, you are there.
If I rise on the wings of the dawn, if I settle on the far side of the sea, even there your hand will guide me, your right hand will hold me fast.

REVELATION 1:8.

"I am the Alpha and the Omega — the beginning and the end," says the Lord God. "I am the one who is, who always was, and who is still to come, the Almighty One." (NLT)

The Scriptures teach that God is infinite. This means that His being knows no limits. Therefore there can be no limit to His presence; He is omnipresent. Because He is infinite, He surrounds the finite creation and contains it. There is no place beyond Him for anything to be. God is our environment as the sea is to the fish and the air to the bird. "God is over all things," wrote Hildebert of Lavardin, "under all things; outside all; within but not enclosed; without but not excluded; above but not raised up; below but not depressed; wholly above, presiding; wholly beneath, sustaining; wholly within, filling."

3. GOD IS TRIUNE (three Persons in One)

GENESIS 1:26. Then God said, "Let us make man in our image, in our likeness."

JOHN 14:16-17,31. And I [Jesus] will ask the Father, and he will give you another Counselor to be with you forever — the Spirit of truth. The world cannot accept him, because it neither sees him nor knows him. But you know him, for he lives with you and will be in you... The world must learn that I love the Father.

EXODUS 15:11. Who is like you among the gods, O LORD – glorious in holiness, awesome in splendor, performing great wonders? (NLT)


PSALM 29:2. Give unto the LORD the glory due to His name; worship the LORD in the beauty of holiness. (NKJV)

PSALM 72:19. Praise be to his glorious name forever; may the whole earth be filled with his glory. Amen and Amen.

CONSIDER THIS: Not only is God all of these things – ever-present, all-powerful, loving, beautiful, etc. – but He will always be these things and will never change. And this is only a small part of who God is. We simply can't fathom all His mysteries, or probe the limits of His nature. How does this constancy and depth of God affect you?

Explain and Expand:

God has revealed many other attributes about Himself that we didn't mention above. For instance, He is also Spirit, all-knowing, unchanging, purposeful, and incomprehensible. Are there any other attributes of God that are especially meaningful or perplexing to you? Add them to the following prism illustration.



To what extent do you think you ever really know a God like this?

Think about your view of God. Is He safe? Does your God need to be safe? What if He is wild?

METAPHOR: Looking at God's attributes is like gazing at a sparkling diamond or a manyfaceted gemstone. Create your own metaphor:

Looking at God is like . . .

What comes into our minds when we think about God is the most important thing about us. The most portentous fact about any man is not what he at a given time may do, but what he in his deep heart conceives God to be like. We tend by a secret law of the soul to move toward our mental image of God.... That our idea of God corresponds as nearly as possible to the true being of God is of immense importance to us.

If Tozer is right, and we tend to "move toward our mental image of God," where is your current view of God likely to take you?

The essence of idolatry is the entertainment of thoughts about God that are unworthy of Him. To be right we must think worthily of God. It is morally imperative that we purge from our minds all ignoble concepts of the Deity and let Him be the God in our minds that He is in His universe.

AUTHENTICITY PAUSE:

"God wishes to be seen, and he wishes to be sought, and he wishes to be expected, and he wishes to be trusted." — JULIAN OF NORWICH, QUOTED BY DALLAS WILLARD, THE DIVINE CONSPIRACY

Take some time in prayer to consider who God is and what He wishes. Focus this time on talking to God about who He really is and about your desire to experience Him deeply.

If there are things you don't like about God, this is a good time to talk with Him about that, too.

PAUSE 4_JOURNEYING FORWARD

It's your life . . . it's your journey. So that means it's up to you how you respond to the ideas in this chapter. Pause 4 in every chapter will be like this one – completely open-ended to invite you to zero in on whatever specifically touched you most. Or whatever disturbed you the most.

EPHESIANS 4:1. I... beg you to lead a life worthy of your calling, for you have been called by God. (NLT)



Whatever that is, grab on to it – don't gloss over it! During

this final Pause, revisit that verse and respond to one or more of the reflective questions.

At the end of every chapter we'll invite you to select one verse or passage that you read, studied, listened to, or memorized during the week that was meaningful to you. Begin by copying the verse and its reference below, so you'll be able to find it later.

We live in a world of images that deeply influence how we look at life. Choose a picture from this chapter that is meaningful or disturbing to you, and briefly explain why.

Then, you'll be invited to select one or more of these reflective questions and journal your response. The point is not to answer all of the questions, but to help focus your reflection on what God is saying to you. Most chapters have a final journal page to give you space to write. From this study is there some . . .

PROMISE from God for me to embrace?

ACTION to take?

THOUGHT about God or life to consider?

THANKFULNESS to offer?

EMOTION to express in an honest and godly way?

RELATIONSHIP to build up or reconcile?

NEED to meet?

SINFUL action or motive to confess and forsake?

JOURNAL

Think of the journal page as part of your spiritual fitness routine. Your spirit, heart, and mind have just finished some vigorous exercise. This is the cool-down phase. Not to be hurried. We suggest two things:

- 1. Journal on any of the preceding reflective questions.
- 2. Memorize and meditate on the Scripture memory verse below.

If at all possible, don't leave your study time without capturing in writing the most important things God revealed to you.



JUGGEJTED MEMORY VERJE:

GOD'S GOODNESS - PSALM 34:8

Taste and see that the LORD is good; blessed is the man who takes refuge in him.

Last, we'll suggest a key verse on the chapter's topic for you to memorize. If a different verse touched you more, feel free to substitute it. Taking 5–10 minutes right after completing the chapter study to memorize the verse may help anchor what you've learned in your heart and mind. After you have memorized the verse, check your accuracy. Try to write the verse from memory in the space below.

CHAPTER 2 CREATED IN GOD'S IMAGE: WHAT'S POSITIVE ABOUT ME?



Anastasia couldn't figure it out. The "Who am I?" question confronted her around every corner of life. And there were so many other voices trying to impose their answers on her. Who she really was kept getting drowned out by who others told her she was.

The voice of her mother rang loudest: "You're a failure. Nothing you do will ever be good enough." The voice of her friends said, "You're okay, but a little weird."

Her boyfriend's voice seemed to be muffled and confused by his own search for who he was.

And the voice of God? Well, she hadn't considered listening to what He had to say about who she is.

WHY DOES IDENTITY MATTER ANYWAY?

From birth, human beings are on a quest to discover who they are. First we look to our families to help us define our role, to test our talents and our limits, and to give us a sense of our value. Then we begin to absorb impressions from a wider world of peers, teachers, employers, hobbies, and faith to further discover ourselves.

Whatever our conclusion, how we answer the basic question, "Who am I?" will shape our relationships with others and our responses to life. For example, if I think of myself as a cosmic accident, I may discount my value; perhaps I will have no sense of belonging in a group of other "accidents" like myself and I'll just tune them out. Since my identity doesn't feel essential to the fabric of life, then talents and abilities may be unexplored and undeveloped. Opportunities may slip by; consequences may matter little, or they may terrify me.

On the other hand, what if I believe a Creator designed me with a unique personality?

What if I believe that He designed me with specific skills, abilities, and talents? That He called me for a purpose that's fulfilling and significant, that He adopted me into a family along with other equals? All of a sudden everyday life would be shot through with meaning and purpose. It would change everything.



PAUSE 1_EXPLORING WHAT GOD SAYS

To help us understand how we reflect God, we have to understand the word "image." The Hebrew word for "image" is "tselem," meaning shade or phantom. It suggests that we each bear a phantom reflection of our Creator. The word "likeness" ("demuwth" in Hebrew) tells us that the divine image we bear corresponds to the original pattern. — JONATHAN S. CAMPBELL WITH JENNIFER CAMPBELL, THE WAY OF JESUS

Meditate again on these verses that define our identity at creation.

GENESIS 1:26-27,31. Then God said, "Let us make human beings in our image, to be like us. They will reign over the fish in the sea, the birds in the sky, the livestock, all the wild animals on the earth, and the small animals that scurry along the ground." So God created human beings in his own image. In the image of God he created them; male and female he created them.... Then God looked over all he had made, and he saw that it was very good! (NLT)

What do you think it means to be made in God's own image or patterned after God Himself?



To understand who we are, we must know more about who God is. Here's why: If God created us, and He created us in His image, then who God is defines who we are in some important ways. Of course, there are also many ways that we are not like God since finite, imperfect beings can't possibly be infinite or perfect. We're not exact replicas: whereas God is limitless, we have limits in each area. On top of the limits of being finite, there is also the devastation that sin does to our souls and in the world. We'll explore that in chapters 3 and 4. But regardless of all our imperfections, every person has dignity because every person bears God's image.

Let's try unpacking what it means that all people – not just those we are comfortable with – are created in God's image. We'll revisit the same nine attributes of God that we studied in chapter 1. But this time, after reading and marking the following verses provided, try to answer two questions:

- How do we humans reflect God positively in our nature and design?
- How are we limited in this reflection?

HEADS UP: God is infinite, so there is nothing comprehensive about this list of His attributes. Feel free to select some of the following attributes — rather than trying to do them all.

1. GOD IS ALL POWERFUL . . . and because we're created in His image, we:

[Example] We have been given the capacity to pour our energy and creative powers into significant work and contributions.



HEBREWS 2:7-8. Then you [God] put them [man and woman] in charge of your entire handcrafted world. When God put them in charge of everything, nothing was excluded. But we don't see it yet, don't see everything under human jurisdiction. (MSG)

JAMES 4:13-15. Now listen, you who say, "Today or tomorrow we will go to this or that city, spend a year there, carry on business and make money." Why, you do not even know what will happen tomorrow. What is your life? You are a mist that appears for a little while and then vanishes. Instead, you ought to say, "If it is the Lord's will, we will live and do this or that."

We are made like God in our creative powers because we are to be like God in ruling the earth. The image implies a capacity, and the capacity assumes the creative legacy we shall carry on. Our original design was for a life of creative rule, to share in the overall care and development of God's creation.

 GOD IS ETERNAL AND IS PRESENT EVERYWHERE . . . and because we're created in His image, we: (Reminder: you are describing positive ways we reflect our Creator, within limits.)

1 CORINTHIANS 15:53-55. For our dying bodies must be transformed into bodies that will never die; our mortal bodies must be transformed into immortal bodies. Then, when our dying bodies have been transformed into bodies that will never die, this Scripture will be fulfilled: "Death is swallowed up in victory. O death, where is your victory? O death, where is your sting?" (NLT)

2 TIMOTHY 1:9-10. This grace was given us in Christ Jesus before the beginning of time, but it has now been revealed through the appearing of our Savior, Christ Jesus, who has destroyed death and has brought life and immortality to light through the gospel.

ECCLESIASTES 3:11. God has made everything beautiful for its own time. He has planted eternity in the human heart, but even so, people cannot see the whole scope of God's work from beginning to end. (NLT)

"He hath set eternity in their heart," said the Preacher, and I think he here sets forth both the glory and the misery of men. To be made for eternity and forced to dwell in time is for mankind a tragedy of huge proportions. All within us cries for life and permanence, and everything around us reminds us of mortality and change.... One mark [of the divine image of God in man] may be man's insatiable craving for immortality.... The ancient image of God whispers within every man of everlasting hope; somewhere he will continue to exist.

3. GOD IS TRIUNE (three Persons in One) . . . and because we're created in His image, we:

GENESIS 2:18. Then the Lord God said, "It is not good for the man to be alone." (NLT)

JOHN 17:21-23. I pray that they will all be one, just as you and I are one — as you are in me, Father, and I am in you. And may they be in us so that the world will believe you sent me. I have given them the glory you gave me, so they may be one as we are one. I am in them and you are in me. (NLT)

4. GOD IS THE INDEPENDENT CREATOR . . . and because we're created in His image, we:

Our creative nature is essential to who we are as human beings – as image bearers – and it brings us great joy to live it out with freedom and skill.

HABAKKUK 2:18. Of what value is an idol, since a man has carved it? Or an image that teaches lies? For he who makes it trusts in his own creation; he makes idols that cannot speak.

EPHESIANS 2:10. For we are God's workmanship, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do.

In forming our world, God spoke — and it was so. . . . He composed the symphony others merely echo and painted the portrait others reflect. He engineered the first architectural structures, called mountains and trees; programmed the first computer, called the brain; and invented the first miracle drug, called the immune system. They all started in His imagination, an imagination that has enabled our own. . . . We compose, paint, invent, write, and plan only because He did it first.

5. GOD IS MORALLY GOOD . . . and because we're created in His image, we:

ROMANS 2:14-15. When outsiders who have never heard of God's law follow it more or less by instinct, they confirm its truth by their obedience. They show that God's law is not something alien, imposed on us from without, but woven into the very fabric of our creation. There is something deep within them that echoes God's yes and no, right and wrong. (MSG)

1 PETER 1:16. For it is written: "Be holy, because I am holy."

6. GOD IS TRUE AND JUST . . . and because we're created in His image, we:



ISAIAH 59:11. We all growl like bears; we moan mournfully like doves. We look for justice, but find none; for deliverance, but it is far away.

ZECHARIAH 8:16. But this is what you must do: Tell the truth to each other. Render verdicts in your courts that are just and that lead to peace. (NLT)

7. GOD IS LOVE . . . and because we're created in His image, we:

1 JOHN 4:8,19. Whoever does not love does not know God, because God is love.... We love because he first loved us.

JOHN 15:12. My command is this: Love each other as I have loved you.

COLOSSIANS 3:14. And over all these virtues put on love, which binds them all together in perfect unity.

8. GOD IS JEALOUS . . . and because we're created in His image, we:

SONG OF SONGS 8:6-7. Place me like a seal over your heart, like a seal on your arm. For love is as strong as death, its jealousy as enduring as the grave. Love flashes like fire, the brightest kind of flame. Many waters cannot quench love, nor can rivers drown it. If a man tried to buy love with all his wealth, his offer would be utterly scorned. (NLT)

2 CORINTHIANS 11:2. I [Paul] am jealous for you with a godly jealousy. I promised you to one husband, to Christ, so that I might present you as a pure virgin to him.

HOSEA 3:1. The LORD said to me [Hosea], "Go, show your love to your wife again, though she is loved by another and is an adulteress. Love her as the LORD loves the Israelites, though they turn to other gods and love the sacred raisin cakes."

Hosea likens God's anger toward Israel to the anger of a husband who has just discovered that his wife has been selling herself to other men. Israel, God's bride, is a whore, and God reacts with intense jealousy. — DR. DAN B. ALLENDER & DR. TREMPER LONGMAN III, THE CRY OF THE SOUL

9. GOD IS GLORIOUS AND BEAUTIFUL . . . and because we're created in His image, we:

EZEKIEL 16:14. [Speaking of the nation of Israel] And your fame spread among the nations on account of your beauty, because the splendor I had given you made your beauty perfect, declares the Sovereign LORD.

PSALM 8:4-5. What is man that you are mindful of him, the son of man that you care for him? You made him a little lower than the heavenly beings and crowned him with glory and honor.

ZECHARIAH 9:16-17. The LORD their God will save them on that day as the flock of his people. They will sparkle in his land like jewels in a crown. How attractive and beautiful they will be!

How do we begin to describe this God whose image we bear? Artistic is the only word that comes close. Power, awesome, majestic – yet intricate, delicate, whimsical. Creative, without a doubt although God rested on the seventh day, he hasn't been lying around ever since. . . . For many people this is a new thought – that God is still quite active . . . the creative overture recorded in Genesis was only the first movement of a great symphony that has been swelling ever since.



ISAIAH 45:9-10. Woe to him who quarrels with his Maker, to him who is but a potsherd [a worthless piece of broken pottery] among the potsherds on the ground. Does the clay say to the potter, "What are you making?" Does your work say, "He has no hands"? Woe to him who says to his father, "What have you begotten?" or to his mother, "What have you brought to birth?"

1 CORINTHIANS 15:9-10. For I am the least of all the apostles. In fact, I'm not even worthy to be called an apostle after the way I persecuted God's church. But whatever I am now, it is all because God poured out his special favor on me — and not without results. (NLT)

PHILIPPIANS 1:6. Being confident of this, that he who began a good work in you will carry it on to completion until the day of Christ Jesus.

What do these passages say about dealing with our weaknesses?

ISAIAH 64:8. Yet, O LORD, you are our Father. We are the clay, you are the potter; we are all the work of your hand.

PRAYER PAUSE

This may be a great time to pause and pray. Silently go before the Father and reveal your heart to Him. Ask Him to meet with you. Name any of these influences (your dislikes, struggles, failures, etc.) that have come to define you more than they should. If you can, thank God for what they've taught you. Then tell Him that you know they don't define who you are. Talk with God about allowing Him — and only Him — to define you! Be careful not to pass by this conversation with Him.



PAUSE 3_coming alive to god and others

While man is at home with animals and the stars, he is also the cosmic neighbor of the Absolute. — GUSTAVE MARTELET, THE RISEN CHRIST AND THE EUCHARISTIC WORLD (QUOTED BY DALLAS WILLARD)

So we are back to the "WHO AM I?" question. Or maybe the real question should be "WHO

WAS I CREATED TO BE?" Looking at the DNA similarities, some would answer that we humans are just an evolutionary inch above chimpanzees. Looking to some religions, others would say that we are all gods-in-the-making.

What really matters is what God says, because you truly are whoever and whatever He says you are. From these passages, where has God placed us (humankind collectively) in the line of created things?



PSALM 8:3-8. When I consider your heavens, the work of your fingers, the moon and the stars, which you have set in place, what is man that you are mindful of him, the son of man that you care for him? You made him a little lower than the heavenly beings and crowned him with glory and honor. You made him ruler over the works of your hands; You put everything under his feet: all flocks and herds, and the beasts of the field, the birds of the air. and the fish of the sea. all that swim the paths of the seas.

GENESIS 1:28. God blessed them: "Prosper! Reproduce! Fill Earth! Take charge! Be responsible for fish in the sea and birds in the air, for every living thing that moves on the face of Earth." (MSG)

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Here is a truth that reaches into the deepest part of what it means to be a person... That we are made to "have dominion" within an appropriate domain of reality. This is the core of the likeness or image of God in us and is the basis of the destiny for which we were formed. We are, all of us, never-ceasing spiritual beings with a unique eternal calling to count for good in God's great universe... In creating human beings, God made them to rule, to reign, to have dominion in a limited sphere. Only so can they be persons.

CHAPTER 3 ADAM AND EVE'S FALL: WHAT WENT WRONG WITH THEM?



Adam's diary one week after the fall

Oh, my God, what have we done? It all happened so fast. One minute Father was gazing straight through our eyes into our very hearts and minds. And I like to think that He saw His own

glorious reflection peeking right back at Him. Back then we thought paradise would last forever.

But now, all of our innocence is history. If only that crafty serpent hadn't entered the scene with its deceptive questions. If only we hadn't wanted to be God. If only we could go back and do it right. But now our perfect relationship with Father is over. Look where it's gotten us: ashamed, wearing clothes, full of guilt and self-condemnation, blaming and fearing each other, running for cover. Oh, my God, what have we done?

And what's going to happen to us? There is no way on earth that Eve and I can reverse the damage we've done. The only hope is for the Father to have a solution, because if we're ever to enjoy Him again, He'll have to be the One to reintroduce us to trust.

Sin is the mark that Adam and Eve passed on to their descendants, including us. Sin isn't just breaking God's rules. It is breaking God's heart.

And sin has consequences. Broken trust, shame, guilt, and condemnation – this is the human price we've all paid for sin. And the only hope to remedy all this rests on the mercy of God.

PAUSE 1_EXPLORING WHAT GOD SAYS

From the tragic story of the Fall onward, the Bible unfolds God's secret plan to teach us how to be restored and trust Him again. In chapters 1 and 2, we looked at God's goodness — and the beautiful ways in which we were created to bear His image. The problem is, instead of clearly reflecting who God is, we can only offer back a distorted and darkened caricature — much like the images we'd find staring back in a house of mirrors at a carnival. This distortion and whatever drives us to choose this warped image are called sin.

Explain what "sin" means from your point of view.

Do you ever wonder how we got into such a mess – and where sin came from in the first place? Genesis 3–5 tells the whole story about where sin came from.

Read Genesis 3:1 through 4:8 from your Bible. As you read, search for clues on:

WHAT SIN IS	SIN'S CONSEQUENCES

Adam and Eve were warned about the fruit of the tree in the middle of the garden. It was their only restriction, a symbol of their freedom to accept or reject God's offer of intimacy. The tree was placed in the garden not to tempt but to testify. It stood as a daily reminder to Adam and Eve that they could enjoy God's loving protection or chart their own course. The choice was made clear. The consequences were explained. But the deception was sweet and the enticement great.

PAUSE 3_COMING ALIVE TO GOD AND OTHERS

Sin has consequences — right away, as well as later on, and whether we get caught or not. Let's explore several more consequences that sin throws in our faces. We've already touched on the loss of trust. There are many others, but we'll look at three more.

CONSEQUENCE 2: GUILT

GUILT=that inner echo saying, I have done wrong. A sense of violating a standard.

One of sin's first consequences is often feelings of guilt. Read and mark words that describe how David experienced the pain of his guilt.

PSALM 38:1-4.
O LORD, don't rebuke me in your anger or discipline me in your rage!
Your arrows have struck deep, and your blows are crushing me.
Because of your anger, my whole body is sick; my health is broken because of my sins.
My guilt overwhelms me it is a burden too heavy to bear. (NLT)

CONJEQUENCE 3: JHAME

SHAME=that inner echo saying, I am flawed. A sense of a deep unworthiness.

This consequence of sin — shame — attacks who we are in light of what we've done. It convinces us that there is something deeply wrong with us. "No one will ever want me in my condition!"

In your experience, what things make you feel flawed or unworthy? What specifically triggers this powerful emotion?



This verse may help us see shame and guilt together. Try paraphrasing this verse in your own words:

ROMANS 3:23. For all have sinned [guilt] and fall short of the glory of God [shame].

If you bury your guilt and shame alive . . .

- They become a bomb waiting to explode!
 They spawn a belief
- that you're hopelessly flawed.

The reality of shame is driven by the fear of being exposed for who I really am in all my imperfection, instead of people and God seeing the person I want them to think I am. Our instinct is to hide at all costs rather than being seen.

Read GENESIS 2:25 through 3:10. Before they sinned, Adam and Eve were "naked and unashamed." But after they sinned, they hid from God and tried to cover themselves. Why do you think Adam and Eve hid from God?

Adam and Eve covered themselves with leaves. God covered them with garments of skins. We cover ourselves with clothes every day. Why?

Are you ever conscious of hiding from yourself?

Imagine what would have happened to Adam and Eve if they were not given the capacity to feel guilt and shame. Would they – or the rest of the human race – be better off without these emotions?

Consider a different angle on shame.

PSALM 83:16-18.
Utterly disgrace them [God's wicked enemies] until they submit to your name, O LORD.
Let them be ashamed and terrified forever. Let them die in disgrace.
Then they will learn that you alone are called the LORD, that you alone are the Most High, supreme over all the earth. (NLT)

Here we see God's willingness to use a consequence of sin to ultimately bring our hearts full circle back to Him. From this passage, how can shame contribute to your spiritual growth?

CONJEQUENCE 4: CONDEMNATION

OTHERS	SATAN	C
GOD	SELF	,

Condemnation seems to come at us from all sides. God has a right to condemn us because we deserve it. Fortunately, His mercy moved Him to provide Christ to free us from His condemnation. But other voices whisper that we don't deserve His mercy. Just step out of line an inch, and sometimes we will condemn ourselves; sometimes others condemn us. And you can be sure that Satan will always live up to his name: the Accuser!

CONDEMNATION FROM GOD

Since sin is a capital crime in the eyes of our holy God, it always deserves the capital punishment: death. God is morally perfect and He has rights as the Sovereign Creator. So He always judges people from His holy nature.

CONDEMNATION FROM OTHERS

God isn't the only one doing some judging in this world. Every one of us has heard other voices of condemnation whispering accusations in our ear.

Think of a specific time when someone judged or condemned you. How did you feel?



What may have been true - and false - about this judgment?

Is this condemnation still affecting you? Explain.

Humanity was made in God's image, so we are able to make judgments. Judging can be our legitimate way to bring fairness (as in court cases) or to make sound decisions (as in judging a candidate's suitability for office).

Unfortunately our sinful nature has so badly marred God's image in us that we tend to view what's fair from our imperfect, temporary, often self-serving point of view. Before we know it, we've crossed the line from healthy discernment into illegitimate judging (scorning the divorced, despising the obese, shaming the unemployed or homeless, condemning the adulterer, etc.). We find ourselves trying to take over God's role and doing the judging for Him. And then we've become judgmental.

To keep us from becoming judgmental of others, what guidelines do you see about judging from this verse?

GUIDELINES:

ROMANS 2:1. You, therefore, have no excuse, you who pass judgment on someone else, for at whatever point you judge the other, you are condemning yourself, because you who pass judgment do the same things.

CONDEMNATION FROM JELF AND JATAN

God designed our conscience to act as an inner voice, something to speak up before we mess up. But once we have been forgiven by the Divine, we need to silence the accusing voices within us and listen to the words of grace. Satan, too, nags at our thoughts to make us believe his lies.

What advice do you find in the following verses to help you deal with condemnation from yourself or from Satan?



REVELATION 12:10-11. Then I heard a loud voice in heaven say: "Now have come the salvation and the power and the kingdom of our God, and the authority of his Christ. For the accuser of our brothers [Satan], who accuses them before our God day and night, has been hurled down. They overcame him by the blood of the Lamb and by the word of their testimony; they did not love their lives so much as to shrink from death."

1 JOHN 3:18-19. My dear children, let's not just talk about love; let's practice real love. This is the only way we'll know we're living truly, living in God's reality. It's also the way to shut down debilitating self-criticism, even when there is something to it. For God is greater than our worried hearts and knows more about us than we do ourselves. (MSG)

CHAPTER 4 ADAM AND EVE'S MARH: WHAT'S WRONG WITH ME?



"What's wrong with me?" Keiko has asked herself that question maybe a thousand times. When she looks around, she also wonders, "What's wrong with that person?"

It's obvious that something is seriously wrong with human nature. But identifying what's wrong is more difficult. Frankly, Keiko's main concern is with herself. She's so confused about how she can be so compassionate one moment and then makes such critical remarks the next moment. More and more lately she realizes that she sounds like her mom! Where does all this inner garbage come from? Is all this hereditary?

Freedom to live out God's design involves an honest look at how broken we truly are. Only in dealing honestly with the shame, sin, and wounding that shroud God's image in us can we begin to emerge out of our brokenness. — PARAPHRASED FROM ANDREW COMISKEY, STRENGTH IN WEAKNESS

PAUSE 1_EXPLORING WHAT GOD SAYS



JUMMARY

Let's try to summarize visually what we've discovered from Scripture. On the right we have listed just a few of God's attributes revealed to us through the "prisms" of Scripture and creation. God created humankind to reflect those attributes. But from the Fall of Adam and Eve onward, sin has marred God's image in us, like looking into a cracked and broken mirror. We look at life through the "prism" of our inherited sinful nature, so it's no wonder we feel disillusioned, disoriented, and discontent so much of the time.

PAUSE 2_EXPLORING YOUR REALITY

We seldom see sin as a brokenness that's bone-deep and creation-wide. Sin ruptures our relationships with God, with one another, with the creation. It ruptures our own deepest self. So sin needs more than a private remedy, a personal therapy. Overcoming sin requires more than avoidance. The ethic of avoidance proves altogether too frail an ambition. God desires restoration and reconciliation – of relationships, of creation, of our own true selves. That's the wider and deeper meaning of the Cross.

PAUSE 3_COMING ALIVE TO GOD AND OTHERS

Bad shame invites the soul to turn on itself rather than to welcome mercy. . . . Good shame alerts us to our separation from God and others, potentially causing us to cry out to God for mercy. And when we do so, God replaces our fig leaves with robes of righteousness – garments that lend form and order to our relationships.

So far, we've looked at the bad news. NOW HERE'S THE GOOD NEWS: the hope for our rescue is found in God's mercy. Read these two stories to find out how four different people experienced (or didn't experience) God's mercy covering their guilt and shame. In each story ask yourself who did (and didn't) struggle with shame? Who did (and didn't) experience mercy?

LUKE 7:36-48. [Jesus] went to the Pharisee's house and sat down at the dinner table. Just then a woman of the village, the town harlot, having learned that Jesus was a guest in the home of the Pharisee, came with a bottle of very expensive perfume and stood at his feet, weeping, raining tears on his feet....

⁴⁰ Jesus said to [the Pharisee], "Simon, I have something to tell you."

"Oh? Tell me."

⁴¹⁻⁴² "Two men were in debt to a banker. One owed five hundred silver pieces, the other fifty. Neither of them could pay up, and so the banker canceled both debts. Which of the two would be more grateful?"

Simon answered, "I suppose the one who was forgiven the most."

⁴³⁻⁴⁷ "That's right," said Jesus. Then turning to the woman, but speaking to Simon, he said, "Do you see this woman? I came to your home; you provided no water for my feet, but she rained tears on my feet and dried them with her hair. You gave me no greeting, but from the time I arrived she hasn't quit kissing my feet.... Impressive, isn't it? She was forgiven many, many sins, and so she is very, very grateful. If the forgiveness is minimal, the gratitude is minimal."

⁴⁸ Then he spoke to her: "I forgive your sins." (MSG)

LUKE 18:9-14. [Jesus] told his next story to some who were complacently pleased with themselves over their moral performance and looked down their noses at the common people. "Two men went up to the Temple to pray, one a Pharisee, the other a tax man. The Pharisee posed and prayed like this: 'Oh, God, I thank you that I am not like other people — robbers, crooks, adulterers, or heaven forbid, like this tax man. I fast twice a week and tithe on all my income.'

¹³ "Meanwhile the tax man, slumped in the shadows, his face in his hands, not daring to look up, said, 'God, give mercy. Forgive me, a sinner.'"

¹⁴ Jesus commented, "This tax man, not the other, went home made right with God. If you walk around with your nose in the air, you're going to end up flat on your face, but if you're content to be simply yourself, you will become more than yourself." (MSG)

WHAT IS MERCY?

It is that part of God's character that holds back His hand of condemnation because He jealously loves us.

Imagine that you are either the adoring woman or the tax collector.

The steadfast love of the LORD never ceases, his mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning; great is thy faithfulness.

CHAPTER 5 TRANSFORMING INTO JESUS' IMAGE: WHAT'S NEW ABOUT ME?



Elena's life before Christ was a mess. Childhood sexual abuse had left tremendous scars. In many ways the abuse had defined who she imagined she was: an object deserving abuse, a beauty to be defiled, a soul ready to be tormented, a child not to be protected.

To Elena, God's amazing promise to make her completely new in Christ was overwhelming. Tenderly, Jesus began to expose and strip away the "old things" like old clothes that didn't fit her anymore:

- consequences of abuse at the hands of others
- soul baggage accumulated by her own choices and actions
- a crushing weight of guilt, shame, anger, and fear

He was holding out "new things." New God-given robes of righteousness through Jesus began to cover her! She sensed new meaning for all she'd suffered, refreshing peace, assurance and love, and a new sense of stable joy.

But in truth, Elena was still skeptical. The promise of becoming new in Christ seemed too good to be true, at least for someone like her. If all her feelings of worthlessness didn't go away, would that mean she really wasn't new in Christ? Then who would define her? Her abusers? Herself? Or Jesus? She wondered just how long it would take for the old things to pass away.

PAUSE 1_EXPLORING WHAT GOD SAYS

The contrast between God's way of doing things and our way is never more acute than in this area of human change and transformation. We focus on specific actions; God focuses on us. We work from the outside in; God works from the inside out. We try; God transforms.

- RICHARD FOSTER, DEVOTIONAL CLASSICS

We spent the last two chapters looking at the mess that the first Adam got us all into. At long last, we've arrived at Jesus' Good News! Jesus – the "second Adam" – is the way home,

back to experiencing life with our Father as He intended it to be. Jesus redeems us from sin, reconciles us to God, and is now restoring the image of God that we all bear.

For Adam's sin led to condemnation, but God's

	free gift leads to our being made right with God, even though we are guilty of many sins ¹⁸ Yes, Adam's one sin brings condemnation for everyone, but Christ's one act of righteous- ness brings a right relationship with God and new life for everyone. Because one person disobeyed God, many became sinners. But because one other person obeyed God, many will be made righteous. ²⁰ God's law was given so that all people could see how sinful they were. But as people sinned more and more, God's wonderful grace became more abundant. So just as sin ruled over all people and brought them to death, now God's wonderful grace rules instead, giving us right standing with God and resulting in eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord.	

Reconciliation is a passion for God. This passion is embodied in his son, Jesus, who is called the last Adam – the Life-giver. Just as God breathed into the womb of the earth to bring life to the first Adam, Jesus was conceived by God in the womb of a young Jewish girl. Whereas the first Adam left the Garden of Genesis in separation from God, the Garden of Gethsemane was where Jesus embraced his redemptive work that made our restoration possible. Whereas spiritual death was introduced through the first Adam, the second Adam brings spiritual life.

The following is a fantastic before-and-after description of us from Ephesians 2. Paul is writing to outsiders who became insiders through Christ.

BACKGROUND:

In Jesus' day, the devout Jews were the religious "insiders" and the rest of the people (called Gentiles) were considered "outsiders" to the knowledge of the true God. And, as you might expect, there was lots of friction between the two groups. Sound familiar?

Now because of Christ—dying that death, shedding that blood—you who were once out of it altogether are in on everything. ¹⁴⁻¹⁵ The Messiah has made things up between us so that we're now together on this, both non-Jewish outsiders and Jewish insiders. He tore down the wall we used to keep each other at a distance. He repealed the law code that had become so clogged with fine print and footnotes that it hindered more than it helped. Then he started over. Instead of continuing with two groups of people separated by centuries of animosity and suspicion, he created a new kind of human being, a fresh start for everybody. 	death on the cross. The Cross got us to embrace, and that was the end of the hostility. Christ came and preached peace to you outsiders and peace to us insiders. He treated us as equals, and so made us equals. Through him we both share the same Spirit and have equal access to the Father. ¹⁹⁻²² That's plain enough, isn't it? You're no longer wandering exiles. This kingdom of faith is now your home country. You're no longer strangers or outsiders. You <i>belong</i> here, with as much right to the name Believer as anyone. God is building a home. He's using us all—irrespective of how we got here—in what he is building. He used the apostles and prophets for the foundation. Now he's using you, fitting you in brick by brick, stone by stone, with Christ Jesus as the cornerstone that holds all the parts together. We see it taking shape day after day—a holy temple built by God, all of us built into it, a temple in which God is quite at home. (MSG)

PAUSE 2_EXPLORING YOUR REALITY

On the cross God in Christ endured the ultimate humiliation. For our weaknesses and shame, God allowed himself to become weak and full of shame. God was strung up naked before a mocking, jeering public. He subjected himself to the worst kind of exposure in order to make a way for us, his creation, who have been subject to the exposure of sin and shame ourselves. The Scripture tells us that Christ, "for the joy set before him endured the cross, scorning its shame... Consider him who endured such opposition from sinful men, so that you will not grow weary and lose heart" (Heb. 12:2-3).

PRAYER PAUSE

He might speak to you. If there are things you need to confess and turn from, do that now.

PAUSE 3_coming alive to god and others

DIGGING DEEPER

Let's recap where we've come so far in understanding who God says we are and how it connects with your current reality. <u>Truth: What God created beautiful (that's you!) and sin</u> <u>marred (that's also you!)</u>, Jesus is in the process of transforming (you again!). Of course we can't capture the wonder and complexity of human life in a chart. But like a prism we can try to separate out a few of the most beautiful "colors" of our new identity in Christ. From the list earlier in Pause 3:

- Left side: Write a few words or phrases that describe your sense of fallen humanity.
- **Right side:** Write a few words or phrases that describe your sense of redeemed humanity.
- From everything you have discovered so far in this chapter, circle the ONE aspect of your new identity in Christ from the right side of the diagram where you would most like to experience progress. Talk with God about what that would look like for you and what it would take.



Redemption is restoring the work of God's original creation. This grace is not regarded as planting something new in essentially bad soil, but rather releasing the goodness that is in us, albeit in bondage to evil. Literally, redemption means purchasing back something that was lost, through the payment of a ransom. This is not some rational formula, nor merely a ticket to heaven; nor is it some impersonal union with the universe. We actually become a new creation in Christ. By his redemption, God sets us free from our bondage to sin and spiritual death, to be who we were originally designed to be.

CHAPTER 6 MY NEW IDENTITY: WHO DOES GOD SAY I AM?



Sam knew who he was — he was an engineer, he was athletic, he was Sarah's fiancé, he was a follower of Jesus. Sam had never deeply considered the power of his identity until recently when someone had suggested that people tend to act out of who they perceive they are.

That raised a lot of questions and concerns for Sam. Like who would he be if he couldn't get a job in engineering? Or if an injury knocked him out of sports? Or if Sarah changed her mind?

Who am I? Who decides who I am? Who does God say that I am?

These weren't easy questions. But Sam knew that if he didn't face them, he'd probably just default to letting his friends and his culture define him.

A couple of years ago Sam met Jesus in a personal way. Jesus' call on his life offered him new ways to view himself – new relational identities. Jesus had called him to become a child of God, a disciple, a friend, and a servant. Somehow all this fit into the puzzle of his identity – Sam just wasn't sure how. But he felt a stronger desire to discover himself within his relationship with Jesus.

Furthermore, he still struggled with sin. He wondered how he could be a friend of Jesus if his life contradicted this.

PAUSE 1_EXPLORING WHAT GOD SAYS

The moral qualities which belong to the divine image were lost at the Fall; God's image in man has been universally defaced, for all mankind has in one way or another lapsed into ungodliness. But the Bible tells us that now, in fulfillment of His plan of redemption, God is at work in Christians to repair His ruined image by communicating these qualities to them afresh. This is what Scripture means when it says that Christians are being renewed in the image of Christ (2 Corinthians 3:18) and of God (Colossians 3:10).



PAUSE 3_COMING ALIVE TO GOD AND OTHERS

It's helpful to explore the questions "Who am I?" and "Who do others say I am?" Getting an outside opinion on our identity may help correct some of the distortion caused by our own sin and shame and limited perspective. Of course, others' answers would depend on their relationship to you. To your dad, your identity is "son" or "daughter." To your coach, your identity is "athlete." You get the picture.

But is that really your core identity? No way. By far the most critical question to ask is "Who does God say I am?" That's what we hope you'll take away from this chapter.

The Bible is full of metaphors that try to capture our identity in relation to God – such as being His child, servant, disciple, sheep, etc. No one or two of them is adequate to express everything about who we are to God. According to the Bible, if we are "in Christ," we have ALL of these identities. From God's perspective, you already are all of these things. But we don't experience them all equally or at the same time.



For example, let's explore one of our identities from creation – we are like <u>clay in the hands</u> of a potter.

• How do a potter and clay relate to one another?





PAUJE 1_EXPLORING WHAT GOD JAYJ

When we become God's children, rather than losing all sense of who we are, the fog begins to lift. We are more ourselves than ever. God is not interested in cranking out a bland band of followers with some cosmic cookie cutter. He who creates each single snowflake different from every other snowflake takes particular care with those created in His very image. His plan draws from the uniqueness of each person in ways that can build a supernatural unity among His incredibly diverse people.

People are mysterious, and no two of us are identical. God enjoys diversity! That's why He designed each person with different natural abilities.





What would others who know you probably add to your list? (Don't worry. You're not bragging to list these. You are glorifying the God who gave them to you.)

But God does more than just give you your natural abilities. Now that His Spirit is living in you, get ready to start discovering unique ways He expresses Himself through you. This enables you to do more than you ever could naturally. The Bible refers to these expressions as spiritual gifts. Spiritual gifts are special abilities God distributes among us for the purpose of building up His people and furthering His redemptive plan.

What do you think is the difference between a natural ability and a spiritual gift?

A <u>natural ability</u> is whatever you do well naturally (or with some training and development). A <u>spiritual gift</u> reflects what God does through you supernaturally. When He chooses to use you beyond yourself, giving you grace to bless others in His body, He is probably working through your spiritual gift.

We'll take a look at our unique design through the lens of spiritual gifts to discover how they can bless us and others for God's glory. One thing really awesome about spiritual gifts is how they enable us to experience God. But they are not primarily for our own benefit. Read through the following verses and consider why God gives spiritual gifts to His children.

ROMANS 12:4-5. Just as our bodies have many parts and each part has a special function, so it is with Christ's body. We are many parts of one body, and we all belong to each other. (NLT)

1 CORINTHIANS 12:7,24-26. A spiritual gift is given to each of us so we can help each other. . . . God has put the body together such that extra honor and care are given to those parts that have less dignity. This makes for harmony among the members, so that all the members care for each other. If one part suffers, all the parts suffer with it, and if one part is honored, all the parts are glad. (NLT)

EPHESIANS 4:12-16. Their responsibility is to equip God's people to do his work and build up the church, the body of Christ. This will continue until we all come to such unity in our faith and knowledge of God's Son that we will be mature in the Lord, measuring up to the full and complete standard of Christ. Then we will no longer be immature like children. We won't be tossed and blown about by every wind of new teaching. . . . Instead, we will speak the truth in love, growing in every way more and more like Christ, who is the head of his body, the church. He makes the whole body fit together perfectly. As each part does its own special work, it helps the other parts grow, so that the whole body is healthy and growing and full of love. (NLT)

1 PETER 4:10-11. God has given each of you a gift from his great variety of spiritual gifts. Use them well to serve one another. . . . Then everything you do will bring glory to God through Jesus Christ. All glory and power to him forever and ever! Amen. (NLT)

WHY GOD GIVES US SPIRITUAL GIFTS:

Try to summarize what you learned about the purposes and desired results of spiritual gifts.



Two Greek words are translated as "spiritual gifts" in the New Testament. One of them is <u>pneumatikos</u>, which literally means "spirituals." The other word is <u>charisma</u>, which means "a bestowment of grace." Paul uses both to describe what the Holy Spirit brings to every person whose heart He enters.

1 CORINTHIANS 12:1,4. Now about spiritual gifts [pneumatikos], brothers, I do not want you to be ignorant.... There are different kinds of gifts [charisma], but the same Spirit.

What do you think is "spiritual" (pneumatikos) about spiritual gifts? Try to brainstorm several responses.

GRACE: God's favor, mercy, and blessings given to us just because He wants to — not because we deserve them in any way.

What does grace have to do with spiritual gifts? Write your observations in the margin.

ROMANS 12:3,6. For by the <u>grace</u> given me I say to every one of you: Do not think of yourself more highly than you ought [about your spiritual gifts].... We have different gifts, according to the grace given us.

1 PETER 4:10. Each one should use whatever gift he has received to serve others, faithfully administering God's grace in its various forms. INSIGHT: Spiritual gifts are not God bestowing to His people something external to Himself. They are not some tangible "stuff" or substance separate from God. Spiritual gifts are nothing less than God Himself in us, energizing our souls, imparting revelation to our minds, infusing power in our wills, and working His sovereign and gracious purposes through us.

Of course, the Holy Spirit brings lots of other things into our lives besides spiritual gifts.

GALATIANS 5:22-23,25. But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. Against such things there is no law.... Since we live by the Spirit, let us keep in step with the Spirit.

PAUSE 2_EXPLORING YOUR REALITY

A TRUE STORY: Eric Liddell was a Scottish sprinter who qualified to compete in the 1924 Olympics. But to train, he had to stop his studies in theology. His sister Jennie felt he shouldn't let anything delay his preparation for the mission field. He was really torn over what he should do. What finally convinced him to compete was his conviction:

"I believe God made me for a purpose, but He also made me fast. And when I run, I feel His pleasure. To give it up would be to hold Him in contempt; to win is to honor Him."

He not only won the gold medal, but he set a world record in the 400-meter race that stood for more than a decade. After the Olympics, he finished his theological studies, became a missionary in China, and eventually died in a Japanese prison camp just weeks before American troops liberated the camp in 1945. (To learn more about Eric Liddell, view the movie *Chariots of Fire*.)



From whatever you know about him, what were probably some of Eric Liddell's passions, abilities, burdens, and spiritual gifts? How did they merge to bring glory to God?

When you consider the way God made you, including your abilities and passions, what are you doing when you genuinely feel His pleasure? (Warning: Not everything that pleases you also pleases God.)

How might pursuing that activity or developing that ability bring honor to God?

There is a desire within each of us, in the deep center of ourselves that we call our heart. We were born with it, it is never completely satisfied, and it never dies. We are often unaware of it, but it is always awake. . . . Our true identity, our reason for being, is to be found in this desire.

Is there some desire, passion, or dream in your heart, flowing from your true identity, that gives you a reason for being? If so, describe it.

REALITY CHECH:

Spiritual transformation is a dynamic process along a lifetime journey. So is the exercising of your spiritual gift(s). Don't expect to nail down your gift(s) and develop it and exercise it – all by



the time you're twenty-one. In early adulthood it's appropriate to do these three simple things:

- 1. Pay attention to what motivates you in serving God. What desires are bubbling inside? Notice what you're doing when you "feel God's pleasure."
- 2. Get lots of different experiences. Experiment. Try. Take a risk. Do things outside your comfort zone.

3. Then, listen for the affirmation of others, because you are probably not the best person to identify your own potential or emerging spiritual gifts. When you want more clarity, ask a friend or spiritual mentor how they have seen God consistently blessing others through you.

When the three come together frequently over time (i.e., what really motivates you also really blesses others), you're probably getting close to identifying your spiritual gift.

CHAPTER 8 SPIRITUAL GIFTS: HOW AM I DESIGNED?



To Sarah the idea of spiritual gifts really seemed more like spiritual responsibilities. And that wasn't her idea of a gift. The responsibility of teaching, of serving, or giving made sense to her. But to call these gifts seemed weird.

Over the years, since beginning to serve within her gifting, Sarah had come to embrace the paradox that to serve others is a blessing to the giver as much as to the receiver.

However, she struggled with her gifts. They seemed to be the lesser gifts. Why had God not blessed her with the greater gifts that people praise? No one seemed to publicly praise her gifts of mercy and serving. She liked gifts, but she also liked praise. Couldn't she have both?

PAUJE 1_COMING ALIVE TO GOD AND OTHERS

We are diverse because we have different gifts. Yet we are in unity because we are all part of Christ's body. Unity in diversity is at the core of understanding God's purposes for us. Study and mark these passages for principles about spiritual gifts.



Now that you have identified about eighteen to twenty different spiritual gifts mentioned in the Bible, don't you wonder how the Holy Spirit coordinates all of them so they work together in ministry? For fun, study the following chart to see how the gifts you listed above might be grouped into four primary contributions – depending on whether they focus on <u>expanding</u>, equipping, serving, or guiding others. (Some gifts might fit in more than one group.) There are other ways to "group" the spiritual gifts.

A MODEL OF HOW GIFTS WORH IN MINISTRY



Remember how God created us in His image – and it was "very good" – at least until we messed it up by our sinful choices? Well, the same can be true of the spiritual gifts that God gives us. If there is a way to sideline, misuse, abuse, show off, profit from, or fake a spiritual gift, you can be sure someone has done it. Consider (and mark) how that might happen from this passage.

HISTORICAL BACKGROUND:

The people of Corinth had a reputation for being unruly, hard-drinking, and sexually promiscuous before they heard the gospel. As you can imagine, they didn't automatically become godly afterward; their reputations came with them into their new life in Christ. They were also very gifted people! But instead of glorifying God and promoting maturity and unity with their giftedness, it was causing all sorts of havoc and destroying their relationships. They were splintering into cliques, compromising morally, and competing over their spiritual gifts.

1 CORINTHIANS 12:14-27. Now the body is not made up of one part but of many. If the foot should say, "Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body," it would not for that reason cease to be part of the body. And if the ear should say, "Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body," it would not for that reason cease to be part of the body. If the whole body were an eye, where would the sense of hearing be? If the whole body were an ear, where would the sense of smell be? But in fact God has arranged the parts in the body, every one of them, just as he wanted them to be. If they were all one part, where would the body be? As it is, there are many parts, but one body.

²¹ The eye cannot say to the hand, "I don't need you!" And the head cannot say to the feet, "I don't need you!" On the contrary, those parts of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable, and the parts that we think are less honorable we treat with special honor. And the parts that are unpresentable are treated with special modesty, while our presentable parts need no special treatment. But God has combined the members of the body and has given greater honor to the parts that lacked it, so that there should be no division in the body, but that its parts should have equal concern for each other. If one part suffers, every part suffers with it; if one part is honored, every part rejoices with it. Now you are the body of Christ, and each one of you is a part of it.



2 PETER 2:1. But there were also false prophets among the people, just as there will be false teachers among you. They will secretly introduce destructive heresies, even denying the sovereign Lord who bought them — bringing swift destruction on themselves.

PAUSE 2_EXPLORING YOUR REALITY

When God invites us to partner with Him, He usually uses us *as we are* and *wherever we are*. He also tends to use *all that we are*. Understanding which spiritual gift you have been given may help you know what opportunities to look for. But other parts of our design may influence *where, when, how,* and *with whom* we prefer to contribute our spiritual gifts.¹

PAUSE 3_COMING ALIVE TO GOD AND OTHERS

IF YOU ARE UNDER TWENTY-FIVE:

For most of us, our twenties and early thirties are not years of narrow specialization. That's the time to explore many areas of life — interests, hobbies, jobs, and relationships. Frankly, it's pretty unusual to see a twenty-year-old clearly identifying and using his/her spiritual gifts. You are more likely to see several potential spiritual gifts emerging. So if you're under twenty-five or have known Jesus for less than five years, feel free to skip the next three pages. Or look at them to see what may be part of your journey down the road.

IF YOU ARE OVER TWENTY-FIVE:

On the other hand, if you are about twenty-five and have been walking with God for a while, give this exercise a try. Has God used you to meet physical needs? You may have the gift of serving. Has God used you to encourage people who are troubled in heart? You may have the gift of mercy or compassion. See where we're heading? To explore your potential emerging spiritual gifts, think of times when you were an active part of a community of believers. (Consider church, camps, small groups, campus organizations, individual relationships, etc.) Try to recall several specific incidents when something you did blessed others in God's family. Then try to figure out how God may have been using you in that incident and what spiritual gift it may have been reflecting. Here are some examples:

One danger of talking about spiritual gifts is that our egos can get involved. It could lead to pride ("Hey, look how great my gifts are!") or to discouragement ("Hey, I'm lousy at all of these things!"). That's why Paul warns us to keep things in perspective.

ROMANS 12:3-6. For by the grace given me I say to every one of you: Do not think of yourself more highly than you ought, but rather think of yourself with sober judgment, in accordance with the measure of faith God has given you. Just as each of us has one body with many members, and these members do not all have the same function, so in Christ... we have different gifts, according to the grace given us.

GALATIANS 6:4-5. Each one should test his own actions. Then he can take pride in himself, without comparing himself to somebody else, for each one should carry his own load.



When you think about your own spiritual gift, which way on the see-saw do you tend to lean, and how should you respond? THINK ABOUT IT... It's easy to get envious of other people's gifts. But there is no need for this. After all, God gave those gifts to them to benefit YOU! Since each member belongs to the others, what's theirs is also yours.

Consider this indispensable principle about spiritual gifts.

1 CORINTHIANS 12:31–13:3. And yet some of you keep competing for so-called "important" parts.

But now I want to lay out a far better way for you.

^{13:1} If I speak with human eloquence and angelic ecstasy but don't love, I'm nothing but the creaking of a rusty gate.

² If I speak God's Word with power, revealing all his mysteries and making everything plain as day, and if I have faith that says to a mountain, "Jump," and it jumps, but I don't love, I'm nothing.

³ If I give everything I own to the poor and even go to the stake to be burned as a martyr, but I don't love, I've gotten nowhere. So, no matter what I say, what I believe, and what I do, I'm bankrupt without love. (MSG)

CHAPTER 9 MEANING IN LIFE: CAN I FIND JOME?



Juan started talking to himself when the alarm went off. Why was it so hard getting motivated to get out of bed?

With a degree in information technology, he had many opportunities before him. Financially he was on the right path. Things were going well with his girlfriend. And his supervisor had suggested that in a year or two he would have influence in shaping the research agenda of the company. So why did it always feel like something was missing? Some crucial driving force was absent.

"Why am I working so hard – what good is it? What's the big picture here? Will these unanswered questions impact my future marriage? What's the meaning of it all?" These questions nagged him.

In addition, he feared squandering his opportunities because he was clueless about these foundational questions. It was not a pretty picture on the inside.

Without coming to any insights or resolution, Juan sighed, crawled out from underneath the covers, and got ready for work again.

In despair, Shakespeare's Macbeth describes life as "a tale told by an idiot, full of sound and fury, signifying nothing." Have you ever felt this way about your life?

PAUSE 1_EXPLORING WHAT GOD SAYS

So far we've discovered that our true identity — who God says we are — gives us meaning and dignity totally apart from anything we do or don't do. But there is additional meaning to be found in what we do with all we've been given. It's one thing to appreciate everything God has rescued us from in Christ. But it's another thing to embrace what He has redeemed us for. That raises the question of meaning and purpose, and that's where we're going next.

MEANING. PURPOSE.

Two very similar words. Easy to say...yet loaded when personalized. We wonder, Does my life feel meaningful – or meaningless? What significant purpose am I living for?

People in every age and culture ask these questions. If you haven't grappled with them yet, don't worry; you will.


Whether during a healthy time of self-evaluation or in a valley of self-condemnation, sooner or later we all wonder why we're alive.

God seems to have designed life with a sense that there is some integrated, coherent meaning to life and some purpose that we can significantly influence. At least there should be. Some people never adequately answer these questions. Others find initial answers but then seem to lose sight of them in the face of the great difficulties or simple boredoms of daily life. But one thing is certain: these questions are good to keep asking.

Before we examine what Scripture has to say about a life of meaning, let's consider the alternative - a wasted and meaningless life. King Solomon (David's son) had an international reputation as the wisest and richest man in his age. Yet nobody else in the Bible searched for meaning and truth as intently as he did. Why? In order "to penetrate the absurdity of life!" (Ecclesiastes 2:3, MSG). First he applied himself to understanding wisdom (1:17) to see if human reason might hold the key to meaning and truth. He carried out great projects and enjoyed the finest of pleasures...maybe sensory experience was the route to



meaning. Then he wrote a whole book about his discoveries.

ECCLESIASTES 1:12-17. Call me "the Quester." I've been king over Israel in Jerusalem. I looked most carefully into everything, searched out all that is done on this earth. And let me tell you, there's not much to write home about. God hasn't made it easy for us. I've seen it all and it's nothing but smoke – smoke, and spitting into the wind. Life's a corkscrew that can't be straightened, a minus that won't add up. I said to myself, "I know more and I'm wiser than anyone before me in Jerusalem. I've stockpiled wisdom and knowledge." What I've finally concluded is that so-called wisdom and knowledge are mindless and witless – nothing but spitting into the wind. (MSG)

In his book, Solomon identifies several things that promise everything, but deliver nothing. They're not bad things. But by themselves, or as an ultimate reason for living, they are meaningless and just don't satisfy the human heart. Check out these verses from Ecclesiastes and summarize what things Solomon found so empty.

REALITY CHECH

Let's be realistic. The point will never be to have life's meaning and purpose completely figured out – ever. So cut yourself some slack. If you find meaning and purpose in the small events of your daily life now, they will build together to a meaningful life in the long run. If your life is like a building under construction, think of your twenties as the time to lay the foundation and just rough out the frame.



This process continues through life. As we look back, we'll see what God was building through us while we served Him in faithfulness and worship.

Consider Paul's purposes for you. Mark the key ideas.

1 CORINTHIANS 3:11-15. For no one can lay any foundation other than the one already laid, which is Jesus Christ. If any man builds on this foundation using gold, silver, costly stones, wood, hay or straw, his work will be shown for what it is, because the Day will bring it to light. It will be revealed with fire, and the fire will test the quality of each man's work. If what he has built survives, he will receive his reward. If it is burned up, he will suffer loss; he himself will be saved, but only as one escaping through the flames. Imagine a "building inspector" coming to inspect your life. How solid is your foundation (on Jesus Christ)?

What are the building bricks of your life? What would you like the whole "cathedral" of your life to look like when it's all put together?

What happens when gold, silver, and jewels versus wood, hay, and straw are subjected to fire? What does this imply about lasting meaning?

What is happening in your life now that could be described as "gold, silver, and jewels" or as "wood, hay, or straw"? Where will this lead?

Humans cannot easily sustain a world that's entirely random and plotless.... A French philosopher said, "We are condemned to meaning." There's an almost universal impulse to endow our joys and our sorrows, and our failures and our successes, with meaning.

PAUSE 3_coming alive to god and others

FROM JUCCEJJ . . . TO JIGNIFICANCE . . . TO MEANING

Talk about the good life - King Solomon had it all. He completed amazing projects like man-

sions, parks, reservoirs, and temples. He was known around the world of his day for his amazing wisdom (see Proverbs – he wrote many of them), his compassionate acts, and his extravagant pleasures. But pile all these "significant" pieces together and hit "calculate." To Solomon, it all added up to a big zero – meaningless!

What about us? We arrived on planet Earth naked — and we'll leave it taking nothing with us. Memories of our existence will fade quickly. Our earthly successes vanish or are surpassed by others. Frankly, we can feel successful and significant and yet fail to grasp a deep sense of meaning in life. That's often our dilemma.

One response to this dilemma, in some circles of believers, starts by pointing out that only two things are eternal: The souls of people and God's Word. So the thinking goes that if you want your life to matter long-term, quit your job so you can go into full-time ministry connecting people with the Word of God. If God leads you to do this, that's great.



But this view leaves the impression that normal work out there in society is somehow less significant, second rate, or even "godless." Why exhaust yourself meeting people's earthly needs when you could be helping them with their spiritual needs? Before you know it, life gets cut into competing pieces, with spiritual versus material, sacred versus secular, eternal versus temporal.

There's only one problem with this view: Jesus was a carpenter for the first thirty years of His life, and Paul worked on and off as a tentmaker. Were those years "wasted" in "secular, godless, meaningless" activity? I don't think so.

Solomon's book is a guidebook for anybody in search of meaning. So what did the king who had it all and did it all discover during his lifelong search for meaning? He devoted twelve chapters to telling us all the things he had tried that had let him down. In a nutshell, he concluded, "Been there, done that, and it's all meaningless!" ... except for two things.

In the end, Solomon's conclusion boiled down to two life principles:

ECCLESIASTES 12:13-14. Here now is my final conclusion: Fear God and obey his commands, for this is everyone's duty. God will judge us for everything we do, including every secret thing, whether good or bad. (NLT)

That's it. No explanations. Just these two verses from Solomon to help us get our hands around the meaning of life.

From verse 13, our first life purpose is to "fear God." That's worship . . . coming home to Him and remaining in His presence in awe and reverence and trust. Our second purpose is to

"keep his commandments." That's faithfulness. We are called to cultivate a life of worship in all we do from carpentry to preaching, as Jesus did. And day by day we are called to live out faithfully the ways of God in our relationships — with love, mercy, grace, truth, trust, justice, holiness, etc. Simple, yet profound. As we follow God in all aspects of our lives, He brings meaning and purpose with Him into absolutely everything in our lives.

And that's not all. Verse 14 moves us into eternity. No discussion of the meaning of life can avoid the fact that someday each of us will walk through the gate called Death into eternity. We can pursue meaning in this life. But if it doesn't also extend into the life beyond, then life is meaningless in light of eternity.

Remember that God will judge "every secret thing, whether good or bad." All our hopes for lasting meaning are found there. Maybe it feels strange to you to find hope in being judged. But just consider the alternative:

What if there never is any judgment for what we humans do on this earth?

What if all that we do has no impact or any consequence whatsoever in eternity?

What if everybody just gets away with everything they've ever done – or failed to do?

How meaningless is that? Hey, we might as well just eat, drink, be merry, and die – if nothing we do will last on a planet with a dying sun and the short memories of people and the constant jockeying for power.

We're not talking about the "great white throne judgment" where the sheep will be separated from the goats to determine their eternal destiny — either heaven or hell. We mean the judgment described in 2 Corinthians 5:10.

For we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ, that each one may receive what is due him for the things done while in the body, whether good or bad.

Now that's encouraging! Whatever we do "while in the body" actually matters to God. It all matters. The "things" we work with will all perish – the buildings, cars, computers, money, universities, pots and pans. But ALL our work will have an impact in eternity – for good or bad. There is a cause-and-effect relationship that will extend into eternity.

The apostle Paul looked forward to what awaits us in heaven.

2 TIMOTHY 4:8. Now there is in store for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous Judge, will award to me on that day — and not only to me, but also to all who have longed for his appearing.

Even the tedious work of a slave matters if it is done "as unto the Lord," Paul reminded the many enslaved believers of his day. If you feel chained to your job, take heart. The Lord will assign eternal consequences to whatever you do, which adorns this life with meaning.

Are you a carpenter, a parent, a businessman, a student, a highway worker, a stockbroker, an artist, or a minister? All have equal access to meaning through a life of faithful worship in all we do, think, and are. COLOSSIANS 3:23-24. Whatever you do, work at it with all your heart, as working for the Lord, not for men, since you know that you will receive an inheritance from the Lord as a reward.

The Bible claims that our lives have repercussions in eternity. How do you feel about eternal consequences for all you do?

Consider the alternative. How would you feel in a world without any consequences – now or later? In other words, what if our choices here just don't matter? What would be some of the implications?

What is something big enough and significant enough that you could see yourself giving your whole life to it? How do you think that might connect with what God is doing in the world?



The phone rings, your paper is coming due, the boss demands, the bus is late, the lines get longer, the dinner burns, a child is born, guests laugh, grandmother dies, the car needs gas, the stock market soars and tumbles, the world goes on.

What does it all mean?

Through the medium of photographic images this resource looks at many ordinary actions, objects, and ideas that we all experience through life — things like clothes and child-hood and play and work and sex. CHAPTER 10 LIFE'S PURPOSE: WHY AM I ALIVE?

Work was consuming. But to Bryan, finding direction in life was a bigger problem. He grew up in a home with the stresses of having little money, so working to make lots of money made sense. What didn't make sense was the purpose of living.

Bryan intuitively knew that his relationship with God should influence his daily sense of direction. It just didn't most days. And most of his friends didn't seem to have a

real purpose in the things they did. "Why has God left us on earth when He could take us to heaven? What direction should my life take and how can I decide?" These questions bothered Bryan some days but not every day. Usually he just wanted to make money and have fun.

Here is a truth that reaches into the deepest part of what it means to be a person... that we are made to "have dominion" within an appropriate domain of reality. This is the core of the likeness or image of God in us and is the basis of the destiny for which we were formed. We are, all of us, never-ceasing spiritual beings with a unique eternal calling to count for good in God's great universe.... In creating human beings, God made them to rule, to reign, to have dominion in a limited sphere. Only so can they be persons.

PAUSE 1_EXPLORING WHAT GOD SAYS

So far we've discovered that the dignity we share with all humans comes from being created in God's image. And for believers, being transformed into Jesus' image gives us hope. Next we explored how our unique design (strengths, gifts, etc.) can make a difference in other people's lives and spiritual journeys. Then we tried to get our hands around the awesome reality that our lives have intrinsic meaning and significance because God is weaving each of our individual stories into His grand and cosmic story of redemption into eternity. In this last chapter we are exploring the bigger purposes for which God put us on this planet at this moment in time. Where we're headed is a journey toward . . .

Dignity & Hope -----> Meaning & Significance ----> Purpose & Goals ----> Destiny

Let's explore how several men and women in the Bible viewed their life's purpose and meaning. They all served God, but each served in a unique way. Each had a God-designed destiny in his or her generation. This may be a bit difficult if you are not familiar with these stories. Instead of doing them all, feel free to select one or two and go more in depth by reading his or her story for background.

From whatever you know about these people, and the selected passage, <u>summarize</u> what each person eventually saw as his or her big life purpose or destiny.

JOLHO

Joshua was Moses' right-hand man in leading the Israelites out of 430 years of slavery in Egypt. After Moses died, Joshua prepared the people who survived the Exodus to enter the Promised Land. You can study his story starting at Joshua 21. Here he warns them to remain faithful to God in the pagan territories they will soon enter and occupy.



JOSHUA 24:14-15. So fear the Lord and serve him wholeheartedly. Put away forever the idols your ancestors worshiped when they lived beyond the Euphrates River and in Egypt. Serve the LORD alone. But if you refuse to serve the LORD, then choose today whom you will serve. Would you prefer the gods your ancestors served beyond the Euphrates? Or will it be the gods of the Amorites in whose land you now live? But as for me and my family, we will serve the LORD. (NLT)

JOSHUA'S PURPOSE:

E∫THER

Esther was a beautiful young Jewish woman raised by her uncle Mordecai during the time when the brutal and pagan Persian King Xerxes reigned over a huge empire, making the conquered Jewish people his subjects. Out of all the beautiful young virgins in the territory, Xerxes selected her as his queen. One of the highest nobles in the land was named Haman.



He hatched a plot to persuade Xerxes to exterminate as many Jews as possible. In this passage Mordecai pleads with Queen Esther to use her influence and risk the king's wrath to save her people from the coming genocide. This story is found in the book of Esther.

ESTHER 4:14. If you keep quiet at a time like this, deliverance and relief for the Jews will arise from some other place, but you and your relatives will die. Who knows if perhaps you were made queen for just such a time as this? (NLT)

ESTHER'S PURPOSE:

PAUL

Paul was raised in Asia Minor in a strict Jewish home and rose to a high rank among the Pharisees. So at first he viewed the teachings of Christ and the young movement of His followers as a serious threat to orthodox



Judaism. He was responsible for persecuting many believers before he met the risen Christ and believed in Him. He was convinced that God had commissioned him to take the wonderful news of the gospel of grace out of his Jewish comfort zone to regions beyond so that Gentiles could also be saved. His story starts in Acts 9.

ACTS 20:24. But my life is worth nothing to me unless I use it for finishing the work assigned me by the Lord Jesus — the work of telling others the Good News about the wonderful grace of God. (NLT)

EPHESIANS 3:8-9. Though I am the least deserving of all God's people, he graciously gave me the privilege of telling the Gentiles about the endless treasures available to them in Christ. I was chosen to explain to everyone this mysterious plan that God, the Creator of all things, had kept secret from the beginning. (NLT)

PHILIPPIANS 3:10. [For my determined purpose is] that I may know Him [that I may progressively become more deeply and intimately acquainted with Him, perceiving and recognizing and understanding the wonders of His Person more strongly and more clearly], and that I may in that same way come to know the power outflowing from His resurrection [which it exerts over believers], and that I may so share His sufferings as to be continually transformed [in spirit into His likeness even] to His death. (AMP)

JEREMIAH 29:11. "For I know the plans I have for you," declares the LORD, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future."

ACTS 13:36. For when David had served God's purpose in his own generation, he fell asleep.


How would it feel to reach the end of your life and know that – like King David and others you studied – you had fulfilled God's purpose for you in your generation?



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PAUSE 2_EXPLORING YOUR REALITY

Take a shot at trying to express the big picture by scribbling your thoughts below:



The test of a worthy life goal lies in the wake of its achievement. What a shame to discover that, upon reaching a goal, the joy consisted solely in striving for it! A worthy goal, upon achievement, should give way to another. They should all be intermediate steps in a wider process. The letdown and emptiness that crashes into highly motivated lives reveals that these people were mastered by things that were too small and close-ended. "Coming from" isn't enough. Men clamor for purpose, for always having a direction to "go to."

Don't be worried if you don't have a clue about your destiny. Your destiny usually unfolds over time and rarely becomes clear in your twenties. In the meantime, you are not on this journey alone.

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PAUSE 3_COMING ALIVE TO GOD AND OTHERS

JOHN 17 is a great chapter to learn how Jesus viewed His sense of purpose and destiny. As you read the whole chapter in your Bible, take notes on these four questions:

WHAT PURPOSES DID JESUS BELIEVE HE HAD ACCOMPLISHED DURING HIS LIFE ON EARTH?	WHAT LIFE PURPOSES DID JESUS PASS ON TO HIS DISCIPLES? WHAT DID HE EXPECT THEM TO DO WITH THEIR LIVES AFTER HE WAS GONE?
vs. 1 — He gave glorų to His Father	vss. 6-8 — to accept and keep God's Word
WHAT WERE THEY GIVEN FOR THE JOURNEY?	WHAT WOULD THEY EXPERIENCE ON THE JOURNEY?
vs. 13 — full measure of Jesus' joy	vs. 14 — hatred from the world

Let's not kid ourselves. Jesus' path to His destiny was difficult – very difficult. He paid a huge price in moving toward His purpose. Notice the difficulties and pain He endured from this passage:

PHILIPPIANS 2:5-11. Your attitude should be the same as that of Christ Jesus: Who, being in very nature God, did not consider equality with God something to be grasped, but



made himself nothing, taking the very nature of a servant, being made in human likeness. And being found in appearance as a man, he humbled himself and became obedient to death – even death on a cross!

Therefore God exalted him to the highest place and gave him the name that is above every name, that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

What tough choices did Jesus make, and what did He endure on His journey toward His destiny?

Who accomplished Jesus' destiny?

What were some of the eternal consequences from Jesus' choices on earth?

Consider what the Bible has to say on the questions, "What's worth dying for?" and "What's worth living for?"

JOHN 15:12-13. This is my commandment: Love each other in the same way I have loved you. There is no greater love than to lay down one's life for one's friends. (NLT) ROMANS 12:1. And so, dear brothers and sisters, I plead with you to give your bodies to God because of all he has done for you. Let them be a living and holy sacrifice — the kind he will find acceptable. This is truly the way to worship him. (NLT)

PHILIPPIANS 3:10-11. I want to know Christ and the power of his resurrection and the fellowship of sharing in his sufferings, becoming like him in his death, and so, somehow, to attain to the resurrection from the dead.

What might it look like for you to obey these commands in relation to other people?

Is there any purpose on earth that you would be willing to die for? Explain.

Would you be equally willing to devote your life to it? Explain.

From these words of Jesus, what should – and should not – be your primary concern? What does this mean to you?

MATTHEW 6:31-33. So don't worry about these things, saying, "What will we eat? What will we drink? What will we wear?" These things dominate the thoughts of unbelievers, but your heavenly Father already knows all your needs. Seek the Kingdom of God above all else, and live righteously, and he will give you everything you need. (NLT) What is the cost for those who pursue God's purposes and destiny for their lives? What are some rewards?

JOHN 12:23-25. Jesus replied, "The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified. I tell you the truth, unless a kernel of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains only a single seed. But if it dies, it produces many seeds. The man who loves his life will lose it, while the man who hates his life in this world will keep it for eternal life."



What might it look like for you to "lose your life" for the sake of a greater purpose or destiny?

What are some likely consequences if you try to [hold on to life just as it is (MSG)] instead?

What is the most serious temptation you face to shortchange God's purpose for you? What seems so important to you now that you might trade it for God's best plan for you?

Someday, we will meet the great King and Author of history. Only then will our eyes be opened to the moments in which He was "the Lion" orchestrating events toward a greater purpose – a greater good. Only then will we better understand how and when the grand drama of providence intersected the smaller scenes of our lives. — KURT BRUNER AND JIM WARE, FINDING GOD IN THE LAND OF NARNIA

Have a blast! I've already seen what you get to do. It's better than you could have dreamed. Now hurry up and get on that train. A whole lot of folk are waiting for you to walk into your destiny and into their lives.

ENVISION FORWARD

What are your spiritual needs as you consider the next phase of your journey?

In what environment might these needs be met?

What continuing relationships will you have with the people in this group (casual friendship to in-depth involvement)?

PAUSE TO AFFIRM

Do you want to express a thank you or affirmation to anyone in the group who has influenced your life? Take time to do that.

PAUSE TO PRAY

Spend time together praying. Thank God for this part of your journey. Praise Him for who He is. Linger longer together.

WHY MEMORIZE SCRIPTURE?

You won't find the word memorize in the Bible. But the concept is there both in command and in example ("treasure . . . store up . . . hide" God's words in our hearts). We are encouraged to "study . . . reflect on . . . delight in . . . not forget" God's words (Psalm 119:9-16, NLT; 37:31).

- "lay hold of . . . pay attention . . . listen closely . . . keep [God's words] within your heart" (Proverbs 4:4,20-22).
- "bind them [my commands] around your neck . . . write them on the tablet of your heart" (Proverbs 3:3).
- "always treasure my commands.... Guard my instructions as you guard your own eyes. Tie them on your fingers as a reminder.... Write them on the tablet of your heart" (Proverbs 7:1-3, NLT, NIV).
- "it is good to keep these sayings in your heart" (Proverbs 22:18, NLT).
- "meditate on [God's words] day and night" (Joshua 1:8).

These same verses also explain the reasons for and benefits of memorizing Scripture:

- "that I might not sin against you . . . [my] feet do not slip" (Psalm 119:9-16; 37:31).
- "they bring life . . . and healing to their whole body" (Proverbs 4:22).
- "find favor with both God and people . . . earn a good reputation" (Proverbs 3:3-4, NLT).
- "you will trust in the LORD" (Proverbs 22:18-19, NLT).
- "you will be sure to obey everything written in it. Only then will you prosper and succeed" (Joshua 1:8, NLT).
- so that you'll "have all of them ready on your lips" (Proverbs 22:18).
- "your words . . . were my joy and my heart's delight" (Jeremiah 15:16).

Perhaps even more compelling than these reasons is seeing how powerfully God can use a person who has taken the time and effort to consistently memorize Scripture. When Jesus faced Satan (see Matthew 4:1-11), He drew from the many verses of Scripture that He had memorized in His youth to pinpoint Satan's deception and resist temptation. Where would we be if Jesus had not memorized Scripture? When Peter addressed the huge crowd on the day of Pentecost, he was given no time to consult his concordance and prepare a message! Because he had made Scripture memory a priority in his life, he could quote from three different Old Testament passages that helped bring 3,000 people to the Lord!

If you long to equip yourself to counteract Satan, resist sin, trust and obey God, listen to God's voice, and minister to others, there is no better investment of your time than memorizing Scripture.

A good place to begin is by revisiting the verses you memorized here in this study. Carry the verses around. Put them on your PDA. Put them on your computer. Review them out

loud. Often. Write them out until you can say them accurately. Meditate on them. Pray over them. Tell a friend what they mean to you. Put yourself to sleep at night thinking about them. And look forward to listening to God speak to you!

I am amazed at the countless times God pulled from my mind a memorized verse that has been exactly the right thing at the right time! At times it was a comfort, at times guidance. A push ahead or a pull to stop. A reminder of His promise, a prompting for wisdom. A word for counseling another, an insight for those seeking our Lord.
