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INTRODUCTION

In case this is your first study in the CONNECT series — or even if you've journeyed through other studies before you picked up this one — this overview may help you connect some dots. *GOD: Connecting with His Outrageous Love* is about receiving God's love and loving Him in response. *IDENTITY: Becoming Who God Says I Am* and *SOUL: Embracing My Sexuality and Emotions* are about discovering who God says we are and learning to live out of that true identity. *LIFE: Thriving in a Complex World* is about living well with Jesus. This study is about loving people — all kinds of people. Because if we're loving God and ourselves, then loving people will happen naturally.

CHAPTER FLOW

Think of your time spent in each chapter as a mini-journey... an exploratory trip into a significant topic on your way toward authentic spiritual transformation through Jesus. Most chapters in this study have the following sections where you'll "pause" your heart and mind along the way.

A JHORT JTORY

Each is based on real life experiences.

PAUSE 1: EXPLORING WHAT GOD SAYS

This section encourages you to look at the Bible to see what God said. We'll include most of the verses for you, from a variety of Bible translations. But nothing beats reading your own Bible to make you comfortable in God's Word. You'll be reading the *New International Version*, unless we say otherwise. Sometime we use *The Message* (MSG), the *New Living Translation* (NLT), the *New Century Version* (NCV), *The Living Bible* (TLB), the *New American Standard Bible* (NASB), or *The Amplified Bible* (AMP). As you move from chapter to chapter, you'll gradually try different approaches to studying, processing, and applying these passages.

PAUSE 2: EXPLORING YOUR REALITY

Our information-driven society makes it easy to walk away from profound truth without considering what it really says about us. This section will guide you as you try to see yourself from God's perspective and explore what it would take for you to become more like Jesus.

PAUSE 3: COMING ALIVE TO GOD AND OTHERS

Our "what's-in-it-for-me?" culture often promotes self-centeredness and shallowness in our relationships. This section will help you examine biblical principles in order to develop patterns of knowing and relating — to Him and to others — with authenticity, honesty, humility, and love.

PAUJE 4: JOURNEYING FORWARD

Being connected with Jesus as your default lifestyle means learning to trust Him with what's true about you — all the way, every day. This section invites you to process and write out what you are learning as you live in Him, as well as what you are doing with what you are learning.

DIGGING DEEPER

Like the photo album you make after a trip, in this optional section you can pause to recap and process the highlights of your experience so far. We'll give you a few "extras" if you want to explore and experience the topic of the chapter more deeply.

IMAGEJ

In each chapter we've included pictures and artwork to help you reflect on the topics. They are there to stimulate your imagination and heart when words fall short. Take time to gaze at the images and place yourself within these visual stories. If a photo disturbs you, that's okay; try to figure out why.

YOUR JOURNEY THROUGH EACH CHAPTER

For each chapter, expect to devote about an hour to personal preparation — more if you choose to do the optional Digging Deeper section. So pace yourself. You might try working a little at a time on a chapter — say, one section a day or twenty minutes a day — or a longer time of concentrated reflection. After a few chapters you'll find a rhythm that fits you.

FOR GROUP LEADERS

GETTING YOU STARTED

To get the most from your study, we encourage you to do three simple things:

- 1. Read the verses meditatively, inviting the Holy Spirit to help you unpack what He wants you to understand from each verse. We've printed most passages from the *New International Version* (NIV), but occasionally quote from other translations for a fresh rendering. You may want to use your own Bible for any or all verses in this study.
- Mark the verses to help you engage as you read. Be creative! Underline, draw circles or arrows —>, highlight, use colored pencils whatever will help you process as you go.
- Pray throughout your study, not just when you see a prayer-oriented question. Ask the Lord to shed light on what you're studying and help you connect what you read to the realities in your life.

GUIDELINES FOR SMALL GROUPS

- 1. Confidentiality: Do not repeat anything said or heard inside the group to anyone outside the group. Refraining from gossip builds trust.
- Safety: Respect each other's boundaries. Also, accept each other's perceived realities without needing to comment or "fix" how they feel or see things at the moment. Nobody should feel forced to share anything that they prefer to keep private. Providing each other space and supportive care will promote safety.
- 3. "I" Statements: Be yourself; take off your masks. Share information only about yourself not "we, they, us, or you."
- 4. Interference: Avoid giving advice, talking while someone else is sharing, or engaging in subtle competition by saying, "I'm just like you" or by sharing a similar story. Instead, listen attentively, learn from each other's life experiences, and offer brief and affirming feedback.
- 5. Individuality: Accept and enjoy the diversity in your group, including being at very different places on your spiritual journeys. Allow everyone (but don't force anyone) to discover areas of need or brokenness. Avoid probing or intrusive questioning, as well as tampering with or elaborating on each other's personal sharing.
- 6. Emotional Sharing: Expect and allow each other to experience a full range of emotion, even if this makes you uncomfortable. This might include crying, raising a voice, or being silent. When this happens, avoid interrupting, communicating that another's feelings are unacceptable or "bad," and touching or hugging without

permission. Allow for times of quiet in your group, because silence can be one of the most powerful healing environments.

- 7. Roadblocks and Obstacles: It is important to allow people to process their thoughts and feelings without needing to come to clear resolution. It is also normal to experience obstacles and setbacks. Remember that being stuck can be a catalyst for members to move forward. Trust the process!
- 8. Holy Spirit: Only God can perform the healing and growth needed in our hearts. The purpose of the group is to provide a place where the support, love, and acceptance of God can be modeled and felt, and where the truth of God can be discovered and embraced.
- 9. Personal Responsibility: Recognize that true life change can only occur with God's help as we yield to His leading. The group can provide accountability through prayer and support.
- Group Limits: Don't expect your group to provide therapy, counseling, or other indepth one-to-one support for members. Know when to refer each other to someone outside your group who is better equipped to help.
- 11. Pace: Some groups study and discuss a complete chapter each week. They prepare all of the questions but only discuss selected ones. Other groups prefer to devote two weeks to each chapter. Find a pace that allows your group to truly meet with God — not just finish an academic exercise.

BENEFITS OF HEALTHY GROUP PROCESS

- 1. A safe place to share vulnerably and honestly.
- 2. New relationships.
- 3. An opportunity to be listened to in an accepting and grace-filled environment.
- 4. A forum for embracing truth, gaining perspective, and growing spiritually at your own pace.



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CHAPTER 1 RECEIVING LOVE TO GIVE LOVE



When Sara looks in the mirror each morning, she avoids her

deep brown eyes, as if they were windows into her soul. That way she doesn't have to really see herself. Her own reflection is just too painful. It takes all her energy to hush the criticism she heaps on herself. A glance triggers too many memories, too many shaming thoughts, too much condemnation.

Other people do affirm her now and then . . . for her musical ability, her compassion for kids, her beautiful smile. But Sara doesn't see those things when she looks at herself. She'd rather look at others — her friends in jazz band or the handicapped kids at swim lessons. It's easier to give love to them than to receive love for herself.

Sometimes when she prays, the turmoil inside seems to calm down for a while as she starts to get in touch with God's love for her. Her friends say they like her, and God says He loves her. So why, she agonizes, can't she get it together and allow herself to be loved?

What do you say to yourself about yourself?

Is your self-talk mostly positive or mostly negative? Explain.

PAUSE 1_EXPLORING WHAT GOD SAYS

John Eagan writes, "Define yourself radically as one beloved by God. God's love for you and his choice of you constitute your worth. Accept that, and let it become the most important thing in your life" (in *A Traveler Toward the Dawn*, p. 150). The beautiful thing about being God's beloved is that when we're able to receive God's love (and God's love channeled through others), then we can begin loving and accepting ourselves as God loves us. And when our own hearts are full of love from God, then



we have enough love to overflow into the hearts of others.

1 JOHN 4:10-11,19. This is love: not that we loved God, but that he loved us. . . . Dear friends, since God so loved us, we also ought to love one another. . . . We love because he first loved us.

How do you think receiving love (from God and others) affects our ability to give love?


Jesus made it clear that His way is based on love.

MATTHEW 22:37-40. "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind." This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: "Love your neighbor as yourself." All the Law and the Prophets hang on these two commandments.


What does this passage imply about loving ourselves?

What do you think it feels like . . .



BARRIERS

These two case studies explore what happened when two people received Jesus' love.

CAJE JTUDY: JEJUJ AND ZACCHAEUJ

BACKGROUND

Zacchaeus was probably despised because he was a tax collector. Other Jews probably viewed him as a traitor and a cheat – collecting their money in taxes (plus a cut for himself) for the Romans who were occupying the land. Then Zacchaeus experienced Jesus' love and started viewing himself more through Jesus' eyes.

Read LUKE 19:1-10 about Zacchaeus.

Being the chief tax collector and being hated by his fellow Jews, how do you think Zacchaeus felt about himself?

When Zacchaeus received affirmation and love from Jesus, how do you think it changed the way he felt about himself?

How and why was he able to give of himself for the sake of others?

CAJE JTUDY: JEJUJ AND THE GRATEFUL WOMAN

BACKGROUND

The woman who anointed Jesus in this story was unnamed – maybe because of her scandalous past and immoral reputation. Some think she may have been the woman caught in adultery or Mary Magdalene, out of whom Jesus had cast many demons. There's no way to be sure. But somewhere in her journey she had experienced Jesus' love – and she started living out of who Jesus said she was, not who society said she was.

If people know they are loved, they are not afraid of their "badness." They feel accepted and safe, and they do not have to feel "good" about themselves to be safe. Love does that.

Read LUKE 7:36-50 about the woman anointing Jesus' feet.

Being described as an "immoral . . . sinner," how do you think she felt about herself?

When the woman not only heard but received love and affirmation from Jesus, how do you think it changed the way she felt about herself?


How and why was she able to give of herself for the sake of others?

How do you think these exchanges of love between Jesus, Zacchaeus, and the woman may have influenced other people around them?

CONJIDER

Love is a mystery – who can understand it? But God has revealed that loving is at the very heart of the gospel and of life in His kingdom. Here are some fundamentals of love:

- God pours out His jealous love directly into our hearts.
- God also pours His love into our hearts indirectly through the love of others, and through the beauty He created around us.
- If we can receive His love, it helps us love ourselves as He does.
- God uses us to channel His love into others' hearts.



PAUSE 2_EXPLORING YOUR REALITY

Think about it . . . How does a baby know he is loved? Simple: His needs are met! When he's hungry, his mom feeds him. When he's cold, his dad covers him up. When he's frightened, somebody holds him. It was God who created us with needs. Then He gave us the ministry of meeting each other's needs by loving one another. We can't deeply receive love without the humility to accept and admit our needs.

But first we have to admit that we really do have needs. From these verses, how does God feel about our needs?



ISAIAH 55:1-3. Come, all you who are thirsty, come to the waters; and you who have no money, come, buy and eat! Come, buy wine and milk without money and without cost. Why spend money on what is not

bread, and your labor on what does not satisfy? Listen, listen to me, and eat what is good, and your soul will delight in the richest of fare. Give ear and come to me; hear me, that your soul may live. I will make an everlasting covenant with you, my faithful love promised to David.

PHILIPPIANS 4:19. And my God will meet all your needs according to his glorious riches in Christ Jesus.

What does God promise to us about meeting our legitimate, God-given human needs?

Many of us have learned to be so independent that we deny our needs, trying to protect ourselves from disappointment, rejection, abandonment, and so forth. To what extent (if at all) is this true of you?

It's hard for some of us to admit that we really do want and need to be loved – and even harder to ask for it. How do you think men and women might deal with this differently?

For some of us, shame from our culture or our family might prevent us from receiving love or loving ourselves. If this is true of you, explain why.

It's okay to be thirsty and needy — physically and emotionally! List a few personal needs that you've felt recently. How could you invite others and God to show their love to you this week by meeting a genuine need of yours?

EXAMPLE: I could ask my friends to help me find a new roommate who will be like family to me, and also let them help me pack and move my stuff.

In this quote, Nouwen refers to the "other, louder voices" telling you that you must "earn the love you so desire." When have you felt that way?

"You are my Beloved, on you my favor rests." That voice has always been there, but it seems that I was much more eager to listen to the other, louder voices saying: "Prove that you are worth something; do something relevant, spectacular or powerful, and then you will earn the love you so desire." Meanwhile, the soft, gentle voice that speaks in the silence and solitude of my heart remained unheard or, at least, unconvincing.

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Do you think of yourself more often as being "beloved" by God and others, or as being a "lover" of God and others, or neither? *Explain*.

Let's get practical. God created you in love and gave you dignity and value. Read each statement about loving and caring for yourself and check your tendencies. If neither, write your own example.

PAUSE 3_coming alive to god and others

Here's what's so dangerous about not loving ourselves appropriately: We tend to criticize in others what we can't accept in ourselves. Some people would say: "If you spot it, you've got it!"

MATTHEW 7:3-5. Why do you look at the speck of sawdust in your brother's eye and pay no attention to the plank in your own eye? How can you say to your brother, "Let me take the speck out of your eye," when all the



time there is a plank in your own eye? You hypocrite, first take the plank out of your own eye, and then you will see clearly to remove the speck from your brother's eye.

CONSIDER: Whenever you get irritated during the next month, look at what you're angry about in someone else, and see if you are doing the same thing, at least in principle.

Think of someone in your everyday life who frequently bugs you. The next time you feel critical of this person, how might you use it as a teachable moment to look inside for your own "specks" or "planks"?

Instead of putting the blame on others, Jesus invites us to bring our weaknesses and flaws out of hiding and into the community of others. That's a big step in loving ourselves. From this list, how is God urging you to recognize the "specks" in your life and begin to expose them to love? Check one or two that seem crucial to you now.

- Accept a failure or limitation

Love is valuable — so it always comes at a cost. It cost Jesus a lot to love you, right? And it will cost you to "pay it forward" and genuinely love others. It is love's price tag that says to the loved one, "You are infinitely precious and valuable to me!" Read Jesus' call for His followers to willingly pay the cost of following Him and loving others into His kingdom.

Healthy self-denial willingly forbids us from being the central love of our lives because that place is jealously reserved for the Triune God.

MATTHEW 10:39. If you cling to your life, you will lose it; but if you give up your life for me, you will find it. (NLT)

LUKE 9:23-24. Then he said to them all: "If anyone would come after me, he must deny himself and take up his cross daily and follow me. For whoever wants to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for me will save it."

How does the world around us urge us to "cling to" or "save" our lives?

How do you feel about denying yourself? Explore any feelings of resistance to this idea.

Of course we can take almost anything to extremes. Sometimes we take "loving ourselves" to the extreme of indulging ourselves with selfishness. Or we take "denying ourselves" to the other extreme of punishing ourselves with self-hatred. Both of these inappropriate ways of loving ourselves come from pride – because life becomes all about us – not about God! Our Father is not in the business of either spoiling or abusing His children.

Which extreme could you tend to lean toward when you get off-balance from healthy selflove? Give an example below of when you've done that.



EXAMPLE: I was just indulging myself when I went into debt to buy more electronics.

From the verses you just read, and this passage below, what are we promised when we deny ourselves for the sake of others and spend ourselves to meet the needs of others? <u>Circle</u> anything God promises us.

ISAIAH 58:9-11. If you do away with the yoke of oppression, with the pointing finger and malicious talk, and if you spend yourselves in behalf of the hungry and satisfy the needs of the oppressed, then your light will rise in the darkness, and your night will become like the noonday. The LORD will guide you always; he will satisfy your needs in a sun-scorched land and will strengthen your frame.

Imagine if a friend asked you, "Isn't it selfish to love myself when I am called to deny myself, build the kingdom of God, and serve others?" How would you respond to him or her?

Healthy self-love is always wrapped in humility. That allows us to see ourselves as God does – as a creature, a sinner, and a new creation in Christ – all at the same time. When we love ourselves appropriately, we don't minimize or magnify our obvious faults. Instead, we embrace the awesome reality that God really does value us highly even in our shameful fallen state. When we believe God's love in our heads and also experience it in our hearts, then we're on the way to loving ourselves.

PRAYER PAUSE

As you pray, go easy on yourself. It takes a lifetime to fully receive God's love and love your neighbor as yourself. When you doubt who you are, ask the Spirit of God to help you see yourself as "the one Jesus loves." Ask Him to open your heart so you can receive His mercy, love, acceptance, tenderness, and grace. Take time to enjoy and thank God for your belovedness. Ask Him to reveal any resistance, to remove any barriers, and to repair any brokenness in your ability to receive His love and love yourself.

Self-rejection is the greatest enemy of the spiritual life because it contradicts the sacred voice that calls us the "Beloved." Being the Beloved expresses the core truth of our existence.

PAUSE 4_JOURNEYING FORWARD

It's your life . . . it's your journey. So that means it's up to you how you respond to the ideas in this chapter. Pause 4 in every chapter will be like this one – completely open-ended to invite you to zero in on whatever specifically touched you most. Or whatever disturbed you the most.



Whatever that is, grab on to it - don't gloss over it. During this final Pause, revisit that verse and respond to

one or more of the reflective questions. Then pray about what step you should take to "love one another" as Jesus asks us to in the coming week.

At the end of every chapter we'll invite you to <u>select one verse or passage</u> that you read, studied, listened to, or memorized during the week that was meaningful to you. Begin by copying the verse and its reference below, so you'll be able to find it later.

1 JOHN 4:10-11. This is love: not that we loved God, but that he loved us.... Dear friends, since God so loved us, we also ought to love one another.

We live in a world of images that deeply influence how we look at life. Choose a picture from this chapter that is meaningful or disturbing to you, and briefly explain why.

How have you experienced God this week?

Then, you'll be invited to <u>select one or more of these reflective questions</u> and journal your response. The point is not to answer all of the questions, but to help focus your reflection on what God is saying to you. Most chapters have a final Journal page to give you space to write.

REFLECTING on what was most meaningful to you from this chapter, respond to one (or more) of these questions in the Journal on the following page:

- What impact does the loving way of Jesus have on your heart?
- As you engage in loving yourself, how might you be setting the stage to love God and others?
- What one action step are you motivated to take in response to what God has taught you?



JOURNAL

Think of the Journal page as part of your spiritual fitness routine. Your spirit, heart, and mind have just finished some vigorous exercise. This is the cool-down phase. Not to be hurried. We suggest two things:

- 1. Journal on any of the preceding reflective questions.
- 2. Memorize and meditate on the Scripture memory verse below.

If at all possible, don't leave your study time without capturing in writing the most important things God revealed to you.

JUGGEJTED MEMORY VERJE:

And the second is like it: "Love your neighbor as yourself."

Last, we'll suggest a key verse on the chapter's topic for you to memorize. If a different verse touched you more, feel free to substitute it. If you take 5–10 minutes right after completing the chapter study to memorize the verse, it will help anchor what you've learned in your heart and mind. After you have memorized the verse, check your accuracy. Try to write the verse from memory in the space below.

DIGGING DEEPER

CAJE JTUDY: THE FATHER WITH TWO JONJ

This familiar story about the father with two sons reveals how people can love themselves inappropriately, and then fail to receive love from others that is there for the taking. As you read the end of the story in LUKE 15:11-32, notice anything that suggests how either son:


... RECEIVED (or failed to receive) his father's love.

... LOVED (or failed to love) himself or others.

The younger brother may have believed he was loving himself by demanding his "rights." What was the result of his self-focused, prideful love?

When the younger brother concluded that he wasn't "worthy" of being loved, what effect did this have on him? (See verses 19,21.)

Try to get into the older brother's head. What do you imagine he was feeling and saying to himself . . .



How did either brother demonstrate self-indulgence or self-hatred?

Imagine being the younger brother the morning after the feast. How do you feel as you consider putting back on the robe, the sandals, and the ring of honor?

Where do you find yourself in this story? Can you relate to the heart of the father, the younger brother, or the older brother? *Explain*.

CHAPTER 2 LOVING OTHERS IN COMMUNITY



Jake felt ashamed of the mess he had gotten himself into. He got caught looking at pornography on the Internet — by the guy he had influenced for Christ. Too embarrassed to talk about it, Jake just backed away quietly — from his friend, from the guys in his Bible study group, from anyone who might bring his secret little habits into the open. Let them think whatever they wanted. It just felt way too risky in his circle of friends to come out of hiding.

Then Jake visited another friend's Bible study group. He was blown away when the leader stood up and said, "Let me introduce the folks who serve with me leading this group. Derreck here overcame a serious drug habit earlier in his life. Susan endured the pain of a messy divorce about five years ago. Jared still struggles with some post-traumatic stress from his stint in Kuwait with the National Guard, but he's gaining altitude. As for me ... well, I have struggled with depression now and then. And several of us men meet twice a month to help each other stay away from porn. You could say that all of us here are pretty broken people. But we are all experiencing Jesus' healing touch, too. If you'd like to talk with any of us, just give us a call."

Jake was amazed. People actually talked about their "messes" — even the leaders! It had been a long time since he had tasted an authentic environment of grace and truth like this, where people trusted each other and wanted to come closer to Jesus together. Maybe he really didn't have to sort out his mess all by himself. He knew he had some thinking to do about what it really means to love and be transformed within a community of believers.

What (if anything) would attract you to a group of people who relate to each other like these people do?

PAUSE 1_EXPLORING WHAT GOD SAYS

Jesus said that we can't really love God unless we also love people. In fact, one significant proof of our love for God shows up in our relationships with people. His Holy Spirit alive in us draws us and empowers us to love what He loves: humanity ... every man, woman, and child on earth.

Read the passages below for ways to relate to one another in love — both believers and those among us who are still seeking Him, as well as our families and friends, and even our

In your experience, when were you involved in an environment where people didn't exhibit grace and mercy to one another? Describe that experience.

In a community of grace, who I am in God's eyes is not questioned; instead, it is affirmed.

Acceptance often starts "movement" in someone's spiritual growth. In an environment of no condemnation, people are honest about issues they haven't felt safe to reveal before. When they find that it's okay to confess one problem, they fire up the backhoe and they dig deeper into the dark parts of their souls. As acceptance increases, so does confession, and with confession comes intimacy and growth.

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PAUSE 3_COMING ALIVE TO GOD AND OTHERS

HISTORICAL NOTE

Tertullian was one of the most colorful early Christian scholars. He lived in North Africa about 200 years after Christ died. In AD 197 he wrote a description of life among believers. In it, he told how they used their monthly offerings to support and bury poor people and to supply the needs of destitute orphaned children, elderly people confined in their homes, victims of shipwreck, as well as anyone banished to the islands or shut up in prisons – people who had done nothing wrong except to love God. Observing their lives and "deeds of love," the non-believers around them said, "See how they love one another! See how they are ready even to die for one another!"

Try to imagine visiting the first generation of Christ's followers as they met in community. These communities were often called *ecclesia* in Greek, often translated as "church." Mark whatever you notice about <u>the ways they</u> <u>showed love</u> for one another.



ACTS 2:44-47. And all the believers lived in a wonderful har-

mony, holding everything in common. They sold whatever they owned and pooled their resources so that each person's need was met. They followed a daily discipline of worship in the Temple followed by meals at home, every meal a celebration, exuberant and joyful, as they praised God. People in general liked what they saw. Every day their number grew as God added those who were saved. (MSG)

What do you think it was about these people that attracted so many to join them in following Christ?

In his letters to the churches in Rome, Philippi, and Colosse, Paul described lots of ways that they could be showing love to each other. Mark any you notice.

ROMANS 12:9-16. Don't just pretend to love others. Really love them. Hate what is wrong. Hold tightly to what is good. Love each other with genuine affection, and take delight in honoring each other. Never be lazy, but work hard and serve the Lord enthusiastically. Rejoice in our confident hope. Be patient in trouble, and keep on praying. When God's people are in need, be ready to help them. Always be eager to practice hospitality. Bless those who persecute you. Don't curse them; pray that God will bless them. Be happy with those who are happy, and weep with those who weep. Live in harmony with each other. Don't be too proud to enjoy the company of ordinary people. And don't think you know it all! (NLT)

PHILIPPIANS 2:1-4. If you have any encouragement from being united with Christ, if any comfort from his love, if any fellowship with the Spirit, if any tenderness and compassion, then make my joy complete by being like-minded, having the same love, being one in spirit and purpose. Do nothing out of selfish ambition or vain conceit, but in humility consider others better than yourselves. Each of you should look not only to your own interests, but also to the interests of others.

COLOSSIANS 3:12-17. Therefore, as God's chosen people, holy and dearly loved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience. Bear with each other and forgive whatever grievances you may have against one another. Forgive as the Lord forgave you. And over all these virtues put on love, which binds them all together in perfect unity. Let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, since as members of one body you were called to peace. And be thankful. Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly as you teach and admonish one another with all wisdom, and as you sing psalms, hymns and spiritual songs with gratitude in your hearts to God. And whatever you do, whether in word or deed, do it all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him.

Summarize what loving each other looks like in practice from these passages.

How does "fellowship with the Spirit" (Philippians 2:1) help us to love others this way?

How would you say you're doing in terms of initiating love for people who are different from you in culture, sexual orientation, race, financial status, education, or other ways? What would it look like to "really love them" (Romans 12:9)?

When we live out Jesus' command to love each another, we will influence those outside God's family (if we're not too exclusive!). Why do you think some of us tend to hang out in a "holy huddle" with other followers of Christ?

If we show love for one another – and if we don't – we affect those outside God's family for good or for bad. Consider these two true stories.

In 2004 after the tsunami struck the countries of the Far East, followers of Christ came to minister His love to the devastated survivors through simple acts of service. One of these believers came upon an elderly Muslim man in Sri Lanka who had lost his entire family, his home, and his job. Not knowing what else to do, the believer just sat down next to the elderly man and wept with him. After some time, the man said, "You're a Christian, aren't you?"

"How did you know?" the visitor asked. "Because you care," the man said through his tears.

Mahatma Ghandi is one of the most respected leaders of modern history. A Hindu, Ghandi nevertheless admired Jesus and often quoted from the Sermon on the Mount. Once when the missionary E. Stanley Jones met with Ghandi he asked him, "Mr. Ghandi, though you quote the words of Christ often, why is it that you appear to so adamantly reject becoming his follower?"

Ghandi replied, "Oh, I don't reject your Christ. I love your Christ. It's just that so many of you Christians are so unlike your Christ." – FROM HTTP://JMM.AAA.NET.AU/ ARTICLES/552.HTM

LOVING ONE ANOTHER - JOHN 13:34-35

A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. By this all men will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another.

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DIGGING DEEPER (CHOOSE ONE)

1. TOUGH AND TENDER LOVE DRAMA

One believer who had made a mess of his life and needed love from his brothers in Christ was named Onesimus. Read about him in the very short letter (only twenty-five verses) that Paul wrote to PHILEMON, a follower of Jesus who had once owned Onesimus as a slave. Imagine that one of your group members is Philemon, and the rest of you are his friends and leaders in the fellowship that meets in Philemon's house. You are the community of believers who will be receiving Onesimus back in a few days. You've just received Paul's letter. One of you should play the part of Philemon. Two of you think he deserves the legal punishment for a runaway slave — death. The rest of you want to offer mercy and grace along with truth, but you're not sure what that should look like. Have a five-minute impromptu discussion where you consider your options. Also discuss how your decision about Onesimus will help or hinder the sharing of the good news of Jesus in your town and among your families. Then decide how you will receive him back home.

2. TOUGH AND TENDER LOVE DECISION

If it's a stretch for your group to dramatize the return of Onesimus, try considering Jake's situation from the opening story. Imagine that your group was the one he used to attend, and now he has asked to come back and join you again. Take a few minutes to discuss what you should do. What tensions would you need to overcome, and what realities would you likely face in loving Jake with both grace and truth?

3. HOW CAN YOU STRENGTHEN BIBLICAL COMMUNITY?

In your small group, answer these questions together:

- 1. When was the last time someone spoke a hard truth into your life or the life of another community member? Was it done in love?
- 2. When was the last time you confessed sin or failures, or shared fears or frustrations, with a safe person in this community?
- 3. When was the last time you prayed with someone in the community over needs or decisions?
- 4. When was the last time someone in this community visited you in the hospital, or brought over a meal when you were sick, or met another tangible need?
- 5. When was the last time a homeless person or someone who was deeply broken was brought into this community and made whole?

Creating and living in community requires people to give up a great deal – time, freedom to do as they like, some privacy, and the desire to protect themselves from being hurt by others. Community is a messy thing, but it is also one of the primary ways God communicates His love to us and to the world.

CHAPTER 3 RESTORING BROKEN RELATIONSHIPS



For years Carlos smothered under a ton of hurt that his older brothers had heaped on him. Long ago he decided to protect his heart by refusing to forgive them. Carlos went silent with his pain and avoided the stirrings in his heart regarding his unforgiveness, growing resentment, and simmering anger. Shutting his brothers out of his life was his way of getting even. Now, as a grown man, frankly, it just exhausted him.

Then he was confronted with the words of Jesus in Matthew 6:14-16: "For if you forgive men for their transgressions, your heavenly Father will also forgive you. But if you do not forgive men, then your Father will not forgive your transgressions." That really raised the stakes for Carlos. Disobeying his heavenly Father by withholding forgiveness from his brothers . . . well, that seemed like a lose-lose scenario. But if he broke his silence and tried to reconnect, wasn't he just setting himself up for more rejection?

While he struggled with this, Carlos felt something inside him begin to break. He just didn't want his resentment to control him anymore. How could he begin to forgive them, yet set boundaries with his brothers? Maybe this personal breaking was the strange first step toward restoration. The risk of further pain from his brothers seemed like a small thing compared to rejecting forgiveness from his heavenly Father.

If you were in Carlos's situation, what would you do?

PAUSE 1_EXPLORING WHAT GOD SAYS

Loving one another is a wonderful ideal — until something goes wrong. Paul advised the believers in Rome to blend hope with realism when he wrote: "If it is possible, as far as it depends on you, live at peace with everyone" (Romans 12:18). Frankly, peace and restored trust aren't always possible. But this chapter will help you explore your part in healing broken relationships.

This chapter will highlight ways of handling conflicts and a process of restoring relationships. (The CONNECT study *SOUL: Embracing My Sexuality and Emotions* addresses trusting God for healing of deep wounding.) As you work through this chapter, ask God to show you your next step in healing this broken relationship.

God's Word says a lot about the causes of broken relationships. As you meditate on this passage, highlight or circle anything you notice that may be <u>contributing to the conflict</u> you just mentioned.

EPHESIANS 4:25-32. Therefore each of you must put off falsehood and speak truthfully to his neighbor, for we are all members of one body. "In your anger do not sin." Do not let the sun go down while you are still angry, and do not give the devil a foothold. He who has been stealing must steal no longer, but must work, doing something useful with his own hands, that he may have something to share with those in need. Do not let any unwholesome talk come out of your mouths, but only what is helpful for building others up according to their needs, that it may benefit those who listen. And do not grieve the Holy Spirit of God, with whom you were sealed for the day of redemption. Get rid of all bitterness, rage and anger, brawling and slander, along with every form of malice. Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as in Christ God forgave you.

Has this passage identified something you've done to add fuel to the conflict? If so, explain.

EXAMPLE: I was really bad-mouthing Matt to my girlfriend last night ("unwholesome talk" — verse 29). He didn't hear it, but it just reinforced my own bad attitude.

WHO MAKES THE FIRST MOVE?

According to these verses, resolving conflict involves admitting that we've offended someone – or someone has offended us.

MATTHEW 5:23. If you enter your place of worship and, about to make an offering, you suddenly remember a grudge a friend has against you, abandon your offering, leave immediately, go to this friend and make things right. Then and only then, come back and work things out with God. (MSG)

MATTHEW 18:15-16. If your brother sins against you, go and show him his fault, just between the two of you. If he listens to you, you have won your brother over. But if he will not listen, take one or two others along, so that "every matter may be established by the testimony of two or three witnesses."

According to these verses, who needs to make the first move in a conflict – the offender or the one who was offended? Why?

RESTORATION IS A PROCESS

Forgiveness is simply choosing to do the right thing. It heals instead of hurts, restores broken relationships, and substitutes love where there was hate.

Restoring broken relationships involves authentically facing anger, hurts, and bitterness, and then moving to forgiveness, repentance, reconciliation, trust, and restoration. Match the terms on the left with their definitions on the right. (All definitions are from *American Heritage Dictionary*. Answers are at the end of Pause 1.)

Forgiveness doesn't depend on others; it can be just between you and God if the other person is unwilling. When others show repentance, reconciliation can begin. Then if they earn trust, restoration can begin. Sometimes trust will never be restored.

Is there someone you need to forgive who doesn't see a reason (or is unwilling) to ask for forgiveness? *Explain*.

Reconciliation involves two. Do not think that because you have forgiven that you have to reconcile. You can offer reconciliation, but it must be contingent upon the other person owning her behavior and bringing forth trustworthy fruits.

What might be in it for you to forgive someone who isn't sorry or who hasn't asked for forgiveness yet?

CAJE JTUDY: JOJEPH AND HIJ BROTHERJ

BACKGROUND

About 3,700 years ago, Joseph (like Carlos in the opening story) struggled with forgiving his brothers for years of rejection and injustice. They even sold him into slavery and he ended up in prison. That's where he was when the Egyptian authorities spotted him and eventually raised him to a place of power and influence in Egypt – second only to the Pharaoh! When a terrible famine struck, God used Joseph's gifts to save the lives of millions of Egyptians, as well as his entire Jewish family. Joseph could easily have used his power to get even with his cruel brothers. But he refused to allow injustice to turn him into a bitter person. Instead, he worked through his issues and – in his mature years – forgave his brothers. (If you want to read more of the story of Joseph, see Genesis chapters 37; 39–50.)

Read GENESIS 50:15-21. Why do you think Joseph cried so much (mentioned at least seven times in the full story)?

In the process of forgiveness, the people involved aren't always at the same point at the same time. One may be ready to be restored while the other is still struggling to trust. At this point in the story above (Genesis 50), where do you think Joseph was in the process of forgiveness?

Where do you see his brothers in the process?

What perspective helped Joseph overcome the pains of injustice at the hands of his brothers (verse 20)?

Over time, have you ever experienced God's goodness come out of an experience of suffering or conflict? *Explain*.

God calls His children to a countercultural lifestyle of forgiveness in a world that demands an eye for an eye – and worse. But if loving God is the first commandment, and loving our neighbor proves our love for God, and if it is easy to love those who love us, then loving our enemies must be the filial badge that identifies Abba's children. Only reckless confidence in a Source greater than ourselves can empower us to forgive the wounds inflicted by others.

PAUJE 3_COMING ALIVE TO GOD AND OTHERS

It is the tension between God's justice and mercy that makes God so capable of dealing with wrongdoers. God is able to punish people without destroying them, and to forgive people without indulging them. . . . Mercy does not abrogate justice; it transcends it.

OTHER

We humans can be strangely inconsistent. When I hurt you, I want to receive mercy. But when you hurt me, I want you to get justice for it — not mercy! Jesus came to bring both, restoring us to the Father. In Jesus' kingdom, mercy overcomes judgment and thus satisfies the demand for justice — just as it did at the cross.

In chapter 1 you explored the principle that we love because He first loved us (1 John 4:19). What similar principle does Jesus' parable here reveal about mercy (verse 33)?

Though forgiveness appears to contradict what seems fair and right, forgiving people decide that they would rather live in a merciful universe than in a fair one, for their sake as much as for anyone else's.

Which would you rather live in: a world that's merciful, or a world that's fair? Explain.

When we are in conflict, it is natural to want justice and to feel angry. Ecclesiastes 3:8 says, "There is a time to love and a time to hate." Sometimes as we awaken from emotional numbness into the forgiveness process, we need a season to hate the wrong done to us. But we can't stay there forever. If we get stuck in our demand for justice, we are in danger of becoming bitter.

JAMES 2:12-13. So whatever you say or whatever you do, remember that you will be judged by the law that sets you free. There will be no mercy for those who have not shown mercy to others. But if you have been merciful, God will be merciful when he judges you. (NLT)

Why does mercy win out over judgment?

Huge on God's agenda for us is to "overcome evil with good" (Romans 12:21) – especially with our enemies. Mark ways we can do that.

ROMANS 12:17-20. Never pay back evil with more evil. Do things in such a way that everyone can see you are honorable. Do all that you can to live in peace with everyone. Dear friends, never take revenge. Leave that to the righteous anger of God. For the Scriptures say, "I will take revenge; I will pay them back," says the LORD. Instead,

"If your enemies are hungry, feed them. If they are thirsty, give them something to drink. In doing this, you will heap burning coals of shame on their heads." (NLT)

Is there anyone in your daily life who might be your personal "enemy" (i.e. attitude of hostility)?

A cultural or historical enemy feels hostility toward you because you represent a group he finds offensive, not necessarily because of anything you have done to him personally.

Who might consider you (or people like you) as a cultural/historical enemy?

What historical/cultural enemies might you have?

What might it look like in practical ways for you to "do good" to an enemy of yours?



PRAYER PAUSE

As you pray, ask God to reveal any anger, bitterness, fear, or numbness in your heart toward someone who has hurt you. Stay in prayer awhile. Ask Him to show you the next step in your journey of forgiveness, healing, and restoration of relationships.

When forgiveness seems impossible, we can remember this: Jesus Christ lives in us, and he can do what we cannot. As so we cling to the promise, "With God all things are possible."

Instead, be kind to each other, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, just as God through Christ has forgiven you.

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DIGGING DEEPER: PATHWAYS TO RESTORATION

Most of our conflicts aren't as devastating as Joseph's (Pause 1), but they still hurt. Here are some communication pathways to try when you're resolving an ordinary, everyday conflict before it seriously damages the relationship.

PATHWAY ONE: Recognize and put words to your hurts. Sometimes we stuff our anger when we've been hurt; at other times, we just go numb. But buried hurts are buried alive! So put words to your hurt: "I feel abandoned by her because she . . ." or "I feel betrayed because he . . ."

PATHWAY TWO: Talk to God about your hurts. Sometimes we forget that God listens to the cries of our hearts and understands our pain. His presence can comfort us if we will go to Him honestly with our hurts. The Holy Spirit is our Comforter (John 15:26). Ask the Holy Spirit to comfort your heart in regard to these specific hurts.

PATHWAY THREE: Seek outside counsel or mediation. At any point in the process of relational restoration, consider asking for help. Deeper conflicts and more serious hurts may need the help of trusted others to come alongside. Gifted people within the body of Christ can help during these conflicts.

PATHWAY FOUR: Embrace the ways of Jesus in broken relationships. Jesus came to heal the broken relationship between God and humanity. He came in amazing humility and offered us mercy and forgiveness — again and again and again. Embracing the way of Jesus means humbling ourselves enough to offer mercy and forgiveness to those who hurt us, whether they ask for it or not.

PATHWAY FIVE: Take the initiative to talk to the person face-to-face. Avoid the gossip trail along with complaining to others. Take the initiative by making the first move to open up a conversation about your issue, regardless of whose "fault" it seems to be. If possible, talk face-to-face.

PATHWAY SIX: Declare the importance of the relationship. The relationship should be more important to you than getting your way or getting justice or proving who's right. Tell the other person that "Our relationship is very important to me, and I don't want this temporary problem to get between us."

PATHWAY SEVEN: Seek to resolve hurts before solving the problem. Before you try to resolve the problem or issue that caused the conflict, discuss the pain you feel. For instance, instead of saying, "I think you were wrong to take money from me without asking," you

could say, "When you took money from me without asking, I felt like you violated my space. I felt betrayed." That lets you begin the discussion about relational trust before you get to personal property rights. Expect both of you to have hurts because one's reaction to the problem may have hurt the other. After admitting hurts, apologize and ask for forgiveness. Accept one another's apologies, and speak words of forgiveness.

PATHWAY EIGHT: Talk about the problem and seek a generic solution. Now you're ready to discuss the initial problem. One way is to ask, "How will we handle this in the future?" Keep the conversation open until you come up with an approach that works for both of you.

PATHWAY NINE: Pray and do something together. If possible, pray together. Thank God for each other. Ask God to forgive you. Do something together soon that you would normally do (like go out for pizza) to rebuild a sense of openness and trust between you.



CHAPTER 4 LOVING WITHIN FAMILIES



Families today are very diverse and may look very different: traditional, blended, biracial, foster, gay, group home, hotel, etc. Read the following statistics about families in the United States since 2000. Check one statistic that surprises you.

Over your lifespan, you'll probably be a part of several different families (such as your childhood family, a foster or group home, your spouse and in-laws, etc.). You may have come from a close-knit, nurturing, healthy family. On the other hand, you may not even consider the people you are living with as "family." Since we live on a fallen planet, every family has dysfunctions, which can leave us with feelings of disappointment (or worse) over how we were raised. But God can use the family you are in for good, no matter how flawed it may be. Living in and loving well within our families is a significant part of our lifelong journey and process of spiritual transformation.

What do you think are some of the purposes and benefits of being in a family?

PAUSE 1_EXPLORING WHAT GOD SAYS

In this chapter you will look at the relationships between parents and children, and between husbands and wives. These foundational relationships affect every other relationship in life.

From these passages, mark whatever you notice about healthy parent-child relationships.



EPHESIANS 6:1-4. Children, obey your parents in the Lord [as His representatives], for this is just and right. Honor (esteem and value as precious) your

father and your mother — this is the first commandment with a promise — that all may be well with you and that you may live long on the earth. Fathers, do not irritate and provoke your children to anger [do not exasperate them to resentment], but rear them [tenderly] in the training and discipline and the counsel and admonition of the Lord. (AMP)

1 TIMOTHY 5:3-4. Give proper recognition to [take care of -MSG] those widows who are really in need. But if a widow has children or grandchildren, these should learn first of all to put their religion into practice by caring for their own family and so repaying their parents and grandparents, for this is pleasing to God.

What do they have to say to parents?

God commands us to honor our parents regardless of their performance, behavior, or dysfunction. Why? Because honoring parents demands that we live by faith — we have to trust God in His sovereign wisdom will use our parents to help shape us into the people He wants us to be. . . . Honoring your parents does not mean endorsing irresponsibility or sin. It is not a denial of what your parents have done wrong. Honoring your parents is an attitude accompanied by actions that says to your parents: "You are worthy. You have value. You are the person God sovereignly placed in my life. You may have failed me, hurt me, and disappointed me at times, but I am taking off my judicial robe and releasing you from the courtroom of my mind. I choose to look at you with compassion — as people with needs, concerns, and scars of your own."

CAJE JTUDY: THE FAMILIES OF DAVID

Maybe you've studied about David before – the glorious king of Israel, leader of mighty men, writer of psalms, and a "man after God's own heart." The Bible shows that he finished his life as an influential man deeply connected with God. But have you ever taken a look at his various families – the one he grew up in, the stepfamily he was "adopted" into, or the one he raised with his different wives? It makes your heart break, and proves that dysfunctional families



have been around for thousands of years! As you read the story of David and his imperfect family life, meditate on how God still chose to work out His plan in the midst of this extended family's brokenness.

SCENE 1: The family David was raised in

READ 1 SAMUEL 16:1-13 and 1 SAMUEL 17:28-31.

David was anointed by Samuel to be the future king of Israel (verse 13). How do you think that might have affected his relationship with his family?

What rejection and abandonment do you think David may have experienced in his younger years from his father and older brothers?

How (if at all) can you identify emotionally with this part of David's family life?

SCENE 2: The family David was "adopted" into

READ 1 SAMUEL 16:14-23 and 1 SAMUEL 18:1-12,27-29.

King Saul invited David as a young man to live in his house, first as a musician, then as his personal armor-bearer, and eventually as his son-in-law. How did David experience additional rejection and abuse from Saul?

How was Jonathan a better brother to David than his own natural brothers?

How (if at all) can you identify emotionally with this part of David's family life?

PAUSE 2_EXPLORING YOUR REALITY

Today I wonder why it is God refers to Himself as "Father" at all. This, to me, in light of the earthly representation of the role, seems a marketing mistake. Why would God want to call Himself Father when so many fathers abandon their children? As a child, the title Father God offered an ambiguous haze with which to interact. I understood what a father did as well as I understood the task of a shepherd. All the vocabulary about God seemed to come from ancient history, before video games, palm pilots, and the internet.

PSALM 68:5-6. A father to the fatherless, a defender of widows, is God in his holy dwelling. God sets the lonely in families.



PRAYER PAUSE

Spend time talking with God about the family and relatives He has given you. Listen to what He is saying to you about your relationship with your family; be aware of what your heart is experiencing. Ask God to draw them deeply into His love for them.

Also pray for your kids (present and future, spiritual and physical), future spouses for your kids, and your grandkids, even if they don't exist yet. Talk with God about your hope and desire to raise families and generations who will honor Him and have a heart to serve Him.

As you begin to see and understand the missing element in the [parenting] you received, your responsibility is to grieve and forgive so that you may be healed of whatever your [parents] might have done wrong. Then, as you see and take responsibility for your side of the problem, you will be able to receive what you did not get, gain control, and change those areas where life has not worked for you thus far. In this twofold process of forgiveness and responsibility, you will find unlimited growth.

Pray about what kind of parent you are now – or would like to become some day. If you had a broken or absent family, take time to grieve and forgive. Also ask God to put others in your life to meet the needs your family was unable to meet.

PAUSE 3_COMING ALIVE TO GOD AND OTHERS

In addition to the parent-child relationship, the husband-wife relationship³ is at the core of family life. So where does marriage fit in your personal journey? Have you already found your life partner, or are you still looking? Some of us live in a fantasy world, convinced that our dream partner will banish our loneliness forever. Others have given up on marriage or have settled for the practical benefits (sex or financial security) rather than hoping for love and deep friendship in marriage. Wherever you are now, the Bible portrays a fulfilling marriage (along with contented singleness) as real possibilities in God's family.



MARRIAGE

EPHESIANS 5:21,25-33. Be subject to one another out of reverence for Christ (the Messiah, the Anointed One). (AMP) . . .

Husbands, love your wives, just as Christ loved the church and gave himself up for her to make her holy, cleansing her by the washing with water through the word, and to present her to himself as a radiant church, without stain or wrinkle or any other blemish, but holy and blameless. In this same way, husbands ought to love their wives as their own bodies. He who loves his wife loves himself. After all, no one ever hated his own body, but he feeds and cares for it, just as Christ does the church – for we are members of his body. "For this reason a man will leave his father and mother and be united to his wife, and the two will become one flesh." This is a profound mystery – but I am talking about Christ and the church. (NIV) However, let each man of you [without exception] love his wife as [being in a sense] his very own self. (AMP)

1 PETER 3:7. In the same way, you husbands must give honor to your wives. Treat your wife with understanding as you live together. She may be weaker than you are, but she is your equal partner in God's gift of new life. Treat her as you should so your prayers will not be hindered. (NLT)

For the husband is the head of the wife as Christ is the head of the church, his body, of which he is the Savior. Now as the church submits to Christ, so also wives should submit to their husbands in everything. (NIV) . . . Let the wife see that she respects and reverences her husband [that she notices him, regards him, honors him, prefers him, venerates and esteems him; and that she defers to him, praises him, and loves and admires him exceedingly]. (AMP)

1 PETER 3:1-4. In the same way, you wives must accept the authority of your husbands. Then, even if some refuse to obey the Good News, your godly lives will speak to them without any words. They will be won over by observing your pure and reverent lives. Don't be concerned about the outward beauty of fancy hairstyles, expensive jewelry, or beautiful clothes. You should clothe yourselves instead with the beauty that comes from within, the unfading beauty of a gentle and quiet spirit [unanxious or unintimidated – MSG], which is so precious to God. (NLT)

DIVORCE

The sad reality is that more than half of American couples will probably end up getting divorced. Sometimes it's easier to change our spouses than to change ourselves. Whether or not you are currently married, you are being influenced by the marriages – and the divorces – happening around you.

How has divorce (experienced directly or indirectly) affected you?

MALACHI 2:14-16. You cry out, "Why doesn't the LORD accept my worship?" I'll tell you why! Because the LORD witnessed the vows you and your wife made when you were young. But you have been unfaithful to her, though she remained your faithful partner, the wife of your marriage vows.

Didn't the LORD make you one with your wife? In body and spirit you are his. And what does he want? Godly children from your union. So guard your heart; remain loyal to the wife of your youth. "For I hate divorce!" says the LORD, the God of Israel. "To divorce your wife is to overwhelm her with cruelty," says the LORD of Heaven's Armies. (NLT)

MATTHEW 19:3-12. Some Pharisees came and tried to trap him with this question: "Should a man be allowed to divorce his wife for just any reason?"

"Haven't you read the Scriptures?" Jesus replied. "They record that from the beginning 'God made them male and female.' And he said, 'This explains why a man leaves his father and mother and is joined to his wife, and the two are united into one.' Since they are no longer two but one, let no one split apart what God has joined together."

"Then why did Moses say in the law that a man could give his wife a written notice of divorce and send her away?" they asked.

Jesus replied, "Moses permitted divorce only as a concession to your hard hearts, but it was not what God had originally intended. And I tell you this, whoever divorces his wife and marries someone else commits adultery – unless his wife has been unfaithful."

Jesus' disciples then said to him, "If this is the case, it is better not to marry!"

"Not everyone can accept this statement," Jesus said. "Only those whom God helps. Some are born as eunuchs, some have been made eunuchs by others, and some choose not to marry for the sake of the Kingdom of Heaven. Let anyone accept this who can." (NLT)

MARRIAGE	DIVORCE



CHAPTER 5 LOVING FRIENDS



Jessica has a lot of friends. People greet her everywhere she goes — work, her apartment building, church, and even the grocery store. She gets so many calls on her cell phone that she assigned a different ring tone for each circle of friends. These circles of friends have become family for Jessica. After work hours they gather at a coffee shop. Talk is good. This is what life is really about. Friends.

But when she gets home – especially at night – she still feels unknown and lonely. Usually Jessica appreciates her friends. But every once in a while the inevitable happens: someone breaks a confidence and shares private information with someone else. This always plays out badly. People find out. People get hurt. Revenge sometimes occurs.

Jessica doesn't know who to trust and who not to trust. So she tends to keep everybody at a safe distance from what's really going on in her life. Friends and friendships are very important to Jessica, but she doesn't really feel "known." She wonders if others feel this way too. Secretly Jessica desires a few close friends but is afraid it might not be worth the risk.

At one point Jesus tells His disciples, "I no longer call you servants, because a servant does not know his master's business. Instead, I have called you friends, for everything that I learned from my Father I have made known to you" (John 15:15). Jesus was interested in sustaining His friends more than He was in promoting Himself.

PAUSE 1_EXPLORING WHAT GOD SAYS

In our fast-paced society, many of us are in contact with lots of people through e-mail, in the classroom, at the fitness center, at work, at church, and in our neighborhoods. Maybe you're lucky enough to be blessed with several good friends. But the reality for many of us is that we're busy – but still lonely. We're active – but not really known. We're in constant contact with people, but we may not feel very connected. Many of us long for a sense of being known in community with others. Building deep friendships



takes time, work, and energy. But good friends are among God's most wonderful gifts and life's greatest treasures.

In these verses, circle or highlight what you learn about the value of friends.

HEBREWS 10:24-25. And let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds. Let us not give up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but let us encourage one another — and all the more as you see the Day approaching.

ECCLESIASTES 4:9-12. Two are better than one, because they have a good return for their work: If one falls down, his friend can help him up. But pity the man who falls and has no one to help him up! Also, if two lie down together, they will keep warm. But how can one keep warm alone? Though one may be overpowered, two can defend themselves. A cord of three strands is not quickly broken.

PROVERBS 27:17. As iron sharpens iron, so a friend sharpens a friend. (NLT)

Everyone needs some good friends. But some "friends" aren't really good friends. If you want to know how to choose a good, trustworthy, safe friend — and how to be such a friend — the book of Proverbs is packed with wisdom about expressing love in practical ways, especially to friends. Study the verses in the following chart.

PAUJE 3_COMING ALIVE TO GOD AND OTHERS

BACKGROUND

David's closest friend was Jonathan, the first-born son and heir apparent to King Saul of Israel. Jonathan knew, however, that David was God's choice as the future king, not Jonathan. Despite Saul's insecurities and murderous plots against David, the two friends remained loyally committed to each other through years of testing. They show us what it means to trust each other with themselves.

CAJE JTUDY IN FRIENDJHIP: DAVID AND JONATHAN

In the last chapter, we studied the not-so-perfect family life of David. Despite the pain in David's various families and relational networks, he was blessed with many quality friends whose influence on him contributed greatly to his being "a man after God's heart."

JCENE 4: Encouraging and Affirming a Friend

1 SAMUEL 23:16-18. Jonathan, Saul's son, visited David at Horesh and encouraged him [strengthened his hand — RSV] in God. He said, "Don't despair. My father, Saul, can't lay a hand on you. You will be Israel's king and I'll be right at your side to help. And my father knows it." Then the two of them made a covenant before God. David stayed at Horesh and Jonathan went home. (MSG)

Your observations about encouraging and affirming a friend:

When was a time someone encouraged you to remember God's promises for your life?

[May] God make us all His Jonathans. . . . Notice what [Jonathan] does: he does not so comfort David that he becomes necessary to him. "He strengthened his hand in God." He leaves his friend strong in God, resting in God, safe in God. He [separates] his dear David from himself and attaches him to God. . . . If David had leaned on Jonathan, if Jonathan had made himself necessary to David, David would not have learned to lean on his Rock and proved the glorious strength of his Rock; his whole life would have been lived on a lower level. . . . So let us not weaken those whom we love with weak sympathy, but let us love them enough to [separate] them from ourselves and strengthen their hands in God.



DEEPENING FRIENDSHIPS

AFFIRMING ONE ANOTHER

One way to deepen friendship is to affirm what is good and true about each other. It is important to affirm your friends' character and who they are, not just what they do. In your discussion group, choose one of the following ways to do that:

- IN WRITING: Each group member writes his/her own name at the bottom of a sheet of paper. Pass it to the right. Then take a few minutes to write 2-3 sentences at the top, affirming the person whose name is on the sheet — such as what you like or appreciate, strengths, etc. When you are done, fold the paper over to cover your comments, leaving the person's name exposed at the bottom. Pass the sheets around until everyone has written something affirming or encouraging about everyone else.
- IN THE WHOLE GROUP: All group members will share what they appreciate about one group member. Then take turns until everyone has affirmed everyone else. Ask one person in the group to take notes on what is affirmed, so each person can take away a record of this time of affirmation.
- 3. IN PAIRS: One way is to break into pairs and share.

DOING ACTIVITIES AND SERVING TOGETHER

Friendships often are developed by doing favorite activities together, such as music or sports. Who can you invite to join you in an activity this week?

Serving together is another way to deepen friendships and experience life on a different level. For example, you might serve meals to the homeless, visit the elderly, work on a home building project, or take action on a global issue. How could you and some friends or your group serve others together?



Most men don't have friendships beyond a surface level. What's worse is they don't know how to deepen them. . . . Men are more inclined to find the added significance a friend provides in pursuits such as business, politics or sports.

MAHING LIFE CHANGES TOGETHER

Another way to deepen friendships is to accomplish purposeful life changes together. To get started:

- Think about the future . . . share your dreams or ambitions.
- Think about life today . . . share a significant change you would like to make during the next six months (perhaps develop more friendships, date more frequently, lose weight, change jobs, seek God in a new way, restore a relationship).
- Share what you will start doing or do differently in order to reach your goals.
- Share what obstacles might prevent you from being successful in making these changes.
- Believe God together. Ask the Holy Spirit to empower you as you seek to change.
- Decide how your friends can support you and how you will stay connected in the next six months.

Consider choosing one of the above activities and come prepared to tell your group about it next week.

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CHAPTER 6 LOVING PEOPLE DIFFERENT FROM ME



When Tina first met the new family on the block, she couldn't figure them out. First there was Terrell, about twenty, probably biracial, with some pretty wild tattoos and body-piercing. Then there was an old lady — an old white lady. She kinda shuffled around with her walker and seemed confused most of the time, and she was obsessive about all her cats. From such different worlds, Tina wondered how those two could possibly connect?

Then one day Tina stopped by their house to return one of the cats that had crept into her garage. The living room was crammed with pictures of Terrell as a baby, as a child, as a teenager. The old lady smiled sweetly and said, "You've met my grandson Terrell, haven't you? He's such a great help to me with his mom in a treatment center, and his dad, well, he's not around. It's just the two of us. But somehow the good Lord helps us get through each day."

That explained the affection she saw between them. Those two were separated by age and race and a dozen other differences. But somehow love brought them together.

When was a time that you were loved by (or had a positive experience with) someone different from you – someone who loved you through your differences?

What happened in your lives as a result?

We've probably all said or felt it sometime or other. *They* are different. *They* are inferior. *They* act superior. *They* have too much power. Whatever words we use, it all usually boils down to *they* are not like *me*. The telltale pronoun of intolerance is *they*. How much hurt has been caused in this world because we have trouble getting along with people different from ourselves? People different from us in nationality, in race or ethnic group, in gender, in social or financial standing, in religion — in a hundred other ways. But what if we changed the pronoun to *we*? We are different. We are not like each other — and that is good. We come in lots of different flavors — and those differences can enrich us all instead of divide us. Or better yet — "I am different — just as we all are!"

When we love people who are different from us, we're taking a risk — just as Jesus took a huge risk when He lived among, loved, and died for people who were so different from Him. Like Jesus, we're called to move from harmless indifference into intentional engagement. That never happens without setting aside pride and embracing humility. In this journey of loving the diverse people around us, Jesus is our model. In this chapter we'll take a look at how Jesus loved others — especially those different from Him.

How I treat my brothers and sisters from day to day, whether they are Caucasian, African, Asian, or Hispanic; how I react to the sin-scarred wino on the street; how I respond to interruptions from people I dislike; how I deal with ordinary people in their ordinary unbelief on an ordinary day will speak the truth of who I am more poignantly than the pro-life sticker on the bumper of my car.

PAUSE 1_EXPLORING WHAT GOD SAYS

CELEBRATING DIVERJITY IN HEAVEN

Have you ever taken a diversity seminar on campus or at your workplace? Whatever reasons were presented for celebrating diversity, here's an even better one. In heaven there won't be any hostility between different races or ethnic groups or between the poor and the rich. Picture this scene from heaven as shown to John in a vision:

REVELATION 7:9-10,16-17. After this I looked and there before me was a great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, tribe, people and language, standing before the throne and in front of the Lamb. They were wearing white robes and were holding palm branches in their hands. And they cried out in a loud voice:

"Salvation belongs to our God, who sits on the throne, and to the Lamb." ...



Never again will they hunger; never again will they thirst. The sun will not beat upon them, nor any scorching heat. For the Lamb at the center of the throne will be their shepherd; he will lead them to springs of living water. And God will wipe away every tear from their eyes.

Who will be in the crowd worshipping before the throne of Christ in heaven?

What has the Lamb promised to do for them?

That is the picture God has given us of what it will be like in heaven. So how do you think God feels about the diversity among human beings on earth? How do you feel?

JEJUJ AND THE LEPER

Jesus came to reconcile God and humanity and bring us into His Father's kingdom. And He also came to reconcile people separated by all kinds of barriers. He came so we might truly "love others as ourselves" regardless of race, religion, or any other difference. In Jesus' society, as in ours, some people were considered "different" from the rest. Notice how in each case, people knew they were loved because Jesus' compassion gave them dignity.

HISTORICAL BACKGROUND ON LEPERS

In Bible times the various diseases called "leprosy" were greatly feared and highly contagious. The worst form slowly ruined the body and, in most cases, was fatal. Religious law required lepers to live away from their families and friends, outside the towns, because they were considered "unclean" – and therefore unfit to participate in religious or social activities. People believed they would become unclean if they touched a leper, so some people threw rocks at lepers to keep them at a safe distance. Rabbis and priests were especially careful to avoid lepers, or else they couldn't perform their religious duties. (Adapted from The Application Bible, World Bible Publishers, Inc., 1988.)

Read MARK 1:40-45 about one of Jesus' encounters with a person suffering from leprosy. What did Jesus do in response to the leper's request?

How do you think Jesus' compassion made the leper feel?

What do you think it cost Jesus to love this social "outsider" (verse 45)?



Sometimes lepers were considered as "outcasts" and "untouchables." Although it varies from place to place, every society still has its social outcasts. Maybe today it's the disabled, the AIDS victims, the homeless, or immigrants.

JEJUJ AND THE JAMARITAN WOMAN

HISTORICAL BACKGROUND

The Samaritans were a racially mixed society – what we might call "half-breeds." The religion they practiced was also considered pagan. By the time of Christ, most Jews despised Samaritans and excluded them from their homes and religious activities. To avoid being "contaminated" by contact with Samaritans, Jews used to go miles out of their way rather than travel through Samaria. The typical Jewish man's attitude toward women back then wasn't much better than his attitude toward Samaritans. He probably started the day thanking God that he wasn't created a Gentile, a slave, or a woman!

Read JOHN 4:27-30,34-42. It reveals how Jesus loved someone different from Him in race, ethnic background, religion, gender, social status, and of questionable character.

Both the woman (verse 9) and the disciples (verse 27) were astonished that Jesus was having a conversation with her. How do you think Jesus was able to overcome the cultural taboo against a Jewish man associating with a Samaritan, a woman, and an adulterer?

Remember that *you* are *they* to somebody – you make them uncomfortable because you're different. Has anyone ever treated you like an "outcast" or "untouchable" or a "Samaritan woman"? *Explain*.

PRAYER PAUSE

Can you remember a time when you were hurt or marginalized as a result of being different from others? Or a time when you may have hurt or marginalized someone else because they were different from you? In either case, pause to talk it over with God. Allow God's mercy and grace to be with you in that place. Journal your prayer time here . . .



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PAUSE 2_EXPLORING YOUR REALITY

In Jesus' daily reality, there was serious religious and cultural hostility dividing the Jews and the Gentiles (non-Jews). Jesus came to break down "[destroy, abolish] the hostile dividing wall" between them (Ephesians 2:14, AMP).

EPHESIANS 2:14. For He is [Himself] our peace (our bond of unity and harmony). He has made us both [Jew and Gentile] one [body], and has broken down (destroyed, abolished) the hostile dividing wall between us. (AMP)

By placing His kingdom in our hands, Jesus calls us to do the same thing: break down whatever walls of hostility are dividing people around the world and in our neighborhoods. Take a few minutes to think of groups of people around the world who are currently (or were historically) divided by walls of hostility. Write them on opposite sides of this wall.

GOD'J HEART FOR THE POOR

There is one group of people that God seems to have special compassion for — the poor and oppressed. There are more than 175 passages in the Bible regarding the poor. He wants us to partner with Him by helping those poorer than we are in material resources. As you read these passages:

- For each passage, <u>write in the margin</u> one practical way you could put it into practice.

LEVITICUS 23:22. When you reap the harvest of your land, do not reap to the very edges of your field or gather the gleanings of your harvest. Leave them for the poor and the alien. I am the LORD your God.

PSALM 82:3-4. Give justice to the poor and the orphan; uphold the rights of the oppressed and the destitute. Rescue the poor and helpless; deliver them from the grasp of evil people. (NLT)

LUKE 6:38. Give, and it will be given to you. A good measure, pressed down, shaken together and running over, will be poured into your lap. For with the measure you use, it will be measured to you.

Is not this the kind of fasting I have chosen: to loose the chains of injustice and untie the cords of the yoke, to set the oppressed free and break every yoke? Is it not to share your food with the hungry and to provide the poor wanderer with shelter — when you see the naked, to clothe him, and not to turn away from your own flesh and blood? . . . And if you spend yourselves in behalf of the hungry and satisfy the needs of the oppressed, then your light will rise in the darkness, and your night will become like the noonday.

Have you seen or experienced anything that has made you sensitive to poverty or to social or racial injustice in the world? *Explain*.

What opportunities have you had or what work have you done to express your practical desire for mercy and justice? How were you blessed?

As you read this passage, imagine how it would feel to be treated like the poor person.

JAMES 2:1-4. My dear brothers and sisters, how can you claim to have faith in our glorious Lord Jesus Christ if you favor some people over others? For example, suppose someone comes into your meeting dressed in fancy clothes and expensive jewelry, and another comes in who is poor and dressed in dirty clothes. If you give special attention and a good seat to the rich person, but you say to the poor one, "You can stand over there, or else sit on the floor" — well, doesn't this discrimination show that your judgments are guided by evil motives? (NLT)

Think of a time when you did not receive "the good seat." How would or does it feel to live your life being discriminated against?

If you see someone being treated with discrimination, what are your options for responding?

Do we look at the poor with compassion? They are hungry not only for food, they are hungry to be recognized as human beings. They are hungry for dignity and to be treated as we are treated. They are hungry for our love. — MOTHER TERESA, A SIMPLE PATH

Consider these verses on the pros and cons of wealth and poverty.

JAMES 2:5. Listen, my dear brothers: Has not God chosen those who are poor in the eyes of the world to be rich in faith and to inherit the kingdom he promised those who love him?

REVELATION 3:17. You say, "I am rich; I have acquired wealth and do not need a thing." But you do not realize that you are wretched, pitiful, poor, blind and naked.

What do the "rich" need from others that money can't buy? What riches do the "poor" have to offer?

When we help the poor and oppressed, how might we also be "overcoming evil with good" (Romans 12:21) and revealing God's love?



APPLICATION OPPORTUNITY

Respecting the dignity of every individual through love involves coming alongside them to communicate support, confidence, and respect – all of which opens up important new relationships.

Ask God if, why, and how you should come alongside someone who is different from you with practical love and assistance. Then write down your first step of action.

EPHESIANS 2:14-19. For Christ himself has brought peace to us. He united Jews and Gentiles into one people when, in his own body on the cross, he broke down the wall of hostility that separated us. He did this by ending the system of law with its commandments and regulations. He made peace between Jews and Gentiles by creating in himself one new people from the two groups. Together as one body, Christ

reconciled both groups to God by means of his death on the cross, and our hostility toward each other was put to death. He brought this Good News of peace to you Gentiles who were far away from him, and peace to the Jews who were near. Now all of us can come to the Father through the same Holy Spirit because of what Christ has done for us. So now you Gentiles are no longer strangers and foreigners. You are citizens along with all of God's holy people. You are members of God's family. (NLT)

From these passages, what did Jesus do to "[kill] the mutual enmity and [bring] the feud to an end" (Ephesians 2:16, AMP) among people separated and hostile because of their differences?

How has this study motivated you to respect and celebrate diversity and move forward in relationships with people who are different from you?

CHAPTER 7 REJIJTING JATAN



It's been happening more and more often to Blaine. All those accusing, shaming thoughts that go through his head. Sure, he's made some mistakes with girls. But the voices inside keep telling him what a loser he is and how he'll never have what it takes to be a real man. Going to the porn sites on the Internet makes him feel better . . . until the shame starts all over again. His mother is so worried about his withdrawal from dating that she went to see an astrologer about him.

Blaine's friends bugged him to go to that video room with them again. Even though it makes him feel like one of the guys, the games they like to play creep him out — killing cops and all the blood. The video games with demons are even worse. He keeps telling himself that it's all "virtual" and only a game. But still he senses something dark and evil getting its hooks into him. He's desperate to get free from this darkness and feel clean again like he used to.

What impact do you think all the images Blaine looks at are having on his view of reality? On his soul?

We are involved in an invisible war, a cosmic conflict that has eternal implications (Ephesians 6:12). It is real, it is serious, and it is ultimate in its consequences. We are soldiers in the battle that matters most.



THE MANY FACES OF THE OCCULT

One way Satan tries to influence people is through a variety of occult activities. Many of these practices have become a normal part of our cultures and social lives. From these passages, <u>circle any spiritual practices that God forbids</u>. Also notice how God feels about them.

LEVITICUS 19:31. Do not defile yourselves by turning to mediums or to those who consult the spirits of the dead. I am the LORD your God. (NLT)

DEUTERONOMY 18:9-14. When you enter the land the LORD your God is giving you, be very careful not to imitate the detestable customs of the nations living there. For example, never sacrifice your son or daughter as a burnt offering. And do not let your people practice fortune-telling, or use sorcery, or interpret omens, or engage in witchcraft, or cast spells, or function as mediums or psychics, or call forth the spirits of the dead. Anyone who does these things is detestable to the LORD. It is because the other nations have done these detestable things that the LORD your God will drive them out ahead of you. But you must be blameless before the LORD your God. The nations



you are about to displace consult sorcerers and fortune-tellers, but the LORD your God forbids you to do such things. (NLT)

REALITY CHECK

It is important to deal with anything that has gotten even a small foothold in our lives. Allowed to grow, footholds can become obsessive struggles or spiritual strongholds. Through these strongholds, Satan seeks to destroy people. Sometimes footholds are established during a life-event when we turn from God and vow to fix life our way or even surrender to Satan's promise of immediate pleasure or power. Sometimes strongholds come from family and cultural patterns of resisting God. In spiritual warfare, we can draw upon Christ's authority and the power of the Holy Spirit to help us resist Satan's influence. And where we have allowed Satan to influence, oppress, or possess us previously, the Holy Spirit can heal our wounds and restore us.

What hope and confidence do these verses give you in your struggles with Satan?

1 JOHN 4:4. You, dear children, are from God and have overcome them, because the one who is in you is greater than the one who is in the world.

1 JOHN 5:18. We know that anyone born of God does not continue to sin; the one who was born of God keeps him safe, and the evil one cannot harm him.

However weak we may be, evil spirits are no match for us when we have the name of Jesus in our mouths, because the demons know they must submit to the rule of Christ.

PRAYER PAUSE

Satan will use shame and accusation to keep you isolated and in hiding over your struggles. Like a wounded soldier in battle, what you need is some help from your friends. If you are deeply struggling with the dominion of Satan and his demons, seek committed believers who will pray for you. Sometimes a counselor can help in sorting matters out. Don't go it alone. Even Jesus asked His disciples to pray for Him when He was facing His death. The demonic world will flee from believers who submit themselves to God and who resist Satan in prayer.

Spend time with God in prayer. Ask Him to reveal any areas of your life being influenced by Satan or opposed by him. Ask God to reveal how Satan got his hooks into that area in the first place. Ask Him to free you, to protect you, and to bless you in the name and the power of Jesus. Journal your prayer time.

CHAPTER 8 LOVING PEOPLE INTO GOD'S FAMILY



There it was again — the challenge to share his faith with his friends who didn't know Christ. But did God really need his help? Besides, he really didn't know how to begin.

Then one day at the gym, Jed was invited to join his friends David and Anna for Thanksgiving dinner. At their home Jed recognized several other people from the gym he'd never spoken to before, even though they had worked out side by side for weeks. Now here they all were eating together. Just before diving into the turkey, David and Anna each shared a couple of things they were thankful to God for. Several others, including Jed, did the same as they continued with the meal.

Later Jed asked David why he had invited so many club members over for dinner. David replied, "There are so many people looking for friendship. So Anna and I are always on the lookout for where God seems to be working. As we get to know people, we share our lives with them by opening our home, inviting them to visit our small group, and helping those who are ready to begin a relationship with God." He smiled. "We belong to 24 Hour Fitness, but Anna jokingly calls it 24 Hour Witness!"

Later that evening, Jed began to wonder... maybe God could use him in spite of his insecurities and inadequacies. Maybe he could be more intentional and invite a couple of guys from the gym over to watch football together... and maybe talk about Jesus.

Can you relate to Jed's desire and tension about sharing his belief in Jesus with his friends? How?

All people on earth are born physically into the family of man. But not all people go on to be reborn spiritually into the family of God. Billions of us remain hostages in the dominion of Satan, serving sin and self, until we are rescued by Christ. In this chapter we will explore how to build on our various relationships to attract others to Jesus and invite them into a personal relationship with Him. As we are intentional and authentic in our relationships, He invites us to "pass it forward." That's how His family grows. In this chapter you'll explore how your faith can become contagious.


PAUSE 1_EXPLORING WHAT GOD SAYS

A person's coming to Christ is like a chain with many links. There is the first link, middle links, and a last link. There are many influences and conversations that precede a person's decision to [trust] Christ. I know the joy of being the first link at times, a middle link usually, and occasionally the last link. God has not called me to only be the last link. He has called me to be faithful and to love all people.

Recall the people who had a part in your "rescue" — someone who loved you just as you were, or whose life attracted you to Christ. Someone else whose personal testimony gave you hope that your life could be radically transformed too. Perhaps a different person explained the message of God's love and Christ's sacrifice to win your salvation and your trust. That's pretty much how the Bible describes people apart from Christ: Satan kept us captive to sin until Jesus paid the ultimate ransom. He rescued us with His blood and is bringing us home to His Father's kingdom.

OUR CONDITION APART FROM CHRIST

Holds us hostage

MARK 10:45. That is what the Son of Man has done: He came <u>to serve</u>, <u>not to be served</u> – and then to <u>give away his life</u> in exchange for many who are held hostage. (MSG)

EPHESIANS 2:1-5. Once you were dead because of your disobedience and your many sins. You used to live in sin, just like the rest of the world, obeying the devil – the commander of the powers in the unseen world. He is the spirit at work in the hearts of those who refuse to obey God. All of us used to live that way, following the passionate desires and inclinations of our sinful nature. By our very nature we were subject to God's anger, just like everyone else. But God is so rich in mercy, and he loved us so much, that even though we were dead because of our sins, he gave us life when he raised Christ from the dead. (It is only by God's grace that you have been saved!) (NLT)

COLOSSIANS 1:13-14. For he has rescued us from the kingdom of darkness and transferred us into the Kingdom of his dear Son, who purchased our freedom and forgave our sins. (NLT)

1 PETER 1:18-19. For you know that God paid a ransom to save you from the empty life you inherited from your ancestors. And the ransom he paid was not mere gold or silver. It was the precious blood of Christ, the sinless, spotless Lamb of God. (NLT)

DEMONSTRATING THE GOSPEL WITH OUR LIVES

The first way we can intentionally draw people to Christ is by the way we live. Mark whatever these verses reveal about how others can come to know God by observing our lives.

2 CORINTHIANS 2:14-16. But thanks be to God, who always leads us in triumphal procession in Christ and through us spreads everywhere the fragrance of the knowledge of him. For we are to God the aroma of Christ among those who are being saved and those who are perishing. To the one we are the smell of death; to the other, the fragrance of life. And who is equal to such a task?

1 THESSALONIANS 4:10-12. Indeed, you already show your love for all the believers throughout Macedonia. Even so, dear brothers and sisters, we urge you to love them even more. Make it your goal to live a quiet life, minding your own business and working with your hands, just as we instructed you before. Then people who are not Christians will respect the way you live, and you will not need to depend on others. (NLT)

COLOSSIANS 3:12-17. So, chosen by God for this new life of love, dress in the wardrobe God picked out for you: compassion, kindness, humility, quiet strength, discipline. Be even-tempered, content with second place, quick to forgive an offense. Forgive as quickly and completely as the Master forgave you. And regardless of what else you put on, wear love. It's your basic, all-purpose garment. Never be without it.

Let the peace of Christ keep you in tune with each other, in step with each other. None of this going off and doing your own thing. And cultivate thankfulness. Let the Word of Christ — the Message — have the run of the house. Give it plenty of room in your lives. Instruct and direct one another using good common sense. And sing, sing your hearts out to God! Let every detail in your lives — words, actions, whatever — be done in the name of the Master, Jesus, thanking God the Father every step of the way. (MSG)

PAUSE 2_EXPLORING YOUR REALITY



Share it, and share Him.

What should you always be prepared to do, according to this verse?

1 PETER 3:15. But in your hearts set apart Christ as Lord. Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have. But do this with gentleness and respect.

What motivated you to initially respond to Jesus, and what continues to motivate you to trust Him?

Every person who has met Christ personally has a story to tell to others – even a guy who had been traumatized by a demon.

MARK 5:18-20. As Jesus was getting into the boat, the man who had been demonpossessed begged to go with him. Jesus did not let him, but said, "Go home to your family and tell them how much the Lord has done for you, and how he has had mercy on you." So the man went away and began to tell in the Decapolis how much Jesus had done for him. And all the people were amazed.

What if Jesus were to ask you to "Go home to your family and tell them how much the Lord has done for you"? How prepared do you feel today to give them an answer? *Explain*.

What would you actually tell them? (Summarize in a few sentences here.)

In these passages, notice how Paul met people on their terms – not his. He adapted himself and entered their world rather than expecting people to enter his. Underline anything that illustrates his flexibility and personal sacrifice in relating to people outside God's family.

1 CORINTHIANS 9:19-23. Even though I am free of the demands and expectations of everyone, I have voluntarily become a servant to any and all in order to reach a wide range of people: religious, nonreligious, meticulous moralists, loose-living immoralists, the defeated, the demoralized — whoever. I didn't take on their way of life. I kept my bearings in Christ — but I entered their world and tried to experience things from their point of view. I've become just about every sort of servant there is in my attempts to lead those I meet into a God-saved life. I did all this because of the Message. I didn't just want to talk about it; I wanted to be in on it! (MSG)

ASK YOURSELF: "How willing am I to live and adapt myself so that the people God brings around me can really hear His message from me?"

DEVELOPING YOUR JTORY

In the Digging Deeper section, you'll have an opportunity to process the story of your coming to trust Christ so that you are prepared to share it when you get a chance. Plan to set aside an hour or two to prayerfully process your story of trusting Christ, and write it out. Your own testimony can be very attractive to your friends on their own spiritual journeys.



Jesus' compassion moved Him to tell the story of God's love. Our impulse to tell the salvation story arises from listening to the heartbeat of the risen Jesus within us. Telling the story does not require that we become ordained ministers or flamboyant street-corner preachers, nor does it demand that we try to convert people by concussion with one sledgehammer blow of the Bible after another. It simply means we share with others what our lives used to be like, what happened when we met Jesus, and what our lives are like now.

PAUSE 3_COMING ALIVE TO GOD AND OTHERS

So what stops us from talking about Christ? Just plain old fear of rejection is enough to keep many of us from verbally sharing the truth of Jesus with others. Or fear that we won't know the answers for people's tough faith questions. Sometimes we shrink back because we know that in a lot of ways, we still struggle like everyone else. Even though we are flawed and very much in-process, we can still live the ways of Jesus and speak the truth of Jesus in love. And as we pray and genuinely follow Him. God uses



love. And as we pray and genuinely follow Him, God uses us to draw others to Himself.

Read Paul's plea for Jesus' followers to tell others about "the One who can be trusted."

ROMANS 10:14-15. But how can people call for help if they don't know who to trust? And how can they know who to trust if they haven't heard of the One who can be trusted? And how can they hear if nobody tells them? And how is anyone going to tell them, unless someone is sent to do it? That's why Scripture exclaims, "A sight to take your breath away! Grand processions of people telling all the good things of God!" (MSG)

As you imagine being part of the "grand processions of people telling all the good things of God," how does your heart respond to this plea? How does your will respond?

Don't assume that people already know the basic facts about Jesus – many people don't have a clue. From each passage below, identify just one or two key truths about God or Jesus that you might – over time – explain to someone as you help them understand the gospel. Summarize in the margin.

JOHN 1:12-13. Yet to all who received him, to those who believed in his name, he gave the right to become children of God — children born not of natural descent, nor of human decision or a husband's will, but born of God.

WHAT GOD GIVES/DOES FOR US

God makes us His children & brings us into His family when we are "born" of God.

1 JOHN 1:8-9. If we claim to be without sin, we deceive ourselves and the truth is not in us. If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness.

ROMANS 3:22-25. We are made right with God by placing our faith in Jesus Christ. And this is true for everyone who believes, no matter who we are. For everyone has sinned; we all fall short of God's glorious standard. Yet God, with undeserved kindness, declares that we are righteous. He did this through Christ Jesus when he freed us from the penalty for our sins. For God presented Jesus as the sacrifice for sin. People are made right with God when they believe that Jesus sacrificed his life, shedding his blood. (NLT)

The gospel also includes good news about what will happen to us after we trust Christ. In the margin, summarize one or two key truths from each of these passages about the life we have to look forward to in God's family.

LIFE IN GOD'S FAMILY

ROMANS 8:1,15-17. So now there is no condemnation for those who belong to Christ Jesus.... So you have not received a spirit that makes you fearful slaves. Instead, you received God's Spirit when he adopted you as his own children. Now we call him, "Abba, Father." For his Spirit joins with our spirit to affirm that we are God's children. And since we are his children, we are his heirs. In fact, together with Christ we are heirs of God's glory. But if we are to share his glory, we must also share his suffering. (NLT) EPHESIANS 2:4-9. But because of his great love for us, God, who is rich in mercy, made us alive with Christ even when we were dead in transgressions — it is by grace you have been saved. And God raised us up with Christ and seated us with him in the heavenly realms in Christ Jesus, in order that in the coming ages he might show the incomparable riches of his grace, expressed in his kindness to us in Christ Jesus. For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith — and this not from yourselves, it is the gift of God — not by works, so that no one can boast.

ROMANS 5:10-11. For since our friendship with God was restored by the death of his Son while we were still his enemies, we will certainly be saved through the life of his Son. So now we can rejoice in our wonderful new relationship with God because our Lord Jesus Christ has made us friends of God. (NLT)

What does this amazing plan tell us about God's heart for us?

Look back at what you wrote in the margin above — all God has done to invite you into relationship and lavish His good gifts on you. How have you experienced this relationship and the goodness of these gifts? What are you most grateful for?



Imagine someone you know and care about asking you this question: "What is so good about Jesus that you think I should get to know Him and trust Him with my life?" How would you answer your friend? (Don't try to write this; just say it out loud.)

PRAYER PAUSE

COLOSSIANS 4:3-4. Also pray for us that God will give us an opportunity to tell people his message. Pray that we can preach the secret that God has made known about Christ. This is why I am in prison. Pray that I can speak in a way that will make it clear, as I should. (NCV)

The foundation of reaching out to others in Jesus' name is prayer and the work of the Holy Spirit in their lives. Who are you praying for? And who are you praying with?

In your group, devote some time praying together for the spreading of the good news of Jesus and His kingdom to all people, including specific family members and friends within your daily routine, as well as people all over the world. Also ask Him to help you live out and converse the gospel with some of these people. Journal your prayer time.

DIGGING DEEPER

THE JTORY OF YOUR JOURNEY WITH JEJUJ

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CHAPTER 9 PARTNERING WITH GOD IN HIS HINGDOM



Children with minimal educational opportunities, poor conditions, spiritual darkness — just a few of the things that burdened Kato's heart. As an agriculture professor in the U.S., he remembers vividly his Ugandan church's dream back home to build a small library in their village to expose people to the gospel through access to Bibles, other literature, and films. He and his friends back home dreamed of offering literacy training to help kids learn how to read and potentially break their hopeless cycle of poverty. If it hadn't been for a missionary couple that helped Kato get an education, he'd still be locked into that same dead-end cycle.

Then Kato met Peter at a farm-related workshop and they became friends. As they began praying together over personal and family needs, Peter's desire to help the Ugandan villagers grew until he asked Kato, "What can I do?"

Kato recruited Peter and some friends from their church to provide financial resources. The Ugandans came up with a simple plan and gave their time and the basic materials. Kato's brother back home tells how the whole village – believers, Muslims, animists, everybody – worked side-by-side making bricks for the library.

These partnerships are helping advance the gospel halfway around the world. Peter figures he doesn't have to leave the marketplace to be in the thick of the action where God is at work! How many partnerships do you see going on in this story? List them.

What touches you most about this story?

PAUSE 1_EXPLORING WHAT GOD SAYS

We're called to live with new eyes, grace-healed eyes... seeing every moment, especially those moments when the sick and the sinful throng close about, as an opportunity to do good. And we're called to live with new hearts: to let the cleanness inside us spill out, washing the filth, the evil, the sickness outside us. We're to spend our heart's energy not looking for ways to enter and exit the [work]place with the least amount of involvement, touching, presence; we're to enter the [work]place looking for ways to bring God's kingdom, light, healing into it.

GENESIS 1:26,28. There is a reckless indiscriminateness about salvation.

As His body, Jesus' followers today are still called to a holistic ministry to develop and disciple people. He sends us into every segment of society, including living among the poor, the broken, the rich, and the habitually hardened, and involving the whole person — not just the spiritual side. PAUSE 2_EXPLORING YOUR REALITY

CAJE JTUDY

Maria has longed for God to use her since she started walking with Him in her early teens. Her family's faith tradition urged her to become a missionary nun — maybe in South America because she's fluent in Spanish. In a campus ministry, she caught the vision of being a disciple and making disciples. She has never wavered in her commitment to be involved in the Great Commission, discipling one person at a time. Through her church she has partnered with others reaching out to inner-city kids and the homeless. But marriage, two kids, and a part-time job have limited her available time for the forms of ministry she did in the past.



Maria comes to you, her best friend, and says, "I still want to partner with God. But I don't know what that should look like in this

PAUSE 3_COMING ALIVE TO GOD AND OTHERS

Did you ever wonder what God's core passion and purpose might be? His Word tells us that, primarily, God is working actively to build His kingdom (chapter 7). And He is filling it with His family (chapter 8). Almost everything Jesus taught about who He was and what He was doing, He expressed in terms of His "message of the kingdom" (more than fifty times just in the book of Matthew).

LUKE 12:32. Do not be afraid, little flock, for your Father has been pleased to give you the kingdom.

Partnering with God in His kingdom is never a do-it-yourself project. It includes cooperating and coordinating with others — like the human body does — bringing synergy to what we do. There are different kinds of work to be done and service to be offered, so God designs us uniquely with different spiritual gifts to contribute to His kingdom.

1 CORINTHIANS 12:4-6. There are different kinds of gifts, but the same Spirit. There are different kinds of service, but the same Lord. There are different kinds of working, but the same God works all of them in all men.

Which of your strengths, gifts, skills, or passions can you see God using in partnership with others to advance His kingdom? (If you're not sure, ask your friends what they see as your strengths.)

In light of your limitations and weaknesses (which we all have), how can you partner with others who are designed differently as you serve God together?

When Jesus ascended into heaven, He instructed His followers to wait in Jerusalem until the Father sent the Holy Spirit to empower them for whatever would come next (Acts 1:4). Read ACTS 1:8. Record how you think His followers might have felt to receive this commission. Also record how you feel at the thought of partnering with God nearby or far away.

What part does the Holy Spirit play in your dreams of partnering with God?

In the next chapter you will explore another way for God's children to colabor with Him – by being involved in spiritual multiplication.

PRAYER PAUSE

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DIGGING DEEPER

Partnering with God means we're listening to Him and His agenda for our lives. For some, that agenda is nearby (local outreach); for others it is in distant lands (global missions). 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CHAPTER 10 TRUSTING GOD FOR SPIRITUAL GENERATIONS

What does this illustration suggest about the power of multiplication?

Since creation, God has wanted us to "be fruitful and multiply" (Genesis 1:22, NASB). He wasn't merely interested in increasing the human population on earth (or He wouldn't have sent the flood in Noah's wicked generation). What God longed to see was generation upon generation of men and women who love and obey Him and honor Him through their lifestyles. But where would they come from? In this chapter you will explore two pathways God has used to increase the number of God-lovers.

PAUSE 1_EXPLORING WHAT GOD SAYS

PATHWAY OF BIOLOGICAL GENERATIONS

In the pathway of biological generations, God wants to provide spiritual guidance and leadership through families. Parents and grandparents are called to partner with God by instructing, teaching, and encouraging their children and grandchildren in a life of knowing, loving, and honoring God. They become biological generations of Christ followers. Sure, our biological families are broken and imperfect in many ways. But it is still God's heart to make Himself known through family units.



In the following verses <u>underline any commands</u> given to the older generation. Also circle) the promised results.

DEUTERONOMY 6:2-3. So that you, your children and their children after them may fear the LORD your God as long as you live by keeping all his decrees and commands that I give you, and so that you may enjoy long life. Hear, O Israel, and be careful to obey so that it may go well with you and that you may increase greatly in a land flowing with milk and honey, just as the LORD, the God of your fathers, promised you.

PSALM 78:2-8. For I will speak to you in a parable. I will teach you hidden lessons from our past — stories we have heard and known, stories our ancestors handed down to us. We will not hide these truths from our children; we will tell the next generation about the glorious deeds of the Lord, about his power and his mighty wonders. For he issued his laws to Jacob; he gave his instructions to Israel. He commanded our ancestors to teach them to their children, so the next generation might know them — even the children not yet born — and they in turn will teach their own children. So each generation should set its hope anew on God, not forgetting his glorious miracles and obeying his commands. Then they will not be like their ancestors — stubborn, rebellious, and unfaithful, refusing to give their hearts to God. (NLT)

EXODUS 20:6. [In the first of the Ten Commandments, God describes Himself as] . . . showing love to a thousand generations of those who love me and keep my commandments.

Summarize what you just picked up about the possibilities of one generation influencing the next generation.

Do you know any families who have two or more generations of Christ followers? If so, what are your impressions of these families?

What happened to the generation that followed Joshua, and why did it happen? Read JUDGES 2:7-14.

What lessons can we learn from this dark period in the history of God's people? (This pattern of following God for a while, then forsaking Him, happened many times before and after Joshua.)

PATHWAY OF SPIRITUAL GENERATIONS

Biological generations were just the beginning of God's plan to fill the earth with His children. His plan was also to spread the good news of His saving love beyond the tiny ancient nation of Israel and beyond biological families to all people at the ends of the earth. God's family is not based on genes and DNA passed from one generation to another. What God's children have in common is His Holy Spirit and all the shared spiritual blessings we have in Christ. So He also provides other people – friends, church leaders, mature believers, etc. – to serve as spiritual helpers or spiritual parents in His family, helping younger believers grow and mature.



Where do we fit in? When we partner with God to befriend another believer or seeker, help them learn to honor God, show them how to feed on God's Word, and share their struggles, we are helping to build another spiritual generation. This opens up the possibility for any of us — regardless of what families we had or didn't have — to participate in the promised blessings of having spiritual children and of influencing the next generation of disciples.

Jesus had no biological children. But He poured His life and love into His disciples, teaching them to know, trust, and obey God.

From these words of Jesus, what did He hope they would do with His message after He ascended?

JOHN 17:18-21. As you sent me into the world, I have sent them into the world. For them I sanctify myself, that they too may be truly sanctified. My prayer is not for them alone. I pray also for those who will believe in me through their message, that all of them may be one. Father, just as you are in me and I am in you. May they also be in us so that the world may believe that you have sent me.

JOHN 15:16. You did not choose me, but I chose you and appointed you to go and bear fruit — fruit that will last.

The apostle Paul also had no biological children. Yet he became the spiritual father of many.

PHILIPPIANS 2:20-22. I have no one else like him, who takes a genuine interest in your welfare. For everyone looks out for his own interests, not those of Jesus Christ. But you know that Timothy has proved himself, because as a son with his father he has served with me in the work of the gospel.

2 TIMOTHY 2:2. [Paul writing to Timothy] And the things you have heard me say in the presence of many witnesses entrust to reliable men who will also be qualified to teach others.

BACKGROUND

Almost 4,000 years ago, God called Abraham to move to an unknown land with his wife Sarah. Because of Abraham's faith, God chose him to become the founder of a new nation, as well as the biological and spiritual "father" of countless generations of God-lovers after him who would make God known on the earth. When Abraham was seventy-five years old (and his wife, Sarah, was way too old to get pregnant), God gave him this amazing promise.

Highlight or circle each thing God promised to do for and through Abraham and Sarah.

GENESIS 17:3-8. Abram fell facedown, and God said to him, "As for me, this is my covenant with you: You will be the father of many nations. No longer will you be called Abram; your name will be Abraham, for I have made you a father of many nations. I will make you very fruitful; I will make nations of you, and kings will come from you. I will establish my covenant as an everlasting covenant between me and you and your descendants after you for the generations to come, to be your God and the God of your descendants after you. The whole land of Canaan, where you are now an alien, I will give as an everlasting possession to you and your descendants after you; and I will be their God."

GENESIS 22:17-18. I will surely bless you and make your descendants as numerous as the stars in the sky and as the sand on the seashore. Your descendants will take possession of the cities of their enemies, and through your offspring all nations on earth will be blessed, because you have obeyed me. [The word "offspring" is singular, and can also be translated "seed."]

Who was this "offspring" of Abraham through whom "all nations on earth will be blessed"? (See Galatians 3:16.)

What did God expect Abraham to do in response to these marvelous promises? (See Genesis 18:18-19.)

How do you think Abraham (and Sarah) responded to such a blessing?

Abraham believed God for biological and spiritual generations, simply because He trusted God to keep His promise. He didn't live to see his grandson Jacob, nor his other biological descendants many generations later — King David and Jesus. Another exciting part of God fulfilling His promise to Abraham is identifying some of Abraham's spiritual descendants. Read Galatians 3:29 and fill in the last arrow below.



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REFLECTION

The next time you gaze at the stars in the sky or walk on the seashore (see Genesis 22:17), think about God's promise to Abraham — that one of those stars or grains of sand represents you. As an heir to the same promise, are you trusting God for generations to come from your life, too? If you have never thought about this before, stop for a time of prayer.

It now becomes apparent that God never was thinking merely about physical generations in his instructions to Israel. He intended a convergence of physical generations with the spiritual right from the beginning. God had this generation of ours in mind when he gave Abraham his promise. We, too, are children of Abraham, and, as such, have rights to those same promises!

PAUSE 2_EXPLORING YOUR REALITY

So what is your role in this grand plan for God to reveal Himself to the nations? Are you, too, called to be a spiritual parent or influencer to someone else? Explore these two ways you can partner with God in spiritual multiplication.

PATHWAY 1: PARTNERING WITH GOD THROUGH FAMILIES / BIOLOGICAL GENERATIONS

God wants our offspring to be godly. This is his first line of approach in discipling the nations. It is the primary avenue to spiritual generations. So he instructs us in how to go about this. He says, "Make my ways your topic of conversation as you sit, as you walk, as you lie down, and as you get up." We are always in one of those four positions.

Consider this counsel for parents given by Moses.

DEUTERONOMY 6:5-9. Love the LORD your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength. These commandments that I give you today are to be upon your hearts. Impress them on your children. Talk about them when you sit at home and when you walk along the road, when you lie down and when you get up. Tie them as symbols on your hands and bind them on your foreheads. Write them on the doorframes of your houses and on your gates.

From the passage above, describe in your own words how God wants parents to pass on His Word and His ways to their children.

PATHWAY 2: PARTNERING WITH GOD THROUGH SPIRITUAL GENERATIONS

Meditate on these verses about things that seem impossible.

ISAIAH 54:1-3. "Sing, O barren woman, you who never bore a child; burst into song, shout for joy, you who were never in labor; because more are the children of the desolate woman than of her who has a husband," says the LORD. "Enlarge the place of your tent, stretch your tent curtains wide, do not hold back; lengthen your cords, strengthen your stakes. For you will spread out to the right and to the left; your descendants will dispossess nations and settle in their desolate cities."

ISAIAH 60:21-22. "Then will all your people be righteous and they will possess the land forever. They are the shoot I have planted, the work of my hands, for the display of my splendor. The least of you will become a thousand, the smallest a mighty nation. I am the LORD; in its time I will do this swiftly."

How do these verses give hope to everyone – especially those who feel insignificant or who are childless for any reason?

What do these verses reveal about the power of spiritual multiplication?

In the passage below (often called "The Great Commission") Jesus commands us to "make disciples . . . [by] teaching them to obey everything" He commanded.

MATTHEW 28:18-20. Then Jesus came to them and said, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age."

Take a minute and pray for your family now, your future family, children, grandchildren, nieces, nephews. Ask God to bless your generations and make Himself known throughout your family line. Thank Him that it gives Him great joy to bless your family and reward your faith.

Also pray for your friends, neighbors, coworkers. Who can you come alongside to help him or her know God in a deeper way? What desires do you have to influence generations in their spiritual lives? What legacy do you want to leave through generations of Christ followers? Talk over these questions with God.



PAUSE 3_coming alive to god and others

God is not looking for brilliant men [and women], is not depending upon eloquent men, is not shut up to the use of talented men in sending His gospel out in the world. God is looking for broken men who have judged themselves in the light of the cross of Christ. When He wants anything done, He takes up men who have come to the end of themselves, whose confidence is not in themselves, but in God.

Perhaps you're wondering if and how God could work through you. How adequate do you feel raising children to follow Him, or helping someone else mature spiritually? Consider these verses:

2 CORINTHIANS 4:7. But we have this treasure in jars of clay to show that this all-surpassing power is from God and not from us.

2 CORINTHIANS 12:9. My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness.



As you think about influencing future generations, do you feel anxious or inadequate or some other feeling? *Explain*.

How might God actually work through your weaknesses and failures – not in spite of them? How does your heart respond to God's power being made perfect in your weaknesses, especially as you influence others for Christ?

REALITY CHECH

God often described Himself in the Old Testament as the God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob (see Exodus 3:15). Generations were so important to Him that He named Himself after three of them. Yet, Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob were faith-filled people with real life struggles, failures, and family issues. God chose to bless them and reveal Himself in spite of their weaknesses – and even through them.

God is faithful to fulfill all His promises to us. How does this assurance give you hope to influence future generations in spite of struggles and failures – yours, your family members', and people who have influenced you spiritually?

Paul loved the believers in Thessalonica as though they were his own children. Read 1 THESSALONIANS 2:7-12, where Paul describes how he served as a biblical spiritual parent. List any qualities and actions of a good spiritual parent mentioned in this passage.

From your list, which two or three qualities/actions do you especially want to characterize you as you influence others for Jesus?

Paul compared his discipling ministry to the work of a builder – laying a foundation and then building the house with quality materials. Read 1 CORINTHIANS 3:10-15.

Who has been involved in laying a biblical spiritual foundation in your life?

Whose foundation are you helping to build?

What do you want to be rewarded for in heaven?

What in particular do you know you need to rely on the Holy Spirit for as you help others grow spiritually?

How does your church or community of believers provide this kind of help to young believers?

What if . . . tomorrow you lead someone to trust in Jesus? Would you know how to get them started in walking with Him? Would you know how to keep them going? *Explain*.

REALITY CHECH

If you answered "no" to the last question, that's okay. Consider asking your small group leader or another mature believer about how you can learn to disciple others. Explore other resources that could motivate and equip you in spiritual multiplication, such as books or workshops or training opportunities. Also consider the Digging Deeper section in this chapter. Would you ever consider coleading a group through the CONNECT series or some other form of exploring the Bible together? What might be obstacles and opportunities for you to start such a group?

Pursuing a divine vision is really an act of worship. It is a declaration of our confidence in God. It is a proclamation of how important we believe His agenda to be. And God is honored.

CLOJING REFLECTION

We plant seeds that one day will grow. We water seeds already planted knowing that they hold promise. We lay foundations that will need further development. We provide yeast that produces effects far beyond our capabilities.

We cannot do everything, and there is a sense of liberation in realizing that. This enables us to do something, and to do it very well.

It may be incomplete, but it is a beginning, a step along the way, an opportunity for the Lord's grace to enter and do the rest.

We may never see the end results, but that is the difference between the master builder and the worker.

We are workers, not master builders; ministers, not messiahs. We are prophets of a future not our own.

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DIGGING DEEPER

New spiritual life and spiritual multiplication are definitely miracles that God promises to do. We cannot dictate these blessings any more than Abraham and Sarah could produce the child of promise. But what God has promised, He will do! Our role is to walk by faith, to obey God's leading, and to claim His promise to multiply us spiritually. Some will see much spiritual fruit in their lifetime and others may only see one "Isaac." Abraham believed God's promise of a great nation even when his eyes saw only one son through Sarah. As we faithfully participate in the process, God does the miracle of spiritual multiplication.

Here are a few ideas for participating with Him at the initial phase of introducing people to Christ (evangelizing). As you read, take it to the next level by writing your own ideas for the ongoing phase of deepening people in Christ (discipling).

INITIAL EVANGELIZING APPLICATIONS	ONGOING DISCIPLING APPLICATIONS
Praying . Ask God to work in the lives of specific people. Pray for their spiri- tual life and journeys. By faith claim the promise that God will use you in the lives of others for the glory of God. Rely on the Holy Spirit of God for the miracle of spiritual generations.	Praying
Initiating . Ask God for discernment and boldness in initiating spiritual conversations. Sometimes we hold back and wait for others to bring up the subject. Or we may force a conversation that seems to fall flat. Step out and be real. Enjoy talking about your spiritual journey with others. And when things fall flat, don't let that stop you from initiating.	Initiating
Serving your neighbor. Jesus' way of ministering to others is a way of love. Simply serving people is a wonderful way of communicating love without words. In time these acts of kindness and service can create opportunities to speak more directly about your faith. Serving sometimes involves sacrifice. Loving sacrifice often speaks deeply to other people about the love God has placed in your heart for them.	Serving your neighbor
Listening for needs and open nerves. As we dialogue with people, their needs and desires surface. Sometimes you can ask questions. Sometimes you simply listen. And sometimes you can share from your spiritual journey and truths you have learned from the Bible and experienced in your spiritual journey.	Listening for needs and open nerves
Teaming up and including others . Spiritual multiplication occurs within the body of Christ. No one person can do it all. Introduce other believers to your friends and family who don't yet know Jesus. Let the community of believers who love one another impact them.	Teaming up and including others

Exploring the Scriptures. Many people are open to read books together and discuss what they've read. Sometimes this occurs over coffee or in a dorm room or over the Internet. Be creative. There are many good resources that can help facilitate your time in the Bible and discussion. Also discuss- ing passages from the Bible in the context of living life is a powerful way to experience God's presence and wisdom for life.	Exploring the Scriptures
Exploring life together. The news of the kingdom of God is all around us — through symbols in nature, through the arts and sciences, through life's hardships and pleasures. As you live and explore life with others, take life experiences and relate them to your spiritual journey. Most movies have themes and longings that can be related to our spiritual journey. Major events of life (such as births, marriages, sicknesses, and deaths) are part of the spiritual mosaic that God is designing in our hearts. The beauty around us points toward God whose glory is excellent beauty. Our work relates to God's calling for humanity to be creative, to build ethical societies that worship Him, and to rule in nature while caring for it. As you minister to others, ask God to help you weave these spiritual discussions into the ordinary and major events of life.	Exploring life together
Encouraging others to decide. Following Jesus involves making decisions. Encourage others to make the initial step to follow Jesus and to continue to follow Him daily. Making these commitments will solidify and guide our spiritual journeys.	Encouraging others to decide
Loving others with truth . Ministry to others is always an act of love. This love comes from God and spreads through us to others. As you influence others continue to ask God for His love that speaks His truth in ways that demonstrate and bring life to others.	Loving others with truth

So we encourage you to plan a celebration. Take some time to "Reflect Back," "Envision Forward," and "Pause to Affirm and Pray."

REFLECT BACH

Share how you've benefited from studying God's Word with this group of fellow spiritual journeyers.

How has your walk with God been affected?

How has your daily lifestyle changed?

What emotions surface as you reflect on your times together?

ENVIJION FORWARD

What are your spiritual needs as you consider the next phase of your journey?

In what environment might these needs be met?

What continuing relationships will you have with the people in this group (casual friendship to in-depth involvement)?

Are there other people you know who could benefit from studying this series?

Would one or more people from this group facilitate a new group? Is God leading anyone to be a part of a new group?

PAUSE TO AFFIRM

Do you want to express a thank you or affirmation to anyone in the group who has influenced your life? Take time to do that.

PAUSE TO PRAY

Spend time together praying. Thank God for this part of your journey. Praise Him for who He is. Linger longer together.

WHY MEMORIZE JCRIPTURE?

You won't find the word *memorize* in the Bible. But the concept is there both in command and in example ("treasure . . . store up . . . hide" God's words in our hearts). We are encouraged to "study . . . reflect on . . . delight in . . . not forget" God's words (Psalm 119:9-16, NLT; 37:31).

- "lay hold of . . . pay attention . . . listen closely . . . keep [God's words] within your heart" (Proverbs 4:4,20-22).
- "bind them [my commands] around your neck . . . write them on the tablet of your heart" (Proverbs 3:3).
- "always treasure my commands.... Guard my instructions as you guard your own eyes. Tie them on your fingers as a reminder.... Write them on the tablet of your heart" (Proverbs 7:1-3, NLT, NIV).
- "it is good to keep these sayings in your heart" (Proverbs 22:18, NLT).
- "meditate on [God's words] day and night" (Joshua 1:8).

These same verses also explain the reasons for and benefits of memorizing Scripture:

- "that I might not sin against you . . . [my] feet do not slip" (Psalm 119:9-16; 37:31).
- "they bring life . . . and healing to their whole body" (Proverbs 4:22, NLT).
- "find favor with both God and people . . . earn a good reputation" (Proverbs 3:3-4, NLT).
- "you will trust in the Lord" (Proverbs 22:18-19, NLT).
- "you will be sure to obey everything written in it. Only then will you prosper and succeed" (Joshua 1:8, NLT).
- so that you'll "have all of them ready on your lips" (Proverbs 22:18).
- "your words... were my joy and my heart's delight" (Jeremiah 15:16).

Perhaps even more compelling than these reasons is seeing how powerfully God can use a person who has taken the time and effort to consistently memorize Scripture. When Jesus faced Satan (see Matthew 4:1-11), He drew from the many verses of Scripture that He had memorized in His youth to pinpoint Satan's deception and resist temptation. Where would we be if Jesus had not memorized Scripture? When Peter addressed the huge crowd on the day of Pentecost, he was given no time to consult his concordance and prepare a message! Because he had made Scripture memory a priority in his life, he could quote from three different Old Testament passages that helped bring 3,000 people to the Lord!

If you long to equip yourself to counteract Satan, resist sin, trust and obey God, listen to God's voice, and minister to others, there is no better investment of your time than memorizing Scripture.

A good place to begin is by revisiting the verses you memorized here in this study. Carry the verses around. Put them on your PDA. Put them on your computer. Review them out

loud. Often. Write them out until you can say them accurately. Meditate on them. Pray over them. Tell a friend what they mean to you. Put yourself to sleep at night thinking about them. And look forward to listening to God speak to you!

I am amazed at the countless times God pulled from my mind a memorized verse that has been exactly the right thing at the right time! At times it was a comfort, at times guidance. A push ahead or a pull to stop. A reminder of His promise, a prompting for wisdom. A word for counseling another, an insight for those seeking our Lord.

Our prayer is that we all will grow in deeper intimacy with God from a heart of worship as we humbly follow Jesus' ways, truth, and life!
