Inspired by the presentations of Joyce Smith and Dick Moff, we spent part of two days touring the Canterbury Shaker Village in New Hampshire. Bob and I took several tours and visited with the shaker box maker and the broom maker as they created their shaker treasures. I escaped with only buying two shaker items and one colonial box from Frye's Measure Mill. According to the brochures, the shakers passed the art of the shaker boxes down to the owner of this mill in order to keep the art alive. The mill was an interesting stop with shaker and colonial boxes for every possible purpose. We stopped in Bar Harbor and visited the Abbe Museum. This museum is devoted to preserving the Maine native culture and houses a 400+ collection of native Maine baskets that actually rivals the collection of Billie Dorris. The variety of decorative curls on baskets originated with native Maine basketmakers. All three stops were truly worthwhile and are highly recommended if you find yourself in that absolutely beautiful part of the country.

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

FYI: About Guilders Weave ...History and more.....

About the Event: In its early days, Tidewater Basketry Guild was a branch of High Country Basketry Guild. Members from here and from Northern Virginia decided to get together for weaving and instruction. Members of the guild would teach classes. Everyone would bring a dish to share, etc. MLK weekend was chosen because that left a day to travel and recuperate from having all the fun we could stand. Our little “come-on-down-to-weave-with-us-and-bring-some-snacks” was first called Winter Weave. That event was held for about 6 years while slowly growing into more members wanting more classes for more days, and even more guilds participating... So, TBG decided to try to offer Winter Weave for the first time in a hotel where food and many classrooms were readily available and conveniently located all in one facility. Deep into the planning stages for Winter Weave 2002 Wildwood Basketry Guild in Ohio informed us that we couldn't use the name Winter Weave – they had it copyrighted! Thus, GUILDERS WEAVE was born. New event, new name, all guilders – perfect fit.

About Selecting Classes for GW: Once the call for teachers has been issued, those interested in teaching at our event send us their baskets and class proposal information. You may have wondered how we select the teachers and come up with the class offerings.

First, selection criteria must be set. Criteria may include quality of construction, quality of materials, type of construction, price, hours required, “curb appeal” etc., ad infinitum. (What the heck is “curb appeal”, I hear you wondering. Just ask yourself if you like the basket. Or, will others like it? If nobody likes it, nobody will sign up for it, no matter what skills it teaches...)

Look at each of the baskets that have been sent as class proposals with the selection criteria in mind. Work with as many or as few criteria as needed to make selections commensurate with producing the level of event desired.

Once you have finished selecting those that meet your criteria, all these proposals must be juggled with other considerations. For example, you have to go back and ensure that each teacher has enough offerings to make it lucrative for her to come teach, you have to make sure that there are enough classes for each skill level - beginners, intermediate, and advanced weavers – to have several choices each, you have to make sure that there are enough different constructions being offered for choices, and ditto with differing materials. You have to make sure costs are appropriate to the basket being offered, you must make sure that time frames on all classes mesh (4 hrs, 6 hrs, 8 etc.), you must make sure that the quality of basket and quality of instructor is what you want to offer, etc.

Once you've got your class offerings set, these offerings must then be arranged in a daily schedule, making sure to fill the day and that all classes mesh appropriately. You must also see that each skill level has appropriate choices and an appealing variety of choices available for that day. This is done for each day of the event.

Maybe it's all not as simple as you thought?
