Did you know?

- ♦ HIV, human immunodeficiency virus, is a virus which attacks you immune system. With proper treatment, one can put the virus to sleep and live a long healthy life.
- Hepatitis C is a virus which attacks your liver. New treatments cure over 95% of people living with Hepatitis C.
- Per capita, Saskatchewan has the highest rates of HIV and Hepatitis C diagnoses in Canada.
- ◆ An estimated 14% of people living with HIV in Canada are unaware of their infection.
- ♦ 44% of those living with Hepatitis C are unaware of their infection.
- ◆ Saskatchewan Health Authority encourages HIV testing to be considered at least once every five years and Hepatitis C testing should be considered for anyone born in Canada between 1945 and 1975. Testing should be done more frequently based on a person's risk factors.



Common supports, services and concerns include, but are not limited to:


- Income assistance
