What Next?

I seem to be writing a lot of "what next" articles about Covid, Both my husband and I caught Covid for the first time last month—on a cruise ship, of course. There's probably no better Petrie dish for catching any virus than an environment in which a large group of people from all over the globe gather together to eat and watch entertainment and interact with one another on excursions. I had nausea and a very runny nose, a low fever and no sense of smell. It wasn't like any other virus I've had in the past. It felt very nasty.

But here's what I didn't have: difficulty breathing, a need to be seen by a doctor, a ventilator and a brush with death. I have mild chronic asthma, but I didn't struggle to breathe. My husband, who has a heart arrhythmia, had a more trouble, but it was controlled with higher doses of the medication that he takes for fibrillation. A virus that killed almost a million people in the United States, almost all of them above age 70, in less than 2 years was a nasty nuisance for 76 year old Chuck and 73 year old me.

Why the difference?

The virus has mutated, of course, but we also had vaccinations, which I consider a modern miracle. If you take a look at the county by county Covid vaccination rate and compare it to the death rate from Covid, those counties with the lowest vaccination rate had the highest hospitalization and death rates from the virus.

So "what next?", while still complicated, is at least more clear than it was. I expect that yearly vaccination for Covid, Flu and RSV will become a sensible norm. Wear a mask in crowds if you are vulnerable or if someone you live with is vulnerable. Stay home if you are sick.

Life has changed so much since the winter of 2020, but here we are. It isn't a perfect world, but it's vastly improved. Let us rejoice and give thanks for it.

Advent Traditions

We all know of the Advent traditions like the Advent Calendar or the Advent Candle. There is another tradition that goes way back and it is the Jesse Tree.

The name comes from Jesse who was the Father of the great Jewish King David. One prophecy in the Bible, in the book of Isaiah, says:

1 A shoot will come up from the stump of Jesse; from his roots a Branch will bear fruit. 2 The Spirit of the LORD will rest on him-- the Spirit of wisdom and

of understanding, the Spirit of counsel and of power, the Spirit of knowledge and of the fear of the LORD--

3 and he will delight in the fear of the LORD. He will not judge by what he sees with his eyes, or decide by what he hears with his ears;
4 but with righteousness he will judge the needy, with justice he will give decisions for the poor of the

earth.

A branch is a sign of new life and new beginnings. Jesus was a descendent of King David and Christians believe that Jesus is this new branch.

The first Jesse trees were large carvings, tapestries or even stained glass windows put in Churches that helped illiterate people (people who can't read or write) to learn about the Bible from creation to the Christmas Story. But now Jesse Trees are used as a kind of Advent Calendar. You can use a normal Christmas tree or a banner in the shape of a tree. Each day through advent (or sometimes just on the four Sundays of advent) a special decoration or ornament that tells a story from the Bible, is hung on the tree.

Labyrinth Ready for Walkers!



The labyrinth is not a maze.
There are no tricks to it and no dead ends. It has a single circuitous path that winds its way into the center. The person walking it uses the same path to return from the center and the entrance then becomes the exit.
The path is in full view, which

allows a person to be quiet and focus internally.

Generally there are three stages to the walk: releasing on the way in, receiving in the center and returning when you follow the return path back out of the labyrinth. Symbolically, and sometimes actually, you are taking back out into the world that which you have received.

To prepare, you may want to sit quietly to reflect before walking the labyrinth. Some people come with questions, others just to slow down and take time out from a busy life. Some come to find strength to take the next step. Many come during times of grief and loss.

Children enjoy the labyrinth and we ask that parents supervise their young children so all may enjoy the meditative aspects of the walk.

There are many ways to describe a labyrinth. It is a path of prayer, a walking meditation, a crucible of change, a watering hole for the spirit and a mirror of the soul.

Columbia County Habitat for Humanity Updates



Our Vernonia project is officially begun! Last month Phil Peerson donated all the excavation work needed to get started and last week our steady construction volunteers were able to complete the forms for the footings on this project. Our partner family commented, "I'm so very very grateful for all that everyone is doing...the excitement from seeing progress on the build is overwhelming. Thank you so very much."

In September we raised \$528 for our drive to help Habitat Maui rebuild the ten homes lost in the

Hawaii fire. We have since sent Habitat Maui \$2500 by rounding up the matched donations that we promised to send to them. They have a long road ahead and we are proud to join their effort.

We would also like to honor Rosalynn Carter this month as well. While many people think of President Carter associated with Habitat, Mrs. Carter was just as much of a Habitat hero. She believed deeply in our mission and many times became very emotional when she talked about the families with whom the couple had worked. President and Mrs. Carter celebrated their 40th wedding anniversary on a build site in Chicago; they camped out with volunteers in

locations around the world; and they did countless interviews and appearances — many of them as part of long build days — to raise awareness about the need for adequate and affordable shelter. We feel a great loss today, but we are comforted by the knowledge that Mrs. Carter's legacy will live on through the people she touched and the example she set for servant leadership.
