MONDAY, AUGUST 1st

Paperless tablets, "Rocketbook" Demonstration- Diane Herndon, Frederick CTC

Each participant of the conference received their own Rocketbook. During the demonstration, they were able to learn with the presenter how to create notes and save to their computers or drives for further use within their program.

TUESDAY, AUGUST 2ND

Professional Learning Tour Option #1: Shlagel Farms & Equipment Safety Campaign

Presenter: Carl Shlagel, son of farm owners Host: Stacy Eckels, Southern High School Recorder: Pat Beachy, Linganore High School

This is a third-generation family farm that has been in continuous production for 110 years. The family owns 140 acres and rent several hundred more. By using Best Management Practices (BMP) and following USDA Nutrient Management Plans, maintain their Food Safety Certification. Producing fruits and vegetables to supply grocery stores, produce brokers and sell at several farmer's markets in the D.C/Baltimore area. They provide consumers with the Community Supported Agriculture Program (CSA). This tour directly relates to Agri-tourism and agricultural awareness within their community. The family also raise turkeys and beef for market. Stacy Eckels provided information on the National Equipment Safety materials offered to teachers.

Professional Learning Tour Option #2- Shoreline Restoration

Presenter: Bruce Young, District Manager of the St. Mary's County Soil Conservation District

Host: Dorothy Birch, James A. Forrest Career and Tech. Center Recorder: Kelly Bryant, Maurice J. McDonough High School

The purpose of the tour was to show how important it is to maintain healthy streams by hardscaping and landscaping with the right materials. Attendees took seining nets into the stream to conduct analysis on water quality and identifying plant and animals. The group measured the effects of erosion by the natural tides and human factors. This tour greatly enhanced teacher knowledge on water quality, erosion control practices, habitat monitoring and establishing proper landscape to ensure healthy streams entering into a watershed.

iCEV curriculum presentation- Sarah Shriner, Catoctin High School

One way to meet the MSDE industry certifications is to utilize the iCEV curriculum. Frederick County Ag. Ed. Programs are currently piloting this curriculum and will be presenting data for approval. Teachers shared experiences using the materials. iCEV could potentially become a non-CASE option for school systems.

Professional Learning- "Marketing Your Program"

An expert at marketing, Shelby shared her tips and tricks in successfully promoting your program to the public. She shared how she uses social media campaigns to get her message across, to appeal to emotions and experiences. Visual presentations are the most important tool, using clear and crisp videos and images that convey the right message. This session provided useable tools that are affordable and easy to learn to create professional marketing in displays, flyers, and social media platforms to promote agricultural education.

Professional Learning- "Making the Green in Greenhouse"

Presenters: Ben Beale and Allan Leslie, Saint Mary's County & Charles County UME Ag. Agents

Host: Kelly Bryant, Maurice J. McDonough High School Recorder: Dene' Flack, Harford Technical High School

The best way to maximize profits in growing plants and crops is to maximize their health. That can easily be accomplished by integrated pest management (IPM) and continuously monitoring and balancing the soil's pH levels and applying the correct amount of fertilizers. The presenters shared various actual cases of losing money on plants, and how to correct using the best practice. They also conducted pH tests and showed how to use tools in the trade. These tools could be very useful in the classroom as mini lessons or added to pre-existing lessons.

Remarks from Robin McLean, National Association of Agricultural Educators, Region 6 Vice President Robin connected with teachers in showing them how the NAAE can enhance their teaching with networking across the United States with other similar teachers and programs.

Professional Learning Tour Option #1- Sheepfield Cut Flower Farm

The group toured a working cut flower farming operation from the fields, to processing, and creating floral arrangements. A truly hands-on experience to the world of growing and selling fresh flowers to the community. They proved the importance of properly treating post-harvest flowers for extending floral life.

Professional Learning Tour Option #2- Sotterley Plantation

A national historic landmark overlooking the Patuxent River. It is one of the last plantations open to the public for educational purposes, featuring a mansion dating back to 1703, 95 acres in fields, gardens, and riverfront. Participants learned the importance of environmental stewardship and was encouraged to find similar historic sites significant in their home area.

After being educated on preserving shoreline restoration, participants helped to create multiple oyster reef balls. After they cure, they will be placed in the St. Mary's Wastershed area to promote oyster populations and will also minimize shoreline erosion. This activity can easily be replicated in the classroom to demonstrate the importance of preserving the shorelines and tying in with biodiversity lessons.

The National Chapter Award program recognizes chapters for implementing strategies that enhance the student, the chapter, the school, and community. They discussed how to submit a winning application in being unique and complete by following the standardized rubric for scoring. The major deductions come from: replication of an activity, dates are out of range, or an activity that does not relate to the quality standard. Their best advise was to follow the rubric and you will have an outstanding application.

Professional Learning- "Trout in the Classroom"

Presenter: Tom Giannaccinni, Chair of the Maryland Trout in the Classroom Program

Host: Kelly Bryant, Maurice J. McDonough High School Recorder: Aaron Geiman, Westminster High School

The "Trout in the Classroom" program designed to connect students with their watersheds. It is a partnership between the Potomac-Patuxent Chapter of Trout Unlimited and the Department of Natural Resources. Teacher funding is available. He presented how to set up in the classroom, the labs to teach water quality, chemistry, animal, and wildlife science. There are so many opportunities for connecting with special need students, data collection to reinforce scientific research and monitoring water conditions. This workshop is helpful in studying aquaponics, hydroponics, wildlife management, natural resources and anatomy and physiology studies.
