MARYLAND AGRICULTURE EDUCATORS CONFERENCE

"Our Growth is Their Future"

Before the start of all the county fairs, Back-to-School nights, and SAE visits, more than thirty Maryland Ag teachers kicked off the final month of their summer break by attending MAEC '22 in St. Mary's County. Through participation in a wide variety of agricultural experiences over four days, these teachers fully embodied the conference theme, "Our Growth is Their Future."

Professional learning for Day 1 included two tour options along with three workshop sessions. Teachers could learn more about Agritourism and increasing agriculture awareness by touring Shlagel Farms, a third-generation family farm that's been in continuous operation for 110 years, or they could learn more about shoreline restoration by conducting water quality analysis with seining nets in a local stream. Professional learning workshops included information on how to implement iCEV (an online CTE curriculum and certification platform), how to market an Ag program, and how to maximize the "green" in a greenhouse. Day 1 concluded with remarks by Robin McClean, Region 6 Vice President of the National Association of Agricultural Educators.

Day 2's professional learning included two additional tour options and three workshop sessions. Teachers could get a hands-on experience touring the Sheepfield Cut Flower Farm or they could visit the Sotterly Plantation, a national historic landmark, learning about the importance of environmental stewardship and preserving historic sites. Professional learning included a hands-on, shoreline restoration workshop making oyster reef balls eventually placed in the St. Mary's Watershed, an FFA crash course explaining resources, grants, and opportunities, and an informational session for submitting winning applications for the National Chapter Award. Day 2 concluded with a presentation by MSDE on Maryland's Blueprint for Education.

The final day of the conference started with an update on Maryland FFA by Terrie Shank, followed by professional learning sessions on Trout in the Classroom and the Global Teach Ag Network. The conference concluded with the annual awards banquet with keynote speakers **Charlotte Davis**, Executive Director of the Rural Maryland Council, and **Colby Ferguson**, Legislative Director of Maryland Farm Bureau. Ms. Davis addressed the purpose of the



Rural Maryland Council and their involvement with projects improving the quality of life in rural communities. Mr. Ferguson encouraged Ag teachers to be proactive in the implementation of the Blueprint for Maryland Public Schools.

Following the keynote speeches, NAAE and MATA awards (*listed on next page*) were presented, and the 2022-2023 MATA Executive Board was installed.

SARAH'S SCOOP A Letter from the President Sarah Shriner

Greetings from the Maryland Agricultural Teachers Association!

We are nearing or have completed the first term of the new school year. While we are getting to know our classes better and are opening up more, the students are feeling more comfortable as well and some may be pushing our buttons.

As you may have heard, I changed schools this year. Having been at the same school for 13 years, I had my own groove. It's been a challenge finding a new rhythm in an already established and very successful agriculture program. Students are testing me and my endurance in this profession, but with each new day, I make more connections with students and colleagues.

As the winter nears, teachers often go through a funk. Try your best to avoid the funk by focusing on the small wins. We aren't going to change the world in a day, but we can change it through our daily impact on students.

What do I mean by small wins? Let me name a few of mine this year:

- My family and I were driving through town and we passed 3 of my students who were excited to see me and wave. I was at the total opposite end of the county and saw a student at a volleyball game who made sure to come say hi.
- I had a school counselor tell me that a student loved my class this semester. I received a text message from a past student that I took to Iowa for the World Food Prize. He told me that he was working as a technician for an Engineering company near the high school and that I was right about him going into engineering.
- I received an email from a student asking for a letter of recommendation because my class helped her decide to major in Animal Science.
- I made some new coworker friends here and strengthened past relationships. My most difficult student asked to come to me for STEP (similar to study hall) and behaved himself.
- I have been told that I am their favorite teacher in my most challenging class.

Small wins will help get us through the holidays. We don't have to win a national contest or have a 100% pass rate on a certification exam. Some days, a win is hearing from a former student; some days, it's getting through the day without having to write a referral. The small wins add up and they do matter. Let's all try to focus on the positives this fall/winter. We've got this!

MENTORSHIP MOMENTS

WITH MAZZONE

As we approach "training season" for CDE's and LDE's, my advice to teachers is to not stretch yourself too thin. As a new teacher, I wanted to get involved in it all. I quickly learned that doing so would mean that quite literally every evening of my personal life would be spent training students.

In some ways, Ag teachers are their own worst enemy. A very unfortunate, but very real unspoken notion exists amongst us that if you're not out there winning CDE's and taking teams to Nationals, that you're viewed as a lesser Ag teacher. Hear me loud and clear, your effectiveness and worth as an Ag teacher is not correlated with your FFA stats. Set your boundaries and do what you can. You don't need to be involved in every single CDE. Pick the ones you have personal interest and expertise in and encourage students to follow suit.

As an Ag teacher, I would rather have 1 first place team in a CDE I know well and can be successful in than have 5 eighth place teams in CDE's that I didn't have enough time to generate quality training materials for. If you have students that want to get involved in more, don't be afraid to let go and reach out for outside help. Some of my best CDE coaches were recently graduated students who were still living close to home and knew the content well because they had just done it the year prior. You are not expected to do it all, yet sometimes we fail to remember that.

The MATA Mentorship program capitalizes on the fact that many of us face the same struggles in the traditional Ag classroom. The hope is to make sure new teachers never feel like they are alone in tackling these challenges. This program offers the opportunity to share that advice and hear from a panel of season teachers. Topics include things like cellphone management, FFA management, work / life balance, training CDE teams, classroom organization, etc. Be on the lookout for more communications regarding meeting schedules and topics for the upcoming year.

A LETTER FROM THE UNIVERSITY

The second American agricultural revolution occurred between 1945-1970 with the transition from horse drawn equipment to tractors. In the last 2 years, there has been a realization of autonomous tractors onto production sites across the globe. As machinery continues to advance so have Agricultural education programs.

The Agricultural Science and Technology (AGST) Major - which includes specializations in Agricultural Education, Agronomy and Environmental Horticulture continues to adapt with new research and advances in technology. It also continues to be increasingly pivotal for programs to engage with stakeholders through reflective discussions as technology influences future practices.

Agricultural Education students participate in courses with content experts across 7 areas of agriculture. Students in AGST now have the opportunity to participate in a 3 series course set to prepare them to become a certified drone pilot.

Students would complete Advanced Crop Science (AGST400) and Tractor and Equipment Operation, Safety and Maintenance (AGST401) with a two-credit PLSC399 independent study course. Together, these three courses will provide students with hands-on drone operation in an agronomic setting while preparing them to take the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) Part107 Unmanned Aircraft General – Small (UAG) exam.

These courses build upon the previous precision agricultural practices in courses by the agronomy instructor Dr. Bill Phillips. Ag Education students would be able to engage with applied drone technology in AGST 400 & 401, but necessarily need to complete the independent study unless they are intending to complete the FAA exam.
