GOVERNMENT GRANT OPPORTUNITY

THE WORLDS - WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW...

Attending the Worlds for the first time was an interesting experience - everyone has to have a first time, right? The NHPA does a fabulous job with everything, they have done it time and again and have it all down to a fine art - things are organized, they mostly run on time, and they are on top of everything. But there was a lot that we didn't understand when we got there for the first time...

First off, there are more classes than we are used to in our own tournaments. There are the usual 40-foot groups for men, but there is also a Senior Men's category at 40-feet. Same goes with the women's groups, and there is also a Senior Ladies category. This past year there were A, B, and C groups for the Senior Ladies and the regular ladies had 9 categories. The Elders are just what you would expect, but with groups from A to K. For all classes, depending on the size of the registration, each group can have two sub-groups, think A1 and A2, and you can "win" whichever group you are in. And then there are Juniors and PeeWees. There are 15 players in each group, and you will play 4-5 games a day, playing everyone once over three days.

You will have your schedule weeks in advance of the tournament and you will know exactly who you are playing against and what day and time that you will play. If you want to research your competition, grab yourself a coffee and sit down with e-shoes. This information is pretty much written in stone - if folks drop out, they will fill spots with pacers, even right up to the last minute. Pacers get paid so if you think you would like to do that and get some extra practice in the clay, go for it!

There is a set format for the two-week time period for the overall tournament. Monday to Friday of the first week is divisional group play for the lower groups - think E through K in some cases, men and women, and the Juniors and Cadets. There are four shifts each day - 8:00 am, 11:00 AM, 2:00 PM and 5:00 PM. That means 3 hours between shifts so you play very efficiently - remember that 30 second rule to play both shoes? It is alive and well here so time yourself and see what it feels like - it is longer than you think.

The Saturday night of the first week is set aside for the Hall of Fame and Awards banquet. The awards are NOT for horseshoe play taking place at the tournament. They are NHPA service awards and Hall of Fame inductions only, but there is a lovely dinner and drinks and social time if you are so inclined. The cost for the banquet was approximately \$30 US.

Sunday there is no tournament play. The NHPA provides an all-faith service on Sunday and all the pits are available for practice. You can only practice on the practice pits other than this, and there are only six of those. There will be off-site practice somewhere in town with clay pits - the Lansing Horseshoe Club had a lovely outdoor venue available to the participants this year, we tried it out but I'm not sure that many took advantage of it.

Starting on Monday of the second week, play picks up again with the higher classes and continues until the end of day on Wednesday. If you want to watch Allan Francis play, this will be your chance 😊.

Championship flight play begins on Thursday. You have to be in the top 16% of ringer percentages to play in this group, and it costs an additional \$50US to play. This is the real “world championship” play - if you place in your division, you are a “divisional winner” not a world champion.

As soon as your division has finished playing, your prizes are awarded. There will be a room somewhere in the venue for this purpose where pictures of all the winners are taken. In many cases, they pay up to 6th place out of 15 competitors. Pictures are taken of all 6 winners, then just the first 3 who receive a trophy in addition to their cheque, then the winner alone is photographed with the big trophy.

When you book your accommodations for this event, be clear about your plans. Be aware that if you stay beyond the second Wednesday, you are likely a spectator only paying for an extra three nights' accommodation. If you did well and won in your division, you already have your prize so check the cancellation policy for your hotel. We were able to cancel the last three days of our reservation with a couple of days' notice but not all venues will do that.





Father-daughter team from Port Alberni was in Victoria over Labour Day for provincial tournament

Nicole Dabney and her father, Jack Dabney, are provincial horseshoe champions after winning their respective divisions at the B.C. finals in Victoria over Labour Day weekend. The Dabneys are from Port Alberni and practice at the Dry Creek horseshoe club.

Nicole won the Women's A division with a 9-1 record, and pitched nine percent above her average. She finished the B.C. Horseshoe Association championships with a 50.64 percent ringer average, giving her an overall average of 48 percent.

"I was quite excited to go," said Nicole, who finished third in B.C. in 2021 when the finals were in Abbotsford. "This is my first time winning ladies since I was a junior."

Nicole won a junior girls title in 2011, Junior Girls B in 2014 and Junior Girls A in 2015.

Nicole is in her 17th year playing horseshoes: she started when she was eight years old. She said she had a pair of good games during the tournament—one at 60 percent ringer average and one at 58.4 percent. The highest percentage of the weekend was 61 percent by one of the top competitors.

"I made sure I didn't let any external things bother me," Nicole said. "I learned to tweak how I was throwing; slow down."

The 2023 B.C. championships were Jack's first since before the coronavirus pandemic. He qualified in 2021 but a health emergency right before the provincials prevented him from competing.

Jack beat O'Neil Allard in a playoff to win the Elders E division. Allard had a 37 pitching percentage, which was the top of the division, but Jack managed to beat him on the second day of competition. That forced the playoff, and Jack won the final game.

The Dabneys are already looking ahead to next year's provincials, to be held in Cloverdale, as well as the world championships coming to Abbotsford. "I plan to go to those two," Nicole said.

Anyone curious about playing horseshoes can join club members on Wednesdays and Sundays at 11 a.m. at Dry Creek Park.
