As we emerge from the busy holiday season, the days are getting noticeably longer and there is the promise of lots to do outdoors.



THE WORLDS - WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW - Part 2

It was very interesting and unfortunate that the NHPA changed the tournament schedule, what... the day after our last newsletter was published? So, the format is not as I explained in great detail - it is the opposite - so Monday to Friday of the first week will be the higher divisional group play. Think A-D groups for men, women, elders, senior women, and senior men (these are older men who still throw from 40 feet).

Championship flight play will begin on the Thursday of the first week. You have to be in the top 16% of ringer percentages to play in this group, and it costs an additional \$50US to play. This is the real "world championship" play - if you place in your division, you are a "divisional winner" not a world champion.


All other divisions will play in the following week.

You will still have your schedule weeks in advance of the tournament and you will know exactly who you are playing against and what day and time that you will play. There will be a link to the registration form for the Worlds later in this newsletter.

So, how different is it to play in clay? I found that my shoes still bounced occasionally and they never really did get sucked into the clay. Occasionally they slid just a little, but what they did do differently was stand up. In the sand they might roll over or flip, preferably onto the pin, but in the clay, they stand right up. They can be knocked on to the pin or knocked over having an effect on the score, or you may do that to your opponent's shoe.

If you arrive early enough, you can practice on the pitches but once tournament play begins you can only practice on the designated practice courts, and there weren't very many so time there is limited. There will be practice pits somewhere in the host city - we found the outdoor clay pits in Lansing without any trouble. It was a lovely facility, but it was smoking hot outside in Michigan so you couldn't play for long. You will be able to warm up on your designated pits but if you haven't played in clay you will want a little more time than that - no one likes surprises during tournament play. Pacers get paid \$20US per game so if you have the energy for that, it's a good way to get in some extra time.

I was never formally shown how to groom the clay pits - I just did what I saw others do and hoped for the best. The pits are groomed after every game. There will be a water jug available to sprinkle the clay. Then you take the shovel and turn the top layer over and try to smooth it over with the shovel. Sometimes an extra sprinkle of water helps but it was a difficult job. The pits are not very deep and the clay is quite heavy to turn. You can tell who plays in the clay on a regular basis - their pits looked perfect while mine looked like a marching band had gotten lost in it. The last step is to spray paint the pin white. None of my opponents ever commented on my pit grooming skills or lack thereof. Important note: you are not allowed to adjust the clay during the game without your opponent's permission. Occasionally when a shoe stands up it leaves a big hole in the clay and you might like to smooth it out with your shoe - you have to check with your opponent before you touch it.

Scorekeeping is done on computer right at the court and scorekeepers look after two games at a time, so make sure that you have their full attention when you report your score. Some of them are new to scoring so be patient with them. The person scoring is the one who reports to the scorekeeper. On the scoreboards below, one game is in yellow, and the other in white. The other board scores the two games playing on the other side of the boards. If you think that you can keep two games straight at all times, there is \$20US to be made for every game that you keep score.



I found that the noisy and encouraging banter of our local league and tournament play does not live at the World Championship - kind of like the big golf tournaments, no one makes a sound until well after the swing. However, if you were ever going to take tournament play seriously, would the World Championships not be the place to do it? It's like regular horseshoes with a touch of formality about it. Introductions before each game are polite and reserved. Bob McCauley had provided us with City of Victoria pins and I gave one to each new opponent. Not everyone exchanges a hospitality gift but I received a goodie bag, a pencil, and an Arizona t-shirt. There wasn't much talk during the games - a

quiet 'nice shot", "bad luck" or "well done" was about the extent of it and definitely no Bam Bams, yeehaws, or yelling at your shoe, although the odd cursing under one's breath was probably alive and well. But after the game was concluded, win or lose, the conversation was looser and really friendly. So go with your best horseshoe manners and game face but be prepared to meet some really lovely folks. Some of them have been attending this tournament for years and they understand the need to keep our sport alive so they love to encourage us newbies.

Water is provided for participants and there is portable metal stadium seating available - bring a cushion to sit on if you plan to be there for long periods or your own folding chair. There will also be a horseshoe washing station - your shoes might get pretty mucky after 15 games in the clay. When you check in, usually the day before everything starts, you will be given a welcome package with info about things that are available locally. If you don't play till the second week and choose not to arrive till then, you still check in and get your package. There will be food available to purchase somewhere at the venue or you can venture out to explore the local neighbourhood. I can't recall if the same venue sold beer... Ron and Polly's Horseshoe Pitching Supplies from Texas bring a good selection of their horseshoe merchandise so if you're looking for new shoes or accessories like measuring sticks, etc. you can shop onsite. Polly does horseshoe jewelry and it is all reasonably-priced in US dollars plus they take credit cards - check them out online at https://horseshoes4u.com/. There will also be a separate T-shirt venue of some sort to get your souvenir shirt.


Some things to note:

- We are excited to announce that we are presenting unique custom-made trophies to all category winners!



CLUB NEWS - LADYSMITH

Recollections by Jerry Melissa...

Thought I would reminisce about my Horseshoe beginnings since they began simultaneously, 50 years ago, with the first year of the Ladysmith Horseshoe Club!

In 1973, I was 31 years old with a growing family and looking for a new activity to replace golf. I was an avid member of the Mount Brenton Golf Club in Chemainus and found that I was spending far too much time on the links! 5-pin bowling was my winter sport of choice at the time.

Coincidently I read an article in the Ladysmith-Chemainus Chronicle about a Ladysmith resident that had just won the B.C. Horseshoe Championship in September, 1974. Bob Timothy was not unknown to me. He was a fellow longshoreman worker with my dad. I knew my dad loved the game of horseshoes but he wasn't very good at it. During longshoreman picnics the shoe tournament was the highlight of the day.

I immediately phoned Bob and asked him about the game of horseshoes. He told me that he was a member of the Nanaimo Horseshoe Club but that Ladysmith was in the process of building a horseshoe club and facility at Transfer Beach. A fellow Ladysmith resident, Len Copp and others were instrumental in the formation of the new Club.

Bob invited me to take part in the final shoe tournament of the club in Nanaimo later that month. While there I became enamoured with the whole experience! I asked Bob and Youbou resident, Murray Raynor (another former B.C. champ) to show me how to throw a 1 1/4 delivery.

After investigating the best horseshoe to use I ordered two pairs of Ted Allens and proceeded to construct a shoe pit in my back yard! I also joined the fledging Ladysmith Horseshoe Club that Fall.

Between October 15, 1974 and May 15, 1975 I practiced an hour a day: rain and snow did not deter me!

The new club facility was an immediate success. At one time it boasted of almost 200 members. Each of them and their supporters purchased building blocks for \$2. Each block was inscribed with the name of the donor!

Many members went on to reach top horseshoe achievements. Ladysmith boasted many Provincial, Canadian and International Champions: Bob Timothy, Harvey Robbins, Tony Rondow, Murray Rayner, Lindsay Hodgins, Bernice Busch, Wilf Gregory, Earl Morris and Maryse Atkinson!

It was a perfect setting and right away, tournaments were well-attended with free camping and park facilities that were the envy of everyone!

For the next ten years I enjoyed the club and loved representing it throughout B.C. and the rest of Canada. Tournaments were well-attended and hosted some of the best players in Canada. The club boasted umpteen members who went on to win Provincial and Canadian Championships.

But in 1982, family duties called and I retired from competitive play and dropped my membership in the Club. I moved from Ladysmith to Duncan and then to Youbou. When I decided to again join the horseshoe fraternity, I was told that the Victoria Horseshoe Club had to be my club of choice: Youbou, unlike Ladysmith, was in Zone 1 for all senior competitions.

The Ladysmith Horseshoe Club continued to be the most sought-after facility for Island tournaments. Victoria members especially enjoyed the weekend away from the Capital City. Nanaimo eventually folded and joined Ladysmith!

The years of Covid brought many clubs to near extinction and Ladysmith suffered more than most! However, the present executive is both improvising and creative in their 'future' thinking! The past glory days are more than possible to return!

I am so very pleased to identify with the club's' 50-year anniversary. I am very fortunate to still be playing this wonderful game. And I regret that many of my associates from the 1974 year are not here to help celebrate the Clubs' success. They would be so very proud!



CLUB NEWS - SOOKE


SHPA ended 2023 with our annual Santa Parade and our Christmas party.
