1st Amendment (1791)

Congress shall make no law:

 - Prohibit the Free Exercise thereof
- Abridging the Freedom of Speech or
- Or of the Press
- Right of the people peaceably to Assemble
- To Petition the Government for a Redress of Grievances

14th Amendment (1868)

No State shall make or enforce any law which

 shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States;

nor shall any **State**

- deprive any person of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law;
- nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.







Event Permit Steps

Some legal issues can arise from local regulations or licensing requirements for entertainment venues. Pride Events may need to comply with specific rules, and disputes can occur if these regulations are perceived as overly restrictive.

State & Local Ordinances, Regulations, & Rules

Monroe, NC

Small Towns rarely have Ordinances and may have Forms and Policies usually to prevent events.

Amarillo, TX

Medium-sized Cities start to have Ordinances and Forms with Policies and Procedures that make it easier yet flexible. Creativity and Expansion.

Charlotte, NC

Large Cities have Ordinances for everything with Forms, etc. that may actually harm

Hidden – Read Policies and FORMS

- 4. Parks and Recreation facilities are available for private rentals only. Rentals or events that are advertised or open to the public are not allowed.
- 5. No admission fees may be charged at the door or entry; no concessions may be sold; no admission fees shall be used for personal financial gain. Fundraising events permitted only for approved non-profit (501c3) organizations. Any fundraising event must be a private event and invitation only.
- 6. Individuals listed on rental forms are responsible for the facility during the rental period. Please provide adequate supervision of guests.



DISCRIMINATION SOMETIMES IS SILENT

Out of the 14 rentals of the Entire Park since 2021, 1 was City Police, 6 were Special Olympics in 2022, 4 for events organized for and by people of color like a reunion, 1 for a business, and 2 by Union County Pride.

Pointers for Records Request

- Look up State Laws and compare to Federal
- Look up the Records Request form or email
- Be precise
- Remember you can always change or add to a new request

Best CYA & FAFO

Get an ATTORNEY on the Board or as Legal Representation listed on the Organizational Website.

Make sure the attorney knows Constitutional Law AND Transactional Law such as the bureaucracy of event permits ALONG with never saying things like "well I think kids should not be around drag."
