

"After graduating from Holy Ghost School I attended Gaskill Junior High School in Niagara Falls for two years and then went to Niagara Falls High School on Pine Avenue my junior year and senior years, graduating in 1958 and riding on a school bus for the first time. It was a huge change going from a small school to one that had 700 students. At Niagara Falls High School I played trombone in the school band and played varsity football, making All-League. I was selected to play in the Ad Club All Star football game at the old Civic Stadium in Buffalo and was voted the most valuable lineman. I received several football scholarship offers and chose the University of Nebraska on a full scholarship, playing with several men that were eventually drafted into the NFL. I attended the University of Nebraska for two years and then chose to take a different path in life.

"I came back to Niagara Falls and went to a welding school to learn a trade and then worked 38 years for Tribacher in Niagara Falls. After they closed the plant I worked for a company in Tonawanda for five years, retiring as an Industrial Mechanic in 2003 at age 63.

"In 1964 I joined the US Army Reserves stationed on Porter Road in Niagara Falls and served for six years. In 1965 I met my future wife, Kathy Marzolf from North Tonawanda, at a church softball game, where two friends introduced us. We were married in April 1967 and were blessed with two wonderful daughters, Amy and Heidi.

"Amy attended Holy Ghost from grades K-8, eventually graduating from UB with a Registered Nursing degree, working at Children's Hospital for several years. In 1995 she married Todd Murray and had two children, Jared (22) and Megan (19). Both her children, my grandchildren, attended Holy Ghost from PreK-8th grade and are now in college, Jared at UB studying Computer Science Engineering and Megan at Geneseo studying Anthropology.

"Jared and Megan are the fourth generation to attend Holy Ghost school in our family; their greatgrandfather, Arthur Dubois, attended the first school, followed by myself and my sister, Jane Andrews, followed by my daughter Amy Murray and then her two children, Jared and Megan. "I cannot express enough how important a Christian education was to me and my family. It has shaped all our lives through every generation, giving us all a strong faith and a purpose in life. It is a firm foundation that continues to mold our lives even today. The outstanding academics, personal attention and Christian love shown at Holy Ghost school by the wonderful and dedicated teachers and staff is still on display today, 178 years after my forefathers immigrated here from Germany.

"Thinking back to my experience at Holy Ghost school, I recall grades 1-4 were on the first floor with one teacher and grades 5-8 on the second floor with one teacher. I remember riding my bike to school and in the winter, walking through deep snow and snowstorms, living about a mile away. We had no organized sports activities, no musical instruction, and no field trips. We always looked forward to our special Christmas Eve program which included recitations from each student. After the service, all the kids got a brown bag filled with fruit, nuts and some hard candy; we all appreciated that.

"For Confirmation class the 7th and 8th graders were asked to memorize 300 questions and answers in the Small Catechism. On Question Sunday, Pastor Dahlke asked us random questions in front of the congregation. I remember one time in Confirmation class, one of the boys had checked his trap lines before he came to class and after walking into the room, Pastor Dahlke smelled something bad. The boy confessed he had been sprayed by a skunk while checking his traps. Pastor did excuse him from class that day.

"Every June there was a church and Sunday school picnic with games, food, chowder and children's parade, with all the kids dressing up. Everyone looked forward to the picnic, with fun fellowship."


"I remember working on the construction of our third school building in 1956 and fellowship hall in 1958. I helped put up the ceiling tile in the fellowship hall and us younger men put stones down for all the sidewalks and driveway, in preparation for the concrete being poured.

"The 1967 construction of our present church began with a lot of volunteer labor. My contribution was dumping a lot of stones by wheelbarrow for the church basement and cutting rebar holes in the I-beams for the heating pipes. One of the big jobs was nailing the roofing to the rafters with three pound hammers, using spikes that were seven inches long. Some of the men went into the woods to cut trees to support roof rafters during bricklaying for the walls. Men would work well into the night after working their day jobs; they were very dedicated. Norm Camann did the plumbing and heating, Norm Moll all the electrical work, and Charles Carr Sr. was overseer of the construction. Many members of the congregation participated and helped in some way, either physically, financially, or both.

"I've been retired now for 18 years and try to stay active and busy tending to my large garden and sharing the produce, playing trombone for the Bergholz German Band for 50 years, and taking hikes with Kathy on trails in the area. In past years, Kathy and I enjoyed bike riding and traveling the word, especially our trip to Israel and Jordan with other members of our congregation. Through the years it's been a privilege to do maintenance and handy-man jobs at Holy Ghost church and school, working with my fellow retirees. I also enjoy cutting grass and gardening at church and school, making things look neat and cared for. I am thankful for the health and strength God has given me and very blessed to have my immediate family live close by; we are all very close and enjoy being together and helping one another."



MEET THE TEACHERS

WE OFTEN HEAR THAT THE BEST PART OF HOLY GHOST IS ITS TEACHERS. SO EACH ISSUE WE'LL INTERVIEW A CURRENT TEACHER AT HOLY GHOST, TO GET TO KNOW THESE AMAZING PEOPLE A LITLE BIT BETTER.



As a child in the 1970s and 80s. Gail Carrier (Stoelting) walked through the doors of Holy Ghost Lutheran School each morning, usually after walking or riding her bike to school. The school buzzer would buzz five minutes before the school day started, and again at 8:30am to signal the beginning of the school day. Each classroom contained two grades of students with one teacher, her favorites being Mrs. Witkop for third and fourth grade and Mr. Kerr for eighth grade. She recalls going outside in all kinds of weather for recess- playing on the huge piles of snow in the winter, and playing kickball or spending time on the swings in nice weather. It might surprise current students to know that the teacher stayed inside the school during recess and would call the kids from the school doors when it was time to come back inside.

Mrs. Carrier was encouraged to become a teacher by the director of a daycare center where she worked. The director accommodated her schedule to allow her to keep her job but to obtain her teaching degree from Buffalo State College at the same time. After graduating, she took a long-term

substitute position at St. Peter North Ridge, and then in 1994 Mrs. Carrier walked back through Holy Ghost school doors on her first day as a first and second grade teacher. She had a sense of deja vu, as she found books in the school library that had her name in them from when she checked them out as a student years before! She was again able to experience chapel, the annual Christmas lunch, and track and field day, this time as a teacher instead of a student. Throughout her time teaching, Holy Ghost has grown with the addition of four classrooms, as well as additional classrooms where the stage used to be, and currently the "megaroom" being utilized for teaching inside the gymnasium.

Mrs. Carrier currently teaches second grade, which she says is her absolute favorite grade to teach! She particularly loves Tasting Tuesdays in second grade where they try a new food each week and journal the experience, as well as teaching her students about the Iditarod Sled Dog Race. She loves how the students embrace the Iditarod each year, and one of her favorite stories is when a student brought their life-sized stuffed Husky, Hank, to lead their sled dog team inside the classroom, and then continued the tradition at home for a couple of years with Hank as lead dog. The creativity and fun she puts into lessons she teaches in the classroom linger for years to come.

When Mrs. Carrier is not inside the classroom, she keeps busy as a 35-year volunteer firefighter/EMS with Bergholz Fire Company where she has held offices of trustee, secretary, vice president, parade lieutenant and currently serves as president. She is also a member and past president of the Bergholz Ladies Auxiliary, and serves Holy Ghost Lutheran church on the altar guild and as director of youth, and was a member of the adult choir. She enjoys reading, working outside in her garden and flowerbeds, and tent camping with her family and friends. She still lives down the road from where she grew up on Stoelting Street in Bergholz and shared an interesting fact: her house is on land that Holy Ghost used to own and use as a soccer field!


Mrs. Carrier has two grown daughters who are both Holy Ghost alumni, Hannah who is 25 and is a full-time Niagara County

dispatcher, and Emma who is 21 and a recent graduate of SUNY ESF. Her husband, Mark, was called to his heavenly home in 2010. When he passed away, the school and church community wrapped their arms around her and her daughters, which she believes is part of what makes Holy Ghost so special, as this continues to be done to this day for families experiencing difficulties. She says Holy Ghost has always been family oriented, caring for each other, and that this helped her in her decision to become a teacher and volunteer in the community.

"Having experienced Holy Ghost school as a student, a teacher, and a parent has given me an interesting insight into our school. As a student, I was grateful for the education I received that made it an easy transition to the public high school that I was





Beloved former pastor of Holy Ghost, Reverend Albert William Bahr was called to his heavenly home on November 20, 2021. During his 70 year ministry he served congregations in Milwaukee, Detroit, Buffalo, Bergholz (NY), Port Hope and Sebewaing (MI). He was blessed to lead 2 congregations to build new churches because they outgrew their existing facilities.

Al, more commonly known as "PB" or Pastor Bahr to many, was known first and foremost for giving credit to his Lord for everything, for his subtle but sharp wit, deep and unshakeable faith, humility, heart for service and ministry and a deep love for Christian education. He baptized and confirmed many of our alumni.

"I'm sure there were many others just like me who were motivated by this man's faith and have tried to make a positive influence throughout this world. I was blessed to have known him and his family for many years while living in Western New York."

"Pastor Bahr's time spent here following His divine call influenced so many of us and generations that follow. It is inspirational to know that so many in the family remain engaged in Christian education."
