# WHY YOUR SEATING CHART MATTERS

You might be thinking, “*Can’t people just sit wherever?*”

Technically, yes. But if you want a wedding day that flows beautifully—where guests feel included, engaged, and drama-free—then *thoughtful seating is your secret weapon*.

Think of your seating chart like a movie cast list:

- It’s how you set the tone.
- Control the energy.
- And avoid casting feuds that ruin the ending.

## CEREMONY SEATING 101

### The Basics:

- **Front Row:** Reserved for immediate family.
- **Left Side / Right Side:** Traditionally, one side is for the bride’s guests, the other for the groom’s. But modern weddings often mix it up and say, “Pick a seat, not a side.”

### Who Sits Where at the Ceremony:

Group	Ideal Location
Parents	Front row, center
Grandparents	Front row or second row
Wedding party	Stand at the altar or sit in reserved seats
VIPs/Close Friends	Rows 2–4
Guests	Filled back to front (ushers can help!)

**Pro Tip:** Leave room for photographers. Avoid putting anyone directly in their sightline.

# RECEPTION SEATING: THE REAL FUN BEGINS

## Head Table or Sweetheart Table?

**Head Table:** Seats the couple + wedding party (great for camaraderie).

**Sweetheart Table:** Just the couple (perfect for a private breather and romantic photos).

## WHO SITS WHERE? (WITH PERSONALITY!)

### 1. The Lovebirds (You!)

- Best view of the room
- Not near speakers (trust us on this)
- Easy access for toasts & photos

### 2. Immediate Family

- Near the head/sweetheart table
- Keep divorced parents at separate tables (trust the peacekeepers)

### 3. Extended Family

- Within view of the couple
- Avoid placing them near the bar or speakers unless they're the party starters

### 4. Friends

- Group college friends, work pals, and hobby buddies
- Mix singles who might vibe—but avoid awkward setups (*This isn't The Bachelor.*)

### 5. Kids

- One big table with coloring books and kid-friendly snacks
- Assign a sitter or older teen to keep an eye on the fun

### 6. Vendors

- Yes, they need to eat too! Feed them during guest dinner service (near the kitchen or out of guest view is fine)

# SEATING STYLES: CHOOSE YOUR FLOW

Style	Vibe
<b>Rounds</b> (8–10 guests)	Classic, great for conversation
<b>Banquet/Long Tables</b>	Elegant, communal
<b>Mix &amp; Match</b>	Fun and modern
<b>Lounge Areas</b>	Add near dance floor or bar for casual socializing

## SEATING CHART MISTAKES TO AVOID

- Putting all singles at one “leftover” table
- Sticking frenemies side-by-side
- Forgetting dietary restriction notes
- Leaving too much space between guests
- Letting Uncle Ron plan the chart

## TOOLS TO MAKE IT EASIER

- **Digital Drag-and-Drop Planners:** *AllSeated, Trello, or Zola Seating Tool*
- **Spreadsheet Nerds:** Use Excel/Google Sheets with tabs for RSVPs, table numbers, and meal choices
- **Old School:** Sticky notes + a large board = total visibility and flexibility

## LAST WORD OF ADVICE

Your seating chart doesn't have to be perfect—it just needs to make your day flow. You're designing comfort, conversation, and connection.

So grab a snack, pour a drink, and treat your seating chart like a game of Tetris... Only with more dancing and fewer falling blocks.
