
# The Irish Influence in Harriman

# William Henry McGlauflin, American clergyman.

- Member permanent commission on temperance, Universalist General Convention, 1900-1908
- Member American Council World Alliance for International Friendship Through the Churches
- Ordained Universalist ministry, 1882, Harriman, Tennessee, 1891-1896

- At its first convention in Rochester, New York, in 1890, the Young People's Christian Union (Y.P.C.U.) turned its focus to missionary work. This focus shaped the actions taken by the Y.P.C.U. in the following years by the appointment of its first missionary, Rev. William H. McGlauflin
- Despite being operational for only one year, building a new church, given the economic situation in Harriman, was a plausible objective for the Y.P.C.U. Harriman was barely a town in early 1890, but growth was almost assured. Northern businessmen through the Tennessee Land Company were making substantial investments in Harriman to exploit abundant coal, iron, timber and limestone resources.
- The cornerstone to the Grace Universalist Church in Harriman was laid on December 2, 1891. The church was formally dedicated on Easter Sunday, April 17, 1892, with a sermon preached by Rev. Henry L. Canfield. By 1895, the debt-free church had 140 members. The Y.P.C.U. would soon deliver the deed of the church to the General Convention and turn its attention to its next missionary effort in Atlanta.

#### **GOVERNANCE OF CHHCO**

The management of the organization shall be vested in the following manner:

#### A. Four Officers

- i. **President** to preside over meetings, represent the organization at all functions, to call any special meetings, and to appoint committees and chairpersons thereof
- ii. Vice-President to assume the powers of the president in his/her absence and to take on special assignments as requested by the president
- iii. Secretary to record minutes at the meetings, to keep a file of such minutes, and when requested by the president, to accept assignments involving correspondence and the keeping of records
- **iv. Treasurer** to administer all financial duties of the organization, to have the authority to disburse necessary funds, as directed by the president or Board of officers/directors and to provide a statement of the organization's finances at each meeting or as otherwise directed.

#### C. Up to a total of twelve elected officers/directors

D. Officers and directors may be elected to succeed themselves, however officers are not to exceed four full terms in the same position.

#### F. Elections:

 The officers and directors shall appoint a committee to prepare a slate of candidates to be voted on at an annual first quarter scheduled meeting of the organization as determined by the governing body.

#### TREASURER'S REPORT

- January 1, 2023 Accounts' Balance = \$32,005.82
- 2023 Gross Income = \$42,344.02
  - ~\$24,000 earned from combined Hauntings Tour and Christmas Home Tour (includes advertisers & sponsors income)
  - \$18,000 received in direct donations for Harriman Hall restoration
- 2023 Expenses/Disbursements = \$33,670.18
  - \$582.74 spent on administrative activities (insurance, website)
  - \$8,677.09 on Fundraising Expenses, calendars, t-shirts, etc.
  - \$23,366.98 spent on Harriman Hall renovation, taxes, utilities
  - \$1,043.37 spent on charitable projects & events (Walden Ave., Killeffer Park, picnics, dinners, donations, Trunk or Treat)
  - 2023 Net Income = \$8,673.84
- December 31, 2023 Accounts' Balance = \$40,679.66



 Finishing & Furnishing of the vestibule and two classrooms/meeting rooms on the primary floor


 Install restrooms towards the office space (southeast corner)




New Restroom Configuration


