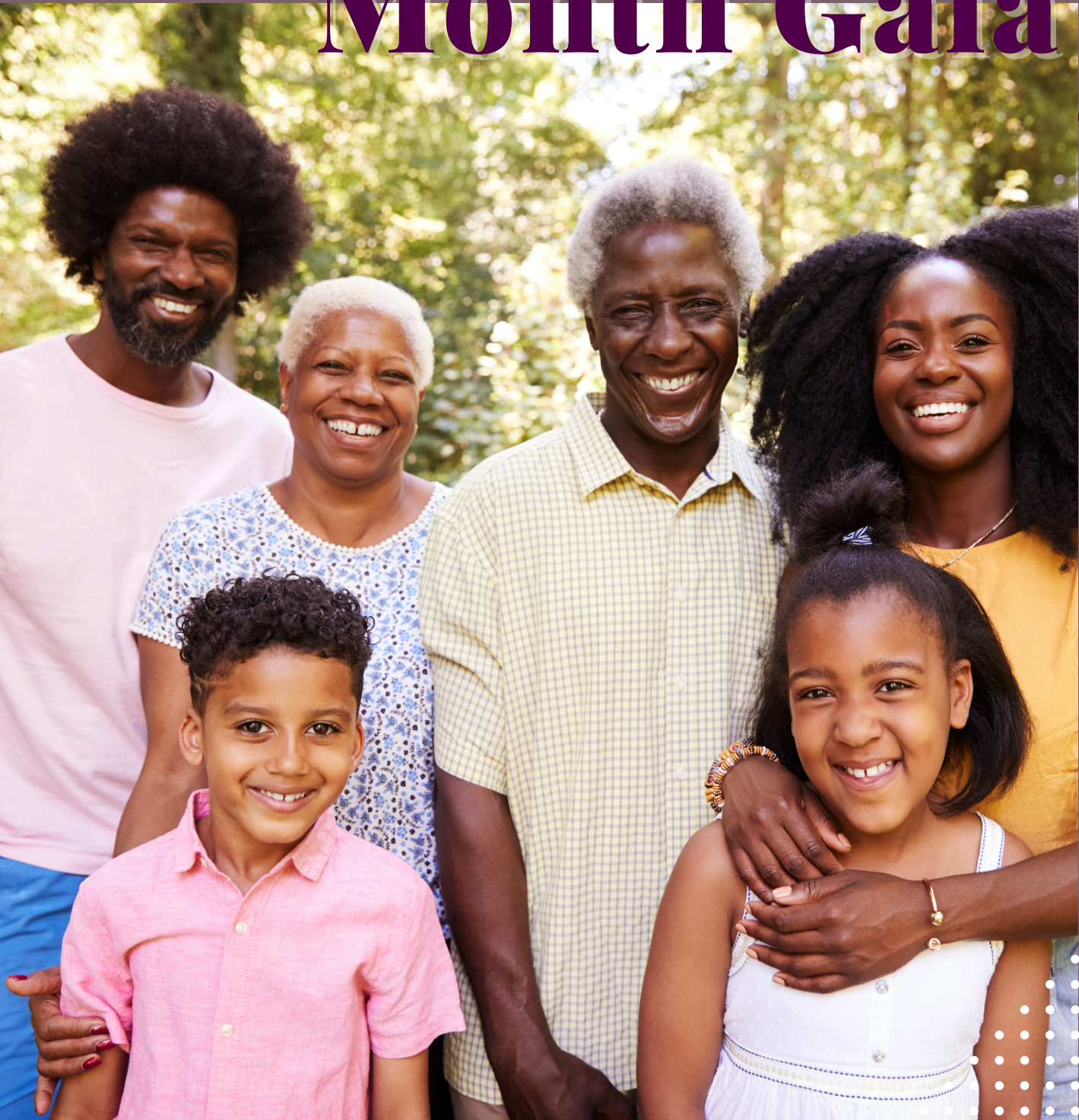

President's Welcome

Greetings and welcome to the 2021 Virginia Black History Month (Virtual) Gala!

We are excited that you decided to join us during these unprecedented times. As a result of the recent pandemic our organization, like many others, decided to host a virtual event. Tonight we're going to hear from some incredible speakers, whose families have impacted the African American culture for years..

Since this year's theme was "the black family," I wanted to perform some research into my own family history and discovered a milestone called, "The 1619 Project," led by Pulitzer Prize Winner and writer, Nikole Hannah-Jones. Nikole Hannah-Jones is an investigative journalist from the New York Times Magazine who looked into the impact of slavery during its 400th year anniversary of when the first enslaved Africans arrive in this country. She called her project the 1619 project in commemoration of the year when enslaved Africans first arrived. It is an ongoing initiative lead by The New York Times Magazine that began in August 2019. After reading her work I discovered that the first 20-30 enslaved Africans arrived in 1619 and were sold to the British colony that was located in an area that was now called Point Comfort, Virginia.

What I learned from Nikole Hannah-Jone's research is that two of the names of those first 20-30 enslaved Africans brought to the British Colony, were Antony and Isabella (Tucker). Then in 1624, Antony and Isabela had a child, who was baptized and given the name, William Tucker, and the first black family was established in the British Colony.

What happened next is close to a miracle, something that I thought would never happen in my lifetime. I discovered that the descendant of (William Tucker) still lived in the Hampton Roads area which was originally known as Point Comfort, Virginia. The Tucker Family can trace their lineage back to 1624 with the birth of William Tucker in that first British Colony. After some further research, I came across "The William Tucker 1624 Society."

Within hours I had the unique opportunity to talk with Mr. Vincent Tucker, a direct descendant of William Tucker and President of the William Tucker 1624 Society.

As a result of my conversation with Mr. Tucker, I discover that there was a marker in Hampton, Virginia where these first 20-30 enslaved Africans arrive here in the United States. (I was already planning a trip)

It was during my annual trip to Virginia Beach, Virginia with my wife, that I convinced her to make a slight detour to (Old) Point Comfort, Virginia to see the marker and the sight where we first arrived. Upon arrival, I immediately gazed out over the water and I began to pray for what had taken place here more than 400 years ago. I felt like I was standing on sacred ground.

I soon realized that my presence there, on that date, as a free man, was most likely the answer to someone else's prayers for the future of enslaved Africans and their families. I then began to pray for the future descendants of those brought to this country by force and pray that they too will have a better life than what we today.

Many of their names we will never know, their faces, we will not see, and their stories we will not hear. Yet their blood and DNA do run through my veins, and like a well-engineered, blueprint of the origin copy.... **we are still here!**

I was then reminded of the prophet Jeremiah's letter to those that were taken captive and carried off to Babylon by King Nebuchadnezzar.

It said in [Jeremiah 29:4-7] This is what the Lord Almighty, the God of Israel, says to all those I carried into exile from Jerusalem to Babylon: "Build houses and settle down; plant gardens and eat what they produce. Marry and have sons and daughters; find wives for your sons and give your daughters in marriage, so that they too may have sons and daughters. Increase in number there; do not decrease. Also, seek the peace and prosperity of the city to which I have carried you into exile. Pray to the Lord for it, because if it prospers, you too will prosper."

So tonight, let's sit back at home, spend time with our families, and enjoy dinner together as we celebrate the beauty and rich tapestry of African American history.

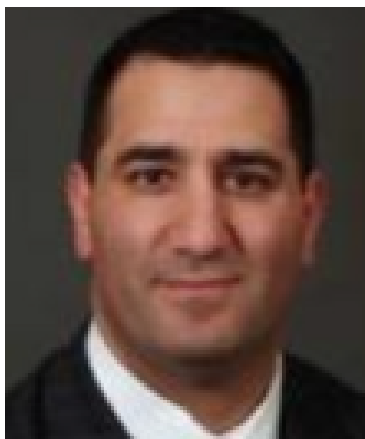

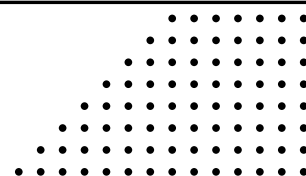

Presidential Proclamation

This February, during Black History Month, I call on the American people to honor the history and achievements of Black Americans and to reflect on the centuries of struggle that have brought us to this time of reckoning, redemption, and hope.

We have never fully lived up to the founding principles of this Nation -- that all people are created equal and have the right to be treated equally throughout their lives. But in the Biden-Harris Administration, we are committed to fulfilling that promise for all Americans.

I am proud to celebrate Black History Month with an Administration that looks like America -- one that reflects the full talents and diversity of the American people and that heralds many firsts, including the first Black Vice President of the United States and the first Black Secretary of Defense, among other firsts in a cabinet that is comprised of more Americans of color than any other in our history.

It is long past time to confront deep racial inequities and the systemic racism that continue to plague our Nation. A knee to the neck of justice opened the eyes of millions of Americans and launched a summer of protest and stirred the Nation's conscience.

A pandemic has further ripped a path of destruction through every community in America, but we see its acute devastation

among Black Americans who are dying, losing jobs, and closing businesses at disproportionate

A pandemic has further ripped a path of destruction through every community in America, but we see its acute devastation among Black Americans who are dying, losing jobs, and closing businesses at disproportionate rates in the dual crisis of the pandemic and the economy.

We saw how a broad coalition of Americans of every race and background registered and voted -- more people than in any other election in our Nation's history -- to heal these wounds and unite and move forward as a Nation.

But also less than 1 month after the attack on the Capitol, on our very democracy, by a mob of insurrectionists -- of extremists and white supremacists -- a bookend of the last 4 years and the hate that marched from the streets of Charlottesville, and that shows we remain in a battle for the soul of America.

We must bring to our work a seriousness of purpose and urgency. That is why we are putting our response to COVID-19 on a war footing and marshalling every resource we have to contain the pandemic, deliver economic relief to millions of Americans who desperately need it, and build back better than ever before.

That is why we are also launching a first-ever whole-government-approach to advancing racial justice and equity across our Administration -- in health care, education, housing, our economy, our justice system, and in our electoral process. We do so not only because it is the right thing to do, but because it is the smart thing to do, benefitting all of us in this Nation.

We do so because the soul of our Nation will be troubled as long as systemic racism is allowed to persist. It is corrosive. It is destructive. It is costly. We are not just morally deprived because of systemic racism, we are also less prosperous, less successful, and less secure as a Nation.

We must change. It will take time. But I firmly believe the Nation is ready to make racial justice and equity part of what we do today, tomorrow, and every day. I urge my fellow Americans to honor the history made by Black Americans and to continue the good and necessary work to perfect our Union for every American.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, JOSEPH R. BIDEN JR., President of the United States of America, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and the laws of the United States, do hereby proclaim February 2021 as National Black History Month. I call upon public officials, educators, librarians, and all the people of the United States to observe this month with appropriate programs, ceremonies, and activities.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand this third day of February, in the year of our Lord two thousand twenty-one, and of the Independence of the United States of America the two hundred and forty-fifth.

2021 - The Black Family:

Representation, Identity, and Diversity

The black family has been a topic of study in many disciplines—history, literature, the visual arts and film studies, sociology, anthropology, and social policy. Its representation, identity, and diversity have been revered, stereotyped, and vilified from the days of slavery to our own time.



The black family knows no single location, since family reunions and genetic-ancestry searches testify to the spread of family members across states, nations, and continents. Not only are individual black families diasporic, but Africa and the diaspora itself have been long portrayed as the black family at large.

While the role of the black family has been described by some as a microcosm of the entire race, its complexity as the “foundation” of African American life and history can be seen in numerous debates over how to represent its meaning and typicality from a historical perspective—as slave or free, as patriarchal or matriarchal/matrifocal, as single-headed or dual-headed household, as extended or nuclear, as fictive kin or blood lineage, as legal or common law, and as black or interracial, etc.

Variation appears, as well, in discussions on the nature and impact of parenting, childhood, marriage, gender norms, sexuality, and incarceration. The family offers a rich tapestry of images for exploring the African American past and present.

Bonita Patillo

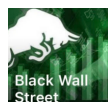

Keynote Speakers

DONNIE & PAM SIMPSON,



Donnie Simpson has been called a trailblazer and a true media legend. His love for music and radio started as a young kid growing up in Detroit where his mother owned Simpson Record Shop, a bustling Motor City Mom & Pop, which started in 1966. He decided to become a disc jockey after WJLB, a popular Detroit radio station, broadcast live one day from the shop. Simpson was asked to read live commercial spots that day, by legendary disc jockey Al Perkins, who was greatly impressed by the little 15-year-old with the big voice.

Within weeks, Simpson became a teen reporter for WJLB, and soon thereafter was given his own radio show. He was only 15. After eight years on Detroit airwaves, Simpson headed to WKYS-FM in Washington D.C. There he became the morning show host and program director. He led the station to such unprecedented rating success, that Billboard magazine selected him as the country's #1 Program Director of The Year, and Air Personality of The Year in 1983. In 1993 he took his talents to WPGC-FM in D.C., but not before embarking on a television career.

In the early 1980s, Simpson was the backup sports anchor for legendary sportscaster George Michael on WRC-TV, the NBC station in D.C. He later paved his way into television history when he joined BET as host of the ultra-popular Video Soul. Considered one of the nation's first video jockeys, Simpson stayed at BET for 14 years, racking up hundreds of memorable live interviews with many of the greatest recording artists of the era. "This guy carried us on his shoulders," Bob Johnson, founder of BET once told a reporter. "You cannot write the history of BET without putting Donnie Simpson in the forefront as the major contributor to the creative and economic success of the company."

Moving from television to the silver screen, Simpson appeared in such classic films as Krush Groove and The Five Heartbeats. He also appeared on the popular sitcoms, Martin and The Jamie Foxx Show.

An active community volunteer, Donnie has served as Honorary Chairman of the National Black Family Reunion and has assisted in fundraising efforts for AIDS research and the United Negro College Fund. Donnie and his wife have established The Donnie & Pam Simpson Scholarship Fund, to help minority college hopefuls in need of assistance in getting the opportunity they deserve. Always committed, in 2005 Donnie stayed on the air for 16 hours and raised over \$220,000 for the victims of Hurricane Katrina.

In January 2010, after 30 years as DC's morning coffee, Donnie left the radio. He took a 5 1/2 years hiatus from the airwaves, but on August 17, 2015, he returned to host the afternoon drive at Majic 102.3, a Radio One station in Washington, D.C. The hype from Simpson's return was so astonishing, it was the #1 trending story on Facebook and Twitter during his first few days on air.

On October 4, 2015, Donnie was inducted into the R&B Music Hall of Fame. He was the only non-musician to be inducted. Donnie said, "This is so special to me because I'm not cool enough to be in a group of musicians, but it says that what I did impacted them significantly, and that's really cool."

While adored by millions, perhaps Simpson's biggest fan is President Barack Obama. On the presidential campaign trail in 2008, Mr. Obama stopped to record and send a congratulatory video message to Simpson, citing the media giant for his great tenure in radio.

Donnie Simpson has consistently carried #1 ratings. Even now in his 51st year in radio, he's #1 with a bullet. This kind of success and reputation have earned him "Icon" status among his peers, The White House, and his millions of fans worldwide.

The winners are students who have demonstrated exceptional community service and academic excellence while in high school. The scholarship is awarded in honor of Civil Rights Activist, Distinguished Professor and Winner of Presidential Medal of Freedom, the late Dr. James L. Farmer Jr.

James Leonard Farmer Jr. was born on January 12, 1920, in Marshall, Texas. His mother was a teacher and his father a minister who was also the first African American citizen to earn a doctorate in the state. Surrounded by literature and learning, the young Farmer was an excellent student, skipping grades and becoming a freshman at Wiley College

in 1934 at the age of 14. While there, he continued to excel as part of the debate team, and his eloquence and storytelling abilities would later be heard nationally as an adult. (Dr. Farmer's personal story is portrayed in the movie "The Great Debaters" with actor Denzel Washington.) Committed to racial harmony,

Dr. Farmer, his friend George Houser, along with a multi-racial group of colleagues, formed an organization called the Congress of Racial Equality (CORE). By 1961, CORE had 53 chapters throughout the United States dedicated to racial harmony and Civil Rights. During this time, Dr. Farmer became one of the most prominent African American leaders of the era, joining the ranks of figures like Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and Roy Wilkins. After numerous medals, awards, honorary degrees and special recognition by state and federal government, Dr. Farmer became the Distinguished Professor of History and American Studies at Mary Washington College (now the University of Mary Washington) in Fredericksburg, Virginia.
