The Rules

1. This scholarship is open to All African-American High School students enrolled in any Prince William County Public Schools and Manassas City Public Schools in Virginia with plans to pursue higher education.
2. The scholarship application deadline ends on **Monday, February 13, 2023 at 5:00 p.m.**
3. Entries should be limited to two pages plus the application form and cover sheet.
4. Each entry must be signed by the student, school counselor and civic representative(s).
5. The entry must be submitted on time. (No late entries will be accepted)
6. Include the title of your entry on both the first page of the essay and on the cover sheet.

How to Enter: In 500 words or less, write your response to the questions below:

Essay: Black Resistance: Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs), were developed by Northern white philanthropists, but they emerged as a space for the formation of activists, artists, business owners, educators, etc. and their continued operation have stood as a testament to Black investment and creative thinking in the face of the changing landscape of higher education. Furthermore, students at HBCUs were at the forefront of the Civil Rights Movement, Black Power Movements, and social justice movements from the nineteenth to twenty-first centuries. (ASALH, 2022)

Consider the following scenario: You have just been awarded your PhD in Educational Leadership from Harvard University. Your goal now is to return to the African American community which has impacted your professional career over the years. You have been offered a leadership position in every Historical Black Colleges/Universities (HBCUs) within the Washington DC, Maryland and Virginia (DMV) area. **Question(s):** Identify one HBCU in each of the three locations. Select two of the three schools and compare their past history in Civil Rights, Black Power Movements and/or Social Justice. Which of the two schools do you believe made a greater impact within the three movements? Why?

7. **Judging Criteria & Rules:** The winners are selected by a neutral judging panel and rated in five areas:

a. **Criteria**

- (1) All African-American High School students enrolled in any Prince William County Public Schools and Manassas City Public Schools in Virginia with plans to pursue higher education.
- (2) Good Academic Standing.
- (3) Participation in the local community through civic programs and volunteerism.
- (4) Plans to attend college after graduation from High School.
- (5) Quality of Essay.

b. **Rules:** The judging will take place under the supervision of **Dr. Sherry Springs**, Human Systems Engineer for the Department of the Navy. She will be joined by other community leaders to determine the winner of the scholarship.

- (1) Participants agree to be bound by these rules and the decisions of the judges.
- (2) All decisions are final.
- (3) The winner will be notified by phone call by Monday, February 20, 2023.

8. Send a cover sheet with your entry and include the following information: Title of the entry, name, home address, applicant phone number, parent name, and cell phone number.
