

On Being Anglican

a column on Anglican identity and tradition by Father Tim

Our annual meeting is on February 4th! Wait, what's an annual meeting!?

Annual meetings are part of the warp and woof of being an Episcopalian, but they may be new to those who haven't spent much time in the Episcopal Church. Basically, they are the time when the church gets together to look at how we live together, celebrate our community, and elect leaders to help manage and guide the church. That's easy to say, but all this is founded on something very important and particular to the Episcopal and Anglican traditions.

The term "Episcopal" points to our polity: we are organized vertically, with bishops making the rules and organizing what we can and shouldn't do liturgically and organizationally. The name, however, missed another important aspect of our polity. We are also organized horizontally and democratically. It is not only bishops or rectors, like myself, who make decisions. You all have a say in how the church runs, too. Power is shared between the clergy and the laity. You are not a simple, passive participant in the life of the church but, instead, an important and essential piece of how we live our lives together.

That's why the annual meeting is a celebration. It's a celebration of who we are together and how we live, the things we've done and the things we hope to do in the future. Your role in the church polity, however, also comes with a responsibility to care for and support the church in whatever way you can, be that through leadership, stewardship, volunteering, raising issues or critiques, or helping to praise and suppose your fellow parishioners. In other words, we're all in this together.

I think this has a direct effect on our spiritual lives. We all give our lives to God and we take up our cross, but God asks us to be participants in the Gospel, not only followers. God asks us to join him in how we live our spiritual lives, not just to have our spiritual lives lived for us. We submit ourselves and are given life and freedom to act in loving communion with one another and with those we serve. Jesus said, "Ask of me whatever you wish." More than an invitation to get what we want, Jesus here is asking us what is in our hearts and souls so that we may, together, work to its fulfillment in our lives and in the world around us.

The annual meeting is just one way that we respond to this reality. At the annual meeting, the leadership of the church will be asking who of you wishes to help lead the congregation, what hopes or dreams we have for the future, and what we can do to better live out our call to serve the poor in Christ's Name. These questions won't be part of a survey of opinions but a call to join together in the spiritual work of the Holy Spirit to make our community holy and effective in our community. I pray that you'll take this invitation and live it during 2024 and in the years to come.

A Habit of Prayer

deepening one's experience of God in prayer, alone or with our family

What are you giving up for Lent? I've never really liked this question. It makes Lent feel like a training regiment or an exercise program. Lent is neither of these things. Like all things that have to do with the Church and Christianity, the primary goal of Lent is to deepen our relationship with God.

So, as we approach Lent (which begins on Ash Wednesday, February 14th), instead of asking yourself, "What am I giving up for Lent?", ask yourself "What is my relationship with God?" Where is that relationship thriving? Where is that relationship stagnating? Where do I feel connected to God at the hip? Where do I feel like God is millions of miles away? Sit down with God and these questions and really ask them - and then really listen to what God points to in your life. That's where you begin your lenten journey.

Many of us spend the entire year trying to figure out how to get closer to God. We want a deeper relationship with the divine, and the problem is that we don't know how to get it. We may pray often, we may have set times that we devote to God, or we may read devotional or theological books that try to guide us deeper into the mystery that is the Trinity. So what makes Lent any different? What more can we do that we haven't already done?

Lent is special because, first, the entire Church is engaging in this effort to examine their lives with God. Lent is further special because it ends with Easter, a time when we are assured that all the new practices we've undertaken have been fulfilled - not through us necessarily but through the grace of Jesus Christ. In part, Lent is so different because we can lean on the Church and on the assurances of Easter so heavily. God breaks into our lives differently during Lent than God does during other times of the year. Rest in the fact that you are not alone.

Also, instead of doing many things, try to take on one, single spiritual practice. Do one thing and do it well. If you want to give up chocolate, then give it up and talk to God about it. If you want to take on praying the rosary or saying Morning Prayer, then do those things and don't worry about doing anything else. Let the grace of these practices flow through you and engage you with the Holy Spirit. But most of all, do one thing and do it well.

Finally, look at our liturgy. Listen to the readings with a heart tuned in to Lent. Come to our Taize services on Sunday nights and sink into the music and the presence of others and of the divine. Receive the Sacrament with the knowledge that Easter is coming. All these things can make for a more holy Lent.

Pastoral Care Committee Update

Over the past several months members of the Pastoral Care committee have been exploring programs that have been designed specifically to prepare individuals to serve as lay chaplains (extensions of the priest in the delivery of pastoral care). After much prayer and discussion the Community of Hope International (COHI) was selected. In late February the first group of lay people from Christ Church will participate in 13, 2 ½ hour training sessions. We are blessed to have Father Tim participate in a co-facilitator role.

The focus of the sessions is two-fold. First, to educate a person in the theology of pastoral care, skills and methods of caring for others, and ways to recognize gifts and needs of others. Second, to form a community of caregivers that can rely on one another for support, reflection, and prayer. Pastors, experienced lay clergy, social workers and other pastoral care givers from the surrounding community will be invited to share their wisdom and experiences related to each session.

A \$1,200.00 grant from the Episcopal Diocese of CNY will cover all expenses for the COHI curriculum and related pastoral care resources including books for our church library. There are on-line and in-person opportunities for ongoing continuing education. There is no cost to the participants.

Afternoon Book Group


