

Rector's Meditation

Newness in a New Year

Happy New Year, Christ Church! Today, we start a new year in the world and a new year in our lives. The old year is behind us, many of us are debating when to put away our Christmas decorations, and we are hoping - praying! - that 2023 looks a bit brighter and 2022.

It does not take long, however, for that “new” feeling to wear off. Most of us head back to work on the 2nd. Children return to school. Taxes are due soon. Today doesn't seem much different than last week, except in name. And we may wonder: is anything new? Or is today, this week, this month, this year, and this me, is this all just the same? Is “newness” just a game we play on the 1st before we head back to real life?

In a way, yes, the world does not drastically change when clocks strike 12:00 midnight on January 1st. We created the calendar, not God. We shouldn't expect everything to be magically new because we've added one to the year.

This is why Christians don't always talk about “newness” but “renewal” - and that can happen any day and even any moment. Like Jesus' wounds after the resurrection, in “renewal” we don't leave the past behind but take it into a healthier, more whole and holier sense of ourselves. This means that we don't need to change our lives drastically in order to feel the presence of the Spirit, who is ever drawing us into renewal and deepening our relationship with God in Jesus Christ.

So for this new year, don't consider what “new” thing you can do to better your life but about how who you are, what you are, how you live, and the path you walk can be renewed. How is God inviting you into renewal, into transformation, and into rebirth? How is God loving you - even those parts of you that may be broken or in pain - how is God loving *all* of you and your life into eternity, where all things will find their perfection?

Vestry Voices

A Tale of Two Faiths

I cannot recall a time when I was not aware of God. I have always had a dynamic interest in religion and the role it plays in history. I looked at religion with a discerning eye through the context of analysis. Nevertheless, I had a strong sense of belief in God, from a very early age.

I was raised by parents who had an interfaith marriage: my father, a Muslim immigrant from Palestine, and my mother, a first-generation Lebanese American raised in the Catholic Faith. They met because my mother's church group was conducting a clothing drive for Palestinian refugees (shortly after the Palestinian diaspora) and my father was moved by my mother's compassion. They were sorting through old shoes, when he realized that my mother was someone he wanted to see again. He asked her on a date, took her to dinner, and she ordered spaghetti.

As they got to know each other, they realized their compatibility in spite of the religious differences. Both my mother and my father held a healthy skepticism toward dogma. Each would interpret and question the tenets of religious tradition. At an early age, my mother wanted to read and interpret the Bible (which the nuns in her school did not like), and my father, examined Islam with a critical eye particularly in the context of political strife in the Middle East. (He also enjoyed beer and bacon from time to time.)

At that time, marriage was no doubt a challenging decision for them. (My mother had uncles who were vehemently against it.) However, marry they did. And, in spite of the odds stacked up against interfaith marriages, my parents' story is a good one of nearly 66 years. My mother passed away one year ago last March. My father, now 95, grieves her passing. My mother is dearly missed by all who knew her.

My parents raised their children with an understanding of both Islam and Christianity. They also instilled in us an appreciation of all faith traditions, and of the variety of diverse perspectives and world views. As a family, we did talk about religion and politics at the dinner table; and those were some lively discussions, indeed.

As we all grew into adulthood, my siblings and I took different paths. Mine was to Christianity. I married my husband, Matt, who was baptized in the Presbyterian church (with water from the River Jordan, he tells me). Today, when I consider Matt's and my collective family, we have quite a theological representation: including but not limited to; Baptist, Methodist, Lutheran, Catholic, Presbyterian, Muslim, Buddhist, Agnostic, Atheist, and, as you all know, Episcopalian.

It may very well be that the openness instilled by my parents is what draws me into the Episcopal Church and to Christ Church in particular. I follow in the example of my parents in wanting to serve and help others through a variety of ministries. When I am at worship, I often think of my mother and my father, raised in two very different religious traditions, but each wholly committed to God and serving God's purpose here on Earth.

And for them, I give thanks.

On Being Anglican

A column about Anglican and Episcopal identity written by Father Tim

This month, I want to write about an aspect of Episcopal identity that is, actually, not about Episcopalians at all: something called “full communion.” As you can tell by simply driving around town, there are many denominations of Christianity. Like most religions, Christianity has spent many centuries finding new ways to disagree. Some of the issues are critical - others, not so much. And while Christians have found many ways to overcome differences, many of us still define ourselves by institutional lines that were made hundreds of years ago.

In the past eighty years or so, this trend has reversed. Many denominations sought ways to open to one another in ministries, doctrine, and worship. Such efforts can be small, and change happens slowly, but nothing can happen without relationships forged in Christ. And these relationships continue to deepen even to this day.

That said, while we may work in ministry with many different denominations, there are some with whom we are in “full communion.” This designation means that, first, we recognize one another as parts of the Church and that we won’t excommunicate one another around doctrinal issues. Second, and perhaps more importantly, our members and clergy may move freely between denominations. This is how Pastor Rick, an ordained Lutheran minister, could serve as an interim pastor here without much ado. An Episcopal priest could, similarly, serve a church in the Evangelical Lutheran Church of America without needing more education or further ordination. This is the same situation with the Moravian Church, the Philippine Independent Church, and the Church of Sweden, among others.

It’s not a long list now, but it’s an important list. It shows that we’ve found something more important than fighting about doctrine: and that’s Jesus Christ and those Jesus served. Our work as Christians isn’t to “get it right” but to love.

January 14th Samaritan Center Visit

As of September, the Samaritan Center resumed serving hot meals in house after two years of offering only takeout meals because of Covid concerns. This means we will need about 15 volunteers to staff our service at the 12:30 pm meal. Fortunately, Rebecca has informed me that several of our youth have expressed interest in participating. Each young person must be at least 14 years of age and be accompanied by one adult, preferably a parent. If we have 4 or 5 adults who are interested in arriving at 9 am to help with meal preparation, we can do that in addition. Each shift should last in the neighborhood of 3 hours.

As past volunteers are aware of, members of the Samaritan Center's staff will be there to provide guidance regarding our duties for the day and answer any questions any of us might have. This is a hands on opportunity to provide a service to a needy population and meet people that we might not encounter in our normal daily routines, most of whom are very appreciative.

Here is the lineup for winter/spring 2023. Everyone is welcome. You need not have read, or finished the book, to enjoy the conversations. All are welcome!




