

Rector's Meditation

There's something really fun about being in the church at night. It feels special. We don't usually come to the church at night, and when we do, we don't usually turn on all the lights. We use just enough for ourselves, whether it's for a meeting in Crosby Hall, a worship service in the Nave, or (for those of us who work at the church) maybe we're burning a bit of the midnight oil. Every now and again I forget something in my office, and all I need to do is turn on enough lights to see my way about. The rest of the church is sleeping. Only this little corner is awake.

But that all changes on Christmas Eve, doesn't it? And it changed the week prior when we worshipped in the Blue Christmas service. And even if you only came at

the 4:00 service, it was dark enough when we left the building so that it seemed like night. On Christmas, it's not just one little part of the church that is lit; *all* of the church is afire with the blaze of Christmas! And it's not just the lights, but the music, the conversation, the presence of one another, and the joy of Christmas seem to fill up the darkness to the breaking point. Even when the lights are down low, and we only have small candles, the light seems so much stronger than the dark.

Christmas marks the darkest night of the year. Yes, the winter solstice was on the 21st, but we Christians mark this darkest of nights on December 25th: Christmas. It's when, we believe, the long night of waiting was over, when God stepped onto the stage of his own making as Jesus Christ and led us wayward, scared, lost, anxious, and sinful humanity to

salvation. We are now in the post-Christmas time: when each day will come with more and more sunlight. The days are lengthening for the northern hemisphere of the planet Earth, and, metaphorically, the days of our hearts are also lengthening in the daylight of Jesus Christ.

We are, however, still in darkness. COVID hasn't gone away. Our culture is still divided, and perhaps more than ever. Some of us are sick, either mentally, physically, emotionally, spiritually, or some mixture of each. The poor are with us, as are the depressed, the lonely, the destitute, and the sick. Christmas has passed, and we still live in the valley of the shadow of death.

The promise of Christ was not that his death and resurrection would end sin and death, but that both sin and death no longer have any *binding* power over us. We are not chained to sin. Death is not the last work. And that is good news for us, but it is certainly good and *much needed* news for a hurting world. And so, I implore you all: as we begin this new year 2022, do not forget Christmas. Do not forget the light of a beautiful church in the darkness of the night. Remember that *you* can be a light in someone else's darkness, and that Christ Church can be a light to those who are lost.

God bless you all, and happy new year!!!



Eucharistic Visitors: Coming to Visit When Needed



Christ Church is fortunate to have two people who are licensed as Eucharistic Visitors. A Eucharistic Visitor is a lay person who brings the consecrated bread and wine from the Holy Eucharist to people who are not able to attend the service on Sunday. Eucharistic Visitors bring communion to people who are in the hospital, rehabilitation centers, assisted living facilities, nursing homes and those who are at home. If you are not able to attend church and would like to request that communion be brought to you, please contact the office and one of our Eucharistic Visitors can arrange to bring it to you.

Mollie Mills: Warden

From the Rector's Desk



It's been about two years since we all began to hear, and react to, the COVID pandemic. Christ Church has remained strong and faithful throughout these two years, both because of our leadership and because of the steady dedication of you all. Thank you all for the prayers and time you have given to keeping our church safe.

In December, as you all know, a member of the parish attended church who unknowingly had contracted COVID. During this time, the vestry was re-examining our regulations to make sure we were up to, and well beyond, par. I am happy to say that, even with a contact, there was no spread of the virus. Even so, the vestry went ahead with further ways to keep worship even safer. Part of these efforts was to reach out to infectious-disease specialists and put before them what we've been doing. These conversations led to a number of changes.

This month, we'll install two new air purification systems in the choir loft. These systems are used in the Syracuse Symphony and are highly recommended. Further, we're looking at ways to keep the air flowing in the nave. Early in the pandemic, we were concerned with moving air around, especially across the choir where people were singing. We've found a much more nuanced answer in opening certain vents and airways to allow new air in and push old air out. We believe both these changes will even further increase the safety of those who join us on Sunday morning for worship.

The vestry continues to reexamine our regulations every few months and, especially, when the scientific community learns more about the virus. We'll keep you all up to date on these changes, and we invite you to chat with any of our leadership if you have a question or concern!

Did you know?

In the early Church, Christmas wasn't all that important. The early Church was very much focused on Easter, or Pascha. The death, resurrection, and ascension of Jesus Christ was what gave them faith, drew them together, and healed them in a world that, sometimes, was deeply hostile to them. Easter was, and continues to be, thought of as the "eighth day" of Creation, when the world was made new and we were loosed from the power of death. Easter's the thing.

As the Church grew, however, it began to wonder about, and to celebrate, its origins. At first, Jesus' birth was celebrated at the feast of the Epiphany, along with a number of other events in the gospels. Soon, Christmas was separated from this feast so that Jesus' birth could be remembered as a feast in itself, leaving Epiphany to carry the weight of three important events: the visit of the Magi or "Three Kings", Jesus' Baptism in the Jordan River, and Jesus' first miracle: turning water into wine at the wedding in Cana.

You might wonder: what in the world do these three things have to do with each other? Why not pick them all apart and make them their own feast? And hey, maybe we can get a five-day weekend out of it all!

Actually, these three events are tightly related to Jesus' "epiphany", his being-made-know. First, the Magi came from other countries, meaning that the life and work of God in Jesus was not for those of first century Palestine alone. At Jesus' Baptism, God made it known that he, Jesus, was God's beloved Son, and in whom God was well-pleased. Finally, Jesus' ministry as a miracle worker and healer, as well as a pretty awesome preacher, began in Cana at a wedding. In each, Jesus shows that he is more than just "some guy" but is, instead, closely bound to God's life and is even God Incarnate.

And so, on Epiphany, we celebrate that God isn't just some reserved deity watching us from afar behind some clouds. God is with us. God is among us. God was with us in Jesus Christ, and God is with us today, even this very moment. Thanks be to God!

Next Visit to Samaritan Center

Our next visit to the Samaritan Center will be Saturday, January 15th. Due to the Covid pandemic, they have refined and slightly changed their requirements for volunteers as described in the following:

New Volunteer Requirements -

5 Volunteers for Meal Prep 9am - 12pm

8 Volunteers for Meal Service 12:30 pm- 3pm

- Must be 14 years or older.
- Able to stand for up to 3 hours at a time and be able to assist with mopping and cleaning duties too.
- Willing and able to wear a face mask at all times.
- Have no COVID-19 symptoms or temperature or have close contact with suspected or positive COVID-19 situation/individual in the previous 14 days.
- Have not recently (within 14 days) traveled to any states that require a 14-day quarantine on return to NYS
- Not under quarantine or self-isolation directive

If volunteers are able to meet the above criteria, they will need to complete an individual application and identify their group in the comment section.

Wash with complimentary second wash within 5 days.




Please remember our furry friends when providing your food pantry donations! All pet food donations will be given to the FM Food Pantry and are much appreciated.

F.I.S.H. (Friends in Service Here) – Reopen and in need of volunteers

For some people transportation is not readily accessible, and the need to get to their medical appointments becomes critical. This is where F.I.S.H. comes in handy. The Fayetteville-Manlius-Minoa chapter of F.I.S.H. has been operating for over 35 years and transports people from the Fayetteville-Manlius school district and from the village of Minoa to and from doctors' appointments. Our clients do need to be ambulatory. F.I.S.H. is made up of all volunteers who give their time to dispatch, drive, or serve on various F.I.S.H. committees. We need scheduled drivers (one day a month) or random drivers (on an as-needed basis). If you prefer not to drive, we are in need of dispatchers, too. Dispatchers take the calls from clients one week a month and try to find drivers to transport them. If you would like to reach out and help members of our community get to their medical appointments, please give F.I.S.H. a call at 637-8158. You will meet wonderful people and at the same time be helping out people in need.

SYRACUSE MEMORY CAFÉ

Pebble Hill Presbyterian Church in DeWitt provides a place for community for individuals with memory changes (Alzheimer's and other forms of dementia) and their care partners in a safe, welcoming, friendly environment.

We invite any interested person(s) to join us on the second Wednesday of each month, year round, from 10:30 – 12:00 noon. Each café provides socialization, entertainment and a light lunch.

The Syracuse Memory Café is a free program, staffed by volunteers, and all are welcome. We simply require that our guests be people experiencing memory changes and that they have a companion or care partner to accompany them.
