To the People of Christ Church,

Here we are in summer, everyone! And you know what summer means! Watermelon and camping, warm days and swimming in the pool or lake, and green vestments from now until Advent! Yup, it's that time of year again: Ordinary time. Or, as I like to call it, the green half of the year.

But Ordinary time is anything but ordinary. It's about growth, which is why the liturgical color for Ordinary time is green. During this time, we as the Church stop telling the narrative story of Jesus' birth, ministry, death, and resurrection and begin to meditate on his teachings. How did God, in Jesus, call us to live? What sort of community is God calling us to have? How do we live those two great Commandments, love God and love neighbor, and how do we live Jesus' new Commandment to us: love one another, as Jesus loved us, love one another.

Jesus' teachings, however, weren't just about morality, though morality is an important part of what

Jesus was trying to tell us. Jesus' teachings were about prayer, about meditation and contemplation, and about connecting with the heart of our being. Jesus saw into people's hearts (think about the woman at the well, in John 4:1-42), as we remember at the start of each Eucharistic liturgy: "Almighty God, unto you all hearts are open, all desires known, and

from you no secrets are hid..." Jesus knows us through and through, the good parts and the bad. And God, through Jesus, sees who we can truly become and so nurtures us, in love, to that person. As the theologians put it, we are in an eternal act of becoming.

Cool, eternal acts of becoming, nice and heady and complicated, right? What does that mean for our lives lived with running out to the store for some milk, paying our taxes, and doing the laundry? What does that mean for this season of the Church, Ordinary time? It means that God has planted a seed in you: a seed of love, of hope, and of life. And that seed has gotta grow. It's gotta sprout, put down roots, stick its head up above the soil, stretch out branches and leaves and reach out up to the sun (or the Son, if you like puns).

God is nurturing something within you. You are a seed of Life that God wants to grow into a great, towering sequoia tree of Life. That's what we mean when we say that we are Sons and Daughters and Children of God, that God is growing something beautiful in us. And that beauty isn't just for us; it's for the world as well. Like the shade of a tree can help out those who are tired from the long summer heat, so should the Church (all of us together and individually) be a shade to those in need of some rest.

Spend some time in prayer this month asking God just what kind of seed is planted in you. Ask how God is nurturing you into fullness. Hey, maybe God's nurturing you with comfort and a bit of care after a long year. Or maybe God is nurturing you through a challenge to live more towards others in your life. God's nurturing hands take many forms, and it is through prayer, and the words of others, especially the Church, that we come to understand God's hope in us. Be courageous and pray. Be silent and pray. Be loving and pray. Sit with God Almighty and pray.

A Letter from the Wardens to the Parish

July/August 2021

It's been a while since you've heard from the Wardens and this Newsletter edition seemed like a great time to talk about what's been happening and happening quickly at Christ Church!

First of all, we began to make some changes in late May to open up our church to more activities and so with the Vestry and Rector's consent, the Church School began meeting in person, led by the Director of Youth and Adult Ministry Rebecca Russell. If you haven't noticed Crosby Hall yet, it's a real treat and the kids/youth are in a 'summer camp'—Camp Compassion.

More changes will be coming soon as we experience positive state- and county- wide responses by the government leadership and others that inform our decisions to provide a safe and inviting place for all to worship.

During our June property committee meeting we were able to do a walk around of the church grounds. During this walk it was determined that the railing system and steps into the main entrance were in extremely bad and unsafe conditions. The Ramp railing next to the church building is the worst and has since been removed. There is also a missing railing at the steps leading into and out of our building. Due to this hazard and safety concern the steps into the church were closed and are the setting for 4 beautiful flowerpots, which allowed us to create a more pleasant closing of the steps. The RAMP remains open and able to be used by anyone needing this type of handicap access.

Although we do not have a full cost for this important work to return our entrance to a safe and supportive entrance, we do know from conversations with the vendors that it will be an impact to our finances. Once we have those very specific details and timelines, we will be informing the Parish and seeking your input and approval.

As the lay leadership in our Parish, we continue to want to hear from each and any of you with your feedback or interest in what is happening. These are evolving days and times as the science and leadership of our pandemic virus is better understood and examined daily. The Vestry and all our lay leaders in concert with our Rector are excited to guide us all out of this restricted time and into a more open and less restrictive experience.

God Bless and we hope to see you as you return to Christ Church.

Altar Guild Recruitment


We are looking for new membership for our Altar Guild at Christ Church. At the present time we have eight members, and we need more. The definition of Altar Guild is "a group of laypersons in a parish church who maintain the ceremonial objects used in worship". It is a specialized and spiritual endeavor.

Duties include...

- -prepare Altar for services.
- -placement of proper seasonal colors.
- -arrange and place fresh flowers (an optional duty)
- -placement of candles.
- -ensuring priests vestments are in good order.
- -care, preparation, cleaning, and storing of all sacred vessels, linens, hangings, and candles.

We work together in teams of two. We serve approximately once a month depending on your availability. If you would like to shadow a member one weekend to see if this ministry is something that interests you, we can certainly arrange that trial.

Fun notes on Anglican tradition

Processions

We've returned to a few of our old ways of worshiping, and one of them is processions. This is one of the more ceremonial parts of our liturgy, when the priest, crucifer, acolytes, Eucharistic Ministers, and whoever else is up front walks slowly in accompanied by some beautiful organ music. But where in the world did this practice come from? Why not just start from the front of the worship space? Are we doing this all to just get in a few more steps?

Well, the procession began as a way to gather people to worship. In a time of fewer pocket watches and no cars, the priest and servants of the Altar would process through town with a cross. People would see them outside their windows and join the procession to the church building. When everyone was gathered, they'd head to church, through the open doors, and into the worship space. Then the liturgy would begin.

Nowadays, we all live some distance from Christ Church and so drive in, find our pew, and spend some time in quiet meditation (or quite chatting to friends). The only remnant of tradition is the small procession that begins our service. But we don't keep it around just because we like old things. We continue the procession because we need to be reminded that it is the Cross that leads us. The center of our life as Christians is the Cross of Jesus Christ, that we are called to pick up and bear. And our worship is all directed to the meeting of God through Jesus, which is realized in the Bread and the Wine of the Eucharist.

And so, when the cross of the procession passes us in our pew, it's tradition to bow towards it. In this, we are recognizing why we're in church worshiping in the first place and, also, what our call is when we leave the red doors into the mission field of a hurting world.

Bonus! It is traditional to bow when the cross passes us. Many also bow when passing in front of the Altar. What are two other times we bow during the liturgy? Here's a hint: one is a person, one is a name.

RUMMAGE SALE IS BACK!

We are very excited to announce the Rummage Sale is returning. We have made some modifications and changes to adhere to the Diocese Covid guidelines. We are splitting the sale over two weekends due to the overload of rummage sale items we're expecting this year. The sale dates will be July 16 and 17 AND July 24 and 25.

The Friday and Saturday sale, 7/16 & 7/17, will be for all non-clothing items. In other words, household furniture, kitchenwares, toys, electronics, decorative items, jewelry, etc. The sale will have the \$5 early preview on Friday evening. On Saturday entry will be free to all. You can begin dropping off the items for the first weekend following church on Sunday, July 11 and continue through 4:30 pm. On Monday thru Thursday that week organizers will be present from 9 AM till 9 PM daily for receiving additional deliveries. Save clothing for deliveries starting Tuesday, July 20th. Please bag or box clothing in separate containers if possible, labeling women, men, children, etc. It will help the workers get things sorted to prepare for the second week.

The next weekend on Saturday, 7/24, we will reopen the sale with all leftovers from the first weekend plus clothing added. In between the two weekends we will reset the merchandise and add the clothing in the extra space that should allow. That Sunday, 7/25, following worship, at noon our 55-gallon bag sale will take place. When it is over, we will do clean-up.

Now, due to Covid, we will have to have some carefully designed guidelines. During the sale itself, workers need to be Christ Church folks that have already completed their vaccine timeline. (Please get one now if you haven't yet! I know we'll need lots of workers this year!) We do not want to risk passing or receiving the virus. We will also limit the number of people allowed into the sale areas. As a result of this, we'll need workers to monitor the crowds.

There will be one entrance at the single red door (facing North Street) off the gravel parking lot. There will be a sign in sheet for all who enter. Masks must be worn properly, covering the nose and mouth at all times while in the building and social distancing of 6 feet must be followed at all times. There will be a designated walking pattern, indicated by arrows. Checkout will be in the Parish Hall and the only exit will be through the door leading to the side parking lot.

An exciting addition this year will be home-made donuts made by our Fish Fry Team. Take out donuts will be sold at the checkout and picked up outside the exit door.

For some people transportation is not readily accessible, and the need to get to their medical appointments becomes critical. This is where F.I.S.H. comes in handy. The Fayetteville-Manlius-Minoa chapter of F.I.S.H. has been operating for over 35 years and transports people from the Fayetteville-Manlius school district and from the village of Minoa to and from doctors' appointments. Our clients do need to be ambulatory. F.I.S.H. is made up of all volunteers who give their time to dispatch, drive, or serve on various F.I.S.H. committees. We need scheduled drivers (one day a month) or random drivers (on an asneeded basis). If you prefer not to drive, we are in need of dispatchers, too. Dispatchers take the calls from clients one week a month and try to find drivers to transport them. You will meet wonderful people and at the same time be helping out people in need.
