Rector's Reflection

Easter brings us the astonishing news that Jesus has been raised from the dead. Jesus then spent 40 days with his disciples as the Risen Christ, empowering them with the Holy Spirit so that they could participate in God's ministry of love, reconciliation, and the making of new disciples. On Ascension Day Jesus returned to heaven after commissioning his followers to proclaim the Good News and baptize believers. It was ten days later when all the believers were gathered for worship on Pentecost that the Holy Spirit swept through the house like a great wind and dispersed tongues like fire on each of Jesus' followers. The first response of these early Christians to the gift of the Holy Spirit was to spill out of worship onto the street and to tell the story of the Good News of Jesus Christ in way that everyone could understand.

Like the early Christians, many of us continue to wonder at the Resurrection of Jesus. It is both an amazing and difficult thing to believe, for in human experience death is an end, yet in Jesus we understand death as a new beginning. Jesus was fond of metaphors and similes from nature to help us comprehend the mysteries of how God works, and we can point to the very real transformation of seeds that crack open, come apart, and appear to undergo destruction before they can emerge as something new; we can also cite the caterpillar that enters a small, tomb like cocoon, liquefies, and emerges as a butterfly. We have real examples of what it looks like for life to be changed, not ended. Accepting this truth for

ourselves is a great challenge of faith, so we live with hope based in the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus. In Jesus, God came to show us what it looks like when a human lives a God filled life, dies faithfully, and is raised into new life with God.

We could, like the early Christians, gather in hope each week to worship and praise God in response to Jesus. That would be an excellent thing. But what would it take to get us up out of our pews and spilling out the door to share this Good News with our neighbors? What would light a fire in us for God? That requires the Holy Spirit, who, like Prairie Home Companion's Powdermilk Biscuits, gives "shy persons the strength to get up and do what needs to be done." We may or may not have had a dramatic experience of the gift of the Holy Spirit as those first Christians did. But we have all seen the Holy Spirit at work: quietly, persistently, lovingly, and mightily. We know what it is to be loved, to love, and to be empowered to share that love. I have seen God's love made visible at Christ Church in baptisms and confirmations, in Christmas Pageants and *Excellent Trouble*, in Christmas Marts and Rummage Sales, in Fish Fries and First Friday Dinners, in Church School and Youth Groups, in visits to those at home and in the hospital, in ceaseless prayer and great laughter.

How do we get out of our seats and share the very real Good News about the love of God? We've already begun. What we are asked to do is to open our hearts to the power of the Holy Spirit and tell the story of God's love in ways that different people can understand: food made with love and shared with hospitality, welcoming community, plays that are both funny and serious, cookies for people and water bowls for dogs at parades, showing up to share the work at the FM Food Pantry and the Samaritan Center, supporting veterans through Clear Path—the possibilities are as endless as the people wondering if God's love really is too good to be true, at least for them. It is through *your* presence, *your* ministry, *your* love, in whatever form that might take, that people can experience the life changing power of the Holy Spirit. It is, through the Great Commission, our mission to share the love of God as it has been given to us. As former President and ongoing Sunday School teacher Jimmy Carter says, "My faith demands—this is not optional—my faith demands that I do whatever I can, wherever I am, whenever I can, for as long as I can, with whatever I have to try to make a difference."

Memorial Day Hospitality Table

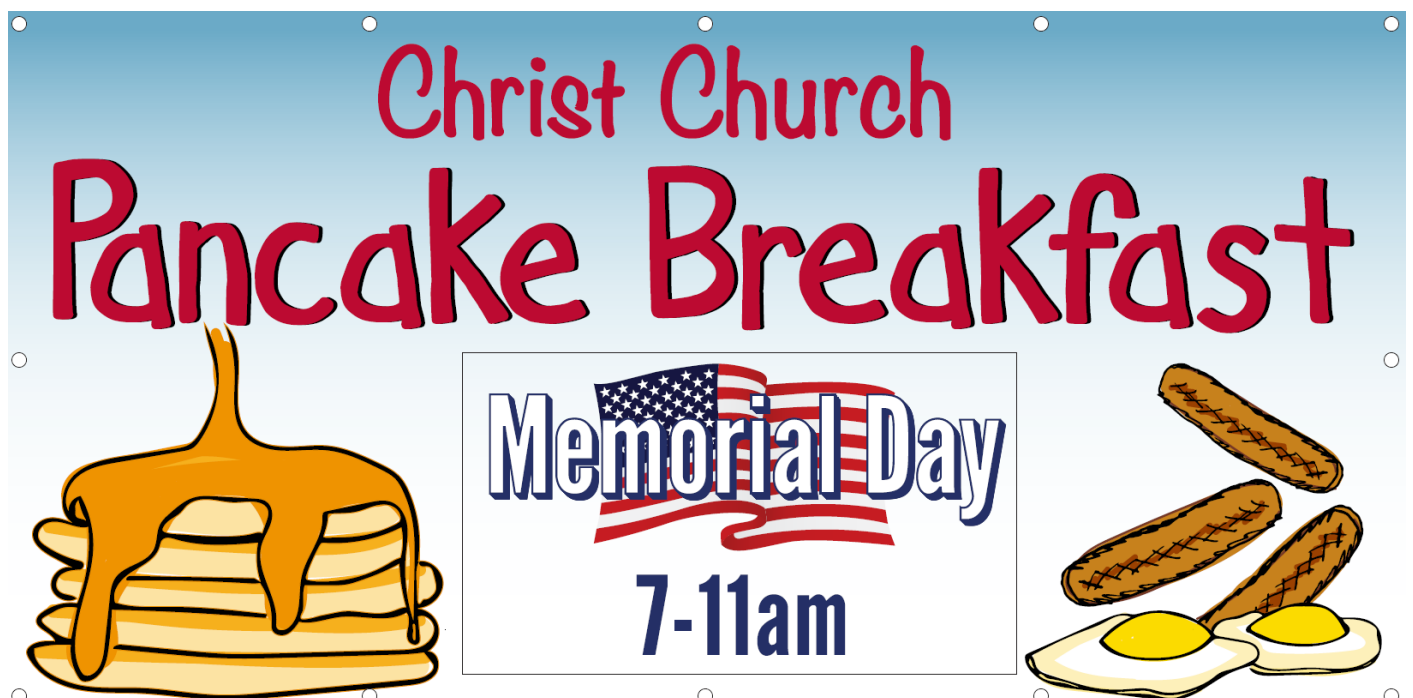

Worship Notes

Easter Season, also called The Great 50 Days, continues to unfold to Pentecost on June 9. On the fortieth day of Easter Season we celebrate The Ascension, when Jesus gathered his disciples to say goodbye again and they witnessed his ascension into heaven. Ten days later the followers of Jesus were together in worship for Pentecost. Pentecost means 'fifty days' and is when we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit to the Church.

Trinity Sunday is June 16, the Sunday following Pentecost, and is the time when we give special thanks for God making God's self known to us in all three Persons of the Trinity: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit or Creator, Christ, and Holy Spirit. Ordinary Time, alternately called The Season after Pentecost, begins the day after Pentecost and stretches until Advent, which starts four Sundays before Christmas.

During Easter Season and on Trinity Sunday the worship space is decorated in white, the color of light and purity. For Pentecost the church is brightened with red to evoke the fiery presence of the Holy Spirit. Ordinary time is known for its green altar, lectern, and pulpit hangings and priestly vestments. Green is the color of growth and Ordinary Time is a time of growth in the Church and its ministry in the world.

At Christ Church we also acknowledge the shift into summer with a change to a single worship service at 9:00 a.m. beginning on June 30.

Thanks to the hard work and great enthusiasm of our Christ Church folks, we have had had several successful events and collections in the past several weeks. We are delighted to report the numbers, as we have them:

- The Lenten Fish Fry made a profit of about \$3,000! This hard earned money was promptly used to cover most of the unanticipated cost of a new sealed combustion hot water heater, as we discovered a hole in the old one at our next to the last Fish Fry.
- The Rummage Sale profit so far is about \$5,000. Thanks to Rene’s willingness to have a follow up version at her community’s garage sale and listing items on EBay, this may increase.
- The Chicken Barbeque was our most profitable so far, earning over \$900.
- Our Birthday Bag collection for the FM Food Pantry resulted in \$605 for pizza gift cards and over 25 bags of birthday plates and napkins.

Samaritan Center Visit

Our next visit to the Samaritan Center will be **Saturday, July 20th**. Once again we will be helping to prepare the early afternoon meal, serving it and cleaning up. An early crew of four people will go at 11:00 am to assist in the meal preparation and a larger group will go at 12:30 pm to serve the meal and clean up. Adults and youth 12 years of age and older are welcome to participate.

We also will be taking cookies to serve at the meal. Participants as well as those who are unable to go may bake cookies. Any type of cookie, homemade or store bought, not containing nuts, is appropriate, bagged two cookies to a small snack bag.

We have visited the Samaritan Center several times before. Those who have gone before have found this a good “hands on” outreach opportunity that enables us to experience and interact with people whom we may not encounter in our normal daily activities as well as providing them a worthwhile service. The Gift of Flowers

One of the ways in which we offer glory to God is through gifts of beauty in worship. The music, stained glass windows, and altar hangings all enhance the beauty of our worship. The opportunity to offer fresh, thoughtfully arranged flowers is another unique way to give praise, thanks, and honor to God in the context of worship. At Christ Church we are blessed with a dedicated and talented Altar Guild, whose members purchase and arrange flowers in addition to reverently cleaning and tending the altar area and all the items used in worship. While people often express their appreciation for the simple beauty of our space and the loving care with which it is prepared for worship, only a few offer the gift of flowers.

Flowers may be given in celebration, such as for the birth of a child or grandchild, a special birthday or anniversary, and in acknowledgement of an important accomplishment such as graduation or a promotion. They may be donated in thanksgiving for friends, family members, co-workers, parishioners, and ministry leaders. Floral arrangements can be donated to honor people who have had an important impact on your life, such as a mentor, teacher, or spiritual companion. People also choose to give flowers to remember those whom they love who have died. Flowers brighten the worship space on many an average Sunday, and may also be donated out of simple appreciation.

While we have a modest budget for flowers, we depend upon donations to fund the beautiful arrangements we admire on a regular basis, so I encourage you to consider the gift of flowers. The flower donation forms are located in the entryway, just outside the doors into the worship space. The suggested donation for two vases of flowers is \$50, but any donation toward the cost of flowers is appreciated. You may have the flower donation noted in the bulletin in celebration, thanksgiving, honor, or memory of a person or occasion. We also have special flower donations for Easter and Christmas, which are used on those feast days as well as to help supplement the budget for other Sundays. Thank you for considering the gift of flowers, and please take the time to thank the Altar Guild for their ministry in creating the arrangements we all enjoy.

Worship and Welcoming

As part of our *Conversations* on Welcoming we have come up with some specific suggestions that **everyone** can implement for our worship services. Thank you for your awareness of others, and for your thoughtfulness in creating a welcoming environment.

- Greeting people in the parking lot- Say hello to anyone you do not know and introduce yourself. Guide guests to Church School classrooms, the nursery, bathrooms, and coat closets as needed.
- Creating a quiet environment- When approaching the entryway to the church, remember that many people prepare for worship through a time of prayer and quiet reflection. Please keep the entryway a quiet space where we welcome others and then move into silence. If you wish to have a conversation Crosby Hall is always available.
- Welcoming guests at the entrance- Invite visitors to sit where they would like. Make sure they receive a bulletin. Offer crayons, coloring books, and books to children.
- Making room- Christ Church members are encouraged to sit in the front half of the church so that those who are guests and might like to observe how our worship flows, as well as those with small children, may sit further back. When you sit in a pew, please move in unless you are saving a seat for someone so that others may sit next to you.
- Being aware- Notice guests and be ready to assist anyone who might have difficulty following the service. Help with finding the right book and page for psalms, service music, and hymns.
- Passing the Peace- In addition to wishing the Peace, also welcome newcomers.
- Helping children- Assist children coming in from Church School who may be looking for their family.
- Invite guests to Coffee Hour- introduce yourself to anyone you do not know, invite guests to Coffee Hour, then go with them and introduce them to others, especially people with whom they may have things in common.

Announcements and Reminders

The Rector's Discretionary Fund is a special account that is financed by the loose cash offering gathered one Sunday each month and by additional donations from parishioners and others. At Christ Church the **loose plate offering from the first Sunday of each month** is designated for the Rector's Discretionary Fund. Many churches also include a line item in the budget. The purpose of the Rector's Discretionary Fund is described in the Episcopal Church Canons as *"to be applied to such pious and charitable uses as the Rector or Priest-in-Charge shall determine."* Money from this fund is used to assist those in financial need, to support ministry, and to contribute to the work of the wider Church.
