### **Rector's Meditation**

Life and death are often mixed. This month, we Episcopalians observe Lent. We remember Jesus' temptations, his death, and his crucifixion. Outside, however, spring is coming. It may still be snowing, and it may be cold, but it won't be for much longer. We'll probably even see daffodils soon!

Death comes in the midst of life; life comes in the midst of death. Gwendolyn was born two weeks before Helene's grandmother died. Christmas is on one of the darkest days of the year. Our times of sickness, grief, and even our own deaths are those times when Jesus, the author of life, is closest to us.

Death and life are often mixed – but death is never the end of the story. A person's story of struggle and growth may extend into the next world, but no story ends in darkness and despair. In truth, stories do not end: they continue, in life, for eternity.

This is a truth we proclaim in the Eucharist, in service to others, and in our own faith journeys, but it is a difficult truth to acknowledge when we are in the midst of grief. Doubt seems to speak most loudly when we are in sorrow. This doubt is no sin but simply a natural part of sorrow. Later, when our grief has less bite, it's important to reflect on our doubt and our struggle so that God can teach us further and deeper wisdom about life - and death.

In this season of death, temptation, and struggle, do not try to do everything. Don't try to solve the mysteries of life and death. Don't try to figure out the nature of God. Simply be with God. Look upon Jesus' face. Sit and allow God to gaze loving upon *your* face. The most important part of any of this is to simply be and remain in love.

### Taizé Worship Service



During Lent we will hold a Taizé worship service on Sunday evenings at 7:00 p.m. Taizé is a style of worship that is quiet, meditative and prayerful. Simple music, scripture readings, prayers, and candlelight set a thoughtful tone. Taizé is an ecumenical community in France which draws people from all over the world for shared worship and work while living in community. Taizé services will be offered through Sunday, March 26. They are wonderful as a Lenten discipline or as a time to

invite people who might not be comfortable with more structured, formal church services, or for whom Sunday mornings do not work.

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We are happy to continue with our Lenten Fish Fries again this year! This is a big event for our parish and the community, and we could not do it without lots of help. Dwayne Wisbey and Michael Bull are the chief Fry Guys, but we also have the expertise of Sharon Wisbey and John and Suzanne Ball. Recruiting for additional helpers this year has expanded the roster of people working the phone, being runners, and helping with clean-up. 
For donations, it would be helpful if clothing is cleaned and bagged. Labeling bags/boxes for men, women, infant, children also helps! We collect all kinds of things including

### On Being Anglican

What you see in the picture here is the chalice on the Altar. It is mostly a "dressed chalice", but I removed the veil and burse to show you what's underneath it. There are many parts of a "dressed chalice", including items of various names in Latin: purificator, paten, pall, and corporal. Each of these items serves two very practical roles. Together, they draw your attention to the Altar and the miracle that will happen there: the turning of normal bread and wine into the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ. Individually, they each serve a single purpose to show reverence to the bread and wine.



The one I want to discuss today is the corporal, the white cloth upon which the chalice sits. On the one hand, the corporal serves an extremely mundane purpose: it catches crumbs that might fall on the altar linens and get them dirty. When clearing the Altar after Communion, I fold the corporal up so that crumbs don't get on the floor.

We are not, however, just being cleanly about food crumbs, because these crumbs are not just bits of food but consecrated Bread crumbs. They are Jesus' Body. This is true regardless of your theology of the Eucharist. Regardless of whether we think the wafer becomes Jesus or that it is just a symbol, we know it's important. We reverence the act of coming to the Altar and receiving it, together as a community and individually. Communion is the climax of our liturgy and, in many ways, our spiritual lives as Episcopal Christians. The presence of the corporal reminds us of this truth.

The corporal also teaches us to revere other things as well. We should handle all gifts from God as we handle the most blessed sacrament. What if we handled our relationships in the same way, with loving care to keep them from being sullied under a metaphorical foot? What about the poor and lonely in the world? What about our skills? The corporal isn't just about keeping things clean; it's also about a life-style choice to remember that, through all things, we may encounter God.

### A Habit of Prayer

The other day, Fiona took a square cracker she was eating, lifted it above her head, and cracked it. "Just like Daddy at church!" she said. She was imitating the moment in the liturgy called the Fracture, when the bread is broken to distribute to the congregation. There's a lot to say about this: first, that Fiona knew how important this moment is in the liturgy. This alone is interesting. Similarly important, however, is that Fiona was *imitating* this important part of the service. She showed knowledge of spiritual depth by pretending to do it herself.

It's often said that children learn through imitation, and that's true. Priest kids aren't the only ones who imitate the priest - many other kids are fascinated by the movements of the Mass. This is especially true of what the priest does during the Eucharistic Prayer. It is already a mystery, and children enter into that mystery by trying to be part of it through imitating it.




When praying at home with your children, or when you are with your extended family and say grace, remember that children will want to imitate you as well. Lean into this penchant among children. When you pray, make eye-contact with children and motion for them to join you in putting your hands together, crossing yourself, or whatever prayer form you do. The child may giggle, or follow you solemnly, or climb up your back - whatever happens is fine, as long as the child *sees* you doing something special during prayer.

And ask yourself: what traditions do you want to instill in your child or grandchildren? Children will pick up on these traditions, especially the physical ones. If the child is old enough, you can explain what you're doing, but the important part is that you do them together. This is the way we teach our children, bring them into the traditions of the church, and help them explore what it means to have a deep and loving relationship with God in prayer *and* with the family.

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#### **Adult Formation: The Seven Last Words of Christ**




As we prepare for Easter this Lent, our Adult Formation on Sunday mornings will focus on the seven last words of Christ on the Cross. These "last words" carry a lot of beauty, sorrow, grace, and depth. We will meditate on these words together and pray with them throughout Lent. We will be using Stanley Hauerwas' short book *Cross-Shattered Christ* as a companion to our discussions, though the book is not required. Adult formation is from 9:10 to 9:45 and will continue throughout Lent.

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# Sunday Night Book Group Prayers in the Night by Tish Harrison Warren



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We will once again be taking up a collection of items for The Child and Adolescent Inpatient Psychiatric unit at Strong Memorial Hospital. Items can be brought to church **during the month of March** and placed in the bin provided. Emily Wisbey has been working as a nurse on the unit for a number of years and provided the information below.

The Child and Adolescent Inpatient Psychiatric unit at Strong Memorial Hospital takes care of patients ages 5-18 with a variety of different acute psychiatric disorders including depression, anxiety and others. These patients come to us emergently from the community (including Syracuse) to stabilize in a safe environment. Most patients stay on the unit for 7-10 days however some stay for much longer depending on safe discharge options. Items such as coloring supplies, playing cards, play doh and stress balls are all utilized at a great rate for coping skills and are difficult for us to replenish.

Some patients do not have families who are able to bring them clothing or toiletries. While the unit provides scrubs and generic toiletries, these patients could benefit from new donated clothing and toiletries such as shampoo, conditioner and body wash to help them feel more comfortable while in an unfamiliar environment.

Our unit would greatly appreciate any and all donations! There is still a stigma surrounding mental health and your contributions would help to ensure that this vulnerable population is still cared for! Unfortunately, due to the safety concerns on our unit there are many items that are not allowed. Please reach out to Sharon if you have any questions!

Below is a list of safe items that would benefit our unit:

shampoo, conditioner, body wash, hair ties (no metal), hair brushes, composition notebooks, markers, colored pencils (no erasers), puzzles for adults/teens, deck of cards, card games, teen coloring books, and Play Doh. They are also looking for clothing which would include: sweatpants, sweatshirts, long/short sleeve shirts in a variety of sizes (medium to 2XL) and new sports bras.
