Father Tim's Meditation

For the past few weeks, I've been preaching about *transformation*. Spring is, of course, the season of transformation: the weather is getting warmer, there are buds on the trees, and new birds are singing outside our window. The season of Easter, which lasts for fifty days (until Pentecost), is also a period of transformation. God's presence and power on Easter Sunday spills out into these few weeks of the year in a special way. As Christians, we revel in this transformative power and let it draw us more closely to the life to which we are called in Jesus Christ, through the Holy Spirit.

Transformation, however, is not just mere change. Not as Christians talk about it, of course. Transformation is always in Jesus Christ, which means that the tired, old parts of ourselves shed their skin and are reborn as fresh and new. We experience an image of this when our mood changes in the warm weather. Personally, I experience God's transforming grace by being called to God's creation - in other words, I take more walks. The bubbling-up feeling that I have while in the forest leads me to want to spread my joy in Creation, either through writing about it or by encouraging others to talk to God through the natural world.

Where do you experience transformation? Where do you feel moved to push out from your winter cocoon and enter into a fresh, renewed world? What are you moved to do? Who are you moved to be? How is God calling you into love and service towards your fellow human beings?

I believe that is how God sees each of us and realizing that has brought me closer to Him.

So what do these happy places have in common? It's the importance of finding peace in this hectic, often frightening world wherever that may be and recognizing that God's love is constant and enduring.

Dear Christ Church Parishioners,

We are writing to give you an update about our current church budget. As you may recall, there was significant concern about the 2024 budget at the time the Vestry met in December - which was subsequently presented to the Parish at the February 4th Annual Meeting. At that time, we were facing a significant shortfall in income versus the projected 2024 expenses.

The good news is that our projected income has improved right up through the end of March.

We ended 2023 with a \$4,727 surplus once all the December income and expenses were received and paid. The surplus was primarily from an increase in non-pledge payments in the Sunday collections. That surplus is carried over into the 2024 budget. Additionally, we received payments on several 2023 pledges totaling \$7,785, and those payments are now part of our 2024 cash flow.

Our pledge total for 2024 as of now is \$235,588 vs. the original pledge total at the end of December of \$224,288... that's a Year-to-Date increase of \$11,300... and a \$10,000 increase since the February annual meeting.

The above represents a \$23,812 improvement to our original budget. Based on our newly projected income our shortfall has been significantly reduced to \$6,659 for the balance of 2024.

While the improvement has been great, we still need to complete our critical goal of finishing 2024 either flat or with a surplus, but not a shortfall.

How do we do that?

We are very appreciative of your generous gifts via our Easter Envelopes! We hope for similar gifts of thanks at Christmas time.

We will be offering some additional ways of generating income for Christ Church such as designated bottle/can return centers, a gift card purchasing program that could be helpful to our income at "back to school" time, at Holiday season, and throughout the year. We will also continue sale of Delta car wash/cleaning advance tickets.

Are there activities, services or outreach programs that are part of our budgeted expenses that are important to you? Perhaps a supplemental gift noting what area of our budgeted expenses you would like to support? Have you considered a "Thirteenth Month" supplemental gift? These are just a few ways of helping. Perhaps you have additional ideas?

Your help will allow us to continue to move forward with our many, many programs, our various outreach efforts, Christian Education, continue to acknowledge the devotion of our wonderful employees, and continue to offer all of the things that make our parish such a wonderful community!

The members of the Stewardship and Finance Committees, together with the entire Vestry and Father Tim sincerely appreciate the commitment you have already made to achieve our critical goal of achieving a balanced budget in 2024. We've done it in the past - we can do it again!

A Habit of Prayer

a column by Father Tim about deepening your life of prayer

In my meditation above, I wrote a little about my experiences of transformation in the natural world. I feel particularly close to God in two places: while celebrating and distributing the Eucharist and while in the forest. The former is still relatively new for me (I only started receiving the Eucharist in our tradition as an adult), while the latter has been with me all my life. “God” and “the forest” are intertwined words for me. There is always something new to learn about God when walking beneath a canopy of trees.



Praying in the forest, however, is not like praying at home or at church. While in nature, you're almost always moving, so you need to learn how to pray on your feet. Walking a labyrinth helps here: in a labyrinth, at each step, you pray the words “I have arrived.” You feel each footfall and experience that arrival, that present-ness to the world around you and to your own body.

It's much the same in nature, except (usually) you're moving quite a bit faster than you would in a labyrinth. You move up and down hills or around bends, and these changes in the landscape and how they affect your body become part of your prayer. You pray by moving, and your body expresses or experiences its own prayer. Your mind is quiet before these physical feelings. Your ears are also open to the sounds of the landscape and your eyes to the gradual changes. And, again, these all happen at the prompting of your body, not your mind.

Now that I hike with children, I stop a lot more to look at curious plants or sights. My wife, also, stops me to listen to birds that she's trying to identify or plants that are apparently quite rare (trilliums). In this way, my prayer is not just personal but communal, which is its own blessing.





Did you know . . .

1 out of 3 moms has had to choose between giving their babies diapers or food. Low-income families will spend 2 times as much on diapers as families who have access to bulk buying options for diapers. An adequate supply of diapers can cost \$250 each month, and they aren't covered by SNAP or WIC.

The CNY Diaper Bank was founded in 2016 to help address this need, and close to 10 million diapers have been distributed to local families!

The CNY Diaper Bank is hosting its 9th annual "Make a Mother's Day" diaper drive all throughout the month of May. Members of the community are encouraged to help in any way they can so local babies can stay dry and clean.

There are multiple ways to contribute. The first, and most effective is to make a monetary donation through the CNY Diaper Bank's website, <https://cnydiaperbank.org>. The organization uses these donations to buy diapers in bulk at a much lower cost per diaper than the retail price

We, at Christ Church, will be supporting this effort for the month of May. You may add diapers to our barrel, donate on line, or write a check to CNY Diaper Bank. Deb Tifft will gladly collect checks after church during May and mail them to the Diaper Bank.

Community of Hope International

A new group has been formed at Christ Church since late February of 2024, meeting weekly from 1 to 3:30 PM on Mondays. Nine adults are being taught Modules included in Community of Hope International (COHI). It consists of training in listening skills, Christian meditation, prayer, spiritual gifts, confidentiality, family systems, coping with loss, and more.

There are fourteen Modules presented by people who "know" the topic, ending with an all-day retreat on June 3, 2024. Participants have already read the writeup provided by COHI, and each learner also prepares by reading a portion of the Benedictine Rule before each meeting.

Members are being taught to notice needs not only in our church, but in our community, on the street, in stores, at appointments, or wherever we connect with hurting people. Our prayer is to become sensitive to others, as Christ showed us by his example. After training, each will become a part of a community of hope reaching out to give Pastoral Care.

After the retreat culminating the extensive training, we will continue to meet monthly to build each other up through study and prayer. We will obtain new resources to go out into the world to bring The Good News told in Matthew 25 to others.

Save the Date: The Rummage Sale is Coming!



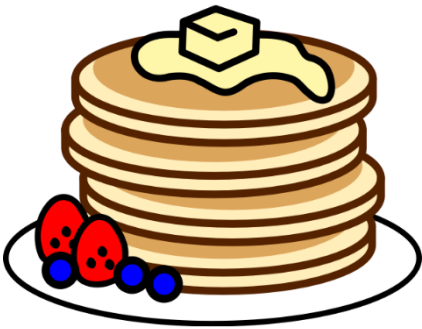

Job Announcement - Director of Children's Education

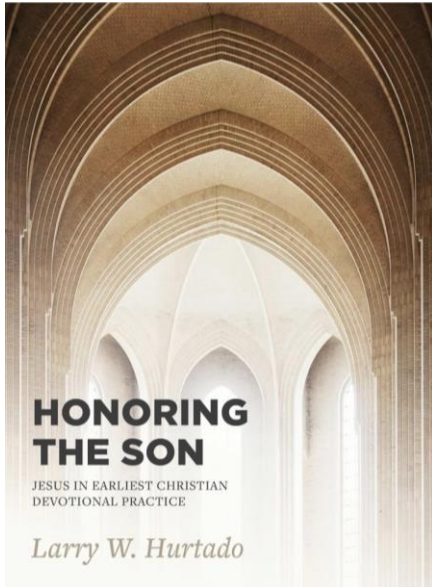
Christ Church in Manlius, New York seeks a nurturing, loving, and dependable director for our children's education program. Responsibilities including care for all children up to the age of eighteen in the following ways:

- Choose and develop curriculum for school-aged children ages five to fourteen
- Organize and recruit teachers for each group of children
- Develop and nurture a loving, Christ-centered environment that welcomes children, teachers, and parents
- Work with the rector and the nursery attendant to organize children's education at Christ Church
- Help make children feel loved, safe, and open to God's loving presence
- Following and being compliant with all Christ Church policies regarding health and safety
- Undergo diocesan training requirements to keep children safe

The Children Education Director will work six hours per week, and these hours are mostly flexible. The Director will need to be present during Sunday worship hours from 9:30 to 11:30 during the autumn, winter, and summer; 8:30 to 10:30 during the summer. Additional hours will be needed during special events or high holy days like Christmas and Easter. Pay is \$5959.86.

Candidates must be experienced in caring for children and infants; be able to adapt to and interact with a variety of children's personalities and needs; and be able to lift 30 pounds. Candidates must be at least 18 years old, complete CPR training for children, pass a background check, provide a record of immunization and TB test results, and provide three references.

Applications must include a cover letter, resume, and three references. Candidates are asked to send this material to Deirdre Popp, our parish administrator, at church.office@christchurchmanlius.org. Applications will be accepted until the position is filled.

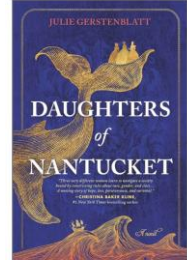
