Rector's Meditation

This past summer, I started seeing a spiritual director in Syracuse. Direction is one of those things that all priests are encouraged to do. Our job is to help the people of our conversation grow more fully into a relationship with God, and to do this we need to work on our own relationship with God. Priests can be pretty busy people, and it's often hard to find time in a busy week (or even a busy day!) to sit down with God and chat about our prayer lives. Spiritual direction keeps us honest with that call.

A prayer life, however, is something that all Christians are called to have. We're called on to pray, to serve the poor and downtrodden in God's Name, and to welcome the Holy Spirit more fully into our lives. Being a Christian is a fully time vocation; we don't forget our call in Jesus Christ when we leave those red doors Sunday morning!

But, if you're like me, when I'm called upon to "develop my prayer life", I roll my eyes and say, "Oh, great, yet *another* thing to do." Like I need another expectation in my already busy life. Personally, I want more time to spend with my kids, to hike this beautiful part of the world, and to enjoy my hobbies. Why should I "work" at my prayer life when I already work at so many things - and I'm so tired from working at them!

Our prayer life, however, is meant not to be just "another thing", nor even THE thing we do, but to ground and enliven us and all that we do. Often, we think of a prayer life as kneeling at our bedside making intercessions or going to church on Sundays. A "prayer life"

seems to be something for monks and nuns, or priests and bishops, who *can* spend all their time down on their knees and counting beads on a rosary.

But consider this: what do you love in your life? What brings you joy, hope, life, and fulfillment? These things, often, are places of prayer - or if not, then God is welcoming you to pray within them. I like making bread, and there is something prayerful about mixing flour and salt and yeast and water, then mixing them up and kneading the dough. There is something meditative about it, something that fills my heart as much as bread fills my belly. The same thing for walking in the woods (I find God in the woods all the time!) or playing with my kids. We can be prayerful when we read a book, watch a movie, or cook dinner. And this doesn't mean that we pray the Lord's Prayer while watching Spider-Man or something, but that we are attentive to the Holy Spirit and all that is going on within us. God calls us through all the things in our lives so that we may be refreshed and renewed in what we do.

Prayer is still, however, a discipline. Sometimes we've got to veg out and sit down to a good movie without thinking about it, but not all the time. Learning about our faith, our history, our own spiritual growth, and listening to God's call to us is something we get better at the more we do it. Recalling the presence of God in the things we do is something we work at, but the result is something that can enrich us more than anything in the world: God's loving presence.

So, this month, as we contemplate our Thanksgivings, as we remember the holy departed on All Saints' Day, as we pray through our stewardship and pledges, remember that God is not confined to just the church building or the Lord's Prayer. The Spirit is ever in our hearts and Christ is ever at our sides. Let us give all things to prayer, even (or especially) our own hearts.

Father Tim will lead us in silent prayers and, if there's interest, some community time afterwards. Come once or come every week. Know that you are always welcome.

Eucharistic Visitors: Coming to Visit When Needed

Christ Church is fortunate to have two people who are licensed as Eucharistic Visitors. A Eucharistic Visitor is a lay person who brings the consecrated bread and wine from the Holy Eucharist to people who are not able to attend the service on Sunday. Eucharistic Visitors bring communion to people who are in the hospital, rehabilitation centers, assisted living facilities, nursing homes and those who are at home. If you are not able to attend church and would like to request that communion be brought to you, please contact the office and one of our Eucharistic Visitors can arrange to bring it to you.

Did you know: Torches

Learning about our Anglican heritage



We don't tend to use the word "torch" anymore, but, like many older words, we still use them in church! The candles around our Altar are more properly called "torches." And you might wonder why we use them. With all the lights in the nave, and especially the spotlights up above the choir loft, we've got enough light in the room! But torches are lit not simply for light, but also to draw the eye.

Think about the torches in our own church. Where are they? There are two on the Altar itself, right? And there are two more, one standing in front of the priest's chair and the other across from it, in front of the lector. Four torches in all, and each of them marks a certain, important place during the liturgy. The Altar is where we share the Eucharist. The lector reads verses from the Old and New Testament. The priest proclaims the Gospel and teaches in the sermon. Torches mark that these roles and parts of the liturgy are important.

A lot about church is visual. We spend a lot of time looking down at our bulletins, reading along, but the liturgy is designed to be seen and not just heard. Those with important roles wear different clothes, and each part of the priest's vestments represent these roles. The stained-glass windows teach the stories of our tradition and help us to reflect on religious Truth. The Bread and Wine are offered forward to the people to show you that Jesus is not just for the clergy but for everyone, and *you* included.

How do we use our eyes to pray in church? How do we use our bodies, our ears, our hearts, and our minds to pray outside of church? These are all questions the liturgy asks us to meditation upon. Take some time this month to consider how we use ourselves, and all of God's gifts, to walk more deeply into our relationship with God and with those around us.

F.I.S.H. (Friends in Service Here) – Reopen and in need of volunteers

For some people transportation is not readily accessible, and the need to get to their medical appointments becomes critical. This is where F.I.S.H. comes in handy. The Fayetteville-Manlius-Minoa chapter of F.I.S.H. has been operating for over 35 years and transports people from the Fayetteville-Manlius school district and from the village of Minoa to and from doctors' appointments. Our clients do need to be ambulatory. F.I.S.H. is made up of all volunteers who give their time to dispatch, drive, or serve on various F.I.S.H. committees. We need scheduled drivers (one day a month) or random drivers (on an as-needed basis). If you prefer not to drive, we are in need of dispatchers, too. Dispatchers take the calls from clients one week a month and try to find drivers to transport them. If you would like to reach out and help members of our community get to their medical appointments, please give F.I.S.H. a call at 637-8158. You will meet wonderful people and at the same time be helping out people in need.

SYRACUSE MEMORY CAFÉ

Pebble Hill Presbyterian Church in DeWitt provides a place for community for individuals with memory changes (Alzheimer's and other forms of dementia) and their care partners in a safe, welcoming, friendly environment.

We invite any interested person(s) to join us on the second Wednesday of each month, year round, from 10:30 – 12:00 noon. Each café provides socialization, entertainment and a light lunch.

The Syracuse Memory Café is a free program, staffed by volunteers, and all are welcome. We simply require that our guests be people experiencing memory changes and that they have a companion or care partner to accompany them.
