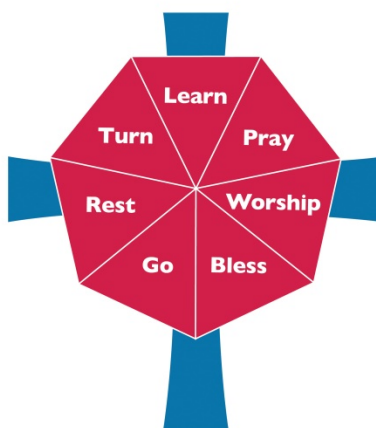

THE WAY OF LOVE
Practices for Jesus-Centered Life

I pray that you, being rooted and established in love, may have power, together with all the Lord's holy people, to grasp how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Christ, and to know this love that surpasses knowledge—that

you may be filled to the measure of all the fullness of God. Ephesians 3:17-19

With this Scripture verse Episcopal Church Presiding Bishop Michael B. Curry invites the Episcopal branch of the Jesus Movement to follow Jesus in **the Way of Love**.

The Way of Love: Practices for Jesus-Centered Life is not a specific program or curriculum. It is an intentional commitment to a set of practices that can shape us a community of faith grow more deeply with Jesus at the center of our lives and the church's witness to Jesus' way of love in and for the world.

The seven core practices for a Jesus-centered Life are:

Turn: Pause, listen, and choose to follow Jesus

Learn: Reflect on Scripture each day, especially Jesus' life and teachings

Pray: Dwell intentionally with God each day

Worship: Gather in community weekly to thank, praise, and draw near God

Bless: Share faith and unselfishly give and serve

Go: Cross boundaries, listen deeply, and live like Jesus

Rest: Receive the gift of God's grace, peace, and restoration

I invite you to learn more about The Way of Love at www.episcopalchurch.org/way-of-love and at <https://cnyepiscopal.org/resources/formation/way-of-love/>

Resources, including videos, a nine-session small group guide, seasonal studies, daily devotional resources, and internet links, are provided to introduce the seven practices. I can imagine them serving as a Bible Study or sermon series. At the diocesan convention in November, Dr. Lisa Kimball of Virginia Theological Seminary will guide participants through each of the seven practices.

One of the goals of an interim ministry period is to renew relationships to God, to Jesus, and to one another, including the denomination, the diocese, and the bishop's office. These themes and resources can be a gift to help us do that.

Please join us for our annual Fall Cleanup Day - Saturday, October 26

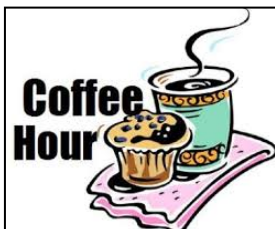
When: 9:00am until 2:00pm, but please do not feel an obligation to spend the day - an hour or two is a significant contribution!

A Note from Pastor Rick Klafehn about Lutheran Church and the Relationship between the Episcopal and Lutheran Churches

Some of you asked to learn more about the **Lutheran Church**. October is big for Lutherans. **October 31**, All Saints' Eve, or the Sunday before October 31, is celebrated as **Reformation Day** with its own sort of liturgical propers. **Red** for the Holy Spirit is the color for clergy vestments and altar paraments. Worshippers are encouraged to wear red.

Martin Luther was a priest, a monk, and professor of Bible at the fledgling university in Wittenberg, Germany. On October 31, 1517, he posted 95 theses, or propositions for academic debate, condemning the church practice of "indulgences" on the doors of the Castle Church, which served as the community and university bulletin board. Parishioners could buy these indulgences as a way to make penance and win forgiveness for their sins. John Tetzel, a Dominican priest, was selling indulgences, as a fundraiser for the renovation of St. Peter's Basilica, Rome, and to pay debts of the archbishop of Mainz. *"As soon as the coin in the coffer springs, the soul from purgatory springs,"* was Tetzel's outrageous claim.

Martin Luther's theological quest was *"How do I find a gracious God?"* He left law school and became a monk and a priest to earn God's love and mercy. When that didn't ease his conscience, his confessor urged him to study the Bible. Luther's spiritual discovery in Scripture was that God already loves and forgives us for the sake of Jesus, who died and who lives to save us. We are justified, or set right with God, and forgiven all our sins, as a gift of God's grace. God's gift is received through faith, by trust, in the promise of Jesus. We are justified by God's grace through faith for the sake of Christ, and not by our own good works or merit or efforts. This is the good news on which the church stands. Believers in Christ are fully free to live, no longer to save their own skins or for their own benefit, but rather to do good and live in service of creation and neighbor.

Luther's pamphlet, *"On the Freedom of a Christian"* explicates this beloved paradox: *"A Christian is a perfectly free lord of all, subject to none. A Christian is a perfectly dutiful servant of all, subject to all."*

Martin Luther's reform movement was advanced by the communication revolution and the technological innovation of his day, the moveable type printing press. It changed things as much in his day as the digital revolution and the internet has in ours.

Martin Luther's translation of the Bible into German served German-speaking peoples for centuries as the King James Bible served the English world. He was a composer of hymns, including two in Hymnal 1982. His Small Catechism is used to this day for teaching confirmands and the faith.

On trial for his faith in 1521 Luther refused to take back his teachings. He was excommunicated and banished, so that anyone could kill him, but his local rulers protected him. In 1530 Lutherans presented the Augsburg Confession, which unites Lutherans worldwide.

Lutherans value Scripture and are taught when reading Scripture to look for both *Law and Gospel*. The Law is what God commands and shows our sin. The Gospel is what God does and promises and shows our Savior.

Lutherans note that Christians in this life are *at the same time both saints and sinners*. They celebrate *the priesthood of all believers* – that all Christians have an important part in the church and Christ’s mission. They lift up God’s call and God’s Spirit at work *in the family and in every vocation*, not only the ordained.

The Lutheran Reformation put worship into the language of the people, celebrated weekly Holy Eucharist with both bread and wine for all participants; and added a sermon. Lutherans recognize two sacraments, Holy Baptism and Holy Communion. They honor the liturgical church year and saint’s days and recognize departed saints as gifts of God and good examples. Episcopal worshippers would find a Lutheran worship service very similar. Lutherans reintroduced married priests. Luther himself married Katy von Bora, a former nun, and they had a family.

Episcopal/Anglican – Lutheran relations:

Since approval of “**Called to Common Mission**” in **2001** Lutherans and Episcopalians in the USA have been in full communion. This agreement gives full mutual recognition and acceptance of each other’s sacraments and clergy. It commits the churches to work together. This was the culmination of dialogues that began in 1969. Already in 1982 an interim agreement was in place.

The introduction to “Called to Common Mission” says, “*Our churches have discovered afresh our unity in the gospel and our commitment to the mission to which God calls the church of Jesus Christ in every generation. ... Our search for a fuller expression of visible unity is for the sake of living and sharing the gospel. Unity and mission are at the heart of the church’s life, reflecting an obedient response to the call of our Lord Jesus Christ.*”

Similar arrangements are in place elsewhere. The Poorvoo Agreement (1996) brought full communion to the Anglican churches of England, Ireland, Scotland and Wales, and the Lutheran churches of Great Britain, Latvia, Estonia, Finland, Iceland, Lithuania, Norway, Denmark, and Sweden. A 2001 agreement brings Anglicans and Lutherans in Canada into full communion. Discussions are underway in Australia. African churches are already working together even without a formal agreement.

If you wish to know more, you always may ask. ***Thank you for asking, but right now I am happy to join and work with you, and to appreciate God’s work in and through you! That is my focus.***

MANLIUS CEMETERIES ADD HISTORICAL MARKER

The combined Christ Church and Manlius Village Cemeteries were added to the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) by the US Department of Interior in 2007. Thanks to a generous grant from The William G. Pomeroy Foundation (<https://www.wgpfoundation.org/>), a new historical marker has been acquired through Christ Episcopal Church.

Founded in 1813 as a public burial ground adjacent to the original location of Christ Church, the combined cemeteries today contain the graves of over 5000 individuals. The earliest included three infants buried here before 1810 by their families, prior to the purchase of land by the church vestry. For over 200 years, extended families, strangers, the great and ordinary, people of various faiths and backgrounds who knew life around Manlius have been placed here. Veterans of the Revolution, War of 1812, Civil War, World Wars and modern conflicts are laid to rest here, including 20 who gave their lives in our country's wars.

On August 25, volunteer parish members and friends installed the NHRP marker at the interior line between the two properties. Visitors can find it 120 yards from Seneca Street along the western lane. We'd like to especially thank the Syracuse-based Pomeroy Foundation for initiating and funding this work!

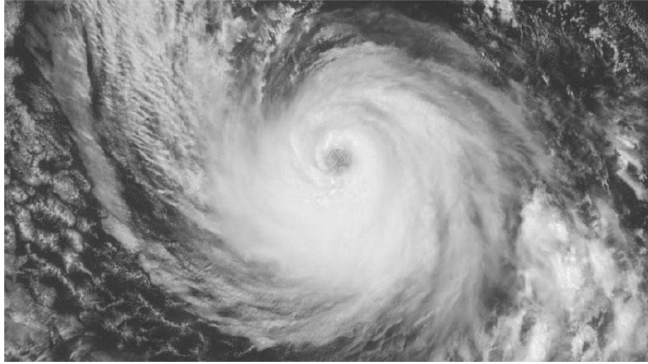
CROSBY HALL PIANO FOR SALE

The Rector's Discretionary Fund is a special account that is financed by the loose cash offering gathered one Sunday each month and by additional donations from parishioners and others. At Christ Church the **loose plate offering from the first Sunday of each month** is designated for the Rector's Discretionary Fund. Many churches also include a line item in the budget. The purpose of the Rector's Discretionary Fund is described in the Episcopal Church Canons as *"to be applied to such pious and charitable uses as the Rector or Priest-in-Charge shall determine."* Money from this fund is used to assist those in financial need, to support ministry, and to contribute to the work of the wider Church.
