Welcome back! Well, that's what I want to say, but I'm a little bit tired of saying "welcome back." During the pandemic, I felt like I was on the verge of being able to say "welcome back" each month - and sometimes every week! We said "welcome back" last autumn, then we had to leave again. We said "welcome back" when we opened up to in-person worship, and again a short time later when we welcomed everyone to receive Communion again. The vestry and I have decided on a series of small steps, opening just a little bit more each time, and each time we did I felt like I was saying "welcome back!" again.

And now, just as we're about to open up for September, here comes the delta variant. Will we need to step back again for a while, only to say "welcome back" again some future month? When we do get to say "welcome back!" and really mean it, without wondering if we'll be welcoming one another back again in another few months?

This time can be frustrating. I feel like whatever lesson we were supposed to learn during the pandemic, well,

we've learned it! God, my good Lord, what else do we need to learn? Why are you putting us through all this? What's going on in your mind? How can we live like this for any longer?

These questions are real and honest questions. I've heard them from some of you, and I've asked them in my own heart as well. What do we do with these questions, especially when it seems like God isn't answering them? Well, what we do is not listen for an answer, but to listen to what God says. Sometimes God's "answer" is to remain silent and direct our attention to something else.

We humans aren't very good at waiting. Patience is one of the most difficult virtues to learn. So then don't wait. Stop trying to be patient. Look at the Life that is around you.

What is God directing you to see right now? Right this very moment. Yes, yes, this nice meditation from your curly-haired priest, but take a moment. Listen. Don't ask a question, don't demand an answer. Don't beg for something. Just listen.

Whatever is before you is real. The things that you heard, that God led you to see, the silence, perhaps, that God gave you, *that* is alive. That's the point. For me, it's the trees outside the window, the quiet of the house as Fiona naps, the little murmurs from Gwendolyn as she talks to the pictures she's drawing. It's the Montes' house that I'm thankful to be in, the full stomach that is a blessing in itself, and the laughter of my friends who I spoke to last night. It's the joy and the honor and the life of being able to write to you all and pray for you all. That's a lot. And that is what God has given to me. That's how God is answering my impatience. How about you? How is God answering you?

We don't know what the future will hold. The vestry and I are still hoping that we'll be in good shape for September. We'll meet on the 7th with that hope and see what the world looks like. But I hope that we'll also bring what God has given us this month that has nothing to do with the pandemic: vacations, family, good books, times of spiritual renewal, experiences of God in big and in small ways. I hope you bring these things, and more, to worship on Sundays, to gatherings in and outside of church, to your prayers, and to your fears as well. We live in the midst of abundance. Let us bring that abundance to all that we are, all that we are called to be, and all that God hopes for within us.

-arrange and place fresh flowers (an optional duty)


-placement of candles.

Did You Know? Deacons



A couple of weeks ago, we were joined in our Sunday worship by a deacon: the Rev. Deacon Meredith Kadet Sanderson. Deacons are, unfortunately, pretty rare in the Episcopal Church today, and the bishop is sending Meredith around to give the churches of our diocese a view of what deacons do. The hope is that some folks in our churches might hear a call to ordination as deacons, but also because deacons are an important part of the orders of the church: bishops, priests, laity (that's you), and

deacons.

But what *do* deacons do? Well, if you were with us when Meredith was here, what did you see her do? She read the gospel and called us all to repentance for confession. She set the Altar for Communion, and then she gave the dismissal at the end of our service. These roles in the liturgy tie directly into what deacons are: they proclaim the gospel to the world and call the Church to living the Gospel in the world around us.

The *Book of Common Prayer* says that deacons are "to interpret to the Church the needs, concerns, and hopes of the world" (pg. 543). While all Christians are called upon to serve the world - and especially the poor, the weak, the sick, and the lonely - it is the role of the deacon to lead the Church to these ministries. This role comes from the first call of deacons in the early days of the Church: noting that those in most need (particularly widows) were not being cared for, the disciples gathered and ordained deacons to oversee this work (Acts 6:1-6). And it was the first martyr, St. Stephen, who was stoned to death while pursuing this ministry (chapter 6 and 7 of Acts).

In the Church today, there are two types of deacons: vocational deacons and transitional deacons. Before being ordained to the priesthood, all priests must spend six months to one year as a deacon. In this, the Church sees the role of the deacon as an important part of the role of a priest. I myself spent six months as a transitional deacon in Tennessee, and my work was with college students on the campus of the University of the South. Meredith is also a transitional deacon, so look for her priestly ordination in a few months or so!

Vocational deacons, on the other hand, see their call as deacons to be essential to their life in Jesus Christ. They are called to this particular ministry of servanthood and the leading of the Church to understand the needs of the world - things that the Church often is unable to see.

I've known a few deacons in my time in the Church, and they're always wonderful people. Some of them are feisty, some quiet and thoughtful, but all of them with a deep sense of justice and compassion.



PACE CNY (<u>P</u>rogram of <u>A</u>ll-inclusive <u>C</u>are for the <u>E</u>lderly) is a part of the Loretto Family of Care. PACE CNY, based on a national model known as PACE, provides an alternative to placement in a nursing home. PACE CNY is particularly

helpful to families desiring to keep their aging loved ones at home. At two Loretto PACE Centers (one in North Syracuse and one in East Syracuse) and their own place of residence, participants receive the home care, medical, rehabilitative, social, transportation, and support services needed to remain at home. F.I.S.H. (Friends in Service Here) – Reopen and in need of volunteers

For some people transportation is not readily accessible, and the need to get to their medical appointments becomes critical. This is where F.I.S.H. comes in handy. The Fayetteville-Manlius-Minoa chapter of F.I.S.H. has been operating for over 35 years and transports people from the Fayetteville-Manlius school district and from the village of Minoa to and from doctors' appointments. Our clients do need to be ambulatory. F.I.S.H. is made up of all volunteers who give their time to dispatch, drive, or serve on various F.I.S.H. committees. We need scheduled drivers (one day a month) or random drivers (on an asneeded basis). If you prefer not to drive, we are in need of dispatchers, too. Dispatchers take the calls from clients one week a month and try to find drivers to transport them. If you would like to reach out and help members of our community get to their medical appointments, please give F.I.S.H. a call at 637-8158. You will meet wonderful people and at the same time be helping out people in need.

SYRACUSE MEMORY CAFÉ: Now reopen

Pebble Hill Presbyterian Church in DeWitt provides a place for community for individuals with memory changes (Alzheimer's and other forms of dementia) and their care partners in a safe, welcoming, friendly environment.

We invite any interested person(s) to join us on the second Wednesday of each month, year round, from 10:30 – 12:00 noon. Each café provides socialization, entertainment and a light lunch.

The Syracuse Memory Café is a free program, staffed by volunteers, and all are welcome. We simply require that our guests be people experiencing memory changes and that they have a companion or care partner to accompany them.
