

A Funny Thing Happened On My Way To Ukraine, I Was Injured By An **Artillery Round**

By Owen Blickensderfer I'm back from Ukraine, and the whole experience is a bit surreal. When I got back, I fell back into the routine of daily living and it seems like I never left home. But I have lots of pictures that bring back the memories of Ukraine and the people | met there

If you didn't know, I was invited to join eight other men for a humanitarian trip to Ukraine. We replaced the roof of a house that had been damaged in the invasion by Russia, and helped at a refugee camp. For myself, it was a trip into my ancestry because my mother's family left Ukraine more than 100 years ago when Ukraine was still part of Russia. I don't know the exact location of the village where my Great Great Grandparents lived, but we do know that it was in the Odessa region. I stayed in Odessa one night. The air-raid sirens were silent that night and I was able to sleep the sleep of sheer exhaustion that only jetlag can give. During the many kilometers of bus travel, it was hard to shake the sensation that I was zooming along a highway in Eastern North Dakota. I saw endless fields of wheat, sunflowers and canola. There were orchards and vinevards too. The wheat harvest was beginning and I saw some massive John Deere combines once in awhile. We passed through quaint farming communities and modern cities. The country has a bit of a European flavor with regard to the style of some of the homes. The cities also have the stark, utilitarian residue of giant concrete apartment buildings that all former Soviet Union satellite countries seem to grow like weeds I wanted to see for myself this country that has been in the news so much lately. I wanted to be with the people and share their pain. My observations are: The people are tired of the war. They are tired of not knowing the future of their country and their children. Many are frightened and jump when the air raid

sirens go off. Some are not able to function. On the other hand, there are people who are doing everything they can to keep the autonomy of their country. They have decided that they cannot afford to fail in their efforts to repel the enemy. They do not want their country to be swallowed up by a country that destroys lives and property for no good reason. They have seen what Putin does to people and they are literally offering their lives for the good of their children and country.

Many of my friends, neighbors and family helped me financially so that I could go on this trip. I am going to share my experiences with my church family this Sunday. Everyone is welcome to join us on Sunday morning, July 23rd at 10:30 at the Mott Evangelical Church at 903 East 2nd Street. I can answer all your questions to the best of my ability and show a few of the many photographs. This is the least I can do to repay the generosity of so many of you.

I suppose I should explain about the artillery shell. My Ukrainian friend, Lot, showed me a heavy piece of a broken steel cylinder. I lifted it with difficulty. Not able to speak English, Lot indicated by hand motions, sound effects and dramatic expressions that it was the exploded casing of an artillery bullet. It was very heavy. As I put it down, a sharp, jagged edge cut my little finger and it drew blood. The guys I was with jokingly told me I should apply for the equivalent of a Ukrainian Purple heart.

By the way, I plan to do another presentation on July 25 at 7:00 PM at the Mott Care Center (Formerly Good Samaritan Nursing Home.) Do come. It will probably be a little different than what I will do at the church and anyone who wants one can receive an autographed copy of my latest (only) book.



For the past few Sundays our congregations have been reading portions of the Apostle Paul's letter to the Romans. Paul speaks often of the redemption of both humanity and creation. At times the Apostle casts creation almost as if creation were a person. He speaks of creation as groaning in labor while giving birth, being held in bondage, yearning to be set free, and having hope. Regarding creation and the ecosystems that surround us as living helps connect us to more deeply love and care for this world God created and so loves (John 3:16-17).

At the end of the movie, "Moana," a favorite of many children including our granddaughter, Moana restores the heart of Te Fiti. In the movie this mother island is depicted as a woman. When she lies down to create the island again, the vegetation and all the creatures that inhabit this island are restored. Seeing the image of the island as a woman is incredibly striking for adults and children alike.

As Paul reminds us in the eighth chapter of Romans, creation, like humanity, waits to be restored. Paul's word helps us reject a commonplace Christian notion that God cares only about human beings. When we explore biblical theology, we see that all God's creation is good while, at the same time, all creation has fallen captive to sin and is groaning in pain until God brings about restoration. Paul likens this to new birth. The entire universe is in labor, Paul says, "We know that the whole creation has been groaning in labor pains until now" (Romans 8:22).

Recent rains in our area have helped our landscape grow lush and green. Fields,







Reflections on the Words of Life by Pastor Paul Ferrie, Grace Reformed Church of the Lord

Jesus Last time we began a study of the book of Ruth by looking together at part of the first verse: "Now it came to pass, in the days when the judges ruled, that there was a famine in the land" (Ruth 1:1a). We saw that the story of Ruth took place during the time of the judges, when the Israelites fluctuated between falling away into idolatry, then repenting and seeking God after He brought judgment upon them. We are also told in verse 1 that there was a famine in the land. This famine is most likely directly related to the low spiritual condition of the people of Israel. God told the Israelites before they entered the promised land that whether they would prosper and have their needs met would depend on their living in obedience to Him. We see that in passages like Leviticus 26:19-20: "I will break the pride of your power; I will make your heavens like iron and your earth like bronze. And your strength shall be spent in vain; for your land shall not yield its produce, nor shall the trees of the land yield their fruit."

The Bible does not hesitate to attribute to God things like famine, affliction, and so-called "natural disasters," and we shall see that in coming weeks, Lord willing. There is no "mother nature." There are no random occurrences. God is in control of everything, and nothing can happen, good or bad, without His permission. Let us consider just a few verses which proclaim this truth. Ephesians 1:11: "In Him also we have obtained an inheritance, being predestined according to the purpose of Him who works all things according to the counsel of His will." Psalm 135:6: "Whatever the LORD pleases He does, in heaven and in earth, in the seas and in all

deep places." Isaiah 46:9b-10: 'I am God, and there is none like Me, declaring the end from the beginning, and from ancient times things that are not yet done, saying, 'My counsel shall stand, and I will do all My pleasure."

Some people are uncomfortable with saying that God is sovereign over all things, and they attribute the bad things that happen to Satan. But that implies that Satan's will could override God's. Let's think through the implications of this. If God is not sovereign over all things, if Satan could thwart His plan, then the believer's comfort would be abolished. God has given a wonderful promise to His people in Romans 8:28: "And we know that all things work together for good to those who love God. to those who are the called according to His purpose." Believers have been upheld by this promise through the centuries. But how could it be true if God were not in control of "all things" and had the power to work "all things" together for the good of His people? Notice-this verse is not saying that all things are good, but that God works all things together for the good of His children. Friends, we live in a fallen, sinful world. No one is able to escape suffering and affliction. These things come to believer and unbeliever alike. But the believer has an anchor to keep him or her from sinking during the hard times. He or she can say, "This is not pleasant, but I know that my Heavenly Father is in control and is somehow working this out for my good, even though I cannot see how. He will either deliver me from or carry me through this fiery trial."

Friend, do you have this hope and comfort to uphold you when things are falling apart? It is only for the one who is trusting in Christ alone to make him or her right with God. Please be sure that describes you.





A Little Birdie Told Me

By: Vivian Hernandez A Little Birdie Told Me: "Shadehill Recreation Area Just South of Lemmon South Dakota

is a Diamond-In-The-Rough." Having lived in SW North Dakota for most of my life I've heard about Shade Hill and thought it would be a great place to visit and go camping. Finally on Monday July 10th I made the trip, stopping first in Lemmon at Grandma's Chocolates for a treat: Just a short 20 minutes south I arrived at Shadehill and was wonderfully surprised by its beauty.

From 1941-1942, preliminary geological studies were conducted to determine the foundation of the dam where the North and South Forks of the Grand River met: no further work would be completed until the end of WWII. Construction on the dam started on April 19, 1949, completed in late 1951 over a year ahead of schedule at a cost of \$5 million.

Shadehill Dam and Reservoir are named for a hill located south of the dam, which was named after Colonel M.L. Shade a member of the State Highway Commission who assisted with construction of Highway 73. Originally built for irrigation the saline content was too high: the dam and reservoir would be primarily used for flood control, silt control, wildlife conservation and recreation. Shadehill Res-



ervoir has 5,200 surfaces acres and 114 miles of shoreline. Seim, South Dakota a once

bombing town founded in 1894, by the 1900's had banks, newspapers, saloons, post office, general store, hotel, livery stable, blacksmith shop, restaurant, barber shop, creamery and school. By 1918 Seim was nearly a ghost town as the railroad was routed north and the highway east. "The little town of Seim slipped below the water and into memory when Shadehill Dam was built."

The South Dakota Department of Game, Fish and Parks administer Shadehill Recreation Area: Jim Straight is the District Park Supervisor. Jim gave me the "Straight" facts about visitation since COVID in 2020. Camping and visitation was up 21% in 2020 and every year since with some 63,000 visitors in 2022! The 80 campsites, 4 cabins and lodge are booked to capacity in advance every weekend from Memorial Day thru the 4th of July. If you're planning a camping weekend at Shadehill be sure to call ahead. In addition to camping Shadehill offers, hiking, fishing, boating, archery, biking, canoeing & kayaking.
