

Reflections on the Words of Life

In 1 Peter 2:1, we went over a list of sins that believers in Christ are told to put away. We can thank God that Peter does not stop at telling us what we must get rid of. He shows us in verse 2 how to get rid of the sins in our lives by revealing what believers are to focus on: "As newborn babes, desire the pure milk of the word, that you may grow thereby." Peter likens the healthy believer to a hungry infant. The way for believers to grow spiritually is analogous to

the way babies grow physically. Just watch a healthy newborn baby, and you might think that all of life consisted in getting his or her next meal. The natural healthy condition of the believer should reflect a similar hunger for spiritual growth. If we saw a newborn baby who was not hungry, we would know that something was wrong. In the same way, if a believer does not find in him or herself a hunger to learn the Word of God and to grow spiritually, it is the sign of an unhealthy soul.

Of course, there are times when the believer becomes dull and cold spiritually, when there is little or no motivation to grow. When that happens, it is time to

realize that we need to expose ourselves to the means of spiritual growth even if we don't feel like it. Our verse tells us that "the pure milk of the word" is what God has given to believers for their spiritual growth. It is no accident that Psalm 119, the longest chapter in the Bible, is primarily about God's Word and its immeasurable benefits. Without the Bible we would not know how the world got here or why we are here. It is God's Word that shows us our sinful state and need for the Savior. It explains how we can have a right relationship with God through faith in Christ alone. It is God's Word that shows us how we are to live as Christians in this world and that our eternal future in heaven will be wonderful beyond imagining. The Bible is the Christian's SOUL FOOD. The Holy Spirit makes the Word understandable to believers and makes it effectual in their hearts and lives.

In a day when Christians seem to be grasping for all kinds of ways to help them in their lives, it is important that we proclaim the truth that God's Word is sufficient for our spiritual needs. Peter in his second letter tells us, "As His divine power has given to us all things that pertain to life and godliness, through the knowledge of Him who called us by glory and virtue" (2 Peter 1:3). That knowledge of Him is found in the Bible. The idea that the church needs psychology or some type of therapy to supplement the Word of God is a terrible shame. These are ever-changing theories from the minds of man. But the Bible is the unchanging and infallible truth of God who made us and knows what we need. Oh brothers and sisters in Christ, don't let theories of critics and liberal theologians keep you from the infinite wealth of truth and comfort and nourishment for your soul that is there. I encourage you who are believers to constantly expose yourself to the Word of God through reading it on your

own daily and being in a church where you regularly hear it faithfully preached. God's Word will be a lamp to your feet and a light to your path. If you are not a believer in Christ, I encourage you to read God's Word with a desire to learn the way of salva-



I keep a lookout for stories that might be of interest to the readers in Eido Country: One source is the North Dakota Living Magazine. On the back cover this month is a full-color ad for the GOD'S CHILD Project.


This caught my eye because in 2012 I traveled to Guatemala with students from Trinity High School in Dickinson and St. Mary's High School in Bismarck. The group included about 30 seniors, 4 priests and 3 female chaperones, just weeks before my 50th birthday I was 20 years older than anyone else in the group.

Our flight took us to Guatemala City; from there we traveled by bus to the "Dreamer Center" which is the operational base for the GOD'S CHILD project in Central America.

We were split up into aroups of 4/5 and stayed with host families. My group stayed with a single mother and her daughter. Our sleeping area consisted of two small rooms with two single beds in each room; it was hot and humid with no air conditioning or even a fan. The bathroom was very small and the shower was electric, so if you touched the showerhead you got a shock! I was given in-







the world! The priests went so

far as to buy a coffee maker and

Our first task was to pour the foundation; we mixed the cement on the ground and carried it in 5 gallon buckets and wheelbarrows to be spread. Next would be the first layer of cinder blocks, each group had a local foreman assisting. He instructed us how to start and left us to our own devises, I had no talent for this and was sure our foundation would fail. Brick by brick we built the walls, left holes for windows and a door. The tin roof followed and finally the famous blue paint.

The final day we brought 8 sets of bunk beds and mattresses, which carried last several hundred feet, this took several trips back and forth. Our last gift to the people was Mass being said outside with villagers and





their dogs. The women of the

village kept asking for Rosaries, and by the grace of God I had brought several with me. The people in the village

were so grateful and gracious helping us as much as they could. When they were able to leave their tin huts and move into a 14X14 home with a concrete floor, windows and a door the joy was both theirs and ours. If you've ever considered going on a mission trip, I recommend the GCP, started in 1991 by a native of North Dakota, Patrick Atkinson

Prevent local measles outbreak with vaccination

As measles cases multiply in the United States, Jacobson Memorial Hospital Care Center (JMHCC) reminds North Dakotans to make sure their family members are vaccinated and to follow precautions.

As Benjamin Franklin said, "An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure."

"Protect yourself and your community from measles by getting vaccinated. Vaccination is the most effective method of preventing measles and is essential for maintaining public health," says Rusette Tesani, assistant director of nursing at JMHCC.

Measles is a highly contagious viral disease that may cause serious complications. Symptoms almost always first include a high fever, runny nose, red watery eyes and cough, followed by a characteristic flat, blotchy rash that starts on the face and neck and progresses down the body. People with measles may also develop tiny white spots inside their mouth.

Because it is highly contagious, patients experiencing measles-like symptoms, especially those who are unvaccinated and have recently traveled, should call the clinic or hospital beforehand, because isolation precautions will be necessary.

As of March 27, 483 confirmed measles cases were reported in 20 different states. Of those, 75% were 19 years old and younger, and 97% were unvaccinated or it was unknown if they were vaccinated.

North Dakota does not have any active cases of measles, but about 91% of school-aged children in North Dakota are fully vaccinated.


Here are key points to consider for measles prevention:

1. Vaccination is the only prevention: The measles, mumps and rubella (MMR) vaccine is safe and effective. Individuals are considered 97% protected by having two doses of the MMR or who are immune due to previous infection. Measles is easily prevented through a two-dose MMR vaccine series, routinely given to children at 12 months of age and a second dose at 4-6 years of age.

JMHCC reminds parents to make sure their children are up-to-date on all immunizations, from babies through teenagers. 2. Herd immunity matters: High vaccination rates protect



outbreaks. 4. Travel with caution: Ensure vaccinations are up to date before traveling, especially to areas where measles outbreaks are occurring.


5. Support public health policies: Support and adhere to local health regulations concerning vaccination requirements for schools and public gatherings.

Remember, vaccination is not just a personal choice; it is a community responsibility," Tesani says. Individuals with questions about the measles vaccine are encouraged to talk with a JM-HCC health care provider. If you're not sure whether you are fully vaccinated, visit with your health care provider or local public health unit.

Bowman County Development Corporation Opens Spring Funding Cycle for Play It Forward Fund

Bowman, ND (April 4, 2025) Bowman County Development Corporation (BCDC) is excited to announce the launch of the spring funding cycle for the Play It Forward Fund. This is an initiative that uses charitable gaming revenues to reinvest in our communities by supporting organizations and businesses with community-focused projects aimed at enhancing the quality of life in Bowman County.

The Spring 2025 funding cycle has \$50,000 to be awarded to deserving projects. Eligible applicants include charities, non-profits, community organizations, and businesses with initiatives that positively impact Bowman County. Applications will be evaluated by the Play It Forward Fund committee based on their potential to address community needs and create lasting benefits.

The first round of Play It Forward funding, awarded in the Winter 2024, supported seven organizations in their efforts to enhance our communities:

Bowman American Legion Post 48 received \$900 for new uniforms and cemetery flags to honor local veterans.

A controversial change that has been proposed to go into effect by our new Secretary of Health and Human Services, Robert F Kennedy is to remove all suspect dyes. Not sure why this would be so controversial as these dyes have already been banned or restricted in some countries due to concerns about their potential effects, particularly in children, however they were still allowed in the United States.

Red 40 is banned in several countries including Norway, German, Denmark, Switzerland, Sweden, France, Austria products containing this dye to include a warning that it may affect attention in children. So in the interest of making more money, companies changed to synthetic dyes. Maybe it's time to go back to the natural food dyes the way other countries have to save our children!



The food pyramid was introduced by the United States Department of Agriculture in 1992. It was based on a similar pyramid developed in Sweden in the 1970's and was designed to provide a visual representation of the recommended daily servings of different food groups. The USDA replaced the Food Pyramid with MyPlate in 2011 to simplify dietary recommendations and provide a more visual and intuitive guide for healthy eating, emphasizing portion sizes and a variety of foods. The new recommendations make a distinction between whole grain carbohydrates, which are good for you, and the refined white sugar and white flour that are considered bad. Dairy products were also de-emphasised in the old pyramid, but got a prominent place along with grains.

Many people don't realize that the food pyramid was actually retired when federal nutrition messaging was changed to a plate visualization.

Robert F Kennedy Jr has set his sights on changing how Americans eat and drink. From the dyes in Fruit Loops cereal to seed oils in chicken nuggets, Kennedy has long spoken out against ingredients that he says hurt Americans' health. He is taking on the food industry in an attempt to 'Make America Healthy Again. When listening to him speak, he is passionate about trying to change the way we see food and make healthier choices for ourselves. We have become highly dependent on fast food and quick choices for eating, so maybe it's time to rethink those choices for a better future for us.

As the years have gone by, we have seen some foods regularly eaten declared bad and then later it is conceded that they are not so bad, as it was with the simple egg. Then we were told that fats were bad and that we should seek low fat foods, which resulted in higher calorie counts. Sugar was bad, so they said we needed sugar substitutes, which are now considered harmful and possibly cancer causing. It is a tough world out there to find something that everybody agrees is good for us. Obesity in the country is increasing and is most generally thought to be associated with highly processed foods and a lack of exercise. Who has the answer to this? 
