Only truth and love are shared in these stories -- no need to impress anyone -- stories help us want to pick up a few good habits ourselves.”

That's how and why Jim and Joe always read obituaries first -- after all these years they had to agree, the stories were uplifting and challenged them to be better people.

As old as they were, and now together due to spouses already being on the obituary pages they still fought for me first - no me -- give me the paper -- laughter was still the joy of the family, even if only two left.

Come on Jim, come on - open the pages so we can see -- maybe there will be something we can pick up from the stories - maybe - just maybe, one of the obituaries will give us an idea how to face the struggle we now have -- where to begin -- what do -- how to carry on.”

Must have been a bad week -- lots of obituaries -- a farmer/rancher, lived, worked hard -- left ranch to children -- here's a business man -- nice family -- never gave up when things got tough as Mother worked hard, volunteered -- Ah - here's a strange one on page 17 -- and Jim began to read about --.

“Jesus of Nazareth -- well that's dumb -- why is this here. He died thousands of years ago - what a dumb thing to do.” Jim put down the paper -- Joe picked it up and continued.

“Remember, when Mom and Dad told us all about him. Let's read what more it has to say -- he healed the sick, touched the lonely -- that's us --.” “Yah but remember when Mom got sick, we prayed and prayed and watched Dad slowly dwindle away with sadness -- nothing ever happened.” Jim screamed -- he wasn't real then.”

“But Jim -- I remember Mom saying -- he is the same yesterday, today, tomorrow - forever -- maybe we just didn't believe at that time --.”

Just then, the only thing left standing from the fire was the bell tower -- bong, bong, bong, calling others to worship --.

Let's try again Jim -- obituary ends with **believe in him** -- let's try again - take another chance to believe.



My efforts continued into Monday and now Tuesday, washing bedding, cleaning the sliding door track, ceiling fan blades, light fixtures and the list

Once I've cleaned the old plants out and stirred up the soil it's ready for a new beginning. The house is filled with fresh spring air and the light is streaming in even brighter.

If we let the light shine in the darkness, Lent will refresh the soul and we can truly be an Easter People, finding hope and joy in Christ's Resurrection.



Date: April 16, 2025

FIRE EMERGENCY AND BURN BAN
GRANT COUNTY, NORTH DAKOTA

WHEREAS, the Grant County Commissioners recognize that abnormally dry and drought conditions continue to exist across the county. These conditions combined with ample dry vegetation, high winds, and recent fires, presents a risk for the citizens and property in Grant County, North Dakota; and

WHEREAS, all available resources remain committed to protecting life and property; and

WHEREAS, the impact of fires could threaten the health, well-being, and safety of Grant County's citizens; and

WHEREAS, the cost of response and inordinate equipment wear may be far in excess of available County resources.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Grant County Commissioners declare Fire Emergency and Burn Ban on open burning in Grant County (regardless of fire danger categories assigned per the North Dakota Fire Danger Rating Map) effective immediately until further notice.

This ban will be reviewed periodically as conditions improve.

What's Included: No Open Burning: Includes campfires, controlled burns (i.e., wood piles, tumbleweeds, tree piles, etc.), cropland/agricultural burning, outdoor wood/charcoal burning fireplaces and chimineas, fireworks aerial, fireworks ground, garbage/pit burning, charcoal grills/smokers, wood fire grills/smokers, smoking, and outdoor welding/hot work.

What's Excluded: Controlled Devices only when device(s) (gas/pellet grills/smokers, gas patio fireplaces, gas firepits, gas chimineas, and gas camp stoves) is/are on a hard, non-organic surface and 15' away from vegetation and an extinguisher or water source is readily available on site.

Any prior Fire Emergency and Burn Restriction(s) issued by Grant County are rescinded and replaced by this Fire Emergency and Burn Ban.

THE PENALTY FOR VIOLATION OF THIS BURN BAN IS A CLASS B MISDEMEANOR (NDCC 37-17.1-10.1: MAXIMUM SENTENCE OF 30 DAYS IN JAIL AND \$1,500 FINE).

Reflections on the Words of Life

by Pastor Paul Ferrie, Grace Reformed Church of the Lord Jesus, New Leipzig

We have been considering a section of 1 Peter which began in chapter 1, verse 23, proclaiming the power and effects of the Word of God. Last time in 1 Peter 2:2, we saw that God's Word causes the believer to grow. When a person is born again through the instrument of the Word, he or she begins a relationship with God which will last forever. It is that relationship Peter refers to in chapter 2, verse 3, where we resume. Here Peter says, "If indeed you have tasted that the Lord is gracious." First let me point out that in the original Greek text, the word translated "if" is better translated "since." Peter is saying here that those who have been born again have, in a special way, tasted the grace of God.

There is a sense in which

all people experience God's grace. Life itself is a wonderful gift from God. Everyone born into this world has tasted God's grace in the sense of having life from Him. By the way, that is why abortion is evil. Life in the womb is no accident. We read in Psalm 139:13, "For You created my inmost being; You knit me together in my mother's womb." For man to snuff out life because it is unwanted is a heinous sin.

Furthermore, all who live on this earth have tasted God's goodness in the sustaining of their lives. The Bible brings this out in Acts 17:28: "For in Him we live and move and have our being." Here the apostle Paul teaches that it is the Lord who sustains the life of all people. Have you ever wondered how your heart keeps beating and your lungs keep breathing even when you're sound asleep? God is the giver and sustainer of life.

But in our verse Peter is talking about something beyond these demonstrations of God's grace. Peter is speaking here about God's special grace which He gives only to those whom He causes to be born again. We get the context by

looking back at the preceding verse, where we read, "As newborn babes, desire pure spiritual milk that you may grow thereby." Then starts verse 3: "since you have tasted that the Lord is gracious." Those who have been born again have experienced the special goodness and grace of God: the grace that provides forgiveness of sins and eternal life.

Lord willing, we shall see more about this next time. But in closing I ask you to consider whether you are a recipient of God's special grace. How can you know this? You can know if you have come to a point in your life when you realized that you are a sinner who needs forgiveness and restoration. God's Word plainly teaches that since Adam's fall into sin, every person comes into this world in rebellion against God and estranged from Him (Romans 3:10-18). To leave this life in that condition means eternal separation from God in hell. But God has made a way for us to come out of that condition. Jesus Christ, God the Son, came into this world to live a life of perfect obedience to God's law and to offer that life as a sacrifice to pay the penalty of sin for all who would place their trust in Him alone for salvation. "For the wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Romans 6:23). "He who believes in the Son has everlasting life; and he who does not believe the Son shall not see life, but the wrath of God abides on him" (John 3:36). If you have placed your trust in Christ alone for salvation, then you are a recipient of God's special grace. I hope such is the case for each one reading this.

As we reflect this Holy Week on Jesus's death and resurrection, I would like us to consider passages of Scripture from Romans. Jesus spent time with sinners; He died for sinners; and He died for you and I so we can be transformed and become like Him more and more in this life and be with Him forever in heaven. My prayer is the same resurrection power that raised Jesus from the dead will live in your life today if it does not already.

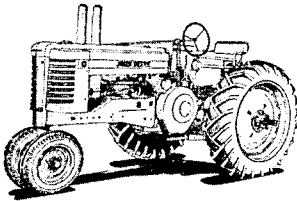

Power of Gratitude Tour' About Overcoming Adversity

Where are the blessing when your father abandons your mother and eleven siblings, and you get put into an orphanage? On the surface, it appears to be a hard luck life, but for Sal DiLeo who lived it, seeing the blessings and developing an attitude of gratitude opened his eyes to a life full of blessings.

Prior to taking personal inventory, however, Sal fell into a downward spiral to the point that his career had fallen apart, his marriage was in ruins, and he planned suicide. But a phone call to Sister Paul, a sister who had cared for him at the orphanage, began to open his eyes to how God had cared for him.

Sal is sharing his insights in his "Power of Gratitude" North Dakota speaking tour this spring. He will recount parts of his story recorded in his memoir, *Did I Ever Thank You Sister?* written thirty years ago after he returned to the now-closed Guardian Angel Orphanage in Joliet, Illinois, run by the Sisters of Saint Francis of Mary Immaculate. The story is planned to be made into the movie, *House of Lion* by Canticle Productions, a North Dakota-based film company dedicated to telling stories of sacrifice, faith, and perseverance.

Sal's retelling of his dramatic childhood has a two-fold mission: helping others to see past adversity to God's blessings and also to encourage women to be open to God's call to religious vocation.

In an interview, Sal talked about his story and mission.

"I was the eleventh in a family of twelve children," he explained. "I learned much later that Sister Regina Marie is the sister who called child welfare on our family. I used to come to the back door of the convent and beg for food. She would make a deal with me that if I let her get me clean clothes and a bath, she would give me breakfast." Years later, my wife Beth and I visited her and many of the sisters from the orphanage in the Franciscans retirement

home in Joliet. We became good friends."

Catholic Charities sent out a caseworker to the DiLeo home. There was no heat or electricity. They were destitute and begged for food. Their mother went to court to try and keep custody of them but lost. The six youngest were supposed to go to the orphanage but the two oldest of them ran out the back door and became street kids.

"Those sisters are the heroes," Sal said. "They gave us what we didn't have: life teachings and continuity. I got up and made my bed, had a shower, had clean clothes, served Mass every morning, and had breakfast. Then I helped stack dishes and set the table for lunch. We had to study and go to bed on time. On Sundays, we got to watch *The Wonderful World of Disney* and eat popcorn."

If he was sick or down, DiLeo recalled the sisters putting an arm around him and comforting him. "And they always remembered our birthdays — something I never had before. They made us feel special, sent us to camps in the summer, and begged for everything for us. When I talk with others from that time, we all fondly remember all they did for us."

From the orphanage, Sal moved to Boy's Town and went on to college. He eventually won the heart and hand in marriage of Beth, the love of his life. But Sal's wounds from deprivation remained open, leading him to the edge of despair following a destructive lifestyle that included an aggressive quest for power and money leading to financial ruin while pushing his wife away.

Once he let God back into his life, Sal was able to forgive those who hurt him and feel gratitude for the blessings. He began anew in his marriage and career by slowly putting pieces into place so that now, Beth and Sal are each other's best friends, blessed by a loving marriage. It wasn't a magic wand. It was a process. We almost got divorced two different times."

Sal was planning to commit suicide one night but looked up Sister Paul from the orphanage in a desperate attempt to find a reason to hang on. "You can't

make it without God. Start building your life with him," she told me. That's when I started praying again."

Sal also took the advice of a good friend and mentor who recommended trying to live by Christ's teaching. He led the way and Beth followed right into the Catholic Church. She converted when their youngest daughter was in third grade. They also renewed their marriage vows. "Now we pray together every morning and every night. When we began praying together, that's when the changes really happened."

Sal said that advice Sister Paul once gave him in the orphanage is now how he looks at the world. "She told me, 'Don't hang your hat on the people who hurt you because that will bring you down. Take a look at the people who helped you. Otherwise, you are letting them hold you back the rest of your life.'"

Sal credits the sisters with giving him and his 3 siblings sound moral teachings, a good education and love. So much so that one of them, Maria, after working in the business world for a few years, became a Catholic sister with the Sisters of the Sacred Heart of Mary, also known as the Religious of the Sacred Heart of Mary. Sadly, she died at the age of 39 on December 31, 1990.

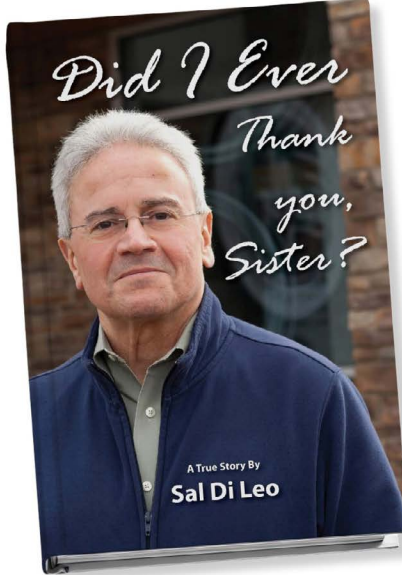
"She was the heart and soul of our family," Sal recalled. "She really reinforced me in my transition back to the faith. We talked quite a bit about God. She was a reminder to us that we needed to have God in our lives."

Sal is now a successful business advisor, sharing his extensive experience with success and knowledge of how to avoid pitfalls. He and Beth also run St. Francis Lodge Bed & Breakfast for women contemplating becoming Catholic Sisters and as a place for Sisters to take time to be alone with God in nature, at no charge to them. 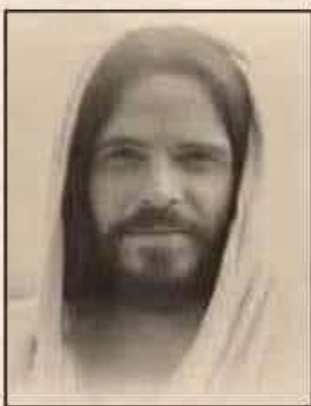
JESUS CHRIST

Jesus was self-educated and spent most of his adult life working as a Teacher. Jesus also occasionally worked as a

Medical Doctor and it is reported that he healed many patients. Up until the time of his death, Jesus was teaching and sharing the good news, healing the sick, touching the lonely, feeding the hungry and helping the poor.



Jesus was most noted for telling parables about His Father's Kingdom and performing miracles, such as feeding over 5,000 people with only five loaves of bread and two fish, and healing a man who was born blind. On the day before His death, He held a Last Supper, celebrating the Passover Feast, at which He foretold His death.

The body was quickly buried in a stone grave, which was donated by Joseph of Arimathea, a loyal friend of the family. By order of Pontius Pilate, a boulder was rolled in front of the Tomb. Roman Soldiers were put on guard.

In lieu of flowers, the family has requested that everyone try to live as Jesus did and believe in Him. Donations may be sent to anyone in need.

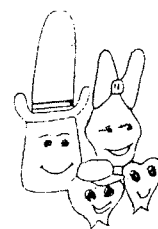

Thoughts for
the Week

As you read this article, Tax Day is now in your rear view mirror since it will be after April 15th, or it is possible that you have had to do an 'extension' to complete your tax return due to missing or incomplete information. However, the pain may be a lingering memory as you will have had to make your payment to the government anyway. If you are one of those that have gotten a 'refund' or in other words, some of the money you already paid in was returned to you, that was most probably a while ago. Generally people who get refunds file as soon as they can to get that back and those that have to pay in, wait until the last minute to do so.

On February 25th of 1913, the 16th Amendment officially became part of the Constitution, granting Congress constitutional authority to levy taxes on corporate and individual income. However, the need to finance the Civil War created one of the first versions of a federal income tax in 1862. At that time President Lincoln signed a law that created the Commissioner of Internal Revenue and imposed an income tax on individuals ranging from rates of 3% on income from \$600 to \$10,000 and 5% on incomes over \$10,000. This version of the tax was repealed 10 years later but came back to life in 1894 with the Wilson Tariff Act. The act levied a 2% tax on incomes over \$4,000, but the US Supreme Court ruled one year later that the tax was unconstitutional. Before the Civil war, the nation derived most of its income from banknotes. The tax rate imposed on individuals was minimal, from 1% to 1.5%. American citizens received virtually nothing in exchange as civil services and protections on the frontier and coasts were minimal. This was resolved with the passage of the 16th Amendment constitutionally establishing income taxes. However, less than 1% of American had to pay the tax in the first days after its inception, thanks to the amendments provisions for numerous taxpayer friendly deductions and exemptions. The rate was

only 1% of net income at that point. Congress later added a 6% rate for incomes of more than \$500,000. Currently, most of the governments federal income tax revenue comes from the nations top income earners. In 2021, the top 5% of earners who are those who earn more than \$252,840 and above, collective pay over \$1.4 trillion dollars in income taxes, or about 66% of the national total.

So what does this all mean to us as citizens of the US? It means that our tax money provides revenue for federal, local and state governments to fund essential services - defense, highways, police, a justice system - that benefit all citizens, who could not provide such services very effectively for themselves. If income taxes didn't exist, it would mean economic upheaval. Government spending plays a significant role in our economy. Without tax revenue, government contracts would dry up, leading to job losses and economic instability. Businesses would face uncertainty, potentially leading to closures and further unemployment. Nearly half of mandatory spending in 2022 was for Social Security and other income support programs such as the Child Tax Credit, food and nutrition assistance and federal employee benefits. Most of the remainder paid for the two major government health programs, Medicare and Medicaid.

The bottom line is taxes are a necessity for our way of life, like them or not. We routinely complain about paying them, but if you are, it is a sign that you are making money. If you are not paying them, chances are you are benefiting from them which may be necessary for your daily life. Whatever reason, we generally consider them as a necessary evil in our lives and the government does not make that easier on us as the tax returns have evolved from a simple one page statement to pages and pages depending on the situation. One thing for sure, for the tax practitioner in your life, it is a busy and confusing time as they wend their way through the tax codes and they will certainly breath a sigh of relief when the 15th rolls around.
