



Reflections on the Words of Life

by Pastor Paul Ferrie, Grace Reformed Church of the Lord Jesus, New Leipzig

Last time we looked together at the first half of 1 Peter 1:6. Peter has listed some of the priceless blessings that God has showered upon His people and tells them that, "In this you greatly rejoice." Here Peter is preparing believers to develop a right perspective toward the sufferings which lie ahead. He is showing us that if, by God's grace, we will view our sufferings correctly, they cannot destroy our peace and joy in believing. Let us look together at the second half of verse 6 to see how Peter puts our trials into perspective: "Though now for a little while, if need be, you have been grieved by various trials."

We need to remember the condition of the Christians to whom these words were first written. They had come to Christ in the early days of the church, when the gospel was being preached by the apostles. They had believed in the Lord Jesus Christ, and as a result, their lives had immediately become more difficult. The people around them considered them strange and started to ostracize them. Former friends and acquaintances and perhaps even family members felt uncomfortable and wanted to avoid them because their Christianity was

now influencing every area of their lives.

Notice what Peter says to these brethren. Not wanting them to lose their joy, he seeks to put their sufferings into perspective. By the phrase "though now for a little while," he is telling believers something very important to remember about sufferings: They are TEMPORARY.

How can Peter say "for a little while"? Some believers have had to suffer all their lives. And some having suffered all their lives, end up dying a horrible death. Peter is obviously comparing the brevity of this life to eternity. When you start comparing life on this earth to eternity in heaven, you can say the suffering is but "for a little while." The apostle Paul says something very similar in 2 Corinthians 4:17: "For our light affliction, which is but for a moment, is working for us a far more exceeding and eternal weight of glory." What a statement this is, made by a man who had suffered terribly and almost constantly! But like Peter, Paul viewed his sufferings in the light of eternity and said they were "but for a moment."

Believers in Christ, we need to learn that our happiness is in God Himself. How slow we are to learn this lesson. We keep seeking happiness in people and material things and pleasant circumstances. But the believer's happiness is to be found in God. Oh, if we would but see that our trials are designed to draw us closer to Him, we would be thankful for them. The Psalmist had this perspective when he wrote in Psalm 73:25-26. "Whom have I in heaven but You? And there is none upon earth that I desire besides You. My flesh and my heart fail; but God is the strength of my heart and my portion forever."

Friend, if you are not a believer in the Lord Jesus Christ, you cannot have such comfort. You do not have the promise that God is working all things together for your good. That promise is for believers. And you cannot say that your trials will last only "a little while." The worst suffering for the unbeliever is still ahead and will be never-ending. Won't you please come to Christ? Tell Him that you see yourself as a sinner and that you are relying on His complete and perfect payment for sin on the cross to make you right with God. Then you can have the comfort of knowing that your trials in this life are brief and profitable-and that a heaven of unending joy is your ultimate destiny.


Through the years Raymond also served on the Cash Township Board and the Grand River Grazing Association Board.




