yet completely forgotten. Then one day when we least expect it, we see that person again and all those memories pop up again. 

Reflections on the Words of Life

by Pastor Paul Ferrie, Grace Reformed Church of the Lord Jesus, New Leipzig

Last time we considered the dilemma that Jonah's sinfulness caused for everyone aboard the ship in which he was seeking to escape from God. All their lives were in danger because of the "mighty tempest" which God sent to bring Jonah to repentance. We come today to Jonah 1:7: "And they said to one another, 'Come, let us cast lots, that we may know for whose cause this trouble has come upon us.' So they cast lots, and the lot fell on Jonah." The sailors think that some god is showing his displeasure by the storm, and they must try to figure out who is to blame.

The lot was a two-colored stone providing a yes or no answer to specific questions. Casting lots was used in ancient times as a way to determine guilt. We see this in Joshua 7, where the lot revealed that Achan had stolen some of the

forbidden articles from Jericho. The lot was also used for obtaining divine guidance. We read in Acts 1:26 how Jesus' disciples chose a replacement for Judas: "And they cast their lots, and the lot fell on Matthias. And he was numbered with the

In our passage, the lot rerealed that Jonah was to blame for the storm. God has many ways of making known what people are trying to hide. As Numbers 32:23 warns, "Be sure your sin will find you out."

The sailors interrogate Jonah in verse 8: "Then they said to him, 'Please tell us! For whose cause is this trouble upon us? What is your occupation? And where do you come from? What is your country? And of what people are you?" These questions reflect the belief that each country had its own gods. The men are trying to determine which god Jonah might be offending. He answers them in verse 9, "So he said to them, 'I am a Hebrew; and I fear the LORD, the God of heaven, who made the sea and the dry land.

Jonah's answer exacerbates his guilt. The fact that he knows the one true living God makes his defiance all the more serious. Jonah's being a Hebrew means that he was part of the nation which enjoyed special privileges from God, the nation which had the Scriptures that revealed God to them. It is equivalent to a Christian's saying, "I am a believer in the Lord Jesus Christ." The believer is, in a sense, more wicked than an unbeliever in his sinning, for

he has been made the object of God's grace and deepest love.

Jonah's claim to fear the Lord is quite ironic because he seems to be doing anything but fearing the Lord. How often is there a discrepancy between the actions of God's people and what they claim to believe. But even though Jonah's life is inconsistent with his profession, he realizes that he still belongs to God. And though the believer sadly continues to sin in this life, his loving heavenly Father will faithfully discipline him to bring him to repentance and restored fellowship. We have the won-

Let us not forget that the trust in this perfect Savior?

derful promise in Philippians 1:6, "that He who has begun a good work in you will complete it until the day of Jesus Christ."

best of men are men, at best. How thankful we should be that God is merciful and gracious. We should never use that as an excuse to sin, but for believers in Christ, it is a great comfort to know that our sins are forgiven because Jesus has paid for them to God's satisfaction. January 1 Becomes New Years Day

The early Roman calendar consisted of 10 months and 304 days, with each new year beginning at the vernal equinox; according to tradition, it was created by Romulus, the founder of Rome, in the eighth century B.C. A later king, Numa Pompilius, is credited with adding the months of Januarius and Februarius. Over the centuries, the calendar fell out of sync with the sun, and in 46 B.C. the emperor Julius Caesar decided to solve the problem by consulting with the most prominent astronomers and mathematicians of his time. He introduced the Julian calendar, which closely resembles the more modern Gregorian calendar that most countries around the world use today.


As part of his reform, Caesar instituted January 1 as the first day of the year, partly to honor the month's namesake: Janus. the Roman god of beginnings. whose two faces allowed him to look back into the past and forward into the future. Romans celebrated by offering sacrifices to Janus, exchanging gifts with one another, decorating their homes with laurel branches and attending raucous parties. In medieval Europe, Christian leaders temporarily replaced January 1 as the first of the year with days carrying more religious significance, such as December 25 (the anniversary of Jesus' birth) and March 25 (the Feast of the Annunciation); Pope Gregory XIII reestablished January 1 as New Year's Day in


Christmas Miracle
