

The last couple of weeks, we have been reviewing budget request from our state agencies. All we hear is cost of continue. one time funding, equity calculations, full time equivalent

employees and temporary fulltime employees. It can be over whelming if you let it. In the end it's really about spending more money, your money regardless of what source it comes from. One thing I find very interesting is how some agencies ask for the authority to hire more employees but never hire all of them, and then use that money for salary increase.

We have heard that most agencies are having trouble keeping or finding qualified employees because of competition from private industry that can offer more wages and benefits than the state can. With that in mind, the Governor has suggested that we consider an equity package of \$90 million to get state employees on par with private industry. He has also has suggested salary increase of 6% the first year and a 4% increase the second year of the biennium at a additional cost of \$50 million. See how the cost of continue comes into play and good thing that he only gets to request. This equity calculation along with the salary increase is going to be one of the first really big cost that we have to settle before we can move any budget

forward and I think that will be the mission of appropriations this week.

We will also address equity increases but we must keep in mind our total contribution package with employees with retirement and medical insurance. Don't get me wrong, I think we have good state employees and need to compensate them fairly, and hope to keep our top talent. I believe equity adjustments need to be made but some of that work has been done with money that has been shifted from unfilled positions and that amount should come out of the

equity package. I believe that if an agency has not filled a position in two years, that position needs to be reevaluated.

We also hear how technology has created efficiency in state offices and that also should be considered when suggesting new FTE. Equity and pay raises will be on the front burner this week and needs to be addressed so individual budgets can be addressed. More to follow. And as always. I am happy to hear your concerns and sug-

JMHCC annual meeting Feb. 9







nah. In this way, God protected Jonah from drowning but continued to discipline His wayward prophet. And it is at this point when we finally see Jonah praying: "Then Jonah prayed to the LORD his God from the fish's belly" (Jonah 2:1). Jonah had no desire to pray up till now because he was running from God. Unconfessed, unrepented sin in a believer's life can kill his or her desire for prayer and communion with God. But the comfort of our verse is that as long as we are alive, it is not too late to turn back to the Lord. Jonah finally sought God again when he was helplessly trapped in the belly of a great fish in the middle of the sea. Note: It is often our afflictions that constrain us to cry out to God in prayer.

Christian, if there is undealt with sin in your life, seek God's grace to grant repentance and restoration to loving communion with Him. A true believer in Christ cannot lose his eternal salvation. It is a gift of God's grace that comes through faith in Christ alone. But the believer can lose closeness and communion with God through deliberate, undealt with sin. There is no greater blessing in this life than walking closely with the Lord. Thoughts for the Week

Why is it that pets are so important to us? There are many health benefits of owning a pet. They can increase opportunities to exercise, get outside and even socialize. Regular walking or playing with pets can decrease blood pressure, cholesterol levels, and triglyceride levels. Pets can help manage loneliness and depression by giving us companionship.

It probably doesn't come as a surprise that owning a dog requires a little bit of energy. Dogs have to be walked and exercised, which means dog owners are out there getting more physical activity than people without dogs. Older people are more likely to take regular walks with a dog than they are with a human, according to one study. Another found that 60% of dog owners who took their dogs for regular walks were considered to get regular moderate or vigorous exercise based on federal standards.

Sure, it can be stressful to have pets when you are afraid one might be sick or you can't figure out how to get them to stop breaking your blinds, but overall, pets are known to reduce stress. Cortisol is a hormone activated by stress, and studies have found that being around animals can decrease cortisol levels. For this reason, many offices are starting to allow employees to bring dogs to work, and some universities are letting students borrow dogs during stressful times of the

Along with medications and lifestyle changes, a pet can help with hypertension. A study of stockbrokers found that hav-

ing a cat or dog helped lower the spikes in blood pressure that happen when a person is stressed. Another study of hospitalized heart patients found that dogs decreased the patients' blood pressure by about 10% in the left side of their

hearts. And if you think that benefits of pets are only limited to dog owners, you would be wrong. Cats also have been shown to be beneficial to their owners. Your little furball could be fighting off heart disease for you. Studies have found that people with cats were 40% less likely to have a fatal heart attack. It's unclear whether the cat's calming effects make the difference or whether people who choose cats as pets are less at risk for heart disease to begin with. Either way, if you're a cat person, you're in luck! (It's possible that dogs have similar benefits, but the study was only done on cat owners.) There are other benefits that animals have been shown to help with, including depression, allergy prevention and less risk of stroke, among others. Spending time with your pet can be relaxing, encouraging the release of endorphins, which are brain chemicals that help us de-stress and feel good. Regardless of what pet that you have, and there are a lot of different kinds of pets out there that people have, that pet can mean as much to you as a human member of your family. Even though you may not be a pet person, many people are and their pets are precious to them. Dogs that are bonded to their humans have been reported to love their masters so deeply that they mourn their death for many years. Cats as well love their humans, even if sometimes they have a funny



Rodney will join the prestigious aviation hall of fame group that currently includes 47 other individuals who have all had a significant impact to the growth, development, and promotion of aviation in North Dakota. Rodney B. Schaaf was born July 20th, 1950 in Hettinger, North Dakota. After graduating from Bowman High School in 1968, Rodney attended NDSU and joined the Reserve Officer Training Corps. Following his graduation in 1972, Rodney joined the Air Force was assigned to pilot training where was named a Distinguished Pilot Graduate with a top 10 standing within the class.

Rodney's first military assignment sent him to the Grand Forks Air Base as a KC-135 flight crew member. Flying KC-135 missions involved completing in-flight refueling and passenger airlift operations worldwide, taking him from North Dakota to Alaska, Spain, England, Hawaii, Guam, Japan, and Korea. During his military service, Rodney achieved the rank of Captain. His missions included refueling aircraft returning from the skies over Vietnam during the conflict. He also acted in the commander role for formation flights of up to six KC-135 tanker aircraft refueling 4 fighters per tanker, moving 30 aircraft to different military bases.

Following his honorable discharge from the Air Force in 1978, Rodney was hired as a pilot for Delta Airlines and continued a successful career through his retirement in 2004. As a Delta pilot, he flew the Boeing 727, 737, 757,767 and MD82 airliners.

Rodney has been an active member of the North Dakota aviation community throughout his life. In 2012, Rodney became the fourth pilot to complete the state's Passport Pro-



gram, where he flew to all 89 public-use airports in North Dakota. Rodney has also assisted many others in their completion of this achievement as he believes in the importance of the program and how it allows

people to interact with the aviation community across North Dakota. Rodney also continually advocates for youth aviation education and development. Throughout the years, he has actively participated in many different aviation related events within North Dakota, as well as

Rodney was also appointed to serve on the Bowman County Airport Authority in 2007 and he acted as the chairman of the board for over a decade. In aison between the Bowman Airport and the county, state, and

He has even been known to offer his hangar space to visiting pilots and their aircraft when severe weather occurs.

As the chairman of the airport authority, Rodney was instrumental in the planning, design, and construction of the new Bowman Regional Airport which was opened to the public in 2015. He volunteered countless hours consulting with contractors, engineers, and state/ federal agencies to ensure that the new airport would be a state-of-the-art facility for Bowman and its neighboring com-

Rodney has also been involved in efforts that would improve all of North Dakota's airports. He has been involved in statewide initiatives with the Airport Association of North Dakota and he has provided testimony before state legislative committees to help promote airport funding initiatives for construction and maintenance projects, representing the "Little Guy" general aviation airports.

Additionally, he has advocated for aviation efforts across North Dakota and has been especially proactive with the Powder River MOA. He has worked with Air Force and FAA staff members in addition to state personnel in North Dakota, South Dakota, and Montana to advocate for and improve the experience for general aviation. His tireless efforts have been ef-

fective to enhance radar coverage, radio communications, instrument approach procedures, and other considerations that enhance safety for aviators

In addition to his dedication to promoting aviation across North Dakota, Rodney has also been an active citizen and community volunteer. He has helped as a Cub Scout leader and has taken numerous young aviators on introductory flights to promote general aviation. Rodnev has also served as a Talbot Township Supervisor and Bowman County Zoning Officer.

Rodney's leadership and support throughout his lifetime has led to significant developments and growth in aviation for the state of North Dakota. The aviation hall of fame committee thanks Rodney for his service and is looking forward to his induction this spring.

Bulldog Country Embroidery Sold and renamed **November Blue**

New Years are for new opportunities and new beginnings. Jenna and Adrian Miller of Raleigh had a jump start to their

2023 New Year's resolutions. In September of 2022 Jenna and Adrian purchased Bulldog Country Embroidery from Alan and Nancy Malm, renaming the company 'November Blue.' "November is the month I was born, and blue is my favorite color, I put the two together and I really liked the name," Jenna said.

Starting a new business or learning the ins and outs of taking over a business requires time, patience, and the willingness to learn and adapt. Jenna and Adrian were ready to take this new opportunity head on with an open mind and eagerness to get the ball rolling. There was a lot more to purchasing the embroidery business than changing the business name. Jenna received all the equipment that went with the business along with established customers. She had to quickly learn the ways around a fifteen-needle embroidery machine. "I sewed for quite a few years making quilts and table runners and I do have a one needle embroidery machine, but it is nothing like the fifteen needle machine that came with the business," Jenna said.

Jenna's current job schedule allowed her time to become familiar with the machines and the new business itself, making it easier to take orders quickly. "I would really like to broaden the business more though and make this my full-time job."

There are numerous steps to take and barriers to overcome to make a business your own, but Jenna and Adrian have been working hard to get their name out there more and build strong customer relationships. 'We just got a Facebook page up and I'm working really hard on setting up a website, but that is going to take some time," Jenna explained.

Jenna has been working with the Flasher School to provide Bulldog/Storm merchandise, available for purchase within the school and at sporting events. She plans to incorporate a website for the school into her everyday business website once the website is up and func-

Winter has been in full swing for a while now, but Jenna and Adrian are already looking forward to the summer months. "Gift shops are going to be opening up for the summer soon. So a fun project I am working on is stuff for the Enchanted Highway gift shop," Jenna said. Caps, t-shirts, window clings and bumper stickers will soon fill the gift shop in Richardton, courtesy of November Blue. A full day of filling orders can

keep Jenna and Adrian busy for twelves hours out of the day, it's more than printing a design on a shirt and sending it off. Jenna makes the designs and layouts in the office, sends them off to be transferred, then the designs are sent back to Jenna to be placed on the merchandise.

"You can get lost in a design with over 70 colors to choose from, and you can spend a whole day switching the text out because there are so many options," Jenna said.

There is a lot of joy watching a project unfold for Jenna and Adrian. The Carson Rural Fire Department received embroidered jackets from November Blue with 92 thousand stitches and 16 different colors of thread. One jacket was finished a day with a four-to-five-hour stitch out and changing the colors on the machine. "It was really neat to see it stitch out," Jenna said.


Many screen printing/embroidery businesses in bigger cities require a minimum on orders. Some Fargo businesses require a \$1,000 minimum while Bismarck business require a 50-piece minimum order. Jenna and Adrian feel every order, big or small, is worth making. "For me, I don't think it's fair to say 'that's not a big enough order' if a family of four wants sweatshirts with their farm or ranch name on them," Jenna explained. "Whether it's one piece or a couple hundred pieces, they're all important," Adrian

Whereas, a YOKEL is a contemptuous term for country bumpkin, a yoke-fellow is a gentleman friend and that's probably a misnomer.



1/4 tsp. black pepper






Gradually whish in broth and milk. Add mustard, salt, nutmeg, black pepper and hot pepper sauce; cook about 15 minutes or until thickened.
