Our children are being taught CO2 is bad yet it is necessary for life. We exhale it when we breathe but activists blame fossil fuels and cows for their gas.

C02 is colorless and odorless produced by breathing and burning carbon or organic compounds. It is naturally present in air and absorbed by plants. Why are we building a pipeline for something we can't see, smell or feel?

Reflections on the Words of Life

by Pastor Paul Ferrie, Grace Reformed Church of the Lord Jesus, New Leipzig

By God's grace, we finished our study of the book of Jonah last time and come today to a new study on the book of Ruth. Ruth is a brief book of only four chapters, and yet one which tells an amazing story that leaves us marveling at the way God works and teaches us many valuable this world.

Among the main messages of this book is that God is working behind the scenes in the lives of His people. It shows us that He has a great and sovereign plan that is being unfolded, even when it doesn't seem that way. In fact, it shows us that God cares about and works in the very ordinary lives of His people, even when those people are straying from Him and making wrong choices.

The book of Ruth also shows us a God of amazing grace. Sometimes this grace is pictured by the main characters. and sometimes it is displayed through the unseen hand of God and the things He causes to happen. Surely another purpose of Ruth is to reveal the heritage of David, Israel's most important king. The story certainly leaves us marveling at the way God preserved the family line which brought not only David, but most importantly, the Messiah Himself into the world.

Let us now see how the book opens in Ruth 1:1: "Now it came to pass, in the days when the judges ruled, that there was a famine in the land." This sentence gives us some significant information. The days of the Judges was a period in Israel's history that came between the death of Joshua, who led the Israelites into the promised land,



and the first king, who was Saul. For a period of about 200 years (approximately 1200-1000 BC), the Israelites were led by various judges. After Joshua died, Israel had no distinct leader and plunged into a cycle which is repeated throughout the book of Judges. First, the Israelites would rebel against the Lord and live deeply sinful lives. Next, God would bring judgment upon them, usually in the form of various groups harassing and seeking to overpower them. Then, in their misery, the people would repent and cry out to the Lord to help them. And finally in each cycle, the Lord would send them a leader, called a judge, who would help bring a measure of deliverance and rest. Later the cycle would start all over again. At the end of the book of Judges, the nation of Israel was in shambles. Its people had

become almost as wicked as the pagan nations whose lands they had conquered. Perhaps the most revealing statement about this time in Israel's history is the verse with which the book of Judges ends: "In those days there was no king in Israel; everyone did what was right in his own eyes" (Judges 21:25). The people desperately needed a perfect King, and He is pointed to in the book of Ruth.

Lord willing, as we go through our study together in the coming weeks, we will learn more and more about that King whom the book anticipates—the Lord Jesus Christ. He is the focal point of history and the One to whom we are all accountable. Friends, are you in a right relationship with Jesus? Are you relying on His saving work alone to make you right with God? Please be sure!



BISMARCK, N.D. - Southwestern North Dakota experienced scattered to widespread rains last week. Most of the area received one-half to one inch of precipitation.


In the District 1 operations area, which includes Bowman and part of Slope Counties, five flights were flown for hail suppression operations last week and two flights for repositioning of aircraft. Rain enhancement operations remained suspended last week due to wet conditions.

Looking ahead, strong to severe thunderstorms are possible in southwestern North Dakota on Tuesday. This could also be the only opportunity for widespread precipitation for the week. High temperatures should average below-normal beginning today and potentially extending into the upcoming weekend.







I'm Still Alive

It is July 7 and ten o'clock at night at the refugee camp. Today we taught Ukranian youngsters about American sports. We did that by tossing a football at them and then they tried to hit it with a softball bat. They didn't want to use the whiffle balls because the football is bigger and easier to hit. Hey, striking things with bats is always a big hit. Then we tossed Frisbees until lunch. The food here at the refugee camp is good. We loaded about 200 bags with food for people who lost jobs and cannot find employment. It was just basic staples. There was oatmeal, cornmeal, ground wheat, flour, salt, macaroni, canned chicken and cans of white beans. There was a time when these food bags once a week was all that they had for daily sustenance. The guys took off for town to deliver it to a distribution station at a church. They should be back any time. I stayed back because there was no need for all of us to be there. The bus that took us here yesterday had a bad rattle in the drivetrain. I wasn't so sure it would get us here. I hope we can take a break tomorrow to swim in the lake. After church on Sunday we will take off for Romania to overnight at a hotel in Bucharest, and then take the flight to Amsterdam and then the Twin Cities. Finally Bismarck and a nice rest from so much sitting down by driving to Mott. It will be hard to get back in the grind once I get home. It will take a few weeks to process

I'm starting to get an inkling of what people are having to endure. I have heard stories to curl my hair.

Funny thing. I spent a lot of time trying to learn some words

and phrases in Ukrainian, and I can't do much with the language. I should have studied Russian, because that is a more useful language in this part of the world. Everyone here speaks Russian. Five of the nine of us speaks Russian. Only one of us speaks Ukranian, and I think he just mostly communicates in Russian.

There have been so many things to see out the windows of the busses we have taken, and I couldn't get the camera out fast enough most of the time. We were in so much of a hurry that we couldn't see so many things that would have been nice to stop for. Those of us who have spent time in the Soviet Union have said that this country isn't too far different from Russia. It is a cool experience to see this part of the world. Well, the guys should be back soon, and I will go over to the "break room" to send this letter off. Things are going well. Only one of us broke a collar bone when he was helping the local people in the village to keep their community center / post office / general store from burning. It looks like the building is a total loss. It happened as we were rushing around to finish the roof of the house we were working on. It looked like a couple of kids had been playing with matches. Oh, and another of us had his ankle swell up. He either bumped it or it is a bug bite. For myself. I would rather break my collar bone than be in the best hospital in Moscow.



"Let's go take a dip in the river," he suggested.


The water was low and sluggish. They laid in the ripples and let the water wash off the chaff from the hay. Then they went to the house to eat.






