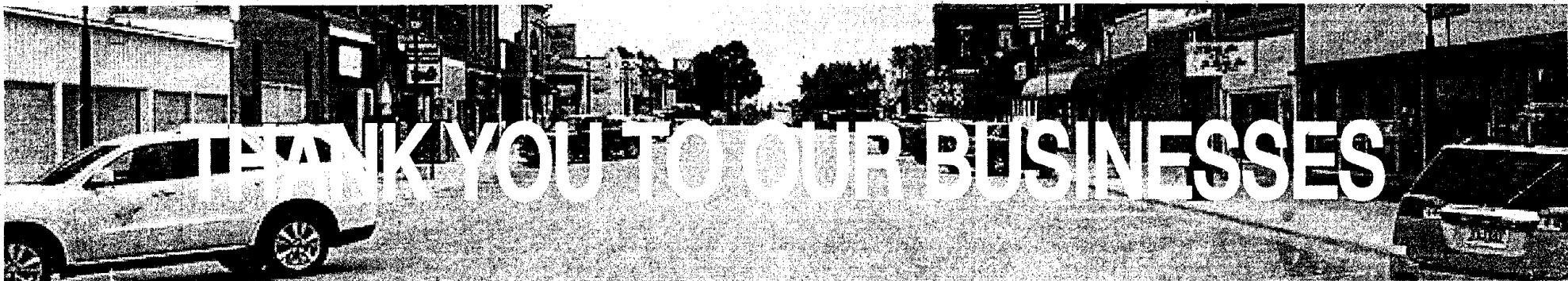



NDSU Extension to Host Grant Writing Workshop

Participants will learn how to identify funding sources and better understand the grant proposal development, submission and review processes.

North Dakota State University Extension will host a two-part interactive Beginner's Guide to Grant Writing workshop 9:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. MDT on Thursday, August 14 and Tuesday, August 26th. The session on August 14th will be held at Memorial Hall in New England, and the session on August 26th will be held in the Legion Hall of the Hettinger County Courthouse in Mott.

The two-day workshop teaches grant writers of all skill levels how to prepare and submit a professional proposal. It is geared toward agricultural producers and those who work or volunteer for nonprofit organizations, educational institutions, community clubs, or local government units and departments. Participants will learn how to develop ideas for winning grant proposals, how to identify and work with funding sources, and advance their understanding of the proposal development, submission and review process. Professional review of a draft proposal is also included.

On August 14th, participants will come to the workshop with an idea and leave with a proposal outline and all the resources needed to expand their outline into a full proposal. They will return on August 26th with a draft proposal ready for peer review.

A past participant shared, "As someone who's never written a grant, this workshop was very well put together and helped me to understand the whole process. There is more to grant writing than I imagined, but there is a lot of resources & assistance available that were highlighted over the two-day workshop."

The cost to participate is \$150, which includes lunch each day and all materials. The workshop has capacity for up to 15 people. Registration is required by August 7. For more information or to register, visit <https://agext-northdakotastate-ndus.nbsstore.net/grant-writing-workshop-hettinger>

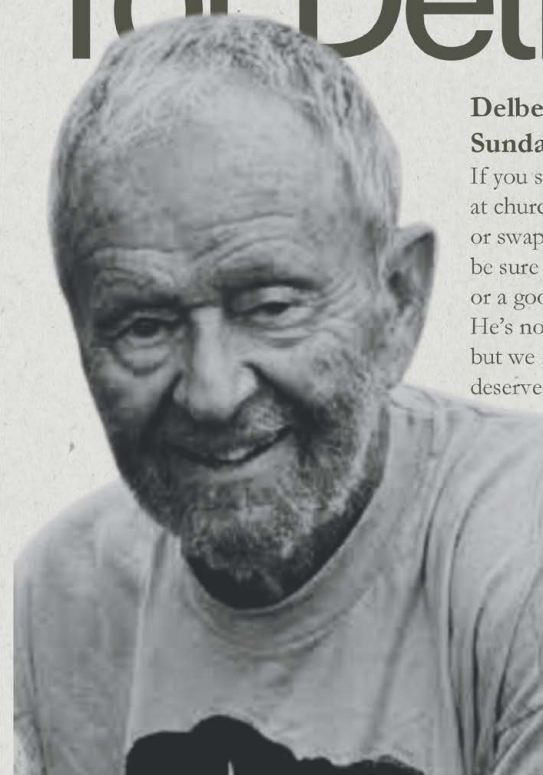

Three-Artist-Exhibit Dakota Buttes Museum Adams County Fair Week

It's a rare treat when we can see and enjoy original art in the southwest corner of ND. It's even more rare when we can see and enjoy the works of three different artists at the same time, all of whom are proficient in a variety of mediums and all of whom are local.

Such is the case for Dakota Buttes Museum's (DBM) next-to-last special event of the 2025 season.

The art show opens Sunday, July 27, before the county fair events in southeast Hettinger, and runs through Sunday, August 3, the last day of the Adams County Fair. Doors open at 1:00 pm and close at 4:00 pm each of those days.

One of the artists, Barb Korang, is a long-time Hettinger native who many perhaps first knew as a caring, efficient nurse. Barb is a self-taught artist, when - after semi-retirement and Covid - she took up painting as a hobby, learning from free, online tutorials. "I've always been interested in art," she says. "My mother and brothers were also." Barb works in a variety of acrylics to create her original pieces. Her advice? "If you try and it doesn't work out, just try again." Good advice for all of us to live by.

The second featured artist in

DBM's August art show is Robin Reynolds, an established potter. Originally from Minot, ND, she has lived in Bellingham, WA, Hebron, ND, and now, Bowman, ND, where she teaches classes in her studio. Because of her interest in native clay, she uses a variety of clays from Hettinger and north of Rhame, ND. Be sure to ask about her "bang pots," created with a firecracker in a lump of clay. When one blows, it creates an organic cavity which she then finishes with a pinch-pot method.

Paul Hendrickson, of the WhiskeyRoad Gallery on Hettinger's main street, is the third featured artist in this year's show. Many will recognize Paul as Hettinger's Main Street artist. His studio, located on the NE corner of Main, across from the Chamber offices, illustrates his eclectic talents in a variety of mediums, some of which are photography, watercolors and oil. Paul, who grew up in Scranton, ND, credits his high school art teacher, Perry Nolan, with setting him on the path to becoming an artist.

The art show, free and open to the public, is open from 1:00 - 4:00 pm MDT, Sunday, July 27 through Sunday, August 3, with a "Meet the Artists" event with refreshments, on Sunday, August 3.

All are welcome to this special event during the Adams County Fair.

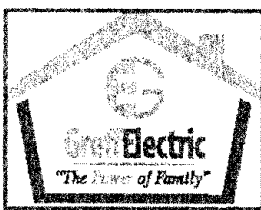

Cloud Seeding Operations Sum- mary For July 14 - July 20, 2025

BISMARCK, N.D. - Last week, showers and thunderstorms brought two to three inches of rain to portions of southwestern North Dakota.

In the District 1 operations area, which includes Bowman and part of Slope Counties, there were three operational seeding flights, two reconnaissance flights, and two reposition flights last week. Rain enhancement operations resumed last week.

Southwestern North Dakota should see daily chances for showers and thunderstorms during the work week and then next weekend could bring the start of a hot and dry weather pattern.

Radar facilities in Bowman operate around the clock during the NDCMP. Radar images can be viewed on the Atmospheric Resource Board's web site at <http://www.swc.nd.gov/arb>. The NDCMP will continue through the end of August.

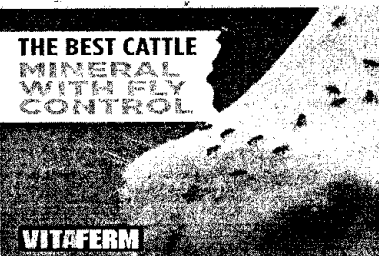

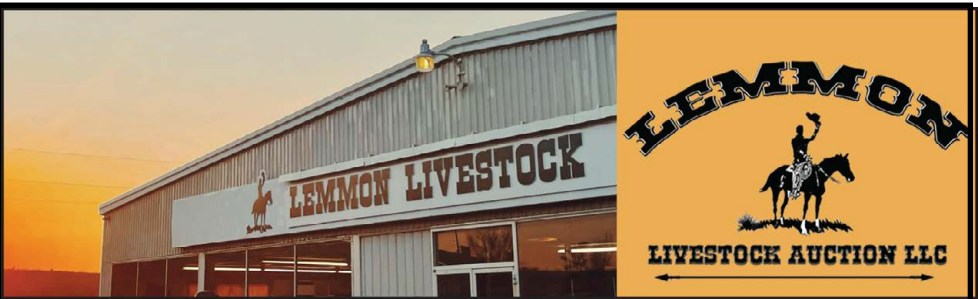


Wild, Wild West



I want to take this opportunity to reflect on the Gospel that was read last weekend in our Church. It is a Gospel reading that many of us know from Luke 10:38-42. This is the Gospel that Jesus is visiting Martha and Mary and Martha comes to Jesus complaining that Mary will not help her. Jesus replies to her "Martha, Martha, you are anxious and worried about many things. There is need of only one thing. Mary has chosen the better part and it will not be taken from her."

First, this Gospel raised the question, what is the one thing necessary in our lives? We hear the answer in this Gospel, God, but does our entire lives point to that answer? Its easy to say God, but do we prove that on Monday when things get tough at work or on Friday when the work week is over and time to have fun. This is not an easy question to rightly answer all the time but one that we can work towards following the examples of Mary and Martha.

Second, many of us like to relate much more to Martha than Mary. She is the one doing something and being productive. We actually sympathize with her in our minds saying "Jesus, don't be so hard on her, she is serving you." The reason we, living here in Southwest North Dakota, sympathize with Martha is because we are the same way. We live to be productive and help others. Many of us will do anything to prevent from doing nothing and many times

prayer and practices of the faith are those things because it seems like we are doing nothing. Productivity becomes our one necessary thing. We easily relate to Martha in this Gospel, but God is calling us to something more.

As I've already talked about, we relate to Martha well and her work, but Mary on the other hand we struggle with. She is the one sitting and doing nothing which is the enemy to productivity. But Mary is doing something! She is reflecting and contemplating who this man in front of her is. She is reflecting on the Son of God sitting in front of her in the Incarnation. The fact that he has already forgiven the sins of those who needed it most. He is claiming the salvation of all through his Sacrifice on the Cross. Mary is taking the time to reflect and meditate on the mysteries of the faith. What an opportunity to take and grow in faith!

Is being a Martha a bad thing? No, but it requires the mindset of Mary focused on God. When we keep this mindset, a person goes from being worried and anxious about getting things done to trust and surrender that God will take care of it. This brings an amazing peace that only God can give to everything going on. God, thank you for everything that you place in my path, grant me the grace to accept all things as coming from you. Amen

Lets be very clear, the one thing necessary in life is Communion with God. Focusing less on what I can do for Him and more on what can God do for me. Let's focus our minds on God, while still remaining strong in our identity of service in Southwest North Dakota.

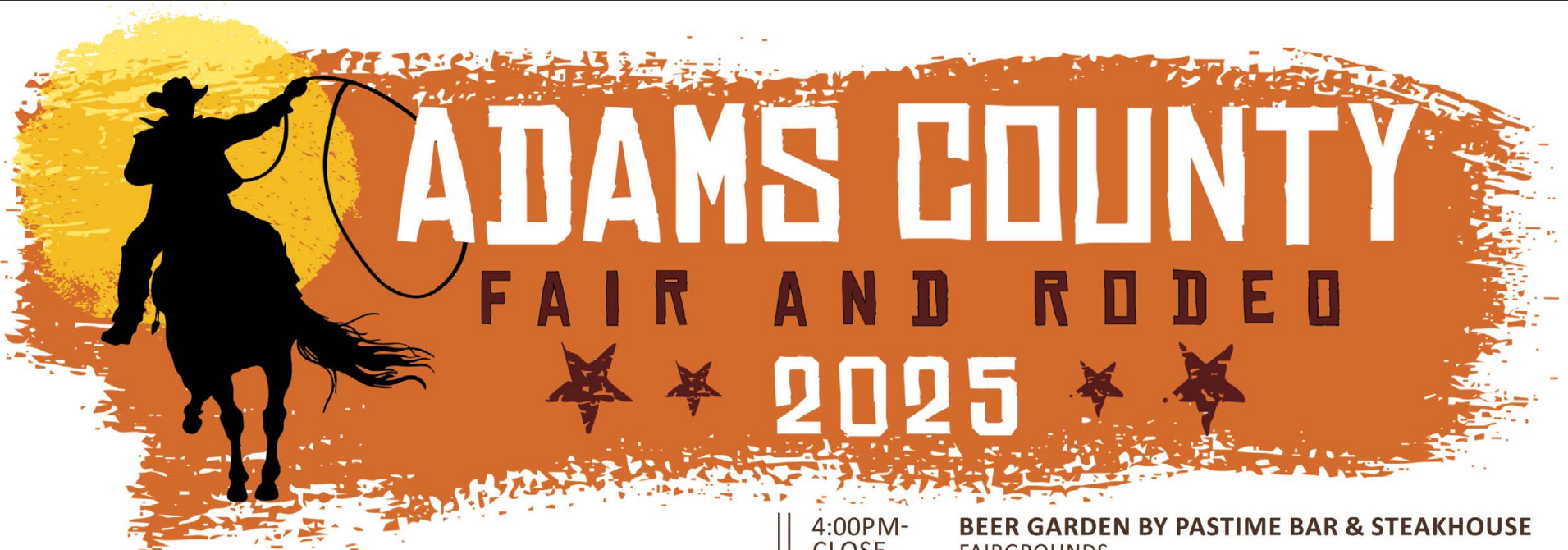

Comedian Ron White says, "You can't fix stupid" and, I'm going to have to agree. Case in point? Those California wildfires in Altadena, Pacific Palisades, Malibu, the hills around Los Angeles and Ventura counties, Castaic, Sepulveda Pass, Brentwood, Bel-Air, and Ventura County last year. The LA Times reports that damages total \$250 BILLION...with a "B"! Tennessee, by contrast, has an average home price of a little under \$335,000—less than half of its Cali counterpart—and respective childcare costs come in at approximately \$10,800 a year." Can, you say...common sense? So as Californians continue to fiddle as their communities burn down, I guess you can say that at least one business owner has common sense. Have a great week.

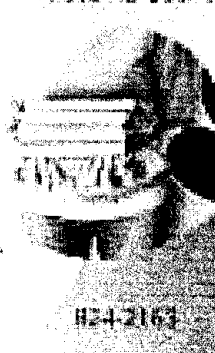

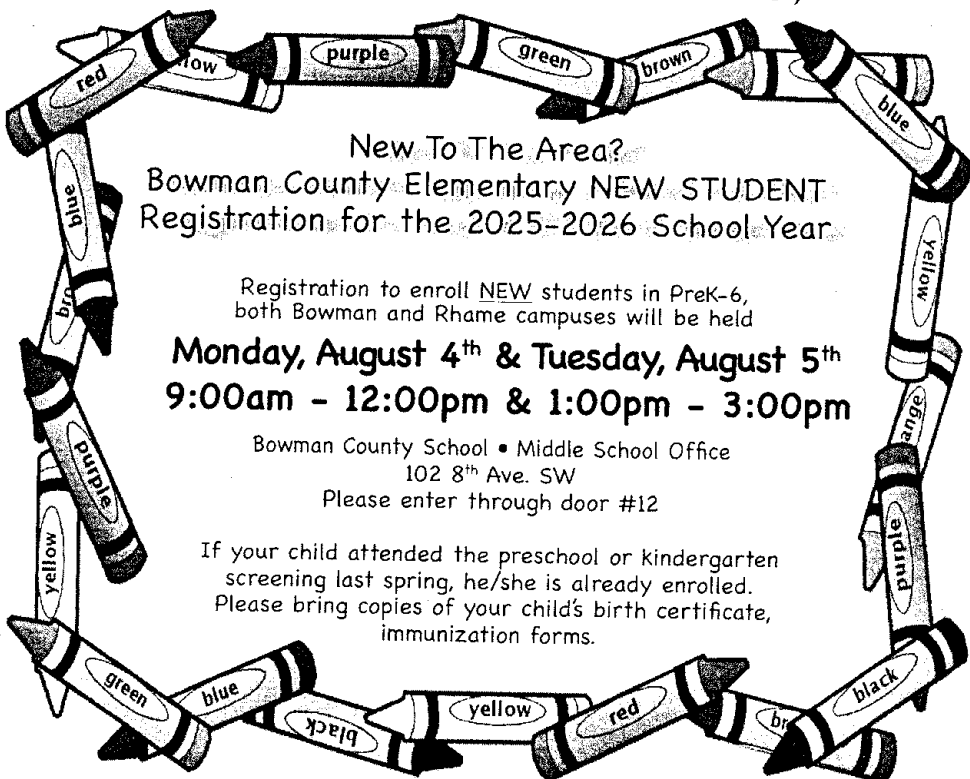

Reflections on the Words of Life

Last time we began looking together at 1 Peter 2:11: "Beloved, I beg you as sojourners and pilgrims, abstain from fleshly lusts which war against the soul." We saw that the apostle Peter is lovingly appealing to God's people, the church, to live lives that are pleasing to God. He refers to believers as "sojourners and pilgrims." This phrase could better be translated "aliens and temporary residents." Peter is using these descriptive words to contrast believers from unbelievers.

Let us be careful here to understand just what this means. We who are believers are like unbelievers in many ways. We do most of the common tasks of life no differently from unbelievers. Typically, we drive the same kinds of cars and live in the same kinds of houses and hold the same kinds of jobs as unbelievers. We have the same responsibilities as spouses and parents and community members and citizens as do unbelievers. So what makes believers different? Believers belong to God. And as such, we do not fit with the world system which is content to leave God out.

The use of the word "aliens" refers to the fact that the ultimate and highest loyalty of the Christian is not to anything on this earth. Believers are citizens of the Kingdom of God. And when this world as we now know it is long gone, the Kingdom of God will continue forever.

er. Christians are but transient residents. We are citizens of one country temporarily residing in another country. Though we live for now in this world, we should view this world as only a temporary dwelling place.

This is NOT just a theological point. How we view ourselves in this world will have a tremendous effect on the way we think, speak, and live. When people view themselves as belonging to this world only, then they will be motivated by things which have their main benefit in this world. For the sake of time and space, let us consider just one example: our opinion on the practice of abortion. Some might wonder how such a thing could have come to be not only allowed but even praised in the United States of America. Sadly, abortion has become a lucrative business, and the first consideration of many on this issue is PROFIT. Note I do not say "the first consideration of ALL" because I realize that there are unbelievers who oppose abortion for moral reasons. But the reasons why believers should

oppose abortion are rooted in God's Word. God is the One who creates life. These beautiful words are found in Psalm 139:14-15: "For You formed my inward parts; You covered me in my mother's womb. I will praise You, for I am fearfully and wonderfully made." All those whom God forms in the womb bear God's image. Every life has value and worth.

When we consider such things as abortion, the believer should not start from the viewpoint of this world, but from the teaching of God's Word. The considerations of what pleases the Lord must always override the considerations of what might bring benefit in this world. And so, when the believer looks at abortion, he or she should view it as murder: taking the life of one whom God created and who bears His image.

Friends, if you are not yet a believer in the Lord Jesus Christ, please know that this present world will pass away. Please don't let this world or the things that it offers be your main focus or priority. God's Kingdom is eternal, and only those who have placed their trust in Christ alone for salvation will be part of it. If you are not one of those, please ask God to enable you to change your citizenship by granting you faith in Christ.

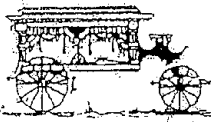

The jump pillow was installed on July 23 and will be ready for play on July 31. The jump pillow will follow the same hours as the splash pad from 8:00am to 8:30 pm.

"This is one more way we're investing in quality of life," said Brooklyn Engelhart, Director of Tourism and Creative of BCDC. "We want families to see Bow-

man County as a place where kids can play, memories are made, and community is built."

The jump pillow project was funded through the BCDC Growth Fund, a program dedicated to enhancing Bowman County's vibrancy and appeal. The installation was coordinated with Bowman Parks and Recreation, who will manage the day-to-day maintenance. During winter months, the jump pillow will be covered to protect it from the elements and ensure it's ready for another season of fun each spring.

BCDC and Bowman Parks and Rec will host an informal grand opening celebration for the splash pad, school of promise playground, and jump pillow on August 8 at 5:30pm inviting families to come check it out and give the jump pillow a try. This celebration will also unveil the Jon Brosz Memorial Bench.

A few years ago she lost her lifetime love and husband Allan Carothers. Her heart was broken, yet she continued on as the strong woman she had always been.

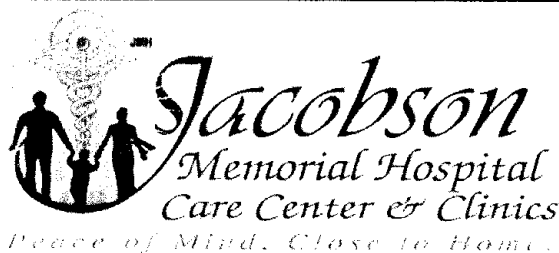
She was 86 and was still as beautiful as ever. I always thank God we come from the same gene pool. One can hope.
