



News from the senate

As we draw near to the end of the first period of the session, every bill has had a hearing and at least one vote. North Dakota is the only state in the union that allows that which is something I believe we can be proud of. It may take a little longer, but everyone's ideas are given a voice in the process. With over 1629 bills drafted, 1075 were introduced, about 400 were moved forward by the house and about 300 will be forwarded by the senate. With over 300 bills being killed, we still have more requests of over \$750 million or more for spending than we have money for. There is some duplication in that amount, but we will still have to make some tough choices and will have to reject what is not our priority.

Property tax relief, school choice and property rights seem to be the hot button issues that will be focused on this second stage of this session. Now the process will begin with a committee hearing and the opportunity for public comment.

I have always found it interesting how a bill on one side will seem to sail through with little opposition and have nothing but trouble on the other side. A second look at the bills does provide time for everyone to scrutinize the effects of the bill and what you thought it

was going to do is not always the case. Property tax reduction and reform is still the top

of the list of most legislators. The primary residence tax and the homestead tax credit are still the most popular way to provide tax relief. There have been some additions that provide some relief to agricultural property tax relief but greatly reduced rates. The discussion has revolved around the idea that agricultural property generates revenue, like commercial property and should not receive relief. It is also argued that farm buildings are exempt from property taxes and therefore should not need any more relief.

I believe that agricultural property should receive substantial relief for small rural communities for agricultural pays a large percentage of the amount of our pollical subdivision that is levied by property taxes. This will be a discussion that we linger in the final days of the session.

We are on break until March 5th and then back to doing the people's work. Your District 31 legislators will be hosting a legislative forum for the public on March 22 in Flasher ND. The public will be given an opportunity to askes questions and communicate with your legislators. More to follow and we are always happy to hear your concerns and questions.

The Call to be Great Souled

Fr. Greg Hilzendeger, Pastor Holy Trinity-Hettinger, Sacred Heart-Reeder, Sacred Heart-

The virtues are one of the most overlooked aspects of the Christian life. This is quite unfortunate, as the virtuous life is the road to happiness and human fulfillment. Most importantly, the more we cultivate the virtues through God's grace, the more Christ-like we become. A virtue is a habitual disposition of choosing the good. Virtues are the varied habits which we can develop to consistently choose the good, true and beautiful. We grow in the virtues through continued practice and cooperation with the grace of God.

There are a number of virtues, all worth our study and practice. Today I'd like to speak a bit more on an essential but relatively unknown virtue: magnanimity. Magnanimity literally means "great souled." The magnanimous person possesses great confidence in the goodness of God and demonstrates a self-possession which moves them to desire and seek to do great things for God. They are

not content with mediocrity or merely doing the minimum, but are always seeking the "more." In order to be magnanimous, we must first have a healthy understanding of the goodness of God present in us and reject any false humility that would say, "I'm no good" or "I could never do anything great." We must have a humble confidence- recognizing that on our own, we can do nothing (cf. Jn 15), but with God, we can truly accomplish great things. The magnanimous soul is willing to make sacrifices in order to do great things for love of God and others. We are all called to greatness. Pope Benedict XVI once said, "The world offers you comfort. But you were not made for comfort. You were made for greatness!" May we ask God for the grace to grow in magnanimity and seek ways to choose heroic love and service. These need not be grand gestures, but can be found in abundance in our daily lives. Nevertheless these acts will require us to step out of the comfortable prison of self-concern into the vast horizons of self-sacrificial love. May we become the great







Tuesday, March 25th was the first of hopefully many more Ladies' Nights at St. Martin's Catholic Parish in Hazen, North Dakota. My Daughter and I have been working and praying tirelessly to plan our first ever Women's Night: a night for women to connect, share and be inspired to become an "Everyday Saint." Meat and cheese trays laid out, tea and coffee brewed, tables decorated and speakers charged we were ready for no one to show up!

How wrong we were, all our worrying was for naught, the room was filled with over 35 attendees, including Michelle Duppong's Parents, Ken and Mary Ann: Serendipitously so, or maybe not? The evening's topic was "Everyday Saints" with keynote speaker, Fr. Thomas Grafsgaard postulator for the Michelle Duppong's Cause for Sainthood.

Following a blessing Fr. Grafsgaard dove into the night's topic, Everyday Saints. Fr. Thomas knows his topic well and he had a captive audience. He talked about Radiating Joy, the Michelle Duppong story and addressed some of the biggest questions facing the cause to-date. "What makes her saint worth?" He gave a succinct but reasonable explanation, she has gained a cult following across the world extending far beyond the reaches of Havmarsh. North Dakota. Michelle also has what is referred to as "The Odor of Sanctity:" a term used to describe a sweet smell that is said to emanate from saints or the reputation of a saint's holiness. These two

attributes propelled her from a shy farm girl into a rarified air, the air of the blessed holy warriors and protectors that came before her: St. Thomas, St. Gertrude, St. Paul an endless list of Everyday Saints.

The microphone was then handed over to Michelle's parents; they spoke about Michelle's life, growing up on the family farm with her five siblings. Michelle was easy going, obedient and eager to please, while her siblings required more attention. Michelle attended NDSU studying horticulture; she soon felt a calling to ministry and became a FOCUS Missionary (Fellowship of Catholic University Students). After FO-CUS Michelle went onto work for Bishop Kagan and was the driving force behind the first Thirst Conference held at the civic center in Bismarck. The event was completely free with internationally known speakers, Scott Hahn, Dr. Edward Sri and Cardinal

Father gave a few last thoughts and shared a recording of Michelle with us to end his talk. Several things resonated with me but the most convicting would be, "The only real sadness, the only real failure, the only great tragedy in life, is not to become a saint." (Leon Bloy, a French Catholic, novelist) How many opportunities have we dismissed out of fear, moments in time we will never get back, moments we could have been an "Everyday Saint" and changed someone's world?







TO BE PREPARED

A timely Confession of sins (Sacrament of Reconciliation, for Catholics) is a worthy element in preparing for our death. It is salutary to receive the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick as one approaches death. This sacrament is not to be postponed to the last possible moment but may be celebrated during any significant illness, and it may be repeated as one's condition deteriorates toward eventual death. It is ideal that sacramental Reconciliation be an integral part of the Anointing rite; and that the Anointing rite conclude with Holy Communion (termed Viaticum, or "food for the journey"). We all hope to die with nothing but venial (lesser) sins on our account; i.e., to die "in the state of grace," which means without mortal sins which would bar us from entry into heaven. For Catholics, these sacramental rites usher us through the work of preparing well for our death.

NOT TO DIE ALONE

Before I was diagnosed as having incurable and terminal cancer, I did not think often about my own death.

dying). What will it be like to die? I have never died before. What will that passage through the thin veil of "death" be like? I have pondered the prospect of dying alone, when the moment comes. And I have wept copious hot tears begging God that I not die alone, that I be accompanied by loved ones, be they fellow monks, family or friends at my deathbed. Dom Hubert van Zeller, a monk of Downside Abbey, England, would put our minds at ease on this matter. First and foremost, God will be present at our death. As van Zeller puts it: "Nothing could be more foolish than to imagine death coming down the street while God happened to be looking the other way" (in his book titled, Death In Other Words). I believe the Holy Trinity, Father, Son and Spirit will be on duty when I die. (Could it be otherwise?) I believe, too, that my mentor in monastic life, St Benedict of Nursia will be on hand, and my late junior-masters Br Aaron Jensen, OSB, and Br Basil Kirsch, OSB: so too my late abbots, Robert West, OSB, Lawrence Wagner, OSB, Patrick Moore, OSB, and Brian Wangler, OSB; so too Mother Mary (of course), and so many others now in the beatitude of heaven. They will be present to

the eyes of faith the great cloud of witnesses who watch over us day by day, if only we could firmly believe they will be in attendance over us on our last day, in our last hour, we should hardly be lonely on our deathbed. If some of the living-fellow monks, family, friends-are also in attendance, so much the better. If we understand that "death" does not exist; that dying is merely passing through a thin veil between mortal life and heavenly beatitude, we should not fear making that passage to the other side. We only need say, "Goodbye" (God be with ye); and "See you later."

THE END

Way back in Reflection #6 of this series. I pondered running out of essay ideas at #10 or so. Here we have arrived at #21. We have been mulling over the topic of dying and death in the past few Reflections. I have said my piece.

Like the little boy drafted to play the part of the Fall wind at the grade school play, twirling and strewing dried tree leaves brought out from a paper grocery sack, who accidentally twirled off the front of the country school stage down to the gymnasium floor, then scampered across and back stage in comical exit; like the tyke I was, reciting a few poem lines in front of the county school stage curtain wishing the audience well, I make my exit; I take my leave.

Perhaps the newspaper installments will cease with this Reflection #21. To my four-hundred-fifty-plus email contacts, I intend to give periodic medical updates, without further elaboration. This labor of writing, and the blessing of corresponding with so many readers, has been very therapeutic for me. I thank my kind readers, and I say, "God be with you, and See you later.' My love to you all.

In our last time together, we barely got into 1 Peter 1:23, just mentioning the first 4 words: "Having been born again, not of corruptible seed but incorruptible, through the word of God which lives and abides forever." In the previous verse Peter commanded believers to have fervent love for one another, and the beginning of this verse gives the reason why: The believers had been born again. They were part of God's family and thus enabled to love one another as brothers and sisters in Christ.

It is important to understand what being born again means, as this is often misunderstood. Many people think that being born again means simply believing the gospel. In other words, they think when a person believes that Jesus died on the cross to pay for his or her sins and was raised from the dead, to being born again. But technically (and sometimes we need to be technical) that is NOT what the Bible means by being born again. When the Bible speaks of being born again, it refers to something that happens to a person BEFORE he or she believes the gospel. It is a miracle done by the Holy Spirit to make a person spiritually alive, who was spiritually dead and totally incapacitated from doing anything that could please God. In fact, the Bible teaches that a person will never believe the gospel until he or she has been born again. Now, when a person is born again, he or she will inevitably believe the gospel. But being born again is not synonymous with believing the gospel. In other words, the new birth is not ultimately just a difference in the content of what a person believes. It is much deeper and more fundamental than that.

The Bible speaks of two births. In natural birth, all of us receive the fallen sinful nature which has been passed on from our first father Adam. All of us are born sinners. As Ro-

mans 3:23 says, "For all have sinned and fall short of the glo-

ry of God." We read in Romans 5:12, "Therefore, just as through one man sin entered the world, and death through sin, and thus death spread to all men, because all sinned." It is this first or natural birth in sin that makes it necessary for us to have a second birth. The second birth is God's giving a new nature. Just as in the first birth, a person inherits the sinful nature which is in rebellion against God, so in being born again, a person is given a new nature which loves God and desires to please Him.







As you walk into the Hettinger County Courthouse in Mott the first thing you see is a very large oil painting of a buffalo hunt.

On October 5, 1948 Coun-Commissioners Jacobs, Roth and Kibble asked Marie Weinberger, of rural Regent, to do a painting for the courthouse. She agreed to do so at the age of 62 years old.

There were no photographs or drawings to use as ideas for the endeavor so she relied on oral histories and stories as her basis. She set up a canvas in her living room and began her work. The only lighting in the room was a couple of lamps and the room had only a small west window. The canvas was almost as tall as her small living room and filled an entire section of a wall from the ceiling to the floor. She sat on a small stool to paint the bottom areas.

The colorful painting depicts several men on horses with spears in the middle of a small herd of running buffalo on a tanned cowhide complete with tail. Below the actual scene, which appears to be on two posts, are three faded boards describing the hunt.

The inscription says "The last buffalo hunt in what is now Hettinger County in the late spring of 1884, in which Levi Colgrove and his son Jim took part. Levi was the father of Will Colgrove, a former county commissioner and was the first white man to live in this county. No buffalo were seen in this country after the hunt."

There is a portion of a weathered wagon wheel and a buffalo skull peeking out beneath the boards. A wild pink rose is growing in the lower left hand corner which is native to the area and now our state flower.

The painting is about five feet by seven feet in size with a simple brown wood frame. She was paid \$300 for her efforts—a large amount in those

In 1981 the painting was part of a traveling art exhibit and was displayed in the North Dakota Historical Museum in Bismarck for part of a vear. It was featured in the Museum in the Fall 1981 edition of the ND Horizon magazine. When it was returned to Mott, there were several cracks across the painting from being rolled up for travel and bits of paint had fallen granddaughter painted over the cracks so they would no longer show.

The only formal art training that Marie DeFord Weinberger ever had was a few classes in high school in Osage, Iowa where she was born and grew up. She married Frank Weinberger in Iowa and they homesteaded in St. Croix Township northeast of Regent in October 1909. They had 6 children, Fred, Grace, Eileen, Francis, Neil and Neileen. Frank died from a sudden heart attack in November 1948 shortly after she was commissioned to do the painting.

Over the years, Marie did many smaller paintings and crafts to help pay her bills. She made molds with rubber poured over an article then peeled off after it cooled. She painted the new items in var-

used a brown stain as she prepared them for sale. Some items she made out of plaster of Paris included door stop cats, buffalo skull ash trays, and a covered wagon with a team of oxen. She also made her own hats, some enamel jewelry, did taxidermy with pheasants, wrote poems and skits and started a novel about the Badlands. She was also a leader in numerous organizations in the area.

Marie Weinberger was a very multi-talented woman. A stroke caused her death at the age of 75 but her art lives on for many to enjoy.


